Grain Handling Asks \$45 Million

A \$45 million suit has been filed by Grain Handling Corporation against Frito-Lay in the 158th Judicial District, Lamb County, for breach of contract.

The action stems from a suit filed earlier by Frito-Lay against Grain Handling.

Grain Handling is seeking to recover from Frito-Lay the "actual damages for the present value of the contract breached by Frito-Lay, said value being at least \$15 million; that Grain Handling recover from Frito-Lay the actual damages caused by the malicious and intentional breach of said agreement, said sum being in at least the amount of \$25 million; and that Grain Handling have and recover from Frito-Lay punitive damages in the amount of \$5 million; that Grain Handling have attorney's fee, prejudgment interest and postjudgment interest, plus such other and further relief as to which Grain Handling may show itself entitled."

Frito-Lay has charged that J.H. Stafford, former Frito-Lay manager of commodity purchasing, violated his position of trust in his dealings with four business associates and two companies supplying Frito-Lay with raw corn materials and edible oil.

Grain Handling maintains that Stafford was never a stockholder in Grain Handling.

Grain Handling further acknowledges that it had no knowledge of Stafford owning stock in any company which they had purchased until the suit was filed. It was then that Grain Handling learned that Stafford owned stock, under his son-in-law's name, in one of the companies purchased by Grain Handling.

Grain Handling contends that the contract which the corporation had with Frito-Lay for the purchase, storage and cleaning of a certain volume of corn was in question after the termination of Stafford. Grain Handling repeatedly assured Frito-Lay that it is ready, willing and able to perform its obligations under the contract.

Grain Handling delivered a letter dated September 21, 1978 to attorneys for Frito-Lay advising Frito-Lay that unless written assurances were given Grain Handling of Frito-Lay's future performance of said contract with Grain Handling that Grain Handling would treat the failure to give such assurances as a repudiation of the contract.

As a result of the repudiation and breach of the contract, Grain Handling claims they have been deprived of a contract which is both fair and economically beneficial to Grain Handling and seeks the present value of the full performance of the contract, valued at an excess of \$15 million.

Emergency Loans

Emergency loans for farmers, ranchers or aquaculture operators are available through county offices of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), Jerald O. Crump, FmHA county supervisor, said today.

Jerald Crump asked that those who need farm credit as a result of 1978 drought and 1978 hail make their needs known at the FmHA office at 118 W. 4th, Littlefield, Texas.

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken counties will be accepted by Farmers Home until 7-23-79 for physical losses and 10-25-79 for production losses.

FmHA loans covering actual physical and production losses may be used to replace installations, equipment, buildings, (including homes) lost through this disaster. Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts. Other loans, beyond actual losses, can be made for annual operating expenses or to make major adjustments in a farming or ranching operation.

"Funds can be used for essential operating and living costs", Jerald Crump said.

Loans covering actual losses are made at an interest rate of three and five percent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible consistent with the applicant's reasonable ability to pay. Loans beyond actual losses have various maturities, depending upon the purpose of the loan.

The interest rate for short-term loans for farm operating purposes is 8 and one half percent. Long term loans are being made at an interest rate of 8 and one half percent.

To be eligible for an emergency loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster and be unable to get credit from other sources.

Emergency loans can be used to help the farmer restore damaged farm operations and additional loans based upon the emergency designation can be used to reorganize the farm for greater efficiency and better production.

Election Day Tuesday Nov. 7

Hundreds of voters are expected to cast their ballots in what is predicted to be one of the largest turnouts in history. There are several important items on the ballot other than candidates. The amendments to the constitution will have a tremendous impact for years to come.

There are several write-in candidates that have filed and do not have their names on the ballot. The only way to cast a vote for write-in candidates is to write their name fully on the lines provided on the right hand portion of the ballot. It is extremely important that this be done properly. Any names that are written on the ballot that do not have the proper filing accomplished prior to the election, will not be counted.

Fire Prevention Week

The Sudan Fire Department held a fire demonstration for the grade school students of Sudan. This was held on Tuesday, October 17 at the school play ground.

A pipe Christmas tree, which is supplied by propane fuel, was lit and the firemen used fog pattern of water from two one and one half inch lines to put it out. This operation was to show the children how hot a propane fire can be, and the safest way to put it out. The highlight of the Pipe Christmas Tree fire was having Mr. LaDelta Vernon, third grade teacher, and Tommy Laceywell, grade school Principal, go into the fire with the charged lines with the firemen and put the fire out on the Christmas Tree.

The second demonstration was using the straight stream nozzle connected to 80 foot of 2 and one half inch line from the pumper truck. Over 400 gallons a minute of water was pumped through the nozzle.

The third demonstration for the school students was a fan shield that is connected at the end of 50 feet of two and one half inch line. This showed the fan pattern that the water made. This type of equipment is used to put into a burning building, that the firemen are unable to go into, because of too much fire and heat.

On Friday, October 20, a group of members from the Sudan Fire Department went to the Sudan Grade School to judge Fire Prevention Posters that the students made. The posters were judged in three divisions: Primary, Intermediates and Jr. High.

Winners in the Primary Division were 1st place, Kyle Maxfield, 1st grade; 2nd place, Keith Damron, 2nd grade; 3rd place, Jacob Lowe, 1st grade.

Jr. High Division: 1st place, Verna Wimberley, 7th grade.

Eyes May Reveal Diabetes Sign

In a message issued for the November observance of National Diabetes Month, Dr. Jose San Martin, president of the Texas Optometric Association, said diabetes is one of several general

health problems that often can be detected during a vision examination long before signs appear elsewhere. Others include high blood pressure and hardening of the arteries.

"By directing light through the pupil and inside the eye, we can see the head of the optic nerve and the eye's blood vessels in their natural state," Dr. San Martin said. "It's through observation of the blood vessels that some general health problems can be detected."

Doctors of optometry and ophthalmologists use this same examination procedure to aid in the detection of the symptoms of glaucoma; cataract; degeneration of the optic nerve; degeneration of the retina, the part of the eye that is receptive to light; other retinal diseases, such as diabetic retinopathy; and other eye diseases or conditions. Optometrists refer patients with the signs of symptoms of eye or other diseases to the proper health professional for further diagnostic tests and treatments.

"The vision examination report of disease signs is not conclusive. Other tests must be run," Dr. San Martin said. "But it is an important part of preventive health care."

From Page 2 children, teachers, and school food service personnel with training in the vital relationship between nutrition, good food and health," Warren said.

The states' grants include advance funds which were made available to enable them to begin operating the program this summer. Advance funds were used to hire state coordinators and to assess each state's nutrition education and training needs.

After making these assessments, states were required to provide the department with a plan describing how they would use the monies.
