JUST IN CASE we forget to write anything nice about fathers on Father's Day, we're passing along some comments we read in a newspaper editorial, the writer of which admitted was stolen from somewhere else, and he didn't know where either. But the thought is good, even if we can't credit the original author. It points out that often nowadays the true role of the father in the family gets obscured by all the little things that are expected of him:

"It is hard for today's father to seem to be the defender and the leader of his family, when he is expected to be an errand boy, babysitter, accountant, janitor, mannequin, harlequin, vet, pet, guinea pig, music critic, mechanic, pot of gold, sounding board, referee, conferee, teacher, preacher, teacher and general all-around household appliance.

"While it is true that civilization has taken us far enough along that the father, literally speaking, no longer is required to spear lions, share game, pull the plow or combat intruders, figuratively, he still does these things.

"His weapons now are his vote, his pen and his knowledge of laws. His tools are ideas, business machines, scientific instruments and currency. It may not look so heroic, the way he leads and defends now, but it is no less difficult for him and no less challenging. His moments of fierce pride and triumphant joy are fewer and farther between than when his work and combat were direct.

"Unlike his forerunner who confronted the wolf with bow and arrow, the father of today sometimes has trouble even seeing exactly what the challenges are.

"So it would seem that such a man exhibits even more fortitude and heroism than did the family father in less complex times. As

Services for John Robert Dean, 88, a longtime Sudan resident, were held at 2 p. m. Tuesday in the First Methodist Church here with the Rev. Robert Brown, pastor, officiating, assisted by the Rev. Willie Hazel of Plainview.

Masonic graveside rites and burial were in the Sudan Cemetery, directed by Hammons Funeral Home of Littlefield.

Dean died Sunday in the South Plains Hospital in Amherst. He was born in Bowie, Texas, and moved to Sudan from Ryan, Okla. in 1923. He had a Real Estate office in Sudan and for more than 40 years was active in the development and progress of this area. His latest project was the development of a new housing addition in Sudan.

A member of the Sudan First Methodist Church, Dean served in many church offices and at the time of his death was an honorary member of the Official Board of the church. He was also a member of the Sudan Rotary Club and of the Masonic Lodge.

Dean built his first cotton gin in Ryan, before Oklahoma was even a state, in 1906. He then took a car agency, which he traded for an interest in the Stanfield Rancy in Oklahoma. When he came to Sudan he bought a cotton gin which he later sold to Ves Terry, and built another gin across the highway, in 1924. In 1925, he sold that gin and built the Dean Gin west of Sudan, which later became co-op, and

Absentee Voting Starts Monday

Absentee voting in the First Primary Election will begin Monday, April 15, 1968. The place to vote absentee in the First Primary Election will be the County Clerk's office at the Courthouse in Littlefield.

County Clerk, Charles Jones, has suggested that Lamb County voters wishing to vote absentee

in person at the County Clerk's office should bring their Voter Registration Certificate with them to present at the time they request to vote by absentee ballot.

The following persons, and no other, may vote by mail:

1. Qualified voters who because of sickness or physical disability cannot appear at the polling place

on the day of the election.

2. Qualified voters who expect to be absent from the county of his residence on election day and during the Clerk's regular office hours for the entire period for absentee voting.

Jones further stated that qualified voters who are members of the Armed Forces of the United States, his spouse and dependents residing with or accompanying him are entitled to vote absentee by mail upon making a sworn application by mail for absentee ballot or an Official Federal Post Card Application.

Jones concluded by reminding Lamb County Citizens to call or visit the County Clerk's office if further information is desired and that absentee balloting will end April 30.

PETITION SIGNED FOR CITY SETUP

Some 67 qualified voters in Sudan signed a recent petition for a change in the city commission from two councilmen to five commissioners, which would give Sudan a larger representation in the city council.

This petition, however, must be checked and double checked before signatures can be affirmed as "legal qualified voters" and then public announcement must be advertised 30 days prior to a called election where voters in the city will have the opportunity to vote for or against the new city council organization as petitioned.

Hospitals And You

For the first seven months of 1967, hospital costs throughout the nation have increased 14.3 per cent over the same period of 1966.
What are hospitals going to do about it, the public wants to know. What are the reasons, and how and when will it level off?
Floyd Rowell, administrator of South Plains Hospital, Amherst, explains that hospitals do not apologize for rapidly increasing costs. "Many factors pushing costs up the scale are external ones--something hospitals have no control over." He cited wage increases, expensive equipment, and special care areas, such as intensive care units and coronary care units, as costly factors.
"Hospitals cannot control the cost of a said piece of equipment, but they can refuse to buy the many costly items available. That one costly machine, however--a respirator, for instance, which takes over breathing functions for an infant fighting to expand his lungs--may save a life.
"Could you, if you were me, say 'no'?"
Today the nation's hospitals are caught up in an explosion of technical knowledge. Medical science has already increased the average life span 20 years. Ten years ago an x-ray department in a hospital could be fully equipped at a cost of \$10,000. Today, the cost is from \$50,000 to \$500,000.
"Equipment in a hospital never wears out; it only becomes obsolete," Rowell said.
Physicians and hospital officials have discovered patients benefit greatly when all critically ill patients can be confined in one area, designated as an intensive care unit, rather than distributed throughout the hospital in private rooms, often far from the central nursing station. Another new

concept in care for heart patients is a coronary care unit. Studies show a 30 per cent lower fatality rate is the result of treatment in such a unit.
Equipment and special care units are expensive items, "but your health is the most precious asset you have," emphasizes the hospital administrator. "Would you trade it for a dollar, or even many dollars?"
