

Watching the national Democratic Convention, one cannot help but wonder how the Democratic nomination would have gone had not Bobby Kennedy been assassinated last June.

The untimely death of Senator Kennedy catapulted the campaign of Hubert Humphrey, which had been showing signs of bogging down, especially in the light of Kennedy's primary win in California on the day prior to his assassination.

It's a sad commentary when American politics are affected by the assassin's bullet more so than by the majority of the country's voters -- but stop and think just how much the assassin's have affected our political scene. It staggers you, you might expect this sort of thing in Communist Russia, but not in America.

Once again we're having to write our column prior to the main part of the convention, which will get to the serious part of the nominating about the time our paper goes into the post office.

We're not going out on a limb this time as we did earlier this month when we explained why we thought Nixon wouldn't be nominated on the first ballot.

Instead, we'd like at this point to discuss the "over-coverage" which we get of these events from network radio and television. Basically, we're not an Art Cuchwald-type writer, but we'd like to be. So, here we go:

Announcer: "And now the convention chairman is calling the convention to order. He has called the convention to order exactly ten seconds earlier than scheduled, according to the official convention clock."

"Davey, why do you suppose the chairman called the convention to order ten seconds early?"

Second announcer: "I don't know for sure, Chad. There has been speculation for several days that Mayor Dailey had something up his sleeve, but no one knows just what it would be. This might be the surprise. Let's check down on the floor. Come in, Ran Dather."

First floor announcer: "We have at our microphone Mr. I. M. Real, delegate chairman from Georgia. Mr. Real, why do you suppose chairman Dailey called the convention to order ten seconds early?"

First announcer: "Oh, we didn't think of that. Good night Chad."

"Good night, Davey."

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Teaching Staff Up 2 From 1967-68 Term

There are 74 classroom teachers and administrators in the Friona School system this year, according to a check with Superintendent of Schools Alton Farr. Adding the two librarians puts the total at 76.

Thirty of the teachers are in the first four grades. Twenty are in grades five through eight and 24 are employed in high school.

The number of teachers in the system is two more than last year. A new position has been created in high school for

distributive education and Industrial Cooperative Training. A new position has also been added in junior high.

Two New Opponents On Chief Slate

Two brand-new opponents are among the ten which the Friona High School Chieftains will meet on the gridiron this fall. Both will be met as non-conference foes.

Tucumcari, N.M., who will provide the opposition in Friona's home opener on September 27, is one of the newcomers to the Chieftain roster, and Crosbyton, to be met here in the eighth game, is the other one.

Tucumcari replaces Bovina, which had been met in the third game of the season for the past two years. An enlarged district schedule by Bovina caused the Mustangs to drop off the schedule.

Crosbyton was signed as a late addition to the 1968 schedule, after Memphis was transferred out of District 3-AA at the district meeting. This left Friona with a vacant spot in the eighth week of the schedule. A similar situation occurred in District 4-A on the South Plains, and it was discovered that Crosbyton had the same open dates as did Friona.

This resulted in a non-conference game in the middle of Friona's district schedule, but is much better than an open date at that time of year. Also known as Chiefs, the Crosbyton team won its district title last year.

Besides the two newcomers, the Chiefs meet eight other foes who have been played from four times to 33 times apiece.

Farwell, which will be Friona's opening-game opponent for the 10th consecutive year, is the most-played among the ten opponents, having been met 33 times including the years it was consolidated with Texico, N.M. The Steers hold a 19-13-1 series edge over their county rivals.

Dimmitt has been met about as often, numbering 32 times, since 1930. The Bobcats, once again a district foe, hold the largest series lead over Friona of any of the opponents, having won 23 of the 32 meetings, with Friona winning eight and one game ending in a tie. Four of Friona's eight wins came during the past five years.

Morton, which will be met in the second game of the season, will be played for the twelfth time. Friona can even the all-time record against Morton at 6-6 with a win this year. The Chiefs have won the last three games played between the two schools.

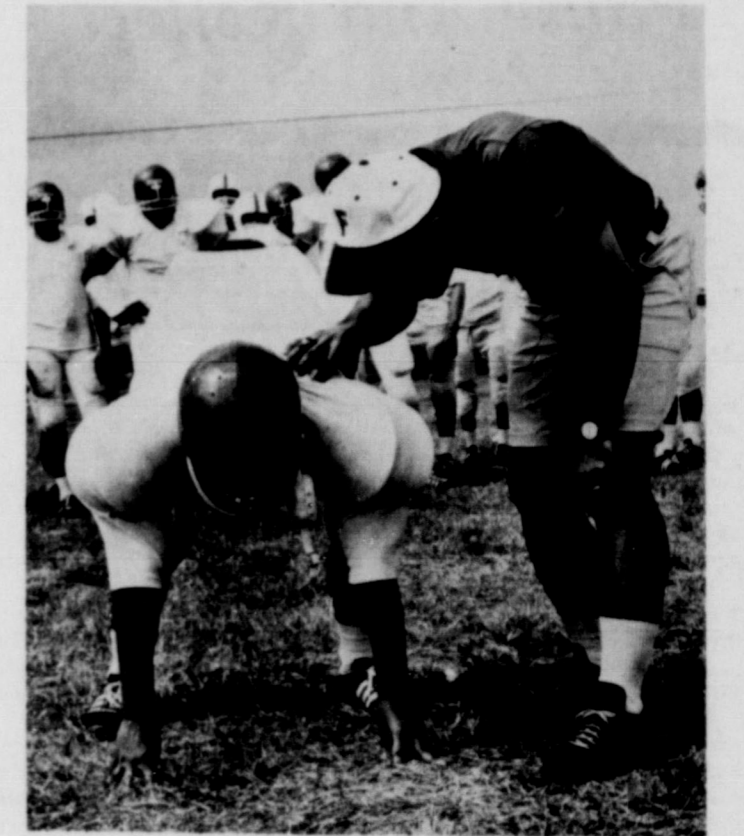

1277 Enrolled On First Day

Enrollment in Friona schools the first day of classes on Wednesday stood at 1277, according to superintendent of schools Alton Farr.

The number was eight less than the first day's enrollment for 1967. However, Farr said he expects the number to increase somewhat. School is starting earlier this year, and more students will undoubtedly come in during the first week or two.

The elementary school showed a gain of two students, to 516 on Wednesday. Junior high school enrolled 432, and high school had 329 students on the first day.

Knowles, 34, has 17 years experience in meat packing, including 14 years with Rath Packing Co. at Waterloo, Iowa. He became personnel director for the Denison division of Iowa Beef Packers, and later was supervisor of the company's Dakota City plant.

Gene Frye, president of Missouri Beef, told the shareholders that the Friona plant was processing in excess of 5,000 head of cattle per week, and has operated at a profit since it began operations.

He sent each shareholder a reprint of an eight-page article which appeared in "The National Provisioner," one of the leading meat packing publications, expounding the Friona plant.

What so very many people, and possibly you, don't realize is that you have no choice. Whether you want to be in it or not, you are UP TO YOUR EARS in politics.

Government is the end result of politics, and it's difficult to think of any action you take that is not affected by government — or politics. Take today for example. You started the day when you arose from a mattress which probably still bears the tag certifying that its contents are described in accordance with state law. Perhaps you had bacon and eggs for breakfast, both of which are subject to inspection and grading by a governmental agency. You traveled to work on roads provided and maintained by another governmental agency. You were required to have a driver's license and registration issued by a governmental agency. While at work, you are the subject of many Fair Employment Laws — administered by governmental agencies. All of these government agencies mentioned are heavily staffed by political appointees.

Entertainment Too

Going to a movie tonight? The film has been previewed by a state board. Or do you plan to watch television? It comes to you via channels assigned by the Federal Communications Commission. All political appointments.

It is possible that the water you drink and even the air you breathe may soon be controlled by a Water Commission and an Air Pollution Commission.

"The voters of the 72nd District are also going to be heard on the issue of daylight savings time, which was sponsored and passed against their known wishes, and which has been a real hardship on school children, mothers, farmers, and many businesses." Ford stated that he will have more to say on this issue in the near future.

The 72nd District includes Cochran, Lamb, Bailey, Castro, Farmer and Deaf Smith Counties.

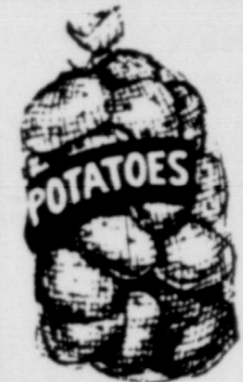

istrict 3-AA opponents, will be met for the 10th time each by the Chiefs. 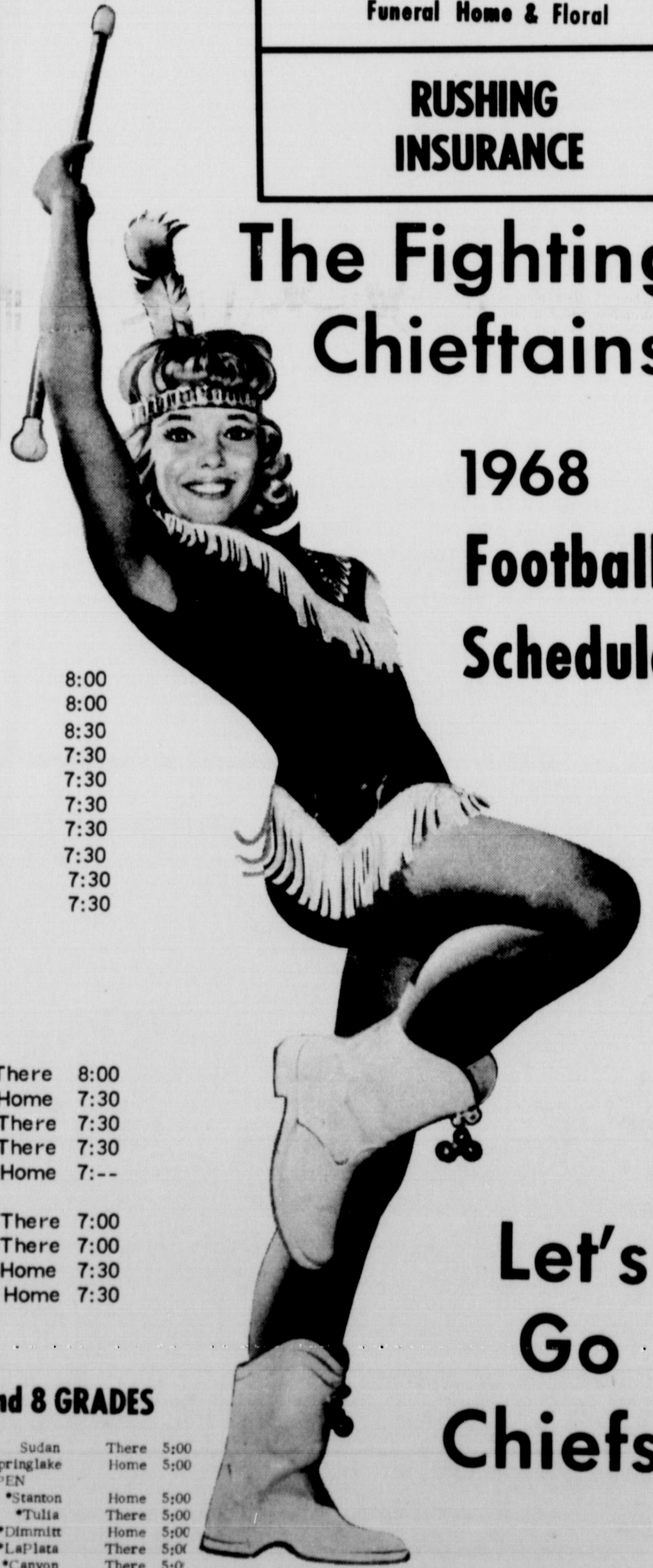

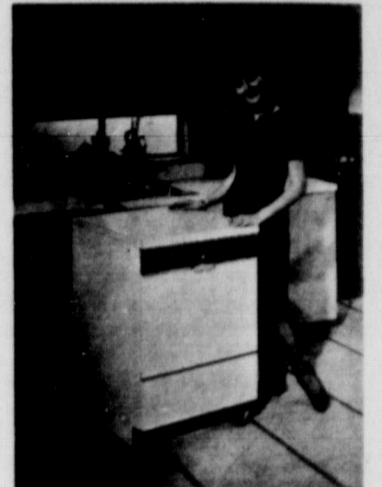
Disabled Workers May Have Benefits Coming

Benefits are now available to some workers, disabled before they reach age 31, who could not have been eligible under the old law.

"Under the old law," Klipping said, "a worker needed social security credits for at least 5 out of 10 years before he became disabled unless he became disabled before 31 because of blindness. But a young worker might not have had a chance to work long enough to meet this requirement."

"Now, if he becomes disabled between 24 and 31, he needs to have worked under social security for only half the time before he became disabled. Also, if he is disabled before he is 24, he will need only 1 1/2 years of work in the 3-year period ending when disability begins."

Even if they had a previous claim turned down because they had not worked long enough, any worker who became disabled before age 31, should contact Klipping in the Council Room at the City Hall from 9 a.m. until noon on the third Tuesday of each month.

PLAY-INSIDE FUN FOR PRE-SCHOOLERS

Winter brings long play-inside days for pre-school youngsters, who alternately envy older brothers and sisters going off to school and pestering mother with "what is there to do" questions.

It is at these times that pre-schoolers are seeking adult guidance for their world of play. According to Playskool Research, it is at these times, too, that mother can offer the guidance-by-indirection to point the way for her pre-schooler to use his own imagination, intelligence, and skills in finding answers.

With just a minimum of suggestion, the pre-schooler finds new uses for his playthings and gains an amazing knowledge of the world around him. If he has a ride-inside wheel toy, mother can build a path for him in the family room, play room, or hallway. Traffic signs — or mother as traffic policeman — can help the youngster learn the safety rules so necessary when he starts to school.

The pre-schooler might plan a trip to the drop-box postal station or make a call from the pay-and-play telephone (hung on a doorknob to serve as an out-of-doors phone booth). As long as he still wants mother's attention and play participation, she has an excellent opportunity to talk about the roles of the mailman, of the telephone operator, and of the policeman in the world of her pre-schooler.

The youngster who likes to play with puzzle plaques and who demands mother's time can learn to identify colors, fruits, animals, even the United States and continents. With mother's encouragement, the pre-schooler will use his imagination to "make up stories" about the "birds I see," the balloon man, the fire truck, or other of his favorite puzzle subjects, at the same time that he is developing manual dexterity and gaining a sense of achievement in problem solving.

"Going to school at home" gives the pre-schooler his conversation piece at the dinner table along with older children. With a play desk — complete with blackboard and mag-

netic spelling board — mother can hold "classes" in numbers, drawing, and writing. The pre-schooler's "school" can be complete, even to milk and cookies at recess.

Keep Matches Away from Children

Always put matches or lighters away, out of the reach of children, urges the American Insurance Association.

Road Improvements Set For County During 1969

Expenditure of \$3,900 and involving 1.9 miles in Parmer County has been approved for highway safety and betterment and for Farm to Market Road improvement during 1969, it was announced this week.

District Engineer O.L. Crain of Lubbock said that the construction within Parmer County will be under the supervision of James W. King, district maintenance engineer, of Lubbock.

The work approved for Parmer County is all in the Farwell area. In work involving major highways, U.S. 84 will be sealcoated from Seventh Street in Farwell to the state line, a distance of .5 mile.

In addition, Farm Road 292 south and west from U.S. 84 in Farwell will receive a seal coat from Highway 84 to the state line, a distance of 1.4 miles.

The work is part of the Highway Commission's combined Farm to Market Road Improvement and State Highway Safety and Betterment Program for 1969.

The safety and betterment portion of the program will cover .5 highway miles in the county at an estimated cost of \$2,100. The farm to market road improvement program will cost an estimated \$1,800 for 1.4 miles of FM roads. Crain stated that the propos-

ed improvements play an important role in the Department's continuing highway safety program.

He said that the types of work included in the program includes seal coating, surface widening, base strengthening, and resurfacing and rebuilding of shoulders.

ARE HOME FURNISHINGS FOR STATUS OR FOR PEOPLE?

Homes and furnishings have become a symbol as to the status of people. Some status seekers have show places for strangers - with little thought to convenience. Homes really should be for people to live in and not show places.

Some homes recently observed have much to be desired as to the basic needs of individuals, their goals and values.

The physical needs a Home can fulfill are: a place to rest, to sleep and a place to eat.

There really is another need that a home must fulfill and that is mental well being. Adequate storage can certainly contribute to this. No one can really feel peace in midst of clutter, therefore, a closet, for instance should be more than a big space with doors. Adequate storage means: well organized storage -- a place for everything. Another point is storage that is often overlooked is that it should be easy to see, easy to reach and easy to grasp. The growing girl needs plenty of storage space for books, treasures and clothing. A pegboard

on one wall is almost a must for the teenager's room.

Few homes have a well planned study desk for students, -- equipped with a good lamp designed for study. Some 4-H members who have taken projects in home improvement this year have made this addition to their bedroom. Deborah Harding, Farwell 4-H'er is one that made this improvement and is quite pleased with the results.

Information on study desk and study lamps are available in the Extension office, or if Johnnie is not taking the interest in his home study assignment that he should, could be he lacks the proper place to work or a poor light or both.

Retirement Base Is Cause Of Confusion

"Questions raised by some of the 357 retired workers in Parmer County show that there is some confusion as to how benefits are figured," Wayne Klipping, social security Field Representative for this area, stated today. (These retirees are presently drawing \$32,461 per month.)

Some persons think social security benefits are based on the individual's highest three or five years of earnings. However, the formula used in computing a person's social security benefit depends on his year of birth.

For example, in the case of a male retiree who was born in 1903, social security counts the years which have gone by from 1951 to the year he becomes 65, or 17 years. The five years of lowest earnings are then dropped, which means that 12 years of highest earnings since 1951 are used in figuring the benefit amount.

New Programs Offered By South Plains College

Technical - Vocational - Occupational program will get underway this fall with the opening of the 1968-69 school year at South Plains College.

Additional programs are: Agri-Business Technology, Irrigation Technology, Radio and Television Station Technology, Stenography, Accounting and Mid-Management.

Occupational programs new to the college will be Arc-Welding, Radio and Television Repair and Diesel Mechanics. The Diesel Mechanics program will begin in January, 1969. Other courses of study include Electronic Data Processing and Drafting Technology.

The primary purpose of the program is to provide specialized training in practical or technical occupations that is dedicated to the principal of developing ones fullest potential for personal growth and service to society.

Registration for these programs is now in progress. Admission to the Technical-Vocational program requires graduation from high school or equivalent, or applications over 19 years of age may be admitted through individual approval.

For admission in the occupational programs, applicants will be required to meet education and aptitude standards appropriate to the course of study chosen.
