Varied Results In Early Season Games

The Hornets lost 37-42 in the game between the Sudan Varsity boys and the Sundown boys last week. Odell Johnson made two free throws and Carl Scott made a basket during the first period of play for a total of 4 points and in the second period, Ricky Moore hit two field goals for four and one free while Carl Scott hit for 3 field goals for six for a total of eleven points for that period. In the third period, Odell Johnson and Ricky Moore made a field goal, Carl Scott, 2 and Billy Williams 3. The fourth period of play, Moore hit 3 field goals for six more points and Carl Scott hit one for a total of 8 points of this play period. Other team members are Mike Jones, John Miles, Henry James, Joey Bellar, Lyn Williams and Victor King with Watters as coach.

The Sudan Hornets lost to Anton 40-51 last Monday when Tracey Hill was high pointer with 8 big ones and 6 free shots for a grand total of 22 points for the game. Sandra Griggs of the opposing team had 18 points for the night.

Tracey also lead in rebounds with eleven. In the first play period the Hornets made 4 points with Becky Byerley making 2 free shots and Deanna Flowers hitting for 14 and the opposing team only 8.

Gloria Martinez made five out of six free ones, Deanna Flowers made three out of four and Tracey Hill made two out of two and two field goals.

During the third stanza, the Hornets hit for 16 while their opponents made 12. Tracey Hill hit 2 out of three free ones and made four field goals, for 10 points and Marilyn May hit 3 FG for 6. During the final play period, Tracey hit 2 FG for 4 and 2 free ones, she had 11 rebounds for the game; Marilyn May had 8; Ruth Withrow 7; Gloria Martinez 6 and Janet Nix 1 for a total of 33 rebounds for the game.

The Hornets made 12 field goals out of 49 attempts for 24 percent; 16 out of 20 free thro attempts for 80 percent, four steals and 15 fouls.

Anton had 5 out of 17 free throw attempts for 29 percent and 23 out of 56 attempted field goals for 42 percent.

Team members include Deanna Flowers, Diana Gardner, Skokie King, Martha Withrow, who are all seniors; Tracey Hill, Becky Byerley, Ruth Withrow, Kathy Swart, Marilyn May, Gloria Martinez and Janet Nix. Cliff Stephens is the coach.

The Hornets will meet Anton again at 1:00 p.m. Thursday during the Tournament and the boys will play at 2:30 there in Anton.

COTTON MARKETING HOLDS KEY TO PRICES—Cotton farmers hold the key to the prices they are receiving for their 1978 crop. The key is orderly marketing.

"The manner in which producers market their crop has a great bearing on the price level," points out Dr. Carl Anderson, cotton marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Although the market is still fairly strong, most cotton is traditionally sold in Texas in December and January. Holding back some cotton and marketing only a limited amount can help bolster prices."

Going into this year's crop season, the cotton market looked fairly strong due to the drop in domestic production and stable foreign production, says Anderson. But, once the harvest season starts and the new crop hits the market, prices tend to go down. However, with cotton supplies tight as they are this year, orderly marketings can contribute to a more stable price pattern.

"With the weak domestic demand for cotton which currently exists, bunched marketings will cause a

ASCS Delegates Meet With Officials

Forty elected delegates, representing the 235 county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) offices, met at the Ramada Inn in College Station with the staff members and officials of the Texas State ASCS Office who administer the State's Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) to discuss the changes made in the 1979 program.

State and county ACP programs will be based on the national practices although additional practices may be developed at the local level to meet specific pollution or conservation problems, reported George Boenigk, Texas State ACP program specialist. ACP assistance will not be used to carry out measures and practices that are primarily production oriented or those that have little or no conservation or pollution abatement benefits.

Darrel Davis, ACP program specialist who accompanied Boenigk to the Area ACP meeting held in Denver, Colorado, preliminary to this meeting, reported that implementation of the provisions of the 1979 ACP Act will be achieved through the establishment of: criteria for determining the practices eligible for ACP assistance; guidelines for directing assistance toward situations in which practices can be expected to yield significant public soil or water conservation or pollution abatement benefits; and procedures to facilitate approval of solutions to local soil conservation, water conservation, or pollution abatement problems not addressed by practices thought to meet the national criteria.

Responding to a request made by the Texas State ASC Committee, a five member board that governs the Texas ASCS programs, that the 1979 national ACP program be afforded input from the 'grass-roots' level, the delegates, in September of this year, furnished to the State office written recommendations for the program's basic policy and program procedures.

John D. Smith, Committee Chairman, announced that details of the 190 million dollar program was published in the Federal Register on or about November 14, and that the public would be afforded a 30 day comment period.

The amount of funds allocated to Texas has not as yet been announced. "The amount," Boenigk said, "will be determined from the results of the needs study conducted in 1971 by USDA Federal agency representatives."

Under ACP, the USDA provides both technical and financial assistance to farmers whose land is a source of agricultural pollution, or is affected by wind or water erosion. ACP emphasizes providing enduring solutions to these problems, and is aimed at farmers who would not carry out approved conservation practices without some cost-sharing incentive. Costsharing for a part of the farmers or ranchers costs on the most critical problems, with a payment limit of \$3,500 per person, will be made available.

Other officials participating in the meeting were Leonard C. Williams, State Executive Director of the Texas ASCS headquarters office located in College Station and State ASC Committee members Marguerite B. Snyder of Baird; Edward L. Lehman of Vernon; Joe E. Chapa of Linn and James E. Goad of Rosebud.

slump in prices," contends the marketing specialist. "Producers short on cash may want to consider placing cotton in the CCC (Commodity Credit Corporation) loan program for several months. This would help even out marketings and maintain a higher price level."

Looking ahead, prospects for a favorable price for 1979 cotton depend on the anticipated crop size which now appears to be substantially larger than this year's crop, notes Anderson. Prices could easily be down near the 1979 CCC loan rate of 50.23 cents per pound for Strict Low Middling 1-1/16 inch cotton this time next year.

"With the prospects of a sizeable boost in next year's cotton crop, producers might consider forward contracting or hedging in the futures market during the next several months at least part of their 1979 crop at a price that allows reasonable profit," advises Anderson.

So, it all boils down to marketing. Farmers can have some control over the price they get for this year's crop and can also take steps to "lock in" a profit next year.

CONFAD TO DEAL WITH "LEGAL ASPECTS OF AGRICULTURE"—Mounds and mounds of new laws and regulations are turning agriculture into a most complex industry. Just where a producer stands as far as the legal implications of certain operations is often misunderstood.

To shed some light on this increasingly complicated situation will be the major purpose of a special conference on the "Legal Aspects of Agriculture" to be held December 7-8 at the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center at Dallas.

The conference is for producers, representatives of producers organizations, agribusinesses and regulatory agencies, and lawyers. Lawyers who write the various regulations affecting agriculture must have a better understanding of commercial agriculture, and those in commercial agriculture must be fully aware of their privileges to appeal to the courts for interpretations of regulations they deem to be unfair.

The conference will be highlighted by four major discussion areas, (1) undesirable loss of farmland by conversion to non-agricultural uses; (2) food safety and product liability; (3) pesticides; and (4) labor and agriculture.

Many outstanding speakers will be featured, including professors of law at Texas University, Texas Tech University and the University of Minnesota; several attorneys, including the deputy associate general counsel for the Environmental Protection Agency and the general counsel of Western Growers Association of Newport Beach, Calif.

Dr. Javis E. Miller, A&M president, will be the leadoff speaker and will set the stage for the conference program.

Conference sponsors are the University of Texas School of Law and Texas A&M's College of Agriculture, Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

RESPONSE NEEDED ON ARSENIC ACID SURVEY—Cotton farmers in Lamb County are urged to respond immediately to a survey regarding the use of arsenic acid as a harvest-aid chemical.

The survey is being conducted by the manufacturer of arsenic acid to obtain opinions from farmers regarding the benefits of the chemical for continued profitable cotton production.

The basis for the survey comes from an October 18 decision by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to place all uses of inorganic arsenicals including arsenic acid on the Rebuttable Presumption Against Registration (RPAR) list. This does not mean automatic removal of arsenic acid from the market, but EPA will now demand more evidence that benefits of this compound outweigh risks before further registration is permitted. An assessment team has until December 4 to respond with benefit comments concerning the value of arsenic acid to cotton industry.

The EPA decision to require further evaluation of the benefits vs. risks of arsenic acid as a cotton desiccant could have far-reaching effects on cotton producers. More than two million acres of cotton in the Southwest are treated annually with arsenic acid to prepare the crop for stripper harvesting. The chemical desiccates or dries the plant for stripper harvesting so that lint and seed quality can be preserved.

Loss of the chemical could be devastating to a large segment of the cotton industry. First of all, it would cost producers millions of dollars in terms of lower lint and seed grade due to delayed harvest. It would also prevent stalk destruction for insect and disease control and would mean higher ginning costs due to the reduced capacity and increase energy required for additional drying of cotton. A change in cotton varieties and harvesting methods to circumvent the need for arsenic acid would cost additional millions and would disrupt the industry to the point that many producers would no longer grow cotton.

The months ahead will be critical for the producers of stripper cotton. Therefore, everyone is urged to respond to the survey and to express his opinion on the use of arsenic acid and its benefit to the cotton industry.
