NOT LONG ago I had occasion to get on the oval track up at the high school. Now I wasn't running, you understand; I was just walking along the track toward a reviewing stand which had been set up. As I gazed down the track and my eye followed it on around the curve and back to where I was, I asked one of my companions, a school administrator who is supposed to know all sorts of things, if this wasn't longer than 440 yards.

He assured me it has been measured to the inch and is exactly 440 yards. Contemplating the awesome task of running around that oval, I was convinced that 440 yards is a whole heck of a lot further than it was when I was in high school. And I begin to have a great respect for these youngsters who run it in 50 or even 60 seconds. I couldn't make it around that track in 60 seconds if Godzilla were after me.

I'm aware that a lot of people my age and older are running or jogging regularly, running a mile every day and all that sort of thing, to keep in good physical condition. And I admire them, even if I don't want to join them. I like to take some exercise, but running isn't for me.

THE APRIL issue of Reader's Digest has an article (by author Vance Packard) which suggests that we may be on the way to becoming a nation of illiterates. Figures from the scholastic aptitude tests (SAT) taken annually by more than a million high school students show that average scores have been dropping with a seven per cent decline in 10 years.

A more extensive study of writing ability is now underway, and first samplings of about 100,000 Americans showed that by age 13, "only the best of students could handle the basic conventions of writing." By age 17, only about half could "put together simple sentences and express simple ideas in general, imprecise language."

There are still some of us around, though, who write gooder than most.
