

I heard someone say one time, "I may not be a Christian, but I pay my debts!" How often do we confess our good points while denying Christ! We wish to show that we are "good" and have a certain "righteousness" about us, but readily admit that it

From then on, we are rot our own, but His who died to purchase us! 1 Corinthians 5:15. He authors our salvation when we obey Him. Hebrews 5:9. From then on, it does not matter what men say, only what God says. Part of confessing Jesus is Repenting from the old ways. Luke 13:3. Part of confessing Jesus is believing that He has been raised from the dead. Mark 16:14. And part of confessing Jesus is being baptized. Mark 16:15:16. All are necessary for true confession of Jesus as Lord because He commanded it. If we love Him we will obey Him. John 14:15.




