City audit shows income down for fiscal '69

The City of Morton audit for 1969 shows income and revenue down a substantial amount from both 1968 and 1967, it was revealed Monday night.

The audit, submitted by accountant Fred Z. Payne at the regular meeting of the city council, shows a total income and revenue of \$272,687 as compared to \$276,997 for 1968 and \$289,548 for 1967.

Total expenses and expenditures were also below that of 1968, but is up slightly over the expenses and expenditures of 1967, the report shows. This category shows a drop from \$290,447 in 1968 to \$287,397 for this year. This figure constitutes a rise of \$2,101 over the \$285,296 for 1967.

Asked for an explanation for the drop in income and revenue for this year, City Secretary Elra Oden attributed it to less total sales in water and gas. This in turn was attributed by him to the unusual amount of rainfall experienced this year and what he believes to be a loss in population by the city. The population loss estimate is based upon gas, water and electric meters in the city.

With the loss in population there were fewer people to sell water to and with the heavier rainfall this year there was considerably less demand for water for lawns and gardens, Oden stated.

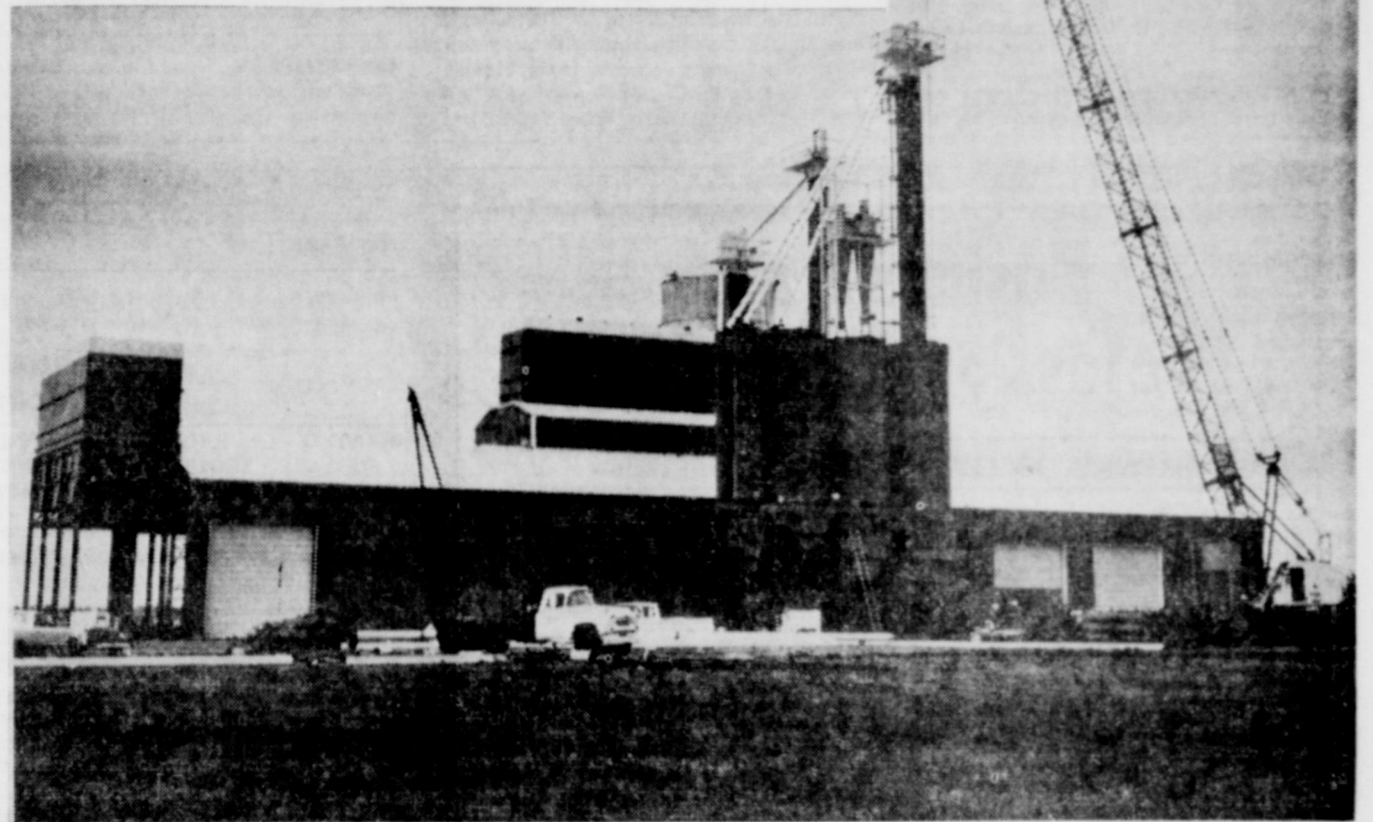
The only bright factor in water sales was that the city came out ahead on the summer water rate program because residents didn't use enough on the average to make the lower rates at higher volumes effective, he added.

Total water sales for this year were down only slightly, from \$54,483 in 1968 to \$54,384. However, this does not give a true picture, as it does not reflect a rate increase that went into effect during the fiscal year. With the rate increase the total revenue should have been substantially higher had the sales volume been on a par with that of 1968. Water sales during 1967 totalled a whopping \$62,603, which gives a good example of how bad the wet year effected the city's income.

The sale of gas by the city was down to \$109,232 from \$113,190 in 1968 and \$120,637 in 1967. The gas sales, not having been effected by the weather to the extent of that made on water sales, is a reflection of the population loss by the city.

Nearing Completion . . .

A GIANT CRANE is being used to put the finishing touches on the also giant feed processing mill that is rapidly nearing completion at the Owens Brothers feed lot east of Morton. Tom White, manager of the feed lot operation, states that the mill construction is three weeks ahead of schedule and should be completed near the first of July. Construction of the all-steel fencing for the ultra-modern feed lot pens is also well underway and the lot is expected to begin receiving cattle in mid-July. Initial facilities will be built to accommodate 30,000 cattle each feeding period with probable later expansion to 48,000, company spokesmen state.



Len Gandy injured in fall from moving car

Len Gandy, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Gandy of Morton, was injured late Tuesday night when he fell from a moving car on a dirt road near Lehman. He sustained numerous cuts and bruises about the face and head, but no bones were broken.

The accident occurred about 11:15 p.m. Gandy was taken to Cochran Memorial Hospital for treatment and was retained in the hospital. He was reported resting well Wednesday.

Gandy was riding in a car driven by Bob Hobson, son of Rev. and Mrs. Bill Hobson of Borger. Shelby Race, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elton Mathis of Lehman, was also in the car.

Hobson reported that the car was moving at a slow rate of speed when the door came open, causing Gandy to fall out of the car.

Gandy and Race are juniors at Morton High School. Hobson's father formerly pastored the First Missionary Baptist Church in Morton.

Community Action Committee to organize Tuesday night

An organizational meeting for the Community Action Committee in Morton has been scheduled Tuesday evening, July 1, at 8:30 in the school cafeteria.

Matters on the agenda include the election of a general board of directors, adoption of by-laws for the corporation, and action on the proposal of a steering committee that the local organization join the South Plains Community Action Committee. The purposes of the CAC are to study ways to assist the needy and to obtain federal funds for that purpose.

All interested persons are urged to attend this important meeting.

Commissioners court opposes tax reforms for oil producers

Proposed tax reforms which would increase the tax burden of oil producers were opposed in a resolution adopted by the Cochran County Commissioners Court in a special session Monday morning.

The proposed reforms, now before Congress, would cause a blow to the economy of Cochran County, according to the resolution which was passed on a motion by Leonard O. Coleman of Precinct One.

The resolution states, in part, "... the oil companies in Cochran County pay approximately 70 per cent of our county taxes, and are therefore vital to our county government; . . . any tax reforms that would prevent the oil producers from operating as in the past, would hurt our local economy."

"NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Commissioners' Court of Cochran County, Texas, assembled in Special Session, hereby records its concern for, and opposition to, legislation which would be detrimental to the oil producers."

The Court authorized Judge J. A. Love to send a copy of the resolution and a letter to Congressman George Mahon, urging Mahon to oppose the increased tax burden for oil companies.

In other matters, the Commissioners Court, sitting as the Board of Equalization, considered a number of errors in assessment on property in the county. Tax Assessor Leonard Groves presented the complaints to the Board.

Judge Love announced that he would attend a small schools conference on July 7 and 8.

All of the members of the court were present for the session.

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The steering committee which drew up tentative by-laws for the committee is made up of Mrs. Dorothy Barker, Mrs. Louise Cobb, Mrs. W. G. Freeland, Mrs. Evelyn Seagler, Santos Gonzalez, Francisco Grado, Mrs. Bessie Green, Rev. David Greka, Mrs. Katherine Joyce, Fernando Ramos, Jr., Mrs. Patricia Trejo, and Mrs. Lucille Wynn.

Ex-officio members of the committee are Bud Fountain, president of the Chamber of Commerce; Leonard Coleman, County Commissioner; Bob E. Travis, school superintendent; and Jack Russell, mayor of Morton.

A group of local citizens attended a meeting in Lubbock on Thursday night, June 19, to study the feasibility of the Morton committee's joining the South Plains Community Action Committee. Supreme Court decision kills revenue bond law

Texas Secretary of State Martin Dies, Jr., states that the United States Supreme Court's decision in a Louisiana case last week has invalidated a Texas law which restricts voting in revenue bond elections to property owners.

By statute the Secretary of State is the chief election officer of Texas and is responsible for obtaining and maintaining uniformity in the application, operation and interpretation of the state's election laws.

On Monday of last week the United States Supreme Court struck down a Louisiana law which gave only property taxpayers the right to vote in elections called to approve the issuance of revenue bonds by a municipal utility, on the ground that it violated the equal protection clause of the Federal Constitution because it excluded otherwise qualified voters who were as substantially affected and directly interested in the matter voted upon as those who were permitted to vote.

The Texas Constitution contains a provision that only qualified electors who own property which has been duly rendered for taxation are eligible to vote in an election for the purpose of issuing bonds. The Supreme Court of Texas has interpreted this provision as applying to elec-

Cochran Memorial Hospital Medicare progress approved

Cochran Memorial Hospital received approval Tuesday for the progress it has made in relation to Medicare, according to a report given to the hospital board by Sue Cross, acting business manager, Tuesday night.

Two Medicare representatives, one from Austin and one from Lubbock, were in Morton Tuesday to inspect the hospital and to advise Mrs. Cross. At the time of the resignation of former hospital administrator Jim McManus two weeks ago, it was believed that the hospital had serious problems in regard to Medicare.

The Tuesday visit cleared the situation.

In other business, the board met with C. E. Smith of Lubbock, who represents the Gilbert X-Ray Company of Texas. Smith advised the board to purchase rather than lease the new X-Ray equipment which was recently installed in the hospital, as the cost would be the same and the hospital would own the machine after five years. Smith's recommendation was accepted.

The board interviewed one applicant for the position of administrator, but took no action. The placing of notices of the vacancy in Lubbock and Amarillo newspapers was discussed. The board feels that the hospital is operating smoothly at the present time, and they want to take ample time to select a new administrator.

A special session was called for Thursday night to meet with Jim Berry, CPA of Farwell, who is helping the hospital get its books in balance.

All of the board members were present Tuesday night except Douglas Dunn of Bledsoe.

Six vacancies remain on faculty of MHS; Elvis Fleming resigns

Six vacancies now exist in the faculties of Morton secondary schools, according to Fred Weaver, principal of Morton High School. School officials expect to experience some difficulty in filling some of the positions.

The openings include a chemistry and physics teacher in high school, a choir teacher for both junior and senior high school, a girls' physical education teacher for both junior and senior high school, and a boys' coach, a math teacher, and a language arts teacher, all in junior high school.

Weaver stated that applicants have been accepted for some of the positions, but that the prospective teachers have not been officially hired.

Some shifting of assignments had been done due to the resignation last Friday of Elvis E. Fleming, high school social studies teacher. David Murrah will assume the classes formerly taught by Fleming; Mrs. Peggy Silhan will assume the English classes formerly taught by Murrah; a new teacher will be employed to teach the junior high language arts classes formerly taught by Mrs. Silhan. Fleming resigned to accept a teaching position with the Social Science department of Eastern New Mexico University, Roswell campus.

Superintendent Bob E. Travis is in the Dallas area this week recruiting teachers. Weaver will be visiting campuses of universities in West Texas in the next few days in search of teachers.

SHSC official tours Texas Plains Trail

Truett Latimer of Austin, executive director of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, was in Morton last week on tour of the Texas Plains Trail, which passes through Morton. Latimer and his family also visited with Mrs. Latimer's parents, Mr. and Mrs. LeRoy Johnson of Morton.

Latimer stated that state tourism officials are retracing the ten tourist trails in the state which were established last year in connection with HemisFair '68. Points of interest in the areas of the trails are being reconsidered to determine whether present sites should be retained in the itineraries or be replaced by new ones.

On Friday, Latimer conferred with the chairman of the Cochran County Historical Survey Committee, Elvis E. Fleming, regarding the progress of the committee in erecting historical markers, enlarging the museum, and other aspects of the committee's work.

Six arraigned on 12 charges in 121st District Court here

Six men appeared before District Judge M. C. Ledbetter in 121st District Court in Morton Monday and were arraigned on a total of 12 counts. All of the men entered pleas of "not guilty."

Thomas Ramos Ysasaga was arraigned on charges of burglary, attempted burglary, theft, and escape from prison. Ysasaga and the Garcia brothers, Joe and David, escaped from the Cochran County jail on March 29. The Garcias were recaptured two days later near Plains and Ysasaga was arrested by FBI agents in Lubbock on May 24.

Ysasaga's father, Harvie Ysasaga, charged with aiding a prisoner in escaping, failed to appear in court. The court revoked his bond. The elder Ysasaga was arrested on March 31 for allegedly helping his son and the Garcia brothers escape from the Cochran County jail.

Arraigned on charges of burglary were Otha Ray Hightower, three counts; Louis Martinez, two counts; and Jessie Prieto and Paul Cisneros, one count each.

Rayful Fulton was arraigned on charges of assault with intent to murder with malice aforethought. He is charged in the April 6 shooting of his step-mother, Mrs. See SIX, Page 5a

Lubbock State School to have open house

The Lubbock Chamber of Commerce will sponsor an open house at the Lubbock State School for the Mentally Retarded, Sunday, June 29 from 1:30 to 5:00 p.m. The new state school, located on 220 acres of land in northern Lubbock, is a multi-million dollar complex with sixteen buildings completed.

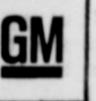

ASCS Farm News

By John W. Hall

"With allotment crop acreages now being certified, producers with an interest in more than one farm should bear in mind the need for compliance on each farm," Chairman Clarence A. Danklefs of the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee said today.

"This means that if someone is participating in the wheat, feed grain or cotton program on his farm, and has an interest in a second farm, he must stay within his allotment or base for each crop on that second farm, even if it is not signed up to participate in the program," the Chairman said.

"If he does not, he will be out of compliance and lose program benefits on all allotment crops on his participating farm," he continued.

The Chairman said that multiple operations affect every State, and a substantial number of farms. Nationally, some 337,000 farms are owned by producers who also have an interest in two or more farms.

"Responsibility for making certain that the offsetting compliance requirement is met falls on the producer rather than the landowner, if they are different people," the Chairman said. "The producer has the responsibility for offsetting compliance."

The Chairman warned that offsetting

compliance is subject to check, and that the requirement goes across both county and State lines. "For this reason," Chairman Danklefs added, "we thought that this reminder, issued at this time, would be a helpful hint to farmers who might need to think about their compliance with programs in which they are signed up."

PEANUTS ONE ACRE PROVISION: To be eligible to harvest peanuts under the one acre provision, the requirement is that you cannot have an interest in peanuts on more than one farm. Basically, then, where no farm allotment is established the permitted acreage of peanuts is one acre, except where producers share in peanuts on another farm. In such cases the one acre provision is lost on all farms.

The ASCS Office has extended measuring service for two weeks longer beginning next Monday for the benefit of those who were late in getting in their request.

tions for issuing public utility bonds which are to be retired from revenues produced by the utility, as well as to elections for issuing bonds to be retired by levy of a property tax.

Secretary Dies said that the property ownership requirement could no longer be imposed in future elections for issuance of revenue bonds. He pointed out that the United States Supreme Court's decision applies only to revenue bond elections and that the court has not ruled on the validity of a property ownership requirement in a tax bond election.

Fisher said the problem of meeting industry's demands is a growing one, and that public schools are "doing their share to meet the demand."

He added approximately 18,000 boys are enrolled in the public school programs and about 4,000 girls in the personal service trades.
