

Sheriff Hancock Urges Registration Of All Firearms Held By Citizens

The Alcohol Tax Unit, Bureau of Internal Revenue, is charged with enforcement of the National Firearms Act. This Act deals with the importation, registration, possession, sale or transfer by any means of certain types of firearms, imposes a tax of \$200.00 on each transfer, and provides a penalty not to exceed \$2,000.00 or imprisonment not to exceed five years, or both, in event a person is convicted on a charge of violating any provisions of the Act. Failure to register weapons covered by this law or the transfer of such weapons without payment of the transfer tax is a violation of the Act.

The basic purpose of the statute is the regulation and control of the traffic in machine guns, semi-machine guns, fully automatic pistols, or any type of gun that will expel more than one shot or bullet with a single pull

of the trigger. It also includes rifles and shotguns with barrels less than 18 inches in length and all firearms equipped with a silencer or muffler, and is aimed at preventing firearms such as above described from falling into the hands of gangsters, racketeers, bank robbers and other criminals.

Until our armed forces were deployed over the world in connection with prosecution of World War II, guns of the type mentioned presented no particular hazard to law enforcement officers, or the public of this country. In October, 1943, the Bureau of Customs outlined a procedure which permitted members of the armed services to import into this country as war trophies certain enemy equipment, including firearms of the type described in the National Firearms Act. Such importations were permitted providing certificates were first obtained from the service man's commanding officer and presented to the Customs Officer, before whom the service man would appear and execute what is known as Form 6 (Firearms), which is an application for importation of firearms. In cases where the weapon was mailed or shipped by a member of the armed services to a friend or relative to be held until the owner returned to this country, the Bureau of Customs procedure permitted the friend or relative to file the Form 6 (Firearms) covering the importation of a weapon is construed as the registration of same.

It has been determined that great numbers of firearms falling within the scope of the National Firearms Act have been imported into this country with and without officers' certificates and in many instances, due to the lack of knowledge of the registration requirements, the possessors of these weapons have not yet executed Form 6 (Firearms). The existence of such a large number of these weapons in the custody of private individuals is materially increasing the hazard of their falling into the hands of the criminal element through illegal sale, gift, transfer or theft, thereby weakening or even defeating the purpose of the National Firearms Act. The government believes this hazard can be

reduced to a great extent by accomplishing the registration of the weapons and requesting the possessors to have firearms of the type described rendered permanently unserviceable. As long as machine gun or firearms subject to registration remains in serviceable condition, it constitutes a hazard to the owner's family as well as to the general public and, in particular, to law enforcement officers. The government appreciates the trophy value of weapons of this type brought or shipped into this country by the veteran. Methods have been evolved for making such weapons inoperative, without in any material way interfering with their appearance or value as a trophy or souvenir. Firearms which are made inoperative may be transferred between persons without payment of the tax, but merely upon execution of the proper form (Form 5 (Firearms)).

The Alcohol Tax Unit in each state functions under the direction of the Investigator in Charge. Each of those officials has a group of Investigators under his supervision stationed at various posts of duty throughout his state. The Investigator in Charge for the Northern and Eastern Districts of Texas is:

In this part of the state there are investigators of the Alcohol Tax Unit stationed at the following posts: Dallas, Tyler, Texarkana, Marshall, Beaumont, Abilene and Nacogdoches.

Each of the posts mentioned is located at a county seat and the investigator may be located through the office of Sheriff Hancock of this county. Each investigator under Mr. Shields supervision has been trained and instructed to assist veterans and others in the registration of firearms if the weapon is of the type and kind required to be registered by the provisions of the National Firearms Act.

If you possess a firearm covered by the National Firearms Act, or holding one pending the return of the owner, you are required to communicate promptly with the Alcohol Tax Unit office nearest you. The investigator stationed at that post will promptly contact you, explain how the weapon can be rendered permanently unserviceable and assist in the execution of the proper forms and in such performances as will have the effect of legalizing the possession of the firearms and affording protection to the public at large. This service is furnished at no cost to the possessor of the weapon.

58,820 Chevrolet Cars And Trucks Produced In May

DETROIT—Despite restricting factors of national coal and transportation strikes, as well as a variety of tie-ups on the part of suppliers, Chevrolet during the month of May established a new high production record for the auto industry in its post-VJ Day history, producing 58,820 cars and trucks, it was announced here today by Hugh Dean, general manufacturing manager, Chevrolet Motor Division of General Motors.

The 58,820 total includes 30,367 passenger cars and 28,453 trucks, Mr. Dean said. The comparable monthly total for April, best previous post-war month production-wise, is 47,077 units.

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF WHITEFACE, TEXAS:

Section 1: That a Special Election shall be held in the City of Whiteface, Texas, on the 6th day of July, 1946, at which election there shall be submitted to the duly qualified resident electors of said city who own taxable property within said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

PROPOSITION NO. ONE
 Shall the Board of Commissioners of the City of Whiteface, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said city in the amount of \$20,000, maturing serially within twenty-five years from their date and bearing interest at a rate not exceeding 3½ per annum, for the purpose of constructing a water system in and for said city, and to levy taxes upon all taxable property within said city annually sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds as it accrues and to create a sinking fund to pay the principal of said bonds as they mature.

PROPOSITION NO. TWO
 Shall the Board of Commissioners of the City of Whiteface, Texas, be authorized to issue the revenue bonds of said City in the amount of \$40,000, maturing serially within twenty-five years from their date, the maximum maturity date to be not later than July 15, 1971, and bearing interest at a rate not exceeding 3½ per annum, for the purpose of building a water system for said city; said bonds to be issued in accordance with and secured in the manner provided in articles 1111 to 1118, both inclusive, revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended; and to secure the payment of the interest on said bonds as it accrues and the principal of said bonds as it matures by pledging the net revenue from the operation of said water system, each bond to be conditioned that the holder thereof shall never have the right to demand payment of said obligation out of any fund raised or to be raised by taxation.

Extra Grain Yield Is Plan Of "Famine Fighter" Plan

With 28,000,000 extra bushels of grain as their goal many thousands of "Famine Fighters" are now on their way toward saving 627,500 tons of grain from this year's harvest to help feed a famine-stricken world.

Mr. Louis Smith, local Massey-Harris dealer reports that owners of self-propelled combines are pledging their support to the

movement—agreeing to work a few extra hours each week during the harvest season in opening grain fields for other farmers. "If each of the 8,000 self-propelled combines now in use in this country get into the fight against grain fields they will add 28 million bushels of grain to our 1946 yield—or enough extra grain to feed 42,000,000 hungry people for 100 days," Mr. Smith pointed out.

Because there is no tractor standing grain, self-propelled combines get all of the crop ordinarily lost on the opening cut thus saving an average of 1/2 bushel per acre or 30 bushels of grain in a 60 acre field. Mr. Smith further points out that every bushel saved this year means bread to feed 150 hungry people for a day according to UNRRA minimum requirements.
