Indians cinch district title tie

Morton's Indians cinched at least a tie for the district 4-AA championship Tuesday night as they raced by the Tahoka Bulldogs, 83-57, while at the same time, Frenship was handing the faltering Post Antelopes their third straight loss to the tune of 74-53 in a Tuesday night game played at Post.

The Indians still have to face the two district upstarts, Frenship and Idalou, but a victory over either team will give the Tribe their first district championship in 12 years.

Tuesday's big win over Tahoka was number 22 for the year and marked the first time since 1959 that the Indians have won that many games.

Morton's win over Tahoka gave the Tribe a 7-1 district record compared to 5-3 marks for both Post and surging Frenship.

Junior Terry Harvey led all departments in pacing the Indians to the win. Harvey hit nine of 14 field goal attempts, added three free shots, led in rebounding with nine, and in scoring with 21 points.

Big George Pritchett connected on 8 of 15 field goal attempts in scoring 18 points. M. C. Collins added 10 points on five of 11 shots.

Cliff Gardner led Tahoka scoring with 21. The Bulldogs' loss was their seventh in district play and their fifteenth of the year. Tahoka ended up with sole possession of the district cellar after being in a tie for that position last week with Denver City.

The Indians got off to a sluggish start Tuesday, but finished strong, thus reversing the trend that had been set during the last two games. Morton pulled ahead, 24-18, as time in the first period elapsed and never trailed as the quarter elapsed in 22 of 44 field goal shots during the first 16 minutes of play. Morton led, 49-32, at the half.

The Indians' shooting percentage fell off during the second half as they connected for 15 of 38, but the Tribe led by 22, 66-44, after the third period and then coasted to the 83-57 win. Morton hit 45 per cent from the field for the game. George Pritchett picked off eight rebounds. Collins snared seven.

Tahoka's B team handed the Morton junior varsity their fourth loss of the season in a tight game that saw the Tribe close an 11-point deficit to three before losing, 55-52. Morton hit on four of nine free throw attempts, while Tahoka connected on 14 of 22.

Local man escapes injury in truck crash

Daniel Zapata, 25, of Morton, was free on \$500 bond Wednesday following a pickup truck crash into the front windows of Strickland Cleaners early Sunday morning in which he was charged with driving while intoxicated, subsequent, in county court.

Zapata was taken into custody by city patrolman Ed Carter after his pickup, which was traveling east on SH 116, jumped the curb and a high set of concrete steps to crash into the plate glass window of the cleaning establishment. The truck, which received heavy damage to the front end, was stopped by large steel post that is part of the wall construction of the building.

Zapata suffered no apparent injuries, according to law enforcement officers. He will be placed before the next Grand Jury which will convene her March 9. Sheriff's personnel informed the Tribune.

Emergency farm loans authorized for county

Cochran county, along with five other neighboring South Plains counties, Friday was designated for emergency farm loans by the United States Department of Agriculture.

The announcement was made by telegram to the Tribune from Congressman George Mahon, Representative from the 19th Congressional District and chairman of the House Appropriations Committee.

The emergency loan program was instituted by the USDA because of weather conditions adversely affecting agriculture during 1969.

Mahon's telegram said, "I am pleased to advise that the USDA has today (Friday) designated for emergency farm loans the following counties: Cochran, Crosby, Hockley, Lubbock, Terry and Yoakum. Upon request of local citizens, I have urged that this action be taken."

The emergency loan program was requested by agencies of the Farmers Home Administration in the counties and will provide emergency loans at reduced rate for farmers who were affected adversely and seriously by the year's bad weather - hail last spring, early freezes, drought of June, July and August, and hot weather which caused a short crop of

Deborah Whitehead sets mark in barrel racing at Fort Worth

A Morton girl has posted the fastest time ever ridden in the barrel race at the Southwestern Livestock Exposition and Fat Stock Show rodeo, it was learned here Wednesday.

Cochran County 4-H Club barrel racer Deborah Whitehead, 16-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Whitehead, toured the course in a time of 17.82 seconds to top the all-time record.

In the over-all barrel race averages, Deborah placed second. It must be remembered that she was competing with approximately 75 of the top professional and amateur barrel racers in the country in the event, which was by invitation only.

Chamber of Commerce president Roy McClung stated "We are extremely proud

of the recognition Deborah's fine showing will bring to our area, and especially gratified by the fact that the Chamber was her sponsor for the rodeo." He added that she managed to achieve her second place showing even after her horse fell on her first two consecutive runs.

Mayor, 2 councilmen positions to be filled by election on April 4

April 4 was set as the date for the election of a Mayor and two Aldermen at the regular meeting of the Morton city council Monday night.

District title possible in Friday cage clash

The Indians of Morton High School will have an opportunity to cinch the district championship Friday night at Frenship, but the Tribe may find that job a little tougher than they first expected. Frenship, now 5-3 in district play, knocked off Idalou and Post in action last week. The Tigers drubbed Post, 74-53, at Post Tuesday night.

The Antelopes, winners of every game during the first round of district play, practically fell apart after successive losses to Idalou and Morton as Frenship won easily over the once-district leaders.

One of the largest crowds of the season followed the Indians to Post last Friday, and an even larger group may show up at Wolforth Friday night.

Tuesday, Morton will host Idalou in a rematch that promises to be a tough clash. The Wildcats have given the Indians all the trouble anyone would want during the two seasons of play. Morton squeaked by Idalou last year twice in one and two-point games, and barely edged by the Cats, 59-56, earlier this year.

Should the Indians win the district outright, the Tribe will play probably Dimmitt or Lockney for the bi-district title one week from Tuesday at a neutral site. The winner of that game will advance

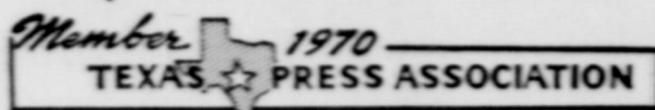

Attending the meeting were: Rhonda Abbe, Deborah Young, Billinda Hunter, Wyn Crone and Connie Randolph.

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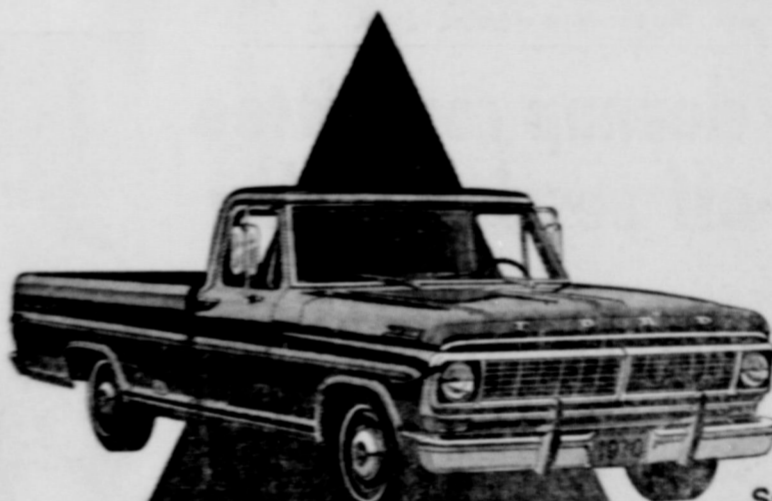

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Elliot hosts LeFleur Garden Club

Buford Elliot was host to the LeFleur Garden Club for their second meeting on January 10.

Olin Darland and Mrs. Don Sanford presented the program on "Hand-Made Flower Shows."

Darland stated that balance, dominance and contrast are three of the principles that make a well planned arrangement. "Without balance there is no visual stability, you must have balance, more of one flower, color and contrast makes variety, as contrast line or two, some medium some forms, uneven spaces, stems and she told the club.

Sanford spoke on the meaning of color and how to achieve this, use of dominance, contrast with rhythm,

a smoother flow of material and color, which carries the eye easily thru the design. Speaking on proportions, she stated the areas and amounts of one part to another and to the whole, this has to do with plant material and also the container used. "Scale, the last principle is a pleasing size relationship of all the component parts of a design, as flowers to flowers, flowers to foliage, individual flower to container, the whole mass of plant material to container and entire arrangement to background, table or location," she continued.

The next meeting of the club will be February 12 in the home of Mrs. Roy Hill. The program will be various kinds of weathered wood and the use of it in arrangements.

Indians slip by Post 48-40; forge into District 4-AA lead

Ted Whillock's basketball teams have long been noted for their defensive play, but many thought that this year's edition was all offense. However, The Tribe's Friday night performance against the Post Antelopes revealed that Whillock's defensive philosophy was still prevalent as the Indians stopped the favored Post squad, 48-40, in a crucial district game.

The win vaulted the Indians past Post into first place in the district standings. Morton's defensive play had to be the deciding factor in the ball game as the Tribe managed to connect on only 30 per cent from the field against the taller Antelopes. But the Indians allowed the Antelopes to connect on only ten field goals in the entire game.

Good defensive play by Morton kept Post's 6-10½ giant, Boyd Noble, from hitting freely as he had in the previous clash when Post ran off with a 59-47 win at Morton earlier in the season. Noble managed 19 points, scoring four of Post's five field goals in the second half.

A recount of the game seems hardly necessary as one of the largest crowds ever of Morton fans travelled the 100 miles to see the contest. An estimated 200 to 300 people cheered the Indians as they ran up a 14-6 lead during the first four minutes of the first period, and watched in despair as the Antelopes surged ahead early in the second by a 16-14 count. Morton's George Pritchett got into foul trouble in a hurry as he tried to stop the big Noble and found himself with four personals within four minutes.

The Indians pulled ahead 21-17 midway in the second and led 26-25 at halftime. The story of the first half was told in fouls. The Antelopes stayed in the game with 15 points coming from the charity line during the first two quarters.

Post jumped ahead 35-29 as the third quarter started and Morton fans began to squirm, fearing a repeat of the first Post contest. But the Indians went to work, utilizing the press, fast break, and missed Post shots, and tied the game 35 all as the third quarter expired.

Post attempted to slow down the game as the fourth quarter started, and the Antelopes handled the ball a full minute before shooting and missing. Morton then jumped ahead, 38-35, and Post became uneasy. The gap was narrowed to 38-37, but the Indians moved back ahead 40-37. With 1:41 left, Stan Coffman connected on two free throws to put Morton ahead,

43-38. Thirty seconds later, Keith Embry added two more free shots, and Elton Patton added another a minute later. Post hit a field goal in the waning seconds, but Terry Harve iced the game with two free throws and gave the Indians the 48-40 win.

Coach Whillock had high praise for his boys, and singled out Stan Coffman for playing a particularly outstanding game.

Harvey was high point man for Morton with 15 points. Stan Coffman scored 10.

The B team won their fifteenth game of the year with a 63-41 win over Post. Willie Holland, Brant Lewis, and Eddie Turney led Morton scoring with 17, 16, and 13 points respectively.

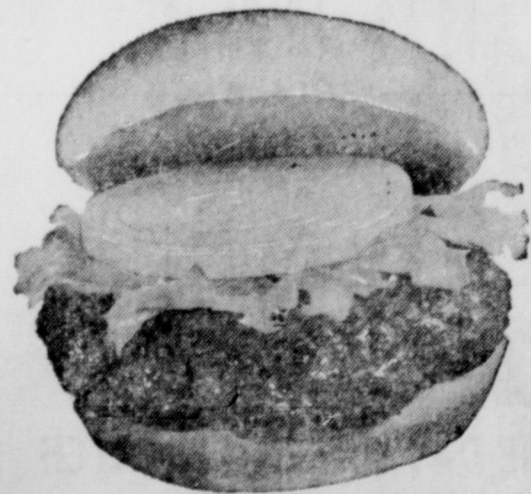

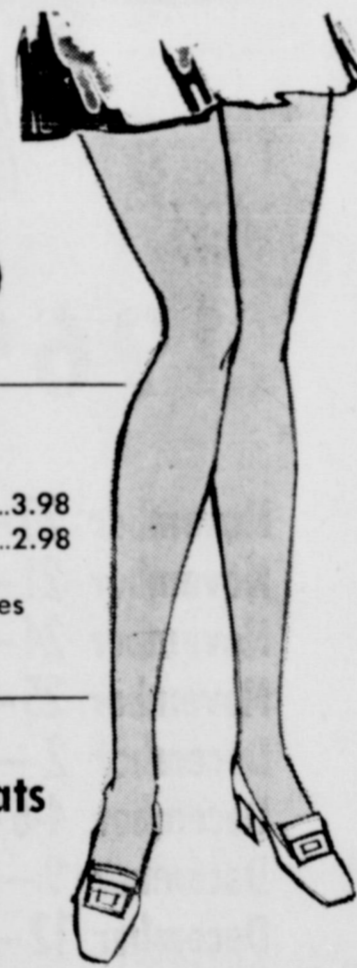

Mrs. Joe Seagler announced Morton 'Clubwoman of Year'

The Town and Country Study Club has selected Mrs. Joe Seagler of Morton as Clubwoman of the Year and the Area Council of Womens Clubs has endorsed this selection.

The council which is made up of representatives of local study clubs, announced its selection here Monday. Mrs. Seagler will now compete with the choices of other clubs in the Caprock District for the title of District Clubwoman of the Year at the annual convention scheduled for later this year.

This selection is made by the Texas Federation of Womens Clubs and recognizes not only leadership and development in Federation, but encourages participation in professional and community activities.

Mrs. Seagler, who is presently an art teacher in Morton Elementary School, has a strong background in community and service activities. She came to Cochran county in 1927 when her father established a ranching business in the south part of the county. She graduated from Morton High School in 1936 and received a BA degree from Texas Tech in 1940.

She has been a teacher in Morton schools since 1951 and has been teaching art for the past 15 years.

Her leading part in the establishment of the Morton Community Action Center,

where she is serving as the president of the board of directors, was a strong point in her consideration for being named the clubwoman of the year. She took an extremely active role in educating the people of Morton to the needs and benefits of a neighborhood center and in interesting the Office of Economic Opportunity in giving aid and guidance to the project.

Long months of hard work on her part culminated in the opening of the center on October 6, 1969. The center, which has proved during its short existence, to be of great benefit to the underprivileged of the community, has grown and progressed enormously under her guidance.

Mrs. Seagler is the mother of two children, Marlin Rose, a senior at Texas University and Linda Rose, who is employed as an expeditor at the spacecraft center in Houston.

Some of the organizations and activities in which Mrs. Seagler has taken part include:

President of the Town and Country Club 1965-67, a charter member of Delta Kappa Gamma, named "Teacher of the Year" in Morton schools in 1966, helped organize and served as president of the Cochran County Hospital Auxiliary and served as Poet Laureate of Caprock District during 1967.

She has also served as a member of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee appointed by Governor John Connally. She is a member of the Cochran County Historical Society and contributed several sketches to the society's sketch book. Her aid in collecting historical stories was valuable to Elvis Fleming in writing a book on the history of Cochran county.

Mrs. Seagler is a member of the First United Methodist Church of Morton where

she is secretary of the administrative board, is a member of the Wesleyan Service Guild and teaches an adult Sunday school class. She is a member of the Texas State Teachers Association and was a delegate to the TSTA convention held in Galveston in 1966.

In addition to serving as president of the board of directors of the community action center, she also teaches a class in adult reading and writing there.
