April 5-11, 1970 has been designated NATIONAL FHA WEEK. The theme chosen for this year's National FHA Week is "25 Years of Sterling Opportunity", tying in with the objective for this 25th anniversary year of Future Homemakers of America,

"To Promote Communication for the Improvement of Human Relationships".

Mrs. Betty Romas, State Advisor, points out that several million young people have been challenged by the unlimited opportunities offered through membership in Future Homemakers of America over the 25 years since its establishment as a national organization. Both city and school elections are scheduled to be held here Saturday, April 4. The election for three school trustees will be held in the Sudan Community Center with Coleman Terrell as

presiding judge, assisted by Mildred Chisholm, Dorothy Jones, Margaret Smith and Gwen West.

Four candidates will be listed on the ballots with the voters to select and mark three names. Candidates are Billy Chester, Marvin Bowling, Bobby Jack Mathman and Halbert Harvey.

The election for city officials will be held in the Sudan City Hall with Joe West as election judge, assisted by Mesdames Tommy Cates, W. E. Hancock, Jake Dent, Edna Bellamy.

Two candidates are vying for the top city job of mayor. Sudan civic-minded businessmen Arnold Reed and Michael (Hano)

Bishop are both seeking election as mayor. F. M. Smith and Paul (Bud) Provence are unopposed as candidates for city commissioners.

The polls for both elections will open at 8 a. m. and remain open until 7 p. m.

All registered voters residing in this school district are eligible to vote in the school election with only those living in the Sudan City Limits eligible to vote in the city election.

All eligible voters are urged to participate in the elections and express their views by voting for the candidates of their choice.

ASSAULT CHARGES FILED AGAINST LOCAL MAN

Charges of assault with intent to murder were filed against a Sudan man Monday at Littlefield. R. E. Aills was charged with assaulting Red Davison Saturday afternoon on Highway 84 between Sudan and Amberst. Davison received several lacerations and is reported to be in fair condition in a Littlefield hospital at press time.

Aills remains in custody at the Lamb County jail. His bond has been set at \$5,000.00.

Witnesses to the alleged assault include Mrs. Davison, Mrs. Dee Aills and daughters, who were reportedly enroute to Lubbock in a vehicle driven by Davison at the time of the assault.

Rotarians Hear Drug Program

Presenting the program Wednesday at the noon meeting of Sudan Rotary were Bill Lane and Dave Behar, representatives of Synanon Foundation, Inc., a unique rehabilitation center for drug addicts where 87 per cent of its residents are cured of drug usage.

The men were in this area speaking to local organizations

relating their experience with drugs, telling how the rehabilitation center for drug addicts works, and seeking donations of beef from area feedlots.

The duo stated that the glamour and excitement of being "in" is usually what starts young people on drugs. They said that with sponsored help it is never too late to stop, but emphasized that it is smart, never to begin.

CITIZENS RECEIVE '70 CENSUS FORM

A bulky white form, similar to income tax forms, was delivered to all Lamb County residents this week for the purpose of tabulating the population. The 1970 Census forms are to be completed and held, to be picked-up by the enumerators later.

Other than the usual questions relating to the number of persons living with you and their names, you must tell how you enter your dwelling and go into detail explaining your plumbing and kitchen facilities.

The enumerators began making their rounds Wed., April 1, and should be completed in three to five weeks.

Each census taker will wear a red, white and blue identification card bearing the seal of Department of Commerce and the words "Census Enumerator" printed across its face.

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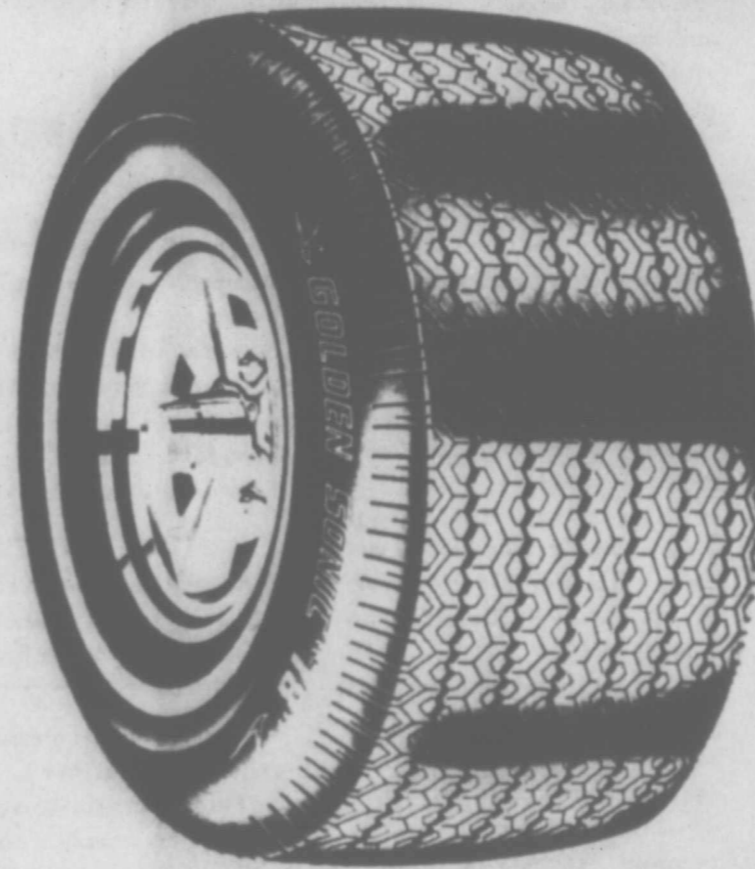
