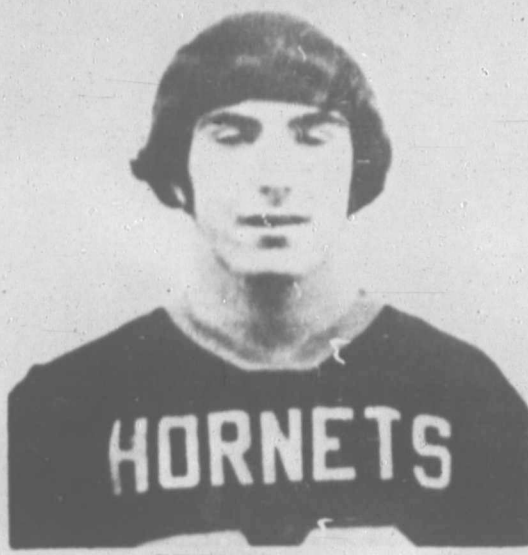

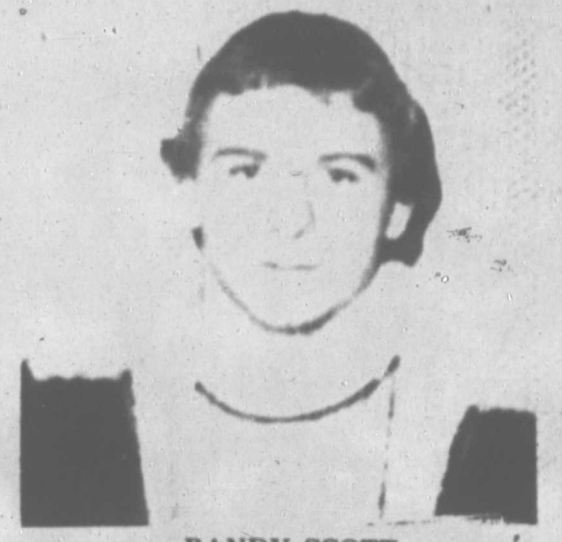

## 1978 Homecoming Success

The 26th Annual Homecoming Banquet was held Saturday, November 11, 1978 and was termed a great success when some 175 persons were served.

The Homecoming football game was not as successful as the banquet in that the Hornets lost to the Sundown Roughnecks, 34-6.

President of the Homecoming Committee for 1978 was Pudd Wiseman. Tim Kent was the Vice President and Pam Humphreys was Secretary-Treasurer.

Decorations Committee was headed by Martha Markham with Pam Humphreys, Deanna Humphreys, Gena Nichols, Wanda Swart and Joan Nix. Decorations included arrangements of yellow mums and the head table was decorated with an arrangement donated by the Central Compress as in years past. The committee wishes to thank the Compress for these flowers.

Registration and Greeting Committee was made up of Peggy Baker, LaDelta Vernon, Mary Ann Harper, Jerry and Peggy Ray.

The entertainment was secured and produced by Tim Kent and his wife, Patricia and consisted of six skits in conjunction with the classes being honored, skits portraying different eras in which these classes were in school.

1920's skit was "The Silent Movie Era" with Tim Kent as a "mad scientist-doctor". 1930's was "Shirley Temple" portrayed eloquently by Leonard Pierce with the music "The Good Ship Lollipop"; 1940's "The War Era" - a USO routine with 2 dance routines by Tim and Patricia Kent. ## Sudan Defeated

The Hornets ended the 1978 football campaign on a losing note Friday night as they dropped the Homecoming game to Sundown, 34-6. The game was a hard fought defensive struggle through almost three quarters as the Hornets had fought back from a 12 point deficit to get within a TD at 12-6.

After the Hornet score, which came on a 4 yard run by Victor King, the Hornets held the Roughnecks and forced them to punt.

Sudan set up shop on the 50 yard line with an opportunity for the go ahead score. After two running plays, a third down pass from QB Mike Jones was picked off by Sundown Linebacker David Perez, who scampered 55 yards for the TD which iced the game for the Roughnecks. Sundown added two more late 4th quarter score to bring the final tally to 34-6.

The loss ended the Hornet season on a break even note as they finished at 5-5.

Playing their last game for the Hornets were Seniors, Randy Scott, John Miles, Mike Jones, Ivan Gipson, Pete Edwards and Bob Graves. The only other senior on the Hornet squad, Graves, finished his career prematurely when he was injured in the Lazbuddie game and though he did not get to play in the final game, Bob was there, cheering his team mates on.

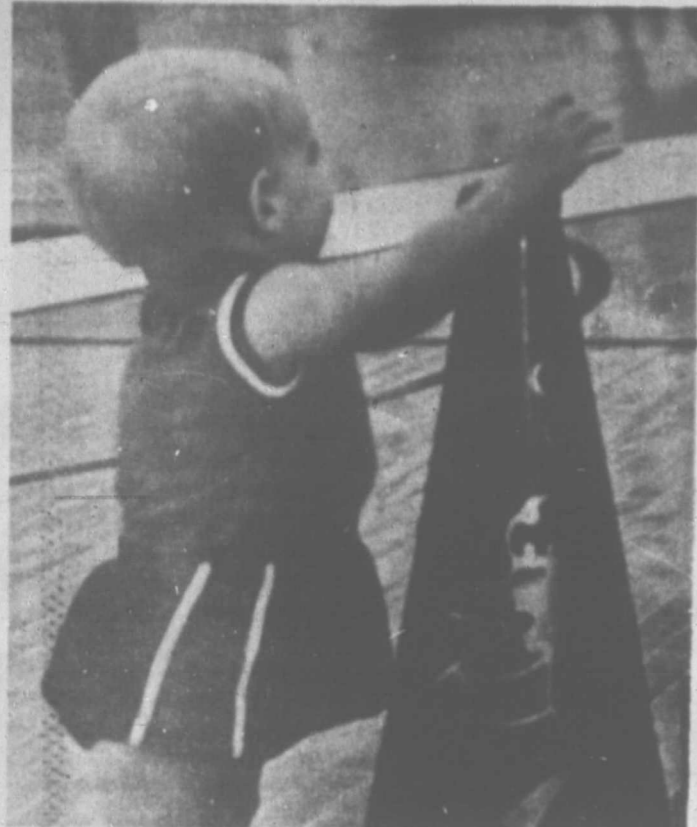

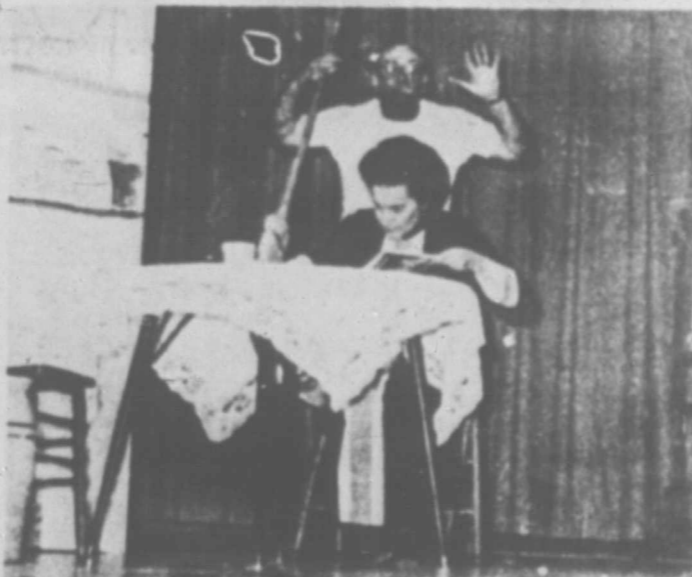

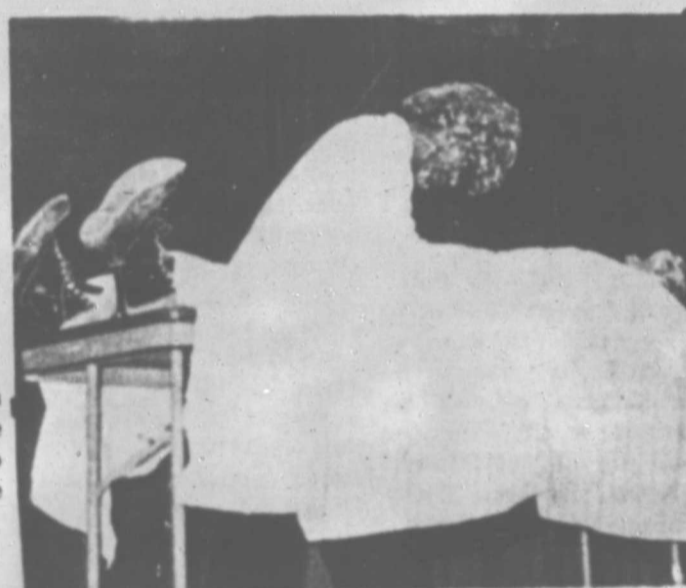

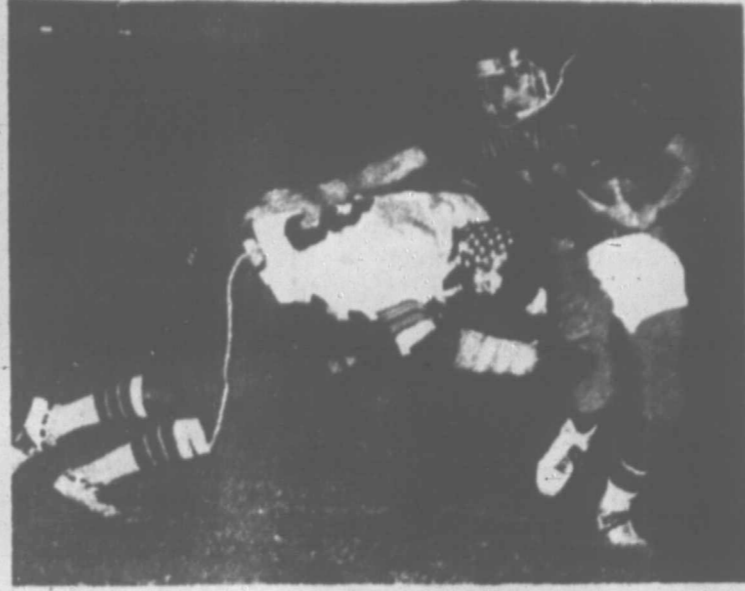
