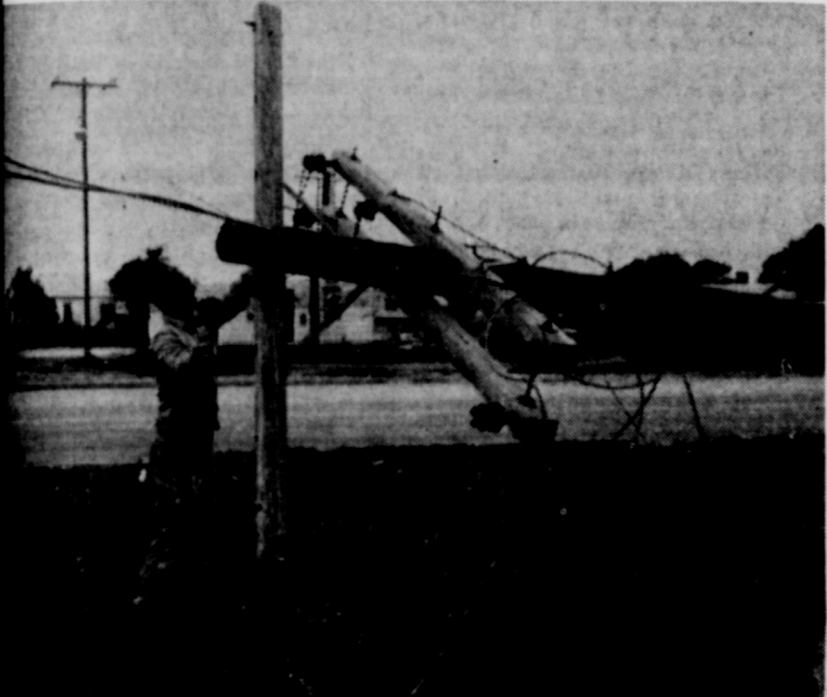

## It's Cowboys & Indians Friday



The Morton Indians launch what promises to be an exciting football season Friday night at Plains after having firmly established their abilities with successful scrimmage performances against Muleshoe and Seagraves.

The Indians are favored to scalp the Cowboys for the second straight year. Morton romped over Plains last season, 44-6. Game time is 8 p.m.

Ted Whillock's surging Tribe proved two things in last Friday's scrimmage against highly-touted Seagraves: first, the Indians confirmed their tough defense as they limited the state-ranked visitors from Seagraves to only one score, and secondly, they showed they could come from behind as quarterback Mike Bryan engineered a 60-yard drive in eleven plays for an Indian score on the last play of the practice scrimmage.

Morton also displayed a much improved and possibly potent passing attack as Bryan teamed up with Terry Harvey and Eddie Lewis for good gains via the air route.

Although the Indians allowed several more first downs while racking up only six of their own, their increasingly tough defense gained increased respect as it rose up to stop Seagraves twice on the goal line after the Eagles had scored on their first possession.

The Indians will again be looking out for Plains' talented quarterback John Lowe. The 180 pound Lowe is described by his coach John Richey as the "best defensive back the district has had in five years."

Plains has seven offensive starters

## Experts predict recent rains to change cotton defoliation procedures

Recent rains may alter planned use of cotton defoliant or desiccants. Dry weather stunted cotton will likely take on new life, says Fred C. Elliott, Texas A&M University Extension cotton specialist, and if the showers continue, a change in preharvest chemical use may be necessary.

Elliott outlines what he calls a "two-shot" treatment for stripper harvesting when conditions are not favorable at harvest time. A defoliant, either a chlorate or phosphate material, is applied when 60 percent of the bolls are open. This should cause about 80 percent of the leaves to drop and green bolls to mature and open more rapidly.

If defoliation is not complete in 7 to 10 days, he suggests the use of arsenic acid to get the remaining leaves. He says the practice can speed up harvest and also improve the grade of the cotton.

If a desiccant, arsenic acid, is used for the initial application and unfavorable weather follows, a second application of arsenic acid is not recommended. Could get into residue trouble, warns Elliott. If a second application is necessary, he says, use a chemical with different active ingredient. The use of 2,4-D formulations is not recommended.

Elliott cautions against the use of any defoliant not labeled as to exact chemical content. Unknown defoliants may injure exposed fibers, unopened bolls or cause fire hazards at the gin. He suggests defoliating only enough acreage to stay ahead of harvesting and adds that unusual delays in harvesting may result in regrowth or barked cotton. Stripping too soon after applying a desiccant, on the other hand, may also cause barked cotton, he says.

For further information on the use of defoliants and desiccants, he suggests that growers visit or call the local county agent for a copy of the 1969 "Cotton Defoliation Guide."

### POWER RAN OUT...

A SECTION OF east Morton was temporarily blacked out at approximately 3:30 p.m. Monday when this pole, belonging to the General Telephone Company, was knocked down by a pickup truck driven by Mrs. Glenn Black of Morton. Hot wires carrying a great many volts of electricity were strung across the Levelland highway causing a temporary traffic jam. After striking the pole, the pickup continued in an easterly direction until coming to rest against a tree in the back yard of the Eastside Church of Christ parsonage. Mrs. Black was taken by ambulance to Cochran Memorial Hospital where she was kept under observation overnight and released Tuesday.

## Slaughter ranch dugout home going to Texas Tech museum

A two-story dugout which served as headquarters of Col. C. C. Slaughter's Silver Lake Ranch and hard to locate original records of this 19th Century pioneer became gifts Friday (Sept. 5) to Texas Tech.

The gifts were presented by Mr. and Mrs. James I. DeLoache and Mr. and Mrs. M. Sims Davidson, both of Dallas, and the family operated White Face Farms, Inc. James DeLoache and Mrs. Davidson are grandchildren of Col. Slaughter who, in the mid-1880's was Texas' biggest taxpayer by virtue of the growth of a \$520 investment he made in cattle at the age of 18.

The records were presented to the Southwest Collection at Texas Tech, maintained as an archive to make southwestern historical material readily available to researchers.

The dugout was presented to the Ranch

Headquarters Committee which will make it a part of the collection of the authentic ranch buildings recreating on the Texas Tech campus an outdoor, living museum of ranch life. The Ranch Headquarters will be located on 12 acres of a 76-acre site for the new Museum.

In making the presentation, James DeLoache spoke for himself and his sister:

"To be able to express our enthusiasm for the Ranch Headquarters project through the presentation of the two-story dugout and to honor our grandfather, Col. C. C. Slaughter, and his contribution to the ranching history of Texas at the same time gives us obviously the greatest pleasure."

Director Sylvan Dunn of the Southwest Collection expressed the university's appreciation for the gift of the records.

"These Slaughter materials are extremely valuable."

mely scarce in proportion to the importance of the man whose ranching ventures were among the greatest ever undertaken in Texas by a single individual.

"We appreciate the fact that descendants of Col. Slaughter recognize the value of these records," he said, "and we are placing them with other significant ranching materials to provide an accurate history of Texas' first big industry."

Col. Slaughter, who earned his brevet rank during the Civil War, was one of the first children born in the Republic of Texas — recorded as the first male child of a marriage contracted in the Republic. He was born in Sabine County on Feb. 9, 1837.

He was the son of George W. Slaughter, a rancher and preacher who came west from Louisiana in 1830. The influence of the father was apparent throughout the life of his son, Christopher C. (Lum) Slaughter.

C. C. Slaughter was described by one historian as a man who "played the role of churchman openly and consistently" throughout his life. He served as vice president of the Southern Baptist Convention and for eight years as president of the Baptist General Convention of Texas. He founded what is now known as Baylor Hospital in Dallas and sponsored a correlated system of Baptist schools in Texas, providing a grant of \$25,000 to initiate the system.

He was a charter member of the Northwest Texas Cattle Raisers Association which later became the Texas and Southwest Cattle Raisers Association of which he was the second president. In Dallas he founded the American Exchange Bank which has merged to become the First National Bank.

He was "making a hand" with cattle at the age of 12, working on the Patron Bayou-Sabine River divide. At 17 he began trading — buying lumber in Anderson County and selling it in Dallas. Using this money he bought wheat in Collin County, made in into flour and sold it in Magnolia. The \$520 he cleared went into cattle, and C. C. Slaughter was on his way toward making Texas history.

He ranched with his father in Sabine and Freestone counties, and then in 1856 the family moved to Palo Pinto County. There were interruptions, first Indian fighting and then the Civil War.

In 1867, however, the ranching had prospered, and Slaughter drove 300 beeves to Jefferson where a packer paid the

unheard of price of \$35 a head in gold. The following year he began driving herds to Kansas.

In 1887, Slaughter founded his Long S. Ranch at the headwaters of the Colorado in Texas. His other ranches were the Silver Lake and the Running Water.

As early as 1871, Slaughter made a strong effort to improve the Texas breed. He imported Kentucky Shorthorn bulls. Later he brought to Texas the first Hereford bull ever to sell for \$5,000 at public auction. The animal was Sir Bredwell. In 1893 he bought the grand champion bull, Ancient Briton, at the Columbian Exposition in Chicago.

The unique box and strip dugout which is to be moved to Texas Tech and furnished authentically by the DeLoache children was the original headquarters of the Silver Lake Ranch, one of the three totalling 1.5 million acres under fence.

When extensive new headquarters were built south of the present site of Morton, the two-story dugout became a line camp.

Dr. and Mrs. W. C. Holden are co-chairmen of the Ranch Headquarters Committee, established to preserve the ranching history of the Southwest. Dr. Holden, author and ranch historian, said the two-story dugout was important architecturally as well as historically.

"It typifies 'the beginning' of most West Texas ranches," he said. "When ranchers preceded civilization, they found the land so accommodating to cattle that human accommodation mattered little. It took men of foresight and stamina to utilize a dugout while carving a realm."

"This dugout is a sturdy reminder of that kind of man," he said.

"Col. Slaughter's importance to the development of the cattle industry," said Holden, "has never been recognized by the writers of history."

"During the 1890's he was perhaps the largest individual cattleman in the Southwest. His influence and ranching operations rank with those of Col. Charles Goodnight. In addition to ranching he built an industry empire in banking, insurance and urban real estate."

"He has been overlooked by historians because he left so few documentary records," Holden explained. "All his life he kept his business operations largely in his head. When his story is properly told, it will be a great contribution to the ranching, industrial and religious history of Texas."

"Nelle DeLoache Davidson and James DeLoache are to be commended for making this two-story dugout available for the Ranch Headquarters as a fitting tribute to the part their grandfather played in the development of the ranching industry."

Senior Mike Bryan inherited the quarterbacking duties that were performed by Wayne Thompson for the last two seasons. Bryan is backed up by sophomore Keith Embry. Starting at fullback will be junior Ralph Soliz. At tailback will be junior Terry Harvey, and at halfback will be senior Eddie Lewis.

Juniors M. C. Collins and Monte Dewbre will be starting at defensive tackle. Keith Embry will start at defensive halfback.

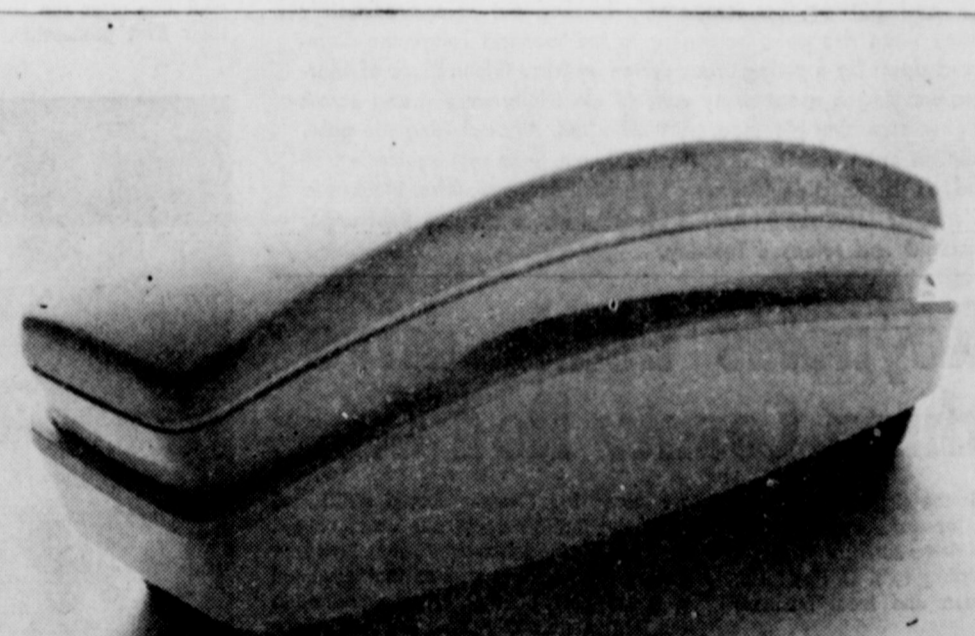

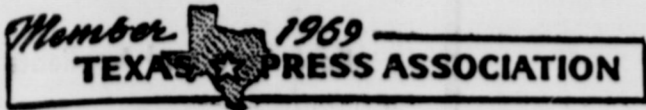
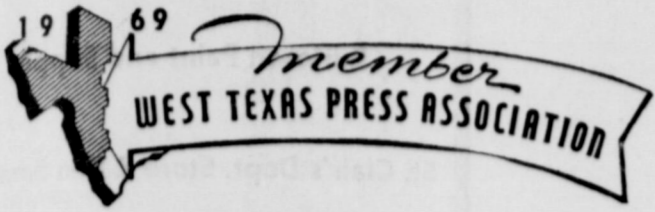

A reception in Fellowship Hall of the Church followed the ceremony.

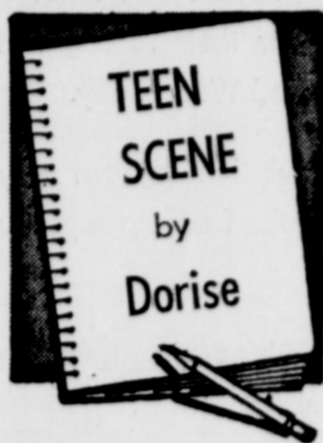
For a wedding trip, Mrs. Williams wore a beige dress with red accessories and a corsage from her bridal bouquet.

## Student who worked in summer reminded to save their W-2's

Going back to school does create one small income tax problem for those students who worked during the summer. Nowadays this includes most of the senior high school students, as well as college students on summer vacation.

Ordinarily the students worked in jobs that required their employer to withhold income tax and social security tax from their pay check. The law requires their employer to issue them a W-2 within 30 days after they leave the job. The students will need to carefully put away this W-2 until January 1, 1970.

Ordinarily if they do not work elsewhere, they will get all of their income tax withheld refunded, provided they file a Form 1040 with the Internal Revenue Service. Of course they are not required to file unless they make \$600, but IRS can't send their money back until they do file.

The students that lose the W-2's usually find that the employer will give them a duplicate but only after at least one, and usually a series of tongue lashings.

## Texas traffic costs for '69 soaring to astronomical high

The Texas barometer of traffic costs for 1969 soared past the one-half-billion-dollar mark as August traffic crashes in the Lone Star State added \$61 million to the state's rapidly ascending cost register.

The Texas Safety Association said today that preliminary reports for the month of August indicate that rural fatalities, injuries and property damage from traffic accidents cost Texans almost \$23 million. Urban accident costs topped the rural tab by \$15 million, with a total cost of \$38 million for accidents happening within city limits.

The cost of traffic accidents on Texas streets and highways for the first eight months of the year reached \$520 million when computed according to a National Safety Council formula.

Noting a significant increase in fatalities on Farm-to-Market roads in the past

month, the Safety Association suggested folks driving in rural areas observe the following rules:

When traveling on an unpaved roadway, yield the right-of-way to vehicles traveling on a paved highway. Under a new Texas law, you may enter an intersecting paved roadway only when there is no chance of interference or collision with traffic on the highway.

Be prepared for animals grazing near the roadway. They may suddenly cross in front of your vehicle.

Look for narrow or rough shoulder areas and washed-out or rough spots in the highway that can cause you trouble in steering.

Keep on your side of the roadway, even if it's narrow.

Slow down for sharp curves and when approaching or crossing narrow bridges.
