To hear a citizen claim he "isn't interested in politics" puts in mind the picture of a drowning man claiming he "isn't interested in water." What so very many people, and possibly you, don't realize is that you have no choice. Whether you want to be in it or not, you are UP TO YOUR EARS in politics.

Government is the end result of politics, and it's difficult to think of any action you take that is not affected by government - or politics. Take today for example. You started the day when you arose from a mattress which probably still bears the tag certifying that its contents are described in accordance with state law. Perhaps you had bacon and eggs for breakfast, both of which are subject to inspection and grading by a governmental agency. You traveled to work on roads provided and maintained by another governmental agency. You were required to have a driver's lisence and registration issued by a governmental agency. While at work, you are the subject of many Fair Employment Laws - administered by governmental agencies. All of these government agencies mentioned are heavily staffed by political appointees.

**Entertainment Too** 

Going to a movie tonight? The film has been previewed by a state board. Or do you plan to watch television? It comes to you via channels assigned by the Federal Communications Commission. All political appointments.

It is possible that the water you drink and even the air you breathe may soon be controlled by a Water Commission and an Air Pollution Commission.

# **Disabled Workers May Have Benefits Coming**

Although 48 disabled workers in Parmer County are receiving \$5,986 per month from social security, additional workers may be eligible under the recently amended law. This statement was made today by Wayne Klipping, social security Field Representative for this county. Benefits are now avalable to some workers, disabled before they reach age 31, who could not have been eligible under the old law.

"Under the old law," Klipping said, "a worker needed social security credits for at least 5 out of 10 years before he became disabled unless he became disabled before 31 because of blindness. But a young worker might not have had a chance to work long enough to meet this require-

"Now, if he becomes disabled between 24 and 31, he needs to have worked under social security for only half the time before he became disabled. Also, if he is disabled before he is 24, he will need only 1 1/2 hears of work in the 3-year period ending when disability

claim turned down because they had not worked long enough, any worker who became disabled before age 31, should contact Klipping in the Council Room at the City Hall from 9 a.m. until noon on the third Tuesday of each month.
