

An Allegorical Discourse On "The Return From the Chase.

With his dim old eyes he looks off and sees the hunters going out to the fields, ranging them all day and at night-fall coming home, the game slung over the shoulder; and reaching the door of the tent the hunters begin to distribute the game, and one takes a coney and another a rabbit and another a roe. In the morning he shall devour the prey, and at night he shall divide the spoil.


