Smith Reports On 1978 Crop

John D. Smith, resident of Sudan, and Chairman of the Texas State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, has recently completed a tour of the Texas coastal bend county where rice producers are completing harvest of their first cutting.

"Although harvest was interrupted by a weekend of thunderstorms early in August, loss was not heavy. Seventy percent of the crop had been cut and 90 to 95 percent of that rice which was blown down could still be harvested," reported Smith. "Production is up 5 to 10 percent over last year, and the quality of the rice is good. We have good expectations for the second cutting which should be completed in November."

Accompanied by members of the State ASC Committee, Smith visited the farm of rice producer J. Bridges in El Campo, toured the field and inspected his farm storage facilities. The ASC group also visited the Rice Belt Warehouse and reviewed production and grading reports.

Continuing, Smith stated, "This is good news for all of Texas, for rice is a major contributor to Texas economy. Fortunately, in the coastal bend, we have had minimal abnormal weather factors or other adverse conditions to affect the production or the quality of our rice. Eighty percent of the rice grown is of the long grain variety which brings the best price."

Reviewing the latest statistics available, Smith reports that Texas ranks third behind Arkansas and Louisiana in the national ranking of chief rice producing states. In 1976, Texas planted 536,000 acres of rice and its value of production was \$176,140,000 which accounted for 21.7 percent of the value of the national rice production which totaled \$811,358,000. Current reporting shows the 1977 production and value figures offer Texas top those of the previous year.

"We intend to keep in close touch with the needs of our rice producers and, as a committee, work to keep this element of our agricultural economy strong, while we work to bring about recovery of other areas that have suffered losses through devastating droughts and floods."

Others on the State ASC Committee, headed by Smith, are: Joe E. Chapa of Linn, Edward L. Lehman of Vernon, Marguerite B. Snyder of Baird and James E. Goad of Rosebud.

"This committee works at the grass roots level with producers of crops and livestock, and deals continually with members of the ASC county and community committees, responding to special needs that are occasioned by those unpredictable elements that can threaten a crop, a farm, a herd or a ranch with severe or total loss." Continuing, Smith related, "We were aware that there was some concern in the rice country, during the early planting period, that adequate water might not be available due to extreme dry conditions which had curtailed well production in some areas. However, this has not adversely affected rice production or the quality of rice produced to any significant degree."

"Our committee membership is selected by the Secretary of Agriculture so as to be representative of the entire State and its diversified agricultural interests."

Concluding, Smith stated, "Not only am I happy with the opportunity to help the producers and agribusiness people in my area, which is devoted primarily to cotton, sorghums, wheat and livestock, but I find it gratifying to be in a position to be of service to all Texas farmers and ranchers."

Retardation Center

On Sunday, June 25, 1978, the Central Plains mMH/MR Center held its open house for the two new group homes located at 404 Floydada and 405 Ennis. The modern facilities will provide family style living for mental health clients 12 years old and over. Persons returning from the State hospital and those who would be sent to the State hospital if the homes were not available, will live in a therapeutic atmosphere until they are ready for independent living.

At the opening, Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives Bill Clayton dedicated the new group homes with a statement of support for the Center and for community based mental health and mental retardation services. In his address Mr. Clayton said, "What has happened here in our area of the state with the Central Plains Comprehensive Mental Health and Mental Retardation Center I think is the very essence of the self-help philosophy. This Center is truly helping to make the area a better place to live. It is helping to make it a healthier place and it is helping to make good citizens better citizens by providing them assistance that they deserve and need to join the mainstream of community life."

"I'm sold on community based mental health mental retardation services and I supported House Bill 3 which set up the guidelines under which MH/MR Centers have operated. The intervening 13 years have seen the methodology of treatment for mental health clients change and we must keep pace with a changing world."

And if a thorough review of legislation regarding MH/MR Centers need updating, then I will push for such change."

Sheila Foster is the resident manager of the group home at 404 Floydada which houses adults 18 and over, and Mike Hull is the manager of the home at 405 Ennis which houses adolescents 12-17 years of age.

For the first time in the history of the Central Plains Mental Health and Mental Retardation Center, a bronze medal has been captured from the State Special Olympics in Austin. This trophy was won by Clemente Aguilar in the 25 meter run. This in itself is an accomplishment, but Clemente being 60 and running against 26 and 27 year-olds makes it a phenomenon. Lynn Mason, Ronnie Price and Huette Scarborough also ran in Austin, but unlike Clemente, they participated also in the softball throw and the standing long jump. They all came very close to winning and next year we will hopefully come back with those medals. Sherry Lipscomb and Sharla Bell were down in Austin with bright blue and gold pom poms supporting the Sunshine Kids to victory. They might not be able to leap tall buildings in a single bound or be faster than a speeding bullet, but the Vocational Center Sunshine Kids will out-try the best.

Southwestern Bell

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company's tariff, filed in compliance with the Public Utility Commission's final order issued on August 2nd granting SWB a \$124.5 million increase, has become effective. (SWB had requested \$214.3 million.)

The tariff was filed with the Commission staff August 4th and approved on August 14th.

This latest increase will NOT affect basic residential and basic business service rates. (Some optional business services may increase slightly.) There will also be NO increases in long distance rates, directory assistance charges, pay telephone or WATS service.

The increase will however affect customers' moves, connections and/or changes in service.

A new alternative rate system, referred to as Residential Measured Rate Service, will be offered in portions of 15 exchanges on an OPTIONAL basis and will be available within six months.

It will be priced between 60 and 70 percent of single party flat rate in each exchange, with 25 free calls and a charge of eight cents per call for each call over the minimum.

The new residential service will be made available in portions of the following exchanges: Austin Metro Exchange, Amarillo, Beaumont, Corpus Christi, Dallas Metro, Fort Worth Metro, Galveston, Harlingen, Houston Metro, Lubbock, Midland, San Antonio, San Benito, Tyler and Wichita Falls.

The new rates became effective August 14, 1978, with the exception of the residential measured rate service which will be implemented within six months, and any changes in billing will be reflected in customers' bills dated August 15th and mailed August 22, 1978.

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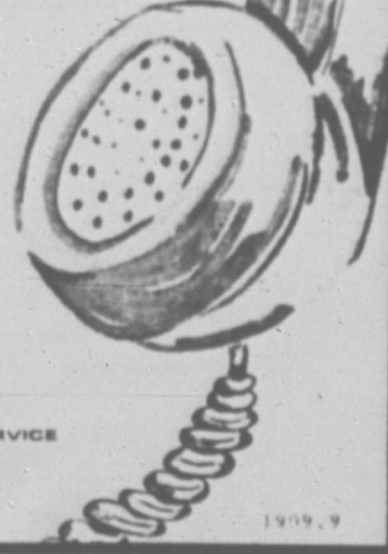
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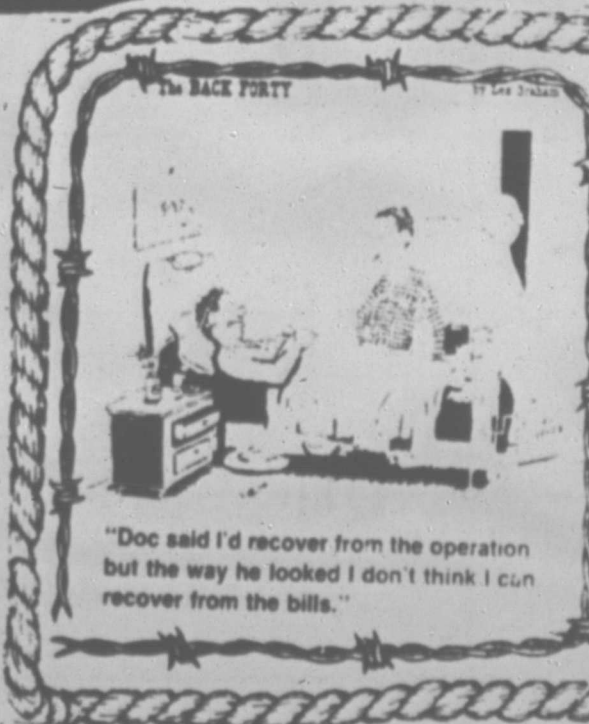
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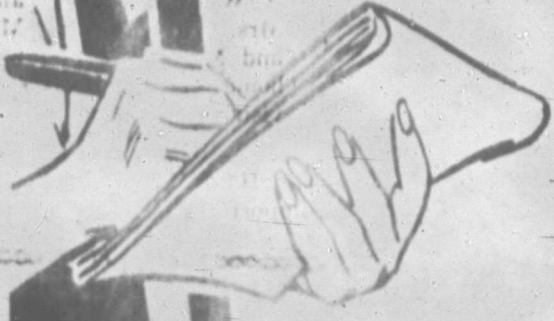

Operation Peace Of Mind

Governor Dolph Briscoe announced today that the Operation Peace of Mind runaway youth hotline will extend its service to Hawaii and Alaska beginning September 1, 1978. By doing so, the unique hotline will offer service to runaway youth in all fifty states.

"This hotline was created by me in September 1973 because of the tragic slaying of twenty-seven young boys in Houston, who were believed to have been runaways. Since that time volunteers answering the free incoming WATS telephones in Houston have responded to nearly 241,000 calls from all over America; of that number, more than 75,000 were actual runaways needing the kind of help we are prepared to offer," Governor Briscoe said.

"I wish to thank Governor George R. Ariyoshi of Hawaii and Governor Jay S. Hammond of Alaska and their state offices of volunteerism for the cooperation Texas Center for Volunteer Action of my office, which operates the hotline, and the countless volunteers in both states who are working to publicize our hotline and its purposes," Governor Briscoe added.

"The hotline continues to allow a young runaway to call from any telephone in America, toll-free, and know that any information is handled by our hotline volunteers in a confidential manner; no locations of the caller are ever revealed. The hotline is not a detective service, but rather a human service to offer a means of relaying a message from a troubled runaway to an anxious parent," Briscoe concluded.

Operation Peace of Mind also maintains lists of halfway houses and other services for youth in all fifty states, which are available to each runaway needing help.
