

George Keith To Exhibit Calf At State Fair In Junior Livestock Show At Dallas

George Keith and his father, C. Keith, will attend the Texas State Fair in Dallas where George will show his calf in the Junior Livestock show on October 10.

The calf won by George and will be exhibited was one of the calves awarded by the Dallas Chamber of Commerce to 4-H club boys in Texas.

School-age exhibitors of livestock will be kings of the show for the first four days of the State Fair of Texas, to be held in Dallas Oct. 5-20, with all barns and pens placed at the disposal of the Future Farmer, and other youthful showmen.

H. L. Thornton, president of the Junior Fair association, announced last week that the Junior Livestock show would be held Oct. 5-8, with the senior division following on the ninth. He stated that this was a new, streamlined procedure that would make more room in the arenas for exhibitors from both groups. Also, he pointed out, this shortened exhibiting would enable boys and girls to return to school with a minimum of time lost.

This is the first year, according to Ray Wilson, chairman of the Junior Farm and Ranch committee, that is planning the younger exhibits, that boys and girls have had all facilities turned over to them to house and show their livestock.

Wilson stated that the plan was adopted in order to alleviate crowded conditions that have resulted in former years when animals to be shown in both the junior and senior divisions were fought in at the beginning of the Fair and kept until the last day.

Plans call for the judging of animals entered in the junior division to be completed by noon on the fourth day. During the afternoon of the same day the livestock will be marketed and the exhibitors will be free to return to school or to follow a program of their own making.

Boy Rupard, Fair secretary, stated that the premium list and instructions would be ready for distribution about July 1.

Sewer Connection Permits Being Issued By City

The sewer system recently completed in Morton, now belongs to the City and all those wishing domestic or commercial lines connected with the system must make application to the City of Morton for a permit.

Any property owner in Morton who feels he has any claims against the City or Sewer Contractor for damages to his property caused by the installation of the sewer system should file his claim for damages not later than Saturday, July 20 in the City Clerks office at the City Hall.

School Election Will Be Held Sat., July 20th

A strong vote is anticipated at both Morton and Lehman for the proposed consolidation of the two school districts.

Petitions for calling the two district mergers were submitted to the county judge in May, and elections subsequently ordered. The election will be held at Morton and Lehman on Saturday, July 20. It is urged that all qualified voters go to the polls and express their preference on this question.

If the mergers carry the Lehman district will be consolidated with the Morton school and both be known as the Morton Independent School district. If either district votes negative on the question the schools will remain as they are.

Scholastics of Morton are approximately 925 and Lehman 73.

George Mahon Visits Morton

George Mahon, candidate for reelection as 19th congressional district's representative, spoke to a good crowd on the court house lawn last Saturday at 3 o'clock.

Excerpts from Mahon's Saturday speech:

During the war period men on the fighting fronts, producers on the farm and ranch, members of congress and others with important work to do had to stay on the job.

Since January 1, 1940—six and a half years—Congress has been in session all or part of every month save four.

In 1946 Congress has been in continuous session since January 14.

As the men on the farm, in business and on the fighting fronts did not desert their posts, George Mahon did not desert his post in Washington. During this period the Congressional Record discloses that Rep. Mahon was faithful to the job assigned him by the people of the 19th district.

"I have been a consistent friend of the laboring men of the Nation—the men who earn their bread by honest toil. I have, by voice and vote however, opposed the efforts of any person who seeks to become more powerful than the Government itself.

"What we need desperately in America today is government in the public interest—not government by pressure groups who threaten legislators and insult



the intelligence and patriotism of the people. Minority groups are entitled to be heard in America and they are entitled to a fair deal, but they are not entitled to roughshod over the majority. Yet good wages for labor and the maintenance of the proper rights of labor organizations are in the public interest. As for myself I am not sympathetic with the viewpoint of those who would oppress the laboring people of this country and deny them their legitimate rights. It is a question of protecting the public interest

with due consideration for the just rights of those who toil.

"I introduced the first bill ever introduced in Congress for the creation of the Civil Aeronautics Authority, commonly known as the CAA, and I have been a steadfast supporter of Military and Civilian Aviation throughout my term in Congress.

I am now working for a program of airport development throughout the 19th Congressional District and look forward to the time when every town will have aviation facilities.

This is the time for advancement in aviation and West Texas must stand abreast of the progress.

There is no more powerful friend of the REA in the House of Representatives than George Mahon of the 19th Congressional District. I have fought the battle of the REA during my entire Congressional service, and one-third of the rural homes of my District are now provided with electricity by the REA.

Your Congressman is still getting the job done, and he looks forward with hope to the day when every rural home will have electricity. LOOKING AHEAD

By George S. Benson, President, Harding College, Searcy, Ark.

ON RECORD

"Freedom is more honest than government and so much more productive." This proverb might be added appropriately and soon to the ever-growing lexicon of "immortal words." It came from the lips of Ralph W. Gwinn of Bronxville, N. Y., toward the end of a speech he made in Congress, last April 16. The address was a review of 40 centuries of price fixing by government.

Down through the ages, Rep. Gwinn traced the dismal trail of political price pegging from King Hammurabi of Babylon, who died 2,242 years before Christ, to our own Chester Bowles. Each successive effort went to pot. The oldest pile of wreckage, marking the turn where some self-confident ruler locked his economic steering wheel was in ancient Babylon.

Babylon was not the last nor the worst. Another notable catastrophe took place about 900 years later as a result of the daga and price freezing provisions of the Hittite Code. Popular pressure in Asia Minor influenced this case, but served to prove how even the ancient rulers ran afoul of sore resentment against their impractical tinkering with freedom of private enterprise.

France's egoistic Phillip IV took prices in hand and created a painful scarcity of bread and clothing, six centuries before Hitler. Three or more English kings took turns at issuing edicts against natural laws, no less silly than Canute's ordering the tide not to come in. Without fail, price control systems have finally created scarcity instead of improved production.

The Emperor's OPA
The congressman's most colorful example was Rome. About 300 years before the birth of Christ, Emperor Diocletian set up a sort of OPA for the whole Roman Empire. Propaganda went out first, in an effort to sell the public on the idea that rulers were much smarter than mere people. After the edict, came a record-breaking swarm of ministers and magistrates to enforce prices.

Did the emperor make his prices hold? He did not! He fixed a death penalty on people who bought or sold above the ceiling but Diocletian has his little undercover problems like all the others who went in for governmental price manipulation. Not many "offenders" were executed. Magistrates took bribes, prices rose anyhow and overflowed into black-markets without number.

Taxes Climbed High
An interesting sidelight on the Roman affair was that all kinds of building stopped, arts and sciences fell into decay to such an extent that people almost forgot about excellence. They fashioned and used makeshifts exclusively. Good craftsmen went jobless, big business men fled into exile and small business men went bankrupt and hungry. And Rome fell.

But before the final collapse, before the tramp of armed aliens is heard in the street, rulers, who have ruined the wealth of their country and prosperity of their subjects, run out of money themselves. A hungry and angry people chased Diocletian out of Rome but his evil work was done. Taxes were devastating until Rome was a ruin. History has not one price-fixing plan fit to copy, here or anywhere.

WAA Illustrated Booklet Issued On Surplus Property

"How, what, and where" to buy surplus property is graphically explained in a 32-page illustrated booklet issued today by the War Assets Administration.

The booklet is a handy guide for prospective buyers of surplus property of all kinds in the United States and its territories and possessions and is available at the Fort Worth WAA Regional office, P. O. Box 1407, Fort Worth and at Post offices throughout the country.

The priorities accorded veterans and other groups are explained, and priority holders are told what they must do to take advantage of the opportunities offered them in surplus disposal. The booklet tells where to get information on sales and list sales prices of WAA and other domestic disposal agencies with addresses and telephone numbers. Also listed are veterans and small business certification offices. The booklet is being widely distributed in conjunction with surplus property advertising.

In an introduction to the guide, Lt. Gen. E. B. Gregory, War Assets Administrator, states: "The War Assets Administration wants to sell surplus property as rapidly as possible. If you do not find the answer to your question here, write, telephone or wire your nearest WAA Regional or branch office."

Texans Warned On Rabid Animals

With a sharp increase in the number of persons being bitten by rabid animals in East Texas, and similar occurrences reported in other sections of the state, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, recently warned all Texans to be on the alert for symptoms of this disease when around domestic or wild animals.

The 2,166 animal heads received for examination by the State Health Department during the past year have shown 687 positives, including incidence among cats, dogs, horses, rabbits, rats, squirrels, skunks, guinea pigs, coyotes, gophers, raccoons, hogs, sheep, and prairie dogs.

Rabies is transmitted to man through a bite or having a cut exposed to the saliva of a rabid animal. Bites through clothing are not as dangerous as bites on exposed surfaces, because the saliva is wiped off as the tooth passes through the cloth.

If a person is bitten, the offending animal should be penned, if possible, for a period of ten days observation. If the animal is normal at the end of that time, the case can be dismissed. If it is necessary to kill the animal, this should be done in such a manner that the brain is not destroyed, otherwise, an examination to determine whether or not the animal had rabies will be impossible. If the head is sent to the State Health Department, care should be used in properly icing it to prevent decomposition.

Car Registrations May Hit 2,000,000

AUSTIN—Titles for 39,965 hard-to-get 1946 model motor vehicles have been sold in Texas to date, a tabulation by the State Highway department revealed today.

As waiting lists for new cars grow longer, total registration of all vehicles in Texas set an all-time July high of 1,626,374.

Highway authorities predicted that 1946 registrations would exceed the 2,000,000 mark by the end of the year, an average of one motor vehicle for every 3 1/2 Texans.

It was reported that automatic traffic counters in Texas have clocked 37 per cent more traffic in June this year than in the same month last year and one per cent more than June of the 1941 peak year.

Texas motorists were being particularly cautioned, the highway report said, although traffic volume for the first five months of this year was more than three per cent above the peak reached during the same period in 1941, traffic deaths had increased only one per cent.

FARM FACTS WORTH KNOWING

Q. Should DDT spray and whitewash be applied simultaneously to walls and ceilings of dairy barns?

A. No. The strong alkali in whitewash will decompose the DDT preparation so that it will lose its killing effect very quickly. However, DDT can safely be applied to walls after the whitewash has thoroughly dried. For best results, an interval of two to three weeks should elapse before DDT is applied to whitewashed walls. If salt is added at the rate of 1 pound of salt to each 16 pounds of lime, the whitewash will adhere to the walls better, and it will cause the DDT to remain effective longer.

Q. Do rabbits produce meat economically?

A. Yes. Three and one-half to four pounds of feed produces a pound of rabbit meat. This amount includes roughage.

Q. Can range sheepmen anticipate any great reduction of their overhead costs in the immediate future?

A. Unfortunately, the present condition of the industry does not produce any great reduction of overhead costs for range sheepmen. However, by increasing the efficiency of his operations the range sheepman will be able to produce more wool and lambs without increasing his running costs.

Q. How does the birth weight of pigs correlate with the health, vigor and livability of pigs farrowed?

A. Experience at the Ralston Purina Research Farm proves that the birth weight of pigs is an excellent indication of vigor and livability. Of pigs weighing one and one-half pounds at birth, only 13% were alive at weaning time. Of pigs weighing three pounds or more at birth, 77%-85% were weaned.

Q. Is the average size of turkeys marketed in the United States getting larger or smaller?

A. The size of turkeys marketed is steadily increasing. According to the United States Department of Agriculture, the average live weight of turkeys at market time was 14.5 pounds in 1935, and 17.4 pounds in 1945, an increase of almost three pounds.

ORDINANCE ORDERING STREET IMPROVEMENTS BY PAVING AND GUTTERING CERTAIN SECTIONS OF UNITS OF CITY STREETS, AND SETTING A DATE FOR PUBLIC HEARING ON CITY'S PROPOSAL TO FIX LIENS ON THE PROPERTY OF ABUTTING PROPERTY OWNERS FOR THE PURPOSE OF DEFRAYING A PART OF THE EXPENSE OF SUCH STREET IMPROVEMENTS.

This 16th day of July, 1946, the City Commission of the City of Morton, Inc. convened in Special Session with all members of the Commission present, to-wit: Paul Arnold, City Mayor, T. L. McAlister, City Commissioner, and Lewis M. Smith, City Commissioner, together with W. K. Whitman,

City Clerk, when along with other business coming on for consideration there came the following:

WHEREAS, on the 15th day of November, 1945, the City Commission of the City of Morton, by Ordinance duly passed, called a Special Election to be held in and for said City, for the purpose of letting the resident property tax payers who were qualified voters of such City say by their vote whether or not the State Paving Laws should be adopted by the City of Morton, as such laws are contained in Articles 1086 to 1096, both inclusive, and Articles 1104 and 1105, Title 28, Cities, Towns and Villages, revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas, 1925, as amended; and,

WHEREAS, on December the 8th, 1945, at the Special Election called for such purpose, a majority of the votes at such election voted FOR the adoption of the Paving Laws, the returns of such election having been duly made to the City Commission of the City of Morton, and canvassed by that body, and an ordinance duly entered upon the minutes of such City declaring the result of such election, and adopting the paving laws in and for the City of Morton, Incorporated.

NOW THEREFORE, be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Morton, Texas, in Special Session sitting on this 16th day of July, 1946, that certain sections or units of certain streets in this City be paved and guttered in accordance with the plans and specifications of the City Engineer. Be it further Ordained that a certain part of the expense of such street improvements be assessed against the property, and the property owners, abutting on the streets herein ordered to be improved with paving and gutters. Be it further Ordained that the following 12 Paving Units shall be, and they hereby are, ordered improved with paving and guttering according to the City Engineer's plans and specifications:

UNIT NO. 1: Main Street from the S. E. corner of the Public Square to its intersection with Fillmore Ave.

UNIT NO. 2: Main Street from the S. E. corner of the public Square to the N. E. corner of the Public Square.

UNIT NO. 3: Main Street from the N. E. corner of the Public Square to its intersection with Madison Ave.

UNIT NO. 4: West 1st St. from the S. W. corner of the Public Square to its intersection with Fillmore Ave.

UNIT NO. 5: Washington Ave. from the S. E. corner of the Public Square to the S. W. corner of the Public Square.

UNIT NO. 6: West 1st St. from the S. W. corner of the Public Square to the N. W. corner of the Public Square.

UNIT NO. 7: Wilson Ave. from the N. W. corner of the Public Square to the N. E. corner of the Public Square.

UNIT NO. 8: West 1st St. from the N. W. corner of the Public Square to its intersection with Madison Ave.

UNIT NO. 9: Wilson Ave. from the N. W. corner of the Public

UNIT NO. 10: Wilson Ave. from the N. E. corner of the Public Square to its intersection with East 2nd St.

UNIT NO. 11: Washington Ave. from the S. W. corner of the Public Square to its intersection with West 3rd St.

UNIT NO. 12: Washington Ave. from the S. E. corner of the Public Square to its intersection with East 2nd St.

Be it further ordained that Friday, August the 2nd, 1946, in the District Court Room in Morton, Texas, be, and the same hereby is designated as the time and place, when and where, property owners whose property abutts on any of the streets or units herein described may be heard to show cause why Statutory Street Improvement Lien, or liens, should not be lawfully fixed against their said properties as the law directs.

Be it further ordered that notice of such hearing be given by the publication of this Ordinance in the Morton Tribune for three consecutive weeks, before the date herein set for such hearing. And such publication of this Ordinance shall be the lawful statutory notice to said property owners to appear, should they elect so to do, and show cause why

Statutory Street Improvement Liens should not be fixed against their said properties.

Commissioner McAlister introduced this Ordinance and moved its passage. Commissioner Smith seconded the motion. The Mayor called for a vote upon the Ordinance as read, and all members of the City Commission voted "Aye," and none voted "No."

The City Mayor declared the Ordinance duly passed, and ordered the same spread upon the Minutes of the City Commission in its regular place, and ordered the City Clerk to have the same published in full in the "Morton Tribune," a weekly newspaper published in the City of Morton, Texas, for three consecutive weeks beginning July the 18th, 1946.

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CITY ORDINANCE

(Continued from preceding page)

Section 35. It shall be unlawful for the owner or occupant of any building or premises within this City to use, or to permit anyone else to use, any privy or water closet on such premises that is connected with the sewer system of the City, unless the same shall be used in connection with sufficient water flowing into the sewer to keep the pipes connecting such privies or water closets with the sewers free from obstruction.

Section 36. It shall be unlawful for the owner of any building where people reside or are regularly employed within reach of the sewer system as provided by this ordinance, to fail to have at least one water closet connected with the City sewer system; except, where two adjoining buildings are owned and operated by the same person, require but one connection.

Section 37. If, on account of the distance from the sewer system, any owner is not required to connect with the sewer system as provided in this ordinance, then privies shall be made to conform with City ordinances now in effect or that hereafter may be enacted governing sanitation and outdoor privies.

Section 38. It shall be unlawful for any person to throw or allow to be thrown or deposited upon the surface of the ground, or in any hole in or under the surface of the ground where such premises are within the distance herein prescribed to be connected with the sewer, any water which has been used for domestic or manufacturing purposes or any liquid or solid filth, faeces or urine, after the said thirty day period following the enactment and legal publication of this ordinance.

Section 39. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to make or have made any connection with the sanitary sewer system of the City of Morton, Texas, that will permit any surface or drain water from the ground or roof of houses or the overflowing of cisterns or cess pools to enter said sewers directly or indirectly; provided, however, that the drainage of cellars may be connected with said system when made in accordance with the regulations herein and by plans and specifications of the Plumbing Inspector and under his direct supervision.

Section 40. Every person, firm or corporation who shall omit or refuse to comply with, or who wilfully violates any section of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor and upon conviction therefor shall be fined in any sum not more than \$100.00 for each offense, and each day that such violation shall exist shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 41. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed and declared of no further force and effect.

Section 42. That the fact that there is not adequate laws in the City of Morton, Texas, now regulating the installation and use of sewers and that sewers are now being rapidly installed, creates an emergency and that a public necessity exists that the rule requiring all ordinances to be read at more than one meeting before final passage be suspended and that this ordinance take effect immediately after its passage at one meeting, its approval and legal publication, and it is so ordained.

herein defined, shall intend to personally do the work of plumbing, on contracts made by him or others, he shall also pass the examination as Journeyman Plumber, as herein defined.

(c) The term "Journeyman Plumber" means one whose principal work is manual; one skilled and experienced in the actual physical labor of installing tanks, pipes, traps fittings and fixtures, making taps, and connections in such manner as will prevent the escaping of noxious vapors, gases, odors, etc., in all buildings and in making proper and sanitary connections for same; and who holds himself out as intending to actually do such work under the employment and supervision of a Master (or employing plumber), as herein defined, but not as intending to contract for the cause to be done such work as a Master or Employing Plumber, as herein defined.

Examining and Supervising Board of Plumbers

Section 2. (A) There is hereby created and established a Board to be known as the Examining and Supervising Board of Plumbers of the City of Morton, Texas.

(B) Said Board shall consist of five members, to-wit:
 One member of the local Board of Health of the City to be designated by the City Board of Commissioners of the City of Morton, Texas, the City Engineer of the City of Morton, Texas; the Inspector of Plumbing of the City of Morton, Texas. These three to be Ex Officio members of the Board hereby created and to continue as such members while holding their respective offices.

Composition of Board

The said board shall consist of the following persons: A member of the local board of Health, if there be such a Board of Health, and if there be no local Board of Health, then the City Physician or the City Health Officer, the City Engineer, the City Inspector of Plumbing, a Master Plumber of not less than ten years' active and continuous experience as a plumber, and one Journeyman Plumber of not less than five years of such active and continuous experience.

PROVIDED, HOWEVER, that if any of the five members of the Board, above provided for, shall die, or become unable to act, for any reason, or shall resign from their respective positions, or shall be removed for any cause, as hereinafter provided, then the Board of Commissioners of the City of Morton shall appoint a successor or successors, who will fill out the unexpired term and until their respective successors shall be duly appointed.

Duties of the Board

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Examining Board, herein provided for, to meet as soon after their appointment as is practicable and within ten days, and organize by selecting one of their members as Chairman and another as Secretary, who shall keep full record of the proceedings of said Board.

And it shall be the further duty of said Board to provide itself with proper books of record, blank forms, stationery and supplies, proper and adequate for the conduct of its business, which shall be paid for out of the fees of examination as hereinafter provided for.

It shall be the further duty of said Board from time to time, as it may deem proper, to submit to the Board of Commissioners of the City of Morton, its written suggestions and recommendations for the improvement of the plumbing ordinances of the City of Morton.

No Compensation

Section 4. All members of the Board herein provided for shall serve the City of Morton without any compensation whatever.

Powers

Section 5. The examining and supervising Board of Plumbers, herein provided for, shall have power, and the same is hereby granted to them, as follows,
 (a) To adopt rules and regulations for the conduct of the business of the examination of applicants and for its own government in carrying out its duties under this ordinance, provided the same shall not be inconsistent with any laws of the State of Texas, or the ordinances of the City of Morton, Texas.
 (b) To provide proper forms, in its discretion, for applicants for examination as Master Plumber, Inspector of Plumbing of Journeyman Plumber and to require all applicants to properly fill out and file same with said Board.
 (c) To fix reasonable times for the examination of applicants under the terms of this ordinance, and to specify the hours therefor, and the place where such examination shall be held.
 (d) To provide suitable examinations for Master Plumbers, Inspector of Plumbing; and for the Journeyman Plumber, and to determine whether they shall be all oral, or all written, or partly oral and partly written, and to make all rules necessary for the fair, speedy and sufficient examination of applicants under the provisions of this ordinance.

ence and dates of issuance of certificated, and such other fact, or facts, as will fully inform all parties desiring to know of the qualifications of holders of said certificates, said book to be prepared with proper columns, showing the facts, by the Examining Board and to be a permanent record of the City of Morton.

First Examination Under This Ordinance

Section 9. All persons now engaged in the plumbing business, whether as Master Plumber, or Journeyman Plumber, in the City of Morton, Texas, shall make application to the Examining Board within thirty (30) days after this ordinance goes into effect. The Examining Board shall publish a notice of the time and place of said first examination in some newspaper regularly published in the City of Morton, in at least two issues thereof, and all persons required hereby to be examined shall make application to said Examining Board and be examined at the time and place fixed by said notice, or failing to do so, shall not continue in the plumbing business in the City of Morton, after said date, until they shall have so applied for, and obtained, a Certificate of Qualification, as provided in this ordinance.

Plumbing Inspector

Section 10. All persons desiring to apply to the Board of Commissioners of the City of Morton, Texas, for the position as Inspector of Plumbing as defined herein, shall first apply to, and be examined by the Examining Board, herein provided for, and obtain a Certificate of Qualification, and a license to act as such Inspector from said Examining Board, as provided for Master Plumbers under the terms of this ordinance and said applicants for the position of Inspector of Plumbing, of the City of Morton, shall file with their applications their certificates of Qualifications, and license, as herein provided for. No person not holding such Certificate of Qualification and license and presenting same position of Inspector of Plumbing for the City.

Cumulative

Section 11. This ordinance shall be considered as cumulative to all other ordinances now in force touching plumbing within the City of Morton, Texas, PROVIDED, HOWEVER, that all acts, or parts of acts, in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Saving Clause

Section 12. If any section of this ordinance, or any part of a section shall, by any court of Competent Jurisdiction be held to be invalid, the same shall not effect any part, or other parts, of this ordinance, but the same shall remain in full force and effect.

Penalty

Section 13. Any person violating this ordinance, or any section thereof, or attempting to do plumbing, either as Master or Journeyman Plumber as defined herein, without first obtaining the Certificate of Qualifications, as herein provided for, shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor and shall be fined in any sum of not more than \$100.00, in any Court of Competent Jurisdiction, including the Corporation Court of the city of Morton.

Each day shall be considered as a separate violation of this ordinance and the penalties shall be applied accordingly.

Emergency

Section 14. WHEREAS, the State Law requires the passage of an ordinance of this character, and

WHEREAS, the City Commission is of the opinion that such ordinance should be effective immediately, and

WHEREAS, the public safety and health require that this ordinance should be immediately effective.

THEREFORE, the same shall be and become immediately upon the passage and publication of this ordinance as provided by the Law of the State of Texas and of the City of Morton, Texas.

An Ordinance Governing the Installation and Maintenance of the Sanitary Sewer System In the City of Morton

Tribune, Morton, Cochran County, Texas, Thursday, July 18, 1947

AN ORDINANCE GOVERNING THE INSTALLATION AND MAINTENANCE OF THE SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM IN THE CITY OF MORTON, TEXAS, PRESCRIBING THE MANNER OF MAKING CONNECTIONS THERE TO; PROVIDING FOR THE APPLICATION BY AND LICENSING OF, QUALIFIED MASTER PLUMBERS; PRESCRIBING A LICENSE FEE THEREFOR AND THE ISSUANCE OF LICENSE; PROVIDING FOR FILING OF APPLICATIONS FOR PERMITS; PROVIDING FOR BOND AND ITS CONDITIONS; DEFINING THE DUTIES OF MASTER PLUMBER; AND PRESCRIBING PENALTIES AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MORTON, TEXAS:

Section 1. The sanitary sewer system of the City of Morton, Texas, consists of main and lateral conduits of salt glazed vitrified earthenware or other similar pipe, with necessary accessories and are known herein as sanitary sewers. They are designed to carry off all liquid house wastes. The sewers in the alleys or streets adjacent to the various lots are called main or lateral sewers. The sewers leading from the main or lateral sewers to the property on either side are called house sewers.

Section 2. That all persons, firms or corporations carrying on plumbing business within the City of Morton, Texas, under the terms of this ordinance, before they shall do any work upon sanitary sewers or make any connections with same, or any plumbing work connected or intended to be connected with the sewer system, shall secure a license as hereinafter provided and shall execute and deliver to the City of Morton, a bond in the sum of one Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00), payable to the City of Morton, at Morton, Texas, and as herein otherwise provided for, with two or more good and sufficient sureties thereon, or a bond regularly issued by an approved surety company, which said bond shall be conditioned as follows: said bond shall be conditioned that all work done upon any sanitary sewer or any connection thereof, shall be done in a good and workmanlike manner, and in accordance with the plumbing ordinance and specifications now in existence, or that may hereafter be adopted by the governing body of the City of Morton; and that the City of Morton shall be fully indemnified and held whole and harmless from any and all costs, expense or damage, whether real or asserted, on account of any injury done to any person or property in the prosecution of work or consequence of doing such work, or that may arise out of, or be occasioned by, the performance of said work; and said bond shall be further conditioned that it shall be the duty of said person, carrying on such plumbing business to replace in a good and workmanlike manner, and restore any portion of any street or alley which may be opened for the purpose of making connections with any sewer pipes; and all such opening or excavations shall be refilled and restored, and the street or alley placed in as good condition as existed before any such excavation was made. That in case any opening or any excavation in any street or alley is not restored as herein provided, to the satisfaction of the Inspector, it shall be the duty of any person doing the work to promptly restore same upon receiving notice from the Inspector, and in case of a failure or default to restore same after such notice, and after the expiration of a reasonable time, and three days time shall be deemed reasonable time for the beginning of any such work, the Inspector of the city shall report such fact to the governing body of the city and the governing body may, thereupon, order the Inspector to restore said street at the cost of such person making such excavation; and the statement of the cost, as furnished by the Inspector, shall be conclusive evidence against such person making such excavation.

Section 3. That said bond shall be further conditioned that all persons engaged in the plumbing business shall do all plumbing in houses and on premises within the city limits, so that such plumbing shall conform to the plumbing specifications provided by this ordinance and all ordinances that may hereafter be enacted; and in case any person so engaged in the plumbing business shall refuse to install or construct any plumbing work in any house or premises in accordance with such plumbing specifications, the owner of any such house or premises, who may be aggrieved or injured thereby, may have recourse on such bond, even though said work has been passed by the Plumbing Inspector. That should the plumbing inspector refuse to issue the certificate of approval of said work on account of the failure of said plumber to comply with the plumbing specifications, then in

such event said Plumbing Inspector shall notify the person doing said work to comply with said rules and regulations, and in case said plumber doing the work shall, within a reasonable time after the receipt of such notice, and three days shall be considered a reasonable time, fail or refuse to change or rectify the work so as to make same comply with the plumbing regulations, it shall be the duty of said sureties on the bond herein required to make any such change on any such plumbing work so as to comply with the plumbing specifications. That in default of said plumber or the sureties on said bond doing said work or performing same as herein provided, the owner of any such house or premises may have recourse against the principal and sureties on the bond herein provided for.

That in case that any person engaged in the plumbing business should in any way injure any sanitary sewer, meter, meter box or any waterworks pipe or any other equipment belonging to the City of Morton, in making any connection or disconnection with same or doing any work upon same, or should fail to do any work on any such pipes or equipment, in accordance with said plumbing specifications, where such plumbing is to be connected with either, the City of Morton, shall have recourse against any such person doing such work and the sureties on the bond herein provided for, but such bond shall be deemed a continuous obligation against the principal and sureties thereon, until the entire amount therein provided for should be decreased in amount on account of any of the conditions of the same, the governing body shall require, upon notice of the principal by the Plumbing Inspector, of such facts, an additional bond to be given by any such person doing said plumbing work, conditioned in accordance with this ordinance, and in an amount sufficient, when added to the unexhausted amount of the original bond, to equal at all times the original sum provided in this ordinance. That in no case shall any individual, firm or corporation engage in any plumbing business without having on file, and accepted by the city, a bond in the amount herein fixed. That all Plumbers' bonds as herein required to be executed by any person engaged in the plumbing business shall expire on the first day of January, 1947, and shall thereafter be re-executed by such person for the period of one year from said date, provided that any person who may engage in the plumbing business at any time after the first day of January of any year shall execute a bond for the unexpired portion of said year, that is, until the first day of January of the succeeding year, and that, as near as practicable, all bonds shall be issued for a period of one year; provided, however, that nothing in this ordinance shall affect the bond of any person engaged in the plumbing business which has already been duly executed in accordance with the terms of the existing City Ordinances, nor shall this ordinance be construed to in any manner diminish the liability of any surety or principal under his, her or their bond.

That upon the approval of the aforesaid bond by the governing body the person desiring to engage in the plumbing business shall obtain from the City Clerk of the City of Morton, a license, which license shall run until the 1st day of January next succeeding its issuance unless sooner revoked, and the same shall not be transferrable and shall be renewed annually.

That the person obtaining said license shall pay to the City Clerk the sum of Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00) for such annual license, and no license shall be issued for less than the fee herein prescribed.

That the governing body of the City of Morton may forfeit the license of any such person for violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance, or such future ordinances as the City may pass relating to plumbing in the City of Morton, after giving at least ten days written notice to such licensee, which notice shall state time and place of the hearing on said revocation, and after license has been given an opportunity to be heard at the time mentioned in said notice.

It shall be unlawful for any person to engage in the plumbing business in the City of Morton without having first secured the license herein provided for.

Whenever any such person shall have executed the bond and secured the license herein provided for, a City meter box key may be secured subject to such regulations as the City Water Department may adopt, in the use of such key for any purpose, such person shall leave the water on or off on completion of work as found when meter box was opened, and such meter box shall be left locked. In no event shall the meter be interfered with and such person shall be held responsible for any damage done to meter, meter box or connection. No person carrying on the plumbing business shall allow his or her name to be used by any other person directly or indirectly to obtain a permit or permits; or to do any work under his, her or their bond.

Section 4. PERMITS. Application for permits to connect with the sewer system or to do plumbing work to be connected therewith, must be made in writing by the owner of the property to be drained, or by his authorized agent. Such application shall give the precise location of the property, the name of the owner, and the name of the person employed to do the work and shall be made on blanks furnished for the purpose. No permit shall be deemed to authorize anything not stated in the application, and for any misrepresentations in such application the plumber shall be suspended; and if such misrepresentation appears to be willful his license shall be revoked. For the issuance and filing of such applications for permits a fee of Fifty cents (50c) shall be charged and such fees shall be deposited to the general fund of the City. Permits to make connection with the sewer system shall be issued only when the plumbing in the house or building to be connected is in accordance with the rules for plumbing herein prescribed and approved by the Plumbing Inspector.

The Plumbing Inspector will designate the position of the "Y" branch in the streets or alleys, as shown by the records in the City Hall. All connections made with the sanitary sewers or drains and all plumbing connected therewith shall be made under the direction of the Plumbing Inspector, or his authorized agent.

Section 5. PLAN OF PLUMBING. Before a permit will be issued for doing plumbing work in a building, or before any additions are made excepting necessary repairs, a description of the work to be done signed by a licensed plumber on blanks furnished for the purpose, shall be filed in the office of the Plumbing Inspector, and no such work shall be commenced until such description shall have been approved by the Plumbing Inspector.

All work done under such description shall be subject to the inspection of the Plumbing Inspector, and no alterations shall be made in any description or in any work without a permit in writing from the City.

Section 6. Bad faith or unreasonable delay in the performance of plumbing work shall be deemed a sufficient reason for subjecting the plumber so offending to a suspension of his license, and every plumber shall be held responsible for the violation of these regulations and of laborers and helpers employed by him.

Section 7. INSPECTION. The Plumbing Inspector shall be given notice when any work is ready for inspection, and all work must be left uncovered and convenient for examination until inspected and approved. Such inspection shall be made within twenty-four hours after such notification. The plumber shall apply either the water or smoke test, in the presence of the City Plumbing Inspector, and the plumber shall remove and repair any defective material or labor when so ordered by the Plumbing Inspector.

Section 8. RIGHT OF ENTRY. The Plumbing Inspector or his assistant shall have the right and privilege to enter any building within reasonable hours, in the City of Morton, Texas, for the purpose of making inspections of the plumbing, drainage or ventilation system constructed or under construction in such building. Each and every system of plumbing, drainage or ventilation shall be inspected and approved by the Plumbing Inspector or his assistant, before said building in which work is being done or has been done, shall be occupied.

Section 9. STATEMENT OF WORK DONE. The plumber shall file in the office of the Plumbing Inspector a correct statement of the work done under the permit.

Section 10. CESS POOLS AND OVERFLOWS. No open gutter, cess pool or privy vault shall be connected with any sewer or drain.

Section 11. No person, firms or corporations shall injure, break, or remove any section of any manhole, lamp hole, flush tank, catch basin, or any part of the sewer system, or throw or deposit or cause to be thrown or deposited in any sewer openings or receptacle connecting with the sewer system, any garbage, offal, dead animals, vegetables, parings, ashes, cinders, rags, or other matter or thing whatsoever, except faeces, urine and the necessary waste toilet paper, lipid, house and mill slops.

Section 12. Any person, firm or corporation desiring to lay pipes for water, gas, steam or any purpose in any street or alley upon which sewers are laid, shall give at least twenty-four hours notice to the Plumbing Inspector before opening the street or alley for the laying and back-filling over such pipe shall be subject to the approval of the Plumbing Inspector. All such work shall be planned and executed so that no injury shall occur to any house sewer or drain connected therewith.

Section 13. OBSTRUCTION. The City, acting through the Plumbing Inspector or other authorized officers, shall have the power to stop and prevent from discharging into the sewer system any private sewer or drain through which substances are discharged which are liable to injure the sewers or obstruct the flow of the sewerage, or interfere with the operations of the disposal plant.

Section 14. CONNECTIONS OF OLD DRAINS. Before any old private drains shall be connected with the sewer system the owner of the private drain shall prove to the satisfaction of the Plumbing Inspector that it is clean and conforms in every respect with these rules and regulations.

Section 15. The house sewer trench shall be dug so as to meet the public sewer at the position of the "Y" branch, if there be one, so located by the City Inspector. The material thrown from the trench shall be placed so as not to obstruct and so as to cause the least inconvenience to the public. Proper barriers and lights must be maintained on the banks of the trench which shall be dug so as to avoid accidents during the progress of the work. In back filling the earth shall be carefully rammed or flooded so as to keep the pipe in proper position and avoid settling and no stone shall be used in filling until there has been a depth of two feet of fine earth placed over the pipe.

Section 16. MATERIALS FOR SEWERS AND DRAINS. The house sewers from a point two feet outside the house to the street or alley sewers, shall be of first quality salt glazed, vitrified earthen or ornubaug pipe, not less than four inches in diameter, unless laid less than six inches deep, when it shall be of cast iron not less than four inches in diameter. Each house must have independent drain to sewer unless more than one house is located on a single lot and a permit is granted by the Inspector of Plumbing.

Section 17. PIPE LAYING. The covering of the "Y" branch on the sewer shall be carefully removed, so as not to injure the socket. The first length of pipe attached shall be curved so as to give a good fall into the sewer. The pipe shall be laid on an even grade of not less than one-tenth (1/10) or more than one-eighth (1/8) of an inch to the foot unless by special permission of the Plumbing Inspector, in which case provisions may be made for regular and efficient flushing.

Curved pipe shall be used for every deflection from a straight line of more than six inches in two feet.

The joints of earthenware pipe shall be made with portland cement of first quality, the joints of iron pipe shall be of oakum and lead if cast iron is used, or white lead if screwed joints are used.

The end of all private sewers not immediately connected with the plumbing fixtures shall be securely closed by water tight impervishable material. If lead pipe, the end must be soldered, if cast iron pipe a cast iron plug must be calked with lead.

No connection for basement drain or cellars shall be allowed until owner of the building has executed and signed a written release to the City of Morton, Texas, releasing it from all damage that may result from said basement or cellar flooded by the stoppage of sewers, which release and agreement shall be filed with the City Clerk and when such connection is allowed it shall be done by means of suitable and properly laid earthenware tile pipes and they shall not communicate directly with any drain pipe carrying foul sewage, or with sewer or cess pool unless properly tapped to prevent back gases.

Section 18. PLUMBING RULES. All materials must be of good quality and free from defects; and the work must be executed in a thorough and workmanlike manner.

From a point two feet outside the foundation wall no material may be used within the building and connected with the sewer for the silt, or waste pipes, other than cast iron pipes with securely threaded or leaded joints, or lead pipes with wiped joints. Cement or putty joints, tin or sheet iron pipes, whether galvanized or not shall not be used.

No soil or waste pipes shall have a fall of less than one inch in ten feet.

Section 19. House Drains within and to a distance of two feet outside of the exterior wall of the building shall be standard weight cast iron soil pipe, except in buildings of two or more stories in which case all soil pipe shall be extra heavy cast iron up to the water level of the highest fixture after which same may be standard weight soil pipe, extending up through roof, said pipe to be calked with oakum and molten lead, and to have a uniform fall of not less than one

quarter inch per foot.

All fittings used in connection with such pipes shall correspond with it in weight and quality. Where lead pipe is used to connect fixtures with vertical soil or waste pipes, or to connect pipes with vertical vent pipes, it must not be lighter than "light pipe."

The arrangement of soil and waste pipes must be as direct as possible, the drain, soil and waste pipes and trap should, if practicable, be exposed to view at all times ready for inspection and for convenience or repairing. When necessarily placed within partitions or within recess of walls, soil and waste pipe should be covered with woodwork so fastened with screws as to be easily removed.

Section 20. All stacks or vertical pipes must be tied or anchored at every other floor by means of cast iron floor rests. When they run parallel or against the wall they shall be supported by clamps of 1/8 x 1 inch iron horizontal runs of waste or vent lines must be supported with permanent hangers, placed at intervals not less than five feet for cast iron pipes and ten feet for wrought iron pipes. Lead pipes must be supported the entire length with a bridge of sufficient thickness to prevent sagging. Pipe hangers made of wood or sheet iron, or that do not meet the requirements of this ordinance and the approval of the Plumbing Inspector, will be rejected.

Section 21. MAIN SOIL AND WASTE PIPES. A main waste pipe into which wash basins, bath tubs or kitchen sinks discharge must be of soil pipe at least two inches in diameter with one and one-half inch branches.

The main line from the sewer connections to the house tap must be at least four inches in interior diameter at every point. No trap or any manner of obstruction to the free flow of air through the whole course of the house sewer will be allowed when the closet sets more than four feet from the main stack, or two of the closets are on the same stack, on different floors, this shall be secured by an untrapped main house sewer and soil pipe by a ventilating pipe leading to the roof from the lower side of the trap and a fresh air inlet connecting the floor of the main-soil pipe just above the trap. Every vertical soil and waste pipe must be extended at least ten inches above the roof or coping. It must be of an undiminished size without return bend. It must not open near a window or an air shaft which ventilates living rooms.

Soil, waste and vent pipes in an extension must be extended above the roof of the main buildings, when otherwise they would open within sixteen feet of the windows of the main house or adjoining houses.

Section 22. JOINTS. All joints in iron drain pipes, soil pipes and waste pipes, except where screw joints are used, must be filled with oakum and lead and hand calked so as to make them gas tight.

All connections of lead pipes with iron pipes must be made with a brass or lead sleeve or ferrule of the same size as the lead pipe, put in the hub or the branch of the iron pipe and calked with lead. The lead pipe must be attached to the ferrule by a wiped joint.

All connections of lead, waste and vent pipes shall be made by means of wiped joints, all fixtures to be lead stubbed for waste.

Section 23. INSPECTION. Before fixtures are placed in connection with the plumbing of any house or building and before the soil pipe is connected with the sewer, the outlet of the soil pipe and openings into it below the top shall be hermetically sealed; the pipe shall be filled with water to its top and every joint be carefully examined for leaks. Defective pipes discovered must be removed or replaced with sound ones and all defective joints made tight and every part of the work made to conform to these rules and regulations, and subject to the approval of the inspector.

In cases where plumbing work has been completed in a building before these rules and regulations came in force, if the plumbing has been done in accordance with these rules and regulations, permits will be granted for making connections with the sewer as in new work but in case such plumbing work does not meet with these requirements alterations shall be made as the Plumbing Inspector may direct to make the plumbing safe to the persons in the house, and such as to be no source of injury or stoppage to the sewer. In all cases the soil pipe shall pass through and above the roof. Traps, are to be ventilated, fixtures and pipes clean, waste and soil pipes to have sufficient fall.

At the bottom of each main stack there shall be a "Y" branch with a one-eighth bend and a clean out plug.

Section 24. Every water closet, urinal, sink, wash trap, bath tub or set of tubs must be separately and effectively trapped and

all bath tubs must be trapped with a 4 x 8 drum trap and the drain from drum traps must be wiped into trap at the lowest possible points and brought up on an angle of 45 degrees to form a waste seal of not less than 2 1/2 inches in trap, and traps must be placed as near the fixtures as practicable. In no case shall water from the bath tub or other fixtures be connected with the water closet trap.

All sinks in packing houses, butcher shops, lard rendering establishments, hotels, restaurants, boarding houses, and laundries, shall be provided with suitable brick or vitrified grease trap, not less than twenty four inches from the places above named. The size, kind and number of which will be required according to the circumstances of the case before any water from any such sinks or receptacle of water containing grease shall discharge into the house drain or sewer. When placed above the floor or ground shall be of cast iron brass or 6 pound lead, size of which shall be at least 12 inches by twelve inches, or larger as necessary, when placed in ground they shall be built of brick and cement mortar, to be plastered inside and out with three fourths inches of cement and sand of equal parts. For ordinary dwellings or residences, grease traps are not compulsory. Where there are no grease traps the waste must be connected with a pipe no less than two inches in diameter for horizontal runs or vertical lines over eight feet in length with a cleanout plug in all horizontal changes of direction. All grease traps provided for in this Section shall be cleaned at least twice each week and oftener if necessary.

Public garages washing automobiles and motor trucks shall install proper catch basins or sand traps constructed of iron, glazed tile or concrete made water tight and the discharge from same shall be taken off in a manner that will provide a water seal of not less than 14 inches. Such trap shall be protected against syphonage or back pressure by proper venting made continuous when possible, and accessible cleanouts for discharge line shall be provided. The Plumbing Inspector will have on file in his office plans showing the construction of these traps that will meet with his approval.

Section 25. VENT TRAPS. Traps must be protected from syphonage, or the waste leading from them ventilated by a special air pipe taken out of the crown of the trap, in no case less than four inches in diameter for the water closet traps, and one inch and a quarter for other traps, except when more than fifteen feet in length when it shall not be less than one and one-half inches in diameter. All floor traps must be dry vented. All sinks shall have cleanouts accessible from the outside. The vertical vent pipes for traps of water closets in buildings more than four stories in height must be at least three (3) inches in diameter, with two (2) inch braches to each trap and for traps of other fixtures not less than two (2) inches in diameter.

Section 26. Batteries of water closets or urinals in toilet rooms on same floor from three to twenty in number may be installed by system of loop venting by extending the horizontal line of soil pipe up and return full size to main vent stack at a point one foot above highest fixture or continue separate through roof full size, thus forming a circuit vent system. When more than ten closets or urinals in a battery are vented in this manner, there will be an additional connecting line between waste and vent full size in center of such battery for the purpose of relieving air pockets.

Section 27. Where two water closets are located on the same floor and discharge into the double "Y" or "TY" or sanitary cross, and they are three feet or less from the stack, said water closets will be considered the same as top fixture and it will not be necessary to back vent either water closet.

No trap or vent pipe shall be used as waste or soil pipe. No brick, sheet metal, earthenware or chimney flue shall be used as a sewer ventilator, nor to ventilate any trap, drain, soil or waste pipe.

Section 28. OVERFLOWS FROM FIXTURES. Water closets must be of the approved pattern, in all cases the tank must discharge into the open air of the basin of the closet, and not into the soil pipe directly. Direct service of a water closet is prohibited.

All interior water closet compartments shall be ventilated into air shafts where possible. All outside water closets must be vented and trapped with running "P" trap.

Section 29. All vent pipes passing through roof shall be flashed with two and one-half pound sheet lead.

Section 30. STRAINER. Pipes to all fixtures except closets shall be furnished with suitable permanently attached strainers.

No steam exhausts, blow-off drip pipes shall be connected with house drains soil, waste or vent pipes within any building, but shall discharge into an open tank or condenser, from which safe connection to the sewer outside the building may be made.

Waste pipes from refrigerators or other receptacles shall not be connected direct with the drain system, but can be run into open sink or basin, from which drain pipes must be trapped. It shall be unlawful to drain air conditioners onto streets and alleys and sidewalks.

Section 31. It being absolutely necessary for the proper maintenance and extension of the sewer system of the City, the following monthly charges shall hereby be fixed to be paid by users of said system, the same to be paid monthly as herein provided, to-wit: for hotels, lavatories, one closet, one bath, one kitchen sink, per month \$10.00, for each additional fixture, 25c per month. For restaurants and rooming houses, one closet, bath tub, lavatory, kitchen sink, per month \$2.50, each additional fixture, 25c per month. For business houses, one closet and one lavatory, per month \$2.50 and for each additional fixture, 25c per month. For barber shops, one closet, two bath tubs and one lavatory per month \$2.50 for each additional fixture, 25c per month. Under condition shall the maximum rate charged any of the above classes of patrons be more than \$10.00 per month. For private residences, one closet, one bath tub, lavatory, sink and lamp, per month, \$1.00. The following building will be charged flat rate per month, to-wit: Churches, 50c; public schools during school months, \$10.00 per building; laundries, \$10.00; ice factories, mills, and other plant factories not herein mentioned, \$10.00. Hospitals and nursing homes, \$10.00. Garages and service stations with wash racks and cleaning equipment, \$10.00. Streets and alleys shall not be used as wash racks; grease and steam must be drained to system.

The above charges shall be payable monthly on the first day of each month at the office of the City of Morton, at the City Clerk's office. Any person, persons, firm, or corporation who shall fail to pay the sewer charges on or before the 10th day of the month same is due, shall be subject to have his sewer discontinued from the City system, and if disconnected no connection will be made thereafter with the City system until such party has paid all amounts due and all costs of disconnecting and reconnecting with said system.

Section 32. INSPECTION FEES. All plumbers desiring under this ordinance shall pay an inspection fee of \$1.00 for first service on each installation, \$1.00 for each additional inspection on said job, said fee to be collected by the inspector.

Section 33. It shall be the duty of the Plumbing Inspector when granting permits for connection with the sewer system issue with said permits a copy of these rules and regulations printed form, and it shall be the duty of the plumber making connections to deliver said rules and regulations to the party having the work done for his guidance and instruction in the sewers and maintenance of public health.

Section 34. Every owner of building or part thereof occupied by people for any purpose, or part of the day or night, situated on any city block in which a public sewer is laid and maintained within 150 feet of such building, or any building acreage tracts where a public sewer, and having no water closets or privy connected with sewer, shall, within thirty days after the enactment and publication of this ordinance, up and within said building part of building used as a residence or upon the premises where the same is situated, a water closet or closets and have connected with sewer. The work done in connection therewith and all material used, shall be done in connection therewith and shall be done in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance. In all cases where a privy or water closet now or may hereafter be connected with the public sewer, the owner controlling the same, or his agent shall cause such privy or closets to be supplied with water for flushing, which water shall be delivered from a tank, the bottom of which must not be less than four inches above the opening in closet bowl. Said tank shall hold not less than five gallons of water, and shall be arranged to deliver not less than four gallons of water at a pressure of not less than fifteen pounds to the square inch. The water shall be contained from the tank to the bowl of privy or closet through a metallic pipe not less than one-fourth inches in diameter.



Veterans' Questions & Answers

Q. Does the government pay the first year's interest on GI Loans?

A. No. When the loan is reported to Veterans Administration for a certificate of guaranty, the amount that VA pays is applied to reduce the amount of the loan. VA pays 4 per cent on the amount guaranteed which cannot exceed 50 per cent of the loan, or \$4,000 on a real estate loan and \$2,000 on a non-real estate loan.

Q. Is a veteran who holds a bad conduct discharge entitled to any benefits under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act (GI Bill)?

A. Since he holds neither an honorable nor a dishonorable discharge, it would be necessary for him to contact his nearest Veterans Administration office for a decision as to whether he was discharged under conditions other than dishonorable; or he may apply to the Army or Navy for revision of discharge.

Q. Can a veteran who is not a high school graduate take a course?

A. The veteran who has not completed high school but who wishes to undertake a college education may go to college under a number of methods. It is best that he go to the nearest Veterans Administration office and explore these possibilities.

Q. Can a veteran who draws retirement pay also receive subsistence allowance while attending school?

A. Yes.

Q. Are wives of veterans entitled to medical care under the GI Bill?

A. Veterans Administration is not authorized to furnish medical care for dependents of veterans under any existing laws.

Q. Is the pension of a veteran subject to change if he takes a position?

A. No. Disabled veterans are encouraged to do such work as their disability permits. This does not affect the amount of their pensions because each disability pension is based on the veteran's disability as determined by Veterans Administration rating schedule. Such pensions are subject to change only as the disability itself changes.

**Allan Shivers
Opens Campaign
In Port Arthur**

Senator Allan Shivers, only serviceman in the race for Lieutenant Governor, focused attention on war veterans when he opened his campaign recently in his hometown, Port Arthur.

"I exchanged ideas with fighting men many times in the hard days overseas in Africa, Italy, France and Germany. I know the anxiety and disappointment so many veterans feel today, and I understand and appreciate their problems that are also my own problems", the Jefferson County

senator stated. Although only 38 years old, Senator Shivers is dean of the Texas Senate because of his 13 years service there. The Gulf Coast counties of Jefferson, Hardin, Liberty and Orange made him the youngest senator ever to take the oath of office when he was first sent to the state capitol to represent them in 1934.

"My past 12 years experience in the state senate enables me to preside over the legislative body, which is one of the main duties of Lieutenant Governor," Senator Shivers pointed out.

Listed as his aims when elected Lieutenant Governor, Senator Shivers named consideration of war veterans problems, higher salaries for teachers, better farm-to-market roads, reorganization of the pardon and parole system of the state.

He pointed out that he proposed and sponsored a farm-to-market road program for every county in Texas during the last session of the legislature. "The first old-age assistance law placed upon the Texas Statutes was sponsored by Allan Shivers," he reminded.

"I have been a proponent of legislative redistricting since 1937. This must be done and real soon," the senator said, continuing his platform. "I favor a 60-day session of the legislature each year rather than 120 days every other year. I also favor a reduction in the number of legislators and adequate pay for them," he stated.

Now touring the state in the interest of his candidacy, the senator stated he is asking for promotion upon the basis that he is the only candidate for Lieutenant Governor who has the experience and qualifications that
