Activities Mark FHA Week

"FOCUS ON POSITIVE ACTION" is the theme of National FHA Week which will be observed by Sudan Chapter Future Homemakers of America, March 30 through April 5. They join chapters throughout Texas in carrying out special projects and activities during this week to give exposure to what youth is doing in a positive way to promote the principles of good citizenship.

There are more than 600,000 members of this national organization for home economics students in over 12,000 junior and senior high school chapters throughout the country. These young people are preparing themselves for the responsibilities of leadership through such experiences as serving on committees, planning and presenting programs, planning and carrying out individual and group projects, presiding at meetings,

and working with others in both school and community. Such participation helps prepare them to be responsible, contributing adult citizens and work toward good home and family life.

Miss Mildred Reel, National Adviser for FHA, summed up the purpose of the organization this way: "As an integral part of the home economics education program in the high schools, Future Homemakers of America projects learning experiences beyond the classroom into the homes and lives of the individual members. Our aims are to help develop the teenagers' abilities through activities and projects that relate to the individual and the family. By so doing we are helping to develop leadership qualities in the individual and strengthening family life."

The FHA chapter at Sudan has scheduled a number of activities in observance of National FHA week.

Future Homemakers of America is a non-profit, self-supporting organization, officially sponsored by the U. S. Office of Education and the American Home Economics Association. High School home economics teachers serve as advisers to the more than 12,000 FHA chapters. National Headquarters are located in Washington, D. C.

HIGHTOWER GUIDES BILL PASSAGE

Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon guided Senate passage of a bill which will clamp down on hot check writers.

This bill will make it unlawful to give an employee an insufficient check for wages.

"In the past this has not been unlawful, and has caused a real hardship on many people who receive a check for work done. They go down and they spend the money for groceries, then the check bounces, the grocery man calls them, and they have to make it good," Senator Hightower said in explaining the bill.

"I think that when a person gets their pay for work done that they should feel sure that this is a good check and that they can rely on it," he continued.

This Easter, let's turn our thoughts toward the risen Lord. Let's resolve to walk in His way.

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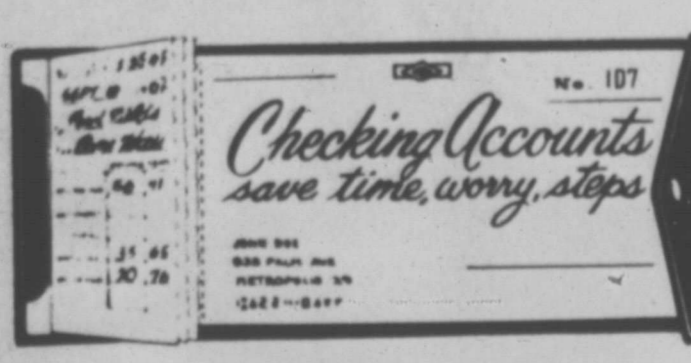
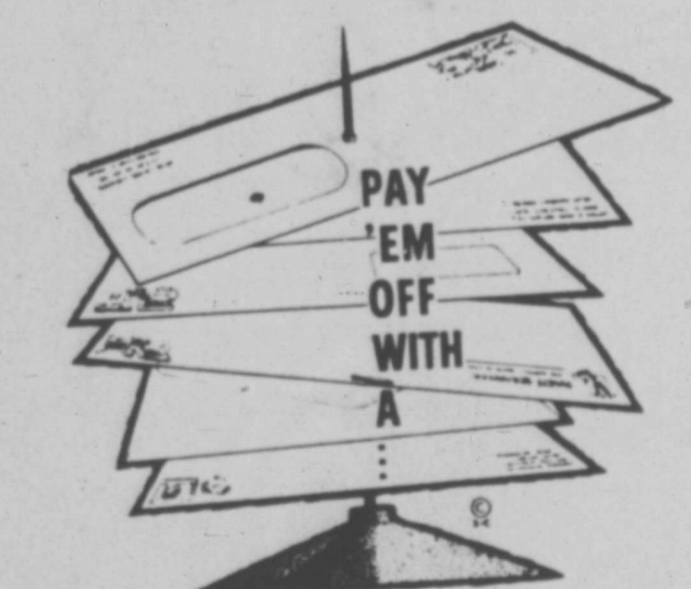

CANDYTUFT



Giant Hyacinth-flowered candytuft is a representative of the upright, rocket type.

The flower we know as Candytuft is named for the place of its origin, the Island of Candy, now the Greek island called Crete.

The last syllable of the name describes the tufted flowers. There are two species of annual candytuft grown in gardens: one known as rocket, the other as globe candytuft.

The rocket type, which you will find in catalogs and seed displays under variety names of Giant Hyacinth-flowered, Iceberg, Empress, White Pinnacle, has only white flowers but they are delicately scented. The varieties mentioned grow from 18 inches to two feet tall.

Globe candytufts, called for their globe or dome-shaped plants, have no fragrance but have colored flowers.

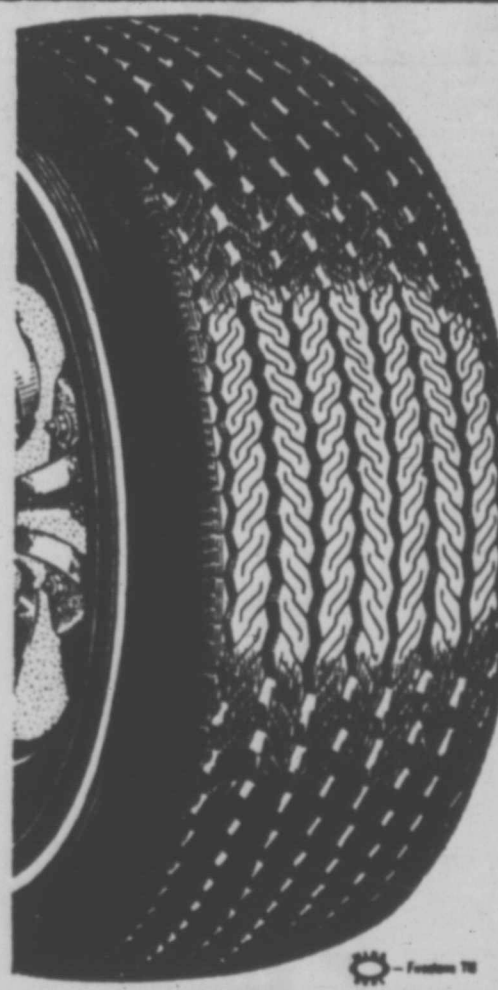
These may be pink, rose, carmine, crimson, lavender or white.

These plants are lower-growing than those of the rocket candytufts and can be used in large masses for an overall colorful effect.

Magic Carpet and Fairy are mixtures of all the bloom colors named.

Both types of candytuft share a liking for cool weather and both exhaust themselves by producing too many flowers.

For this reason it is advisable to sow seeds at 3-week intervals and thus keep new crops of blossoms coming along.
