School Board

The regular school board meeting of the Sudan Independent School District was held October 9, 1978 with the Invocation being given by Glen Cardwell.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read by Mr. Guy Walden, secretary and approved as read.

The Superintendent's financial report for the month of September was approved.

Mr. Ed Brown reported on tax collections to date, and reported on the Sheriff's tax sale and properties disposed of at that time. Brown then discussed the School Tax Assessment Practices Board's value assigned to the Sudan ISD for tax purposes 1978-79. Since there was a considerable increase revealed in certain areas, the Board thought it necessary to appeal to the State Board.

A motion followed as to cost of enclosing the home bleacher area for storage facilities and a go ahead was given on the project.

The purchase of a new outdoor speaker system for the football field and new headsets for coaches was reported and approved.

Reimbursement to those persons attending bus driving school was approved.

The State level of reimbursement to Vocational programs for the 1978-79 school year to Sudan Independent School District was reported as assigned at 81 percent rate of reimbursement.

Mrs. Jana Syntschik was approved to attend the State Math Conference in Austin in November.

Lonis Withrow and Connie Hill reported to the Board on proceedings at the State Administrators and School Board Workshop in San Antonio.

Various equipment for the Vocational Agriculture shop for purchase was discussed with the approval to add this equipment to the shop for 1978-79, as well as repairs to the Vocational Agriculture stock trailer and trailer brakes installed on the pickup.

The benediction was given by Richard Black.

Steers Bulldog Hornets

The Farwell Steers completely dominated the first half Friday night in taking a 25-6 victory over the Sudan Hornets.

Farwell received the opening kickoff and took only nine plays to complete a 67 yard TD drive. The score came on a 6 yard pass completion and with a successful extra point quickly had a 7-0 lead. After an interception of a pass on the Hornets opening play the Steers were back in business on the 50 yard line. The defense stiffened and forced an unsuccessful field goal try from the 28 yard line. After an exchange of punts, the Hornets had a first down on their own one yard line. Two running plays brought the ball out to the six yard line where halfback John Miles, broke loose on a spectacular 94 yard Touchdown run. The extra point was blocked and the Hornets were back in the game at 7-6.

Farwell added another TD on a 5 yard run, a 2 point

conversion, and a 32 yard field goal before halftime to take an 18-6 lead at the end of the 2nd quarter.

The second half was highlighted by outstanding defense by both teams with the Hornets being turned away on several occasions by pass interceptions and a stiff Farwell defense.

Farwell tacked on another 7 points on a 46 yard TD pass on the last play of the game to increase the margin to 25-6.

Outstanding performances were turned in defensively by Bob Graves and Ivan Gipson, and offensively by Randy Scott and John Miles. Miles collected 192 yards rushing on 19 carries to bring his total after five games to 1014 yards.

Hance Speaks Out

"One of the prime examples of Government meddling can be seen in the occupational safety and health administration's anticipated control standards on cotton dust in gins and textile plants," Kent Hance, State Senator now campaigning for Congress in this district for the seat being vacated by George Mahon, declared this week.

"The greatly increased cost of ginning, cotton oil mills and textile mills is going to price cotton out of the textile markets, and it's going to cost the farmer in the West Texas area most of all," Hance added.

Mills will be turning to synthetic fibers, cotton imports will increase, and many older gins and plants will have to go out of business because the standards being set by OSHA "are unreasonable and cannot be complied with by older plants," Hance said.

"It's not only our farmers, ginners and cotton industry that will suffer, either. Increased imports will greatly damage the national interest, the trade balance will worsen, businesses will close, jobs will be exported.

"We certainly understand the importance of health and safety in every industry. But in the cotton business we should strive to the best of our ability to have both without sacrificing the entire cotton industry and the prosperity it has brought to our area," Hance said.

Effective date for the new standards was September 4 and include projects controlling respirable cotton dust through oil additives and new air filter methods in gins and oil mills. Cost of the new facilities is estimated at between \$1.8 billion and \$2.6 billion.

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
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Teachers Of The Month

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SWPS Accepts Rate Increase

Bob Drummond, Division Manager for Southwestern Public Service Company in Lubbock, has announced that after considering all alternatives Southwestern Public Service Company has decided to accept the \$15.9 million rate increase granted by the Public Utilities Commission of Texas.

"We feel that to pursue the matter further would be an unnecessary added expense to the cities, our customers and the company," Drummond said. "However, the \$15.9 million is not enough to cover our expenses as they were presented to the regulatory bodies."

"In order to continue to build coal-fired plants and to meet our customers' needs and comply with Texas Docket (28) I am sure it will be necessary to request another adjustment in our rates in the near future."

Docket 600 mandates that SWPS curtail their use of gas as a boiler fuel by 10 percent by 1981 and 25 percent by 1985.

"Of course we are making every effort, as we have in the past, to hold the line on expenses and continue to provide the highest quality service to our customers," Drummond concluded.

New Hospital

South Plains Hospital-Clinic in Amherst has received official notice from their attorney, Fred Davis of Davis, Davis and Sharp in Austin, that their application for an Exemption Certificate for total replacement of the existing facility on a new site has been approved by the Texas Health Facilities Commission in Austin.

Approval of this application allows the construction of total replacement of the hospital and clinic facilities.

The new construction will replace the existing 35-bed patient nursing services, diagnostic and treatment services, billing services, public and administrative services, and private physician offices and treatment areas.

The 20,042 square foot facility will be built on a five-acre tract of land south of the present location.

Architects for the construction are Barnes Landes Goodwin Youngblood in Austin.

EMT Classes Available

The secondary Emergency Medical Care class is slated to begin at Lubbock Christian College October 26.

Such classes are good preparation for those planning to enroll in the Emergency Medical Technician Class which LCC will offer next January, as well as those wanting to know more about immediate care for people who become ill or injured.

Topics to be discussed include: cardiopulmonary resuscitation, clearing an obstructed airway; blood pressure, pulse, respiration; use of oxygen, airways, suction; bandaging and splinting techniques; proper lifting and moving of patients; and immediate care for burns, poison, seizures, shock, heart attack and near drowning.

Testing for the Texas certification as Emergency Care Attendant or renewal of EMT certification is available. Classes will begin on October 26 and will meet from 6-10:15 p.m. each Tuesday and Thursday through November 21. There is a class fee of \$25.00 and deadline for application is October 18.

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
