NO DOUBT you will be pleased to hear that your dollar is about to greatly increase in relative purchasing power (meaning a buck supposedly will buy more than it would previously).

Only the sad part is that it really won't buy more; it will buy less, just as you knew all along.

What's happening is this: After years of reporting a steady decline in the power of the dollar, the nation's economic big brains mercifully are about to rub out and start over with a new basis that won't hurt so much.

The dollar of 1967 now is to be the standard declared as worth 100 cents. For the last 10 years we have measured the value of our dollars in terms of the period 1957-59 equalling 100 cents. In comparison, our dollars have taken a beating.

For example, according to Associated Press writer John Cunniff, at the close of 1969 the dollar was equal to only a bit more than 78 cents in terms of 1957-59. But in terms of 1967 it was worth more than 90 cents.

The government denies that it is changing the base period simply to disguise the deterioration in buying power. The real reason, says Cunniff, is that "statistics must remain pertinent for economic indicators, such as the consumer price index." The base, therefore, is updated every decade.

This probably is a good thing. We all would really feel bad to be constantly reminded that, for example, the dollar in our pocket would buy about what 38 cents would have bought in 1939. According to the economists, there's no way to avoid inflation and deterioration of the dollar. That's why I spend all of mine as fast as I can, before they completely go out of style.

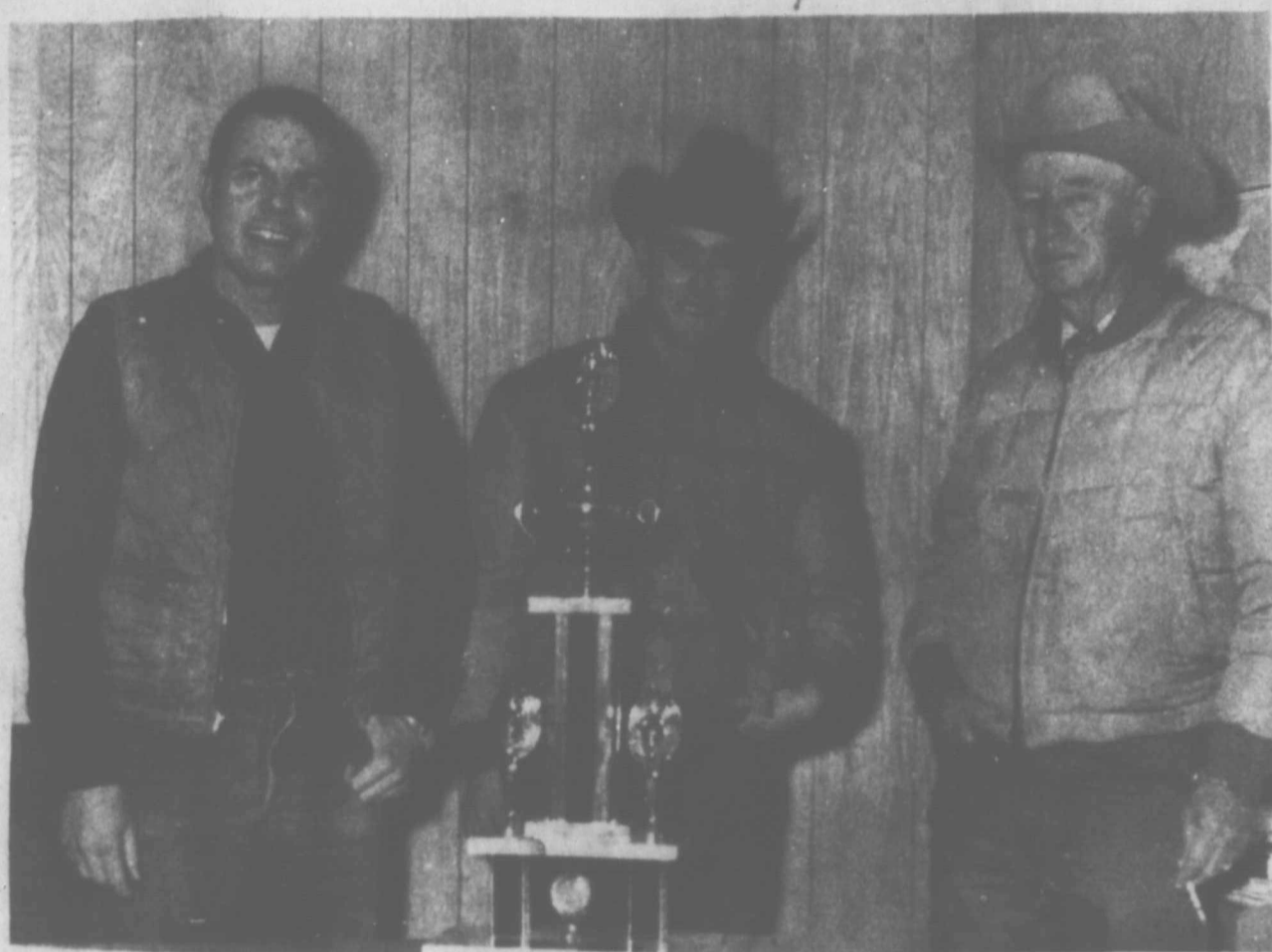

ELECTION RETURNS ANNOUNCED

Arnold Reed was re-elected as mayor in the city election here Saturday with 160 votes. His opponent, Michael Bishop, received 20 votes with two write-in votes being cast for Joe Rone.

F. M. Smith and Paul Provence were unopposed for city commissioners. Smith received 162 votes and Provence 159. Election judge Joe West reported that 186 ballots were cast in the city

election.

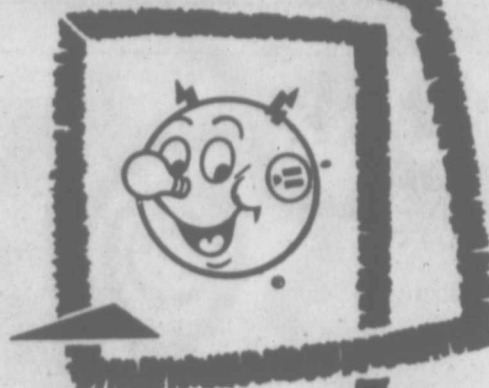

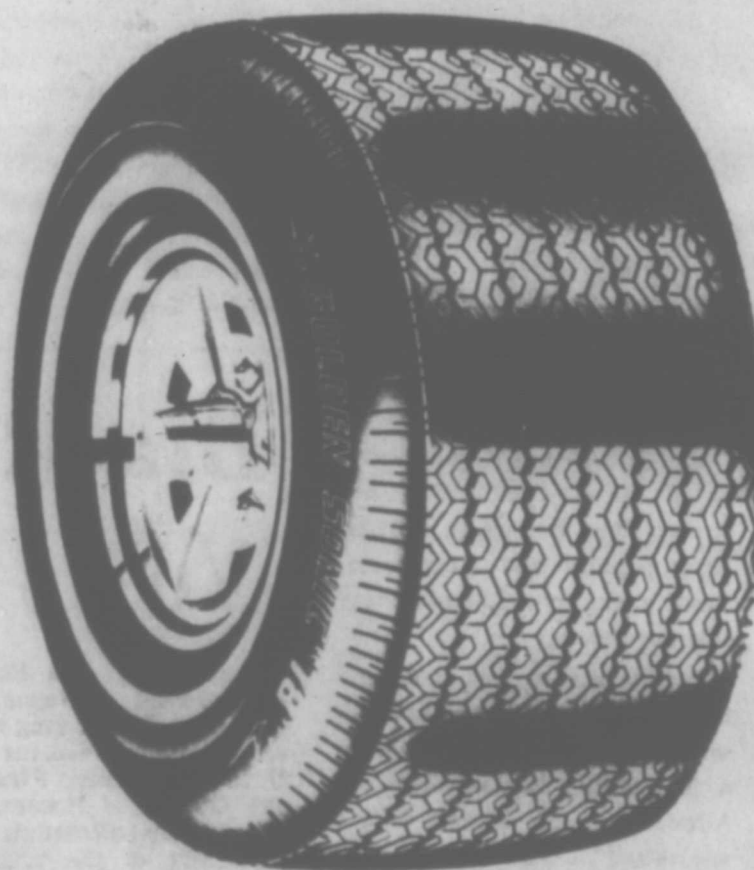
