## MHS graduates 49 Tuesday

Twelve long years of struggle up the ladder of education will come to an end for 49 Morton youths as they formally graduate from Morton High School Tuesday, May 30.

A close association with their fellow students, some of which has endured for the entire twelve years of their school life, will at last come to an end and they will experience a parting of the ways as each pursues his own individual path through adult life. Some will continue up the ladder to still higher education in colleges and universities, while others will begin immediately carving a place for themselves in the everyday world of commerce, industry and agriculture.

Each will have his moment of triumph as he finally acquires that coveted diploma and will feel a high sense of elation before passing from the high school scene to make room for the members of the upcoming senior class who eagerly await their turn to fill the senior class shoes.

Baccalaureate services for the graduating class will be held Sunday, May 28 in the auditorium of the county activities building beginning at 7:30 p.m. Commencement exercises will be held in the same place and time on June 30.

The sermon for the baccalaureate service will be delivered by Rev. Paul McClung, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Morton.

The processional will be played by Mrs. Earl Polvado followed by the invocation by John Coffman. Introduction of the speaker will be by Morton schools superintendent Bob E. Travis. The benediction will be given by Rev. G. A. Van Hooser, of Assembly of God Church in Morton, after which Mrs. Polvado will play the recessional.

The Morton High School Band, playing the processional, will open the commencement exercises at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, followed by the invocation by Dennis Howell, Morton High School teacher.

Following the invocation, the Salutatory address will be given by Teri Harris, second highest ranking student in the graduating class.

David Rice, highest ranking student in the class, will follow Miss Harris with the Valedictory address, after which the class song, "Try A Little Kindness" will be offered by Danny and Linda Williams.

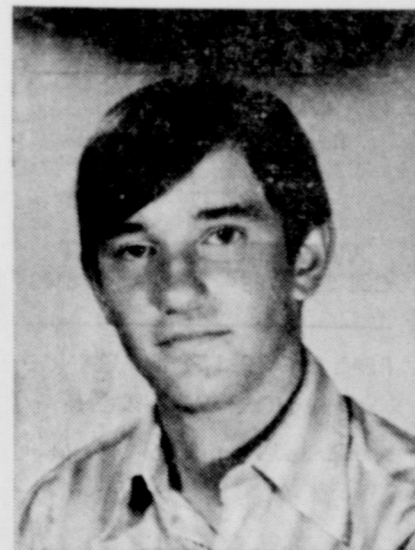

## Local students receive NSF workshop invitations

Two Morton High School students were the recipients this week of two highly coveted invitations to attend mathematics and science workshops being held this summer by Southern Methodist University and the University of Oklahoma. Allen Mauldin and Richard Coleman were invited to attend the workshops by both schools.

The National Science Foundation sponsors these workshops each summer in math and science for high school juniors who meet their rigid requirements. Competition for the invitations is on a nation-wide basis through application of the student to the NSF, and the chances for a school of Morton's size to receive one, much less two in one year, is considered by educators to be very slight.

This is the second consecutive year that MHS has had students accepted for these highly selective courses of instruction. In 1971 Ernestine Hawkins was selected with Jane Wilcox as her alternate.

The Southern Methodist University course, which is described as a JvN Mathematics Seminar for high ability students, begins June 5 and ends July 1. Richard Coleman has elected to attend this course, according to information released by Morton High School authorities.

The University of Oklahoma course is in Mathematics and Computer Programming and is scheduled for June 5-July

28. Allen Mauldin will attend this course, officials stated.

Both courses entail substantial expenses and for those who would like to show their confidence in the two boys by helping to defray these costs, a scholarship fund has been set up at the First State Bank where contributions will be accepted in both their names, school officials state. Payment to the respective universities must be in by June 1, so those contributing should do so soon.

## Secretary of State warns against 'crossover' voting

Secretary of State announced Tuesday by Secretary of State Bob Bullock to "stay in the party where they voted on May 6."

Following reports several counties are receiving, it looks like many voters are being tempted to switch and vote in the Democratic runoff election, Bullock said.

Secretary Bullock said that if they vote in the Republican primary on May 6 and if they voted Democratic the next time, they cannot switch and vote Republican on June 3.

He wants the public to know that this violates Article 249 of the Texas Constitution and is punishable by a fine of \$100 to \$500.

Secretary Bullock said that this type of voting has taken place in the past. A survey by State Auditor Oscar Mauzy in 1968 showed there were some 1,300 crossover voters in this district alone.

Secretary Bullock said that if this type of voting continues, it will weaken the true strength of a candidate for the other party. I think the low-key campaign by the Republicans lends itself to making a Republican want to crossover, if only for excitement's sake.

Secretary Bullock said that if we hope that public awareness will discourage this type of voting, if we find out what takes place, we will have no choice but to pass this information along to the proper prosecuting authorities.

"We want election officials to know that there is a law behind them and they should not permit this practice. This will be the only way we can preserve the integrity of the Texas election process."

Bullock said he wanted the voter to know that it is also against the law for a voter to cast a ballot in two different precincts, even within the same party.

"We know that there were instances of this reported during May 6 primary. Like crossover voting, this dual voting practice is against the law and simply cannot be tolerated.

"I want the local election officials to bear down and make sure this doesn't happen in the runoff," Bullock said.

## Steve Stockdale receives Air Force Academy appointment

Steve Stockdale, son of Mr. and Mrs. Stockdale of Olton, grandson of Mrs. Stockdale Sr. and great-grandson of E. F. Eitelman, both of Morton, has received an athletic scholarship to the United States Air Force Academy.

He signed an acceptance of appointment to the Academy Tuesday, May 2, and will report July 3 and undergo six weeks of basic training. He is one of 14 students recruited this year.

Forty-eight to 100 freshman athletes are recruited by the academy. Freshmen athletes play a seven game schedule. Stockdale was recruited by Capt. Neil Johnson. He will have four years regular training at the academy plus summer training and will graduate as a second lieutenant.

Summer between freshman and sophomore years will feature training in a simulated prisoner of war camp and SERE (Survival, Evasion, Resistance and Evasion). 1200 freshmen are enrolled in the academy each year.

Stockdale was honored recently at the Morton High School all-sports banquet as named best all-around football player, best basketball player, most valuable player and best student athlete.

He participated four years in football and earned three letters. He was named district quarterback three years and Lubbock Avalanche Journal's All-Plains team three years.

For four years basketball player, he earned four letters in that sport and was named All-District and All-South Plains basketball player.

He earned four letters in golf and participated in track his first three years in school and earned two letters in swimming. He was named District runner-up medalist this year.

Outstanding athlete also excels in tennis and the past three years. He was named "best actor" at District UIL one-day competition this year.

Stockdale is active in the OHS Fellowship, Christian Athletes and the First Methodist Church in Olton.

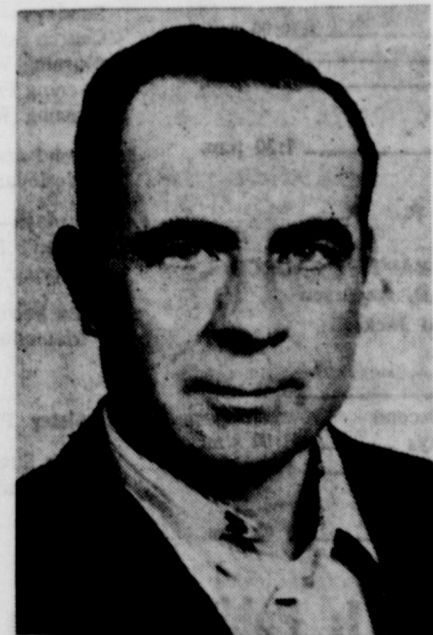

Don't suppose that if they have the opportunity to fill the vacuum left by our retreat in Southeast Asia that they will be long in mass infiltration of the shores of South America, Latin America and eventually the United States.

It very well could be that we are witnessing in this dirty little war the beginning of the end for western civilization as we know it.

Way out? Maybe, but that's a matter for the historians. We must act now.

Our point? — President Nixon was absolutely right to take the action he did — it was just about three administrations and thousands of U.S. casualties late, the way we see it.

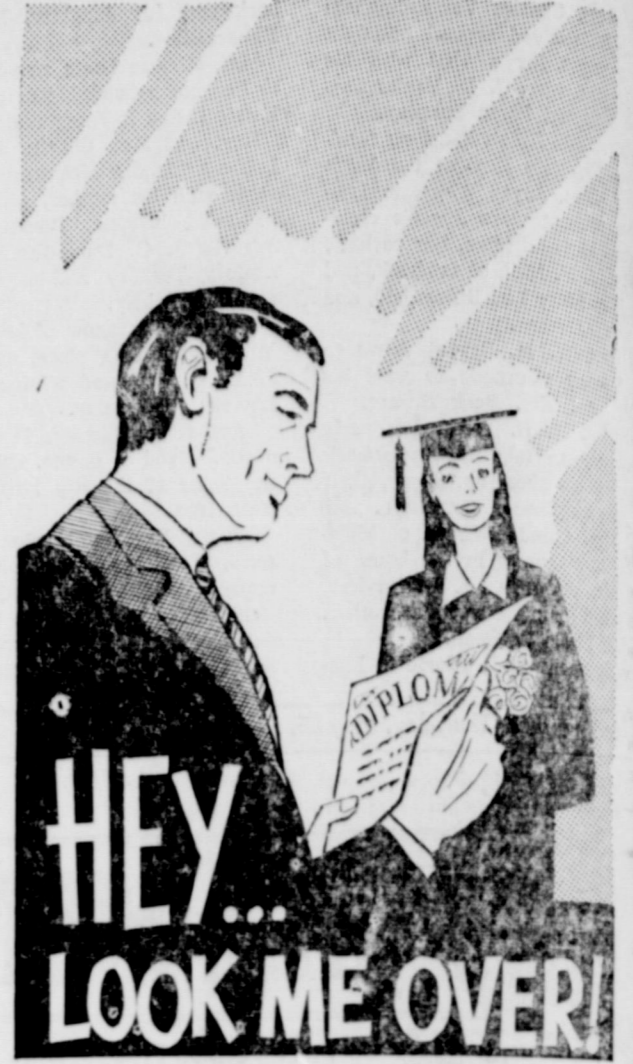

**Survey indicates federal aid costly for county taxpayers**

According to a recent study, taxpayers in Cochran County are paying a high price for the benefits their area receives in the form of Federal aid.

The figures show that for every dollar in grants that comes to them from Washington — for welfare, education, health, housing, highways, urban renewal and other purposes — the cost to them is \$1.03.

That is the estimate of the amount they have been contributing, via their income taxes and excise taxes, for allocation to the aid programs. It is exclusive of what had to be provided locally in the form of matching funds.

The study was made by the Tax Foundation, a non-profit research organization that keeps tab on Federal spend-

ing. It represents a state by state breakdown of Treasury Department figures covering the past fiscal year.

The findings are that, in 21 of the states, more money was collected in taxes that were earmarked for the aid programs than came back to them in grants. In the other 29 states, the benefits exceeded the cost.

Of the taxes collected in the State of Texas as a whole, \$1,431,000,000 went into the aid program and \$1,387,000,000 came back in grants.

Cochran County's contribution amounted to approximately \$658,000 of the total and its share of the grants, to nearly \$639,000.

As for the unequal distribution of grants-in-aid, it is explained that there is no attempt to return dollar for dollar. The purpose is to provide aid in accordance with need.

The report shows that a total of \$29 billion in such aid was distributed among the 50 states during the past year. This compares with 23.5 billion in 1970.

Much more than this is available to states and localities, it is noted. Various funds that are obtainable go begging because no application is made for them.

The reason is, according to Senator William V. Roth of Delaware, who made a study of the situation, that there are no less than 1,350 aid programs on the books, administered by 57 departments and agencies of government. No comprehensive listing of them has ever been made.

**Lottery numbers 35 and below to receive orders for induction**

Col. Melvin N. Glantz, State Director of Selective Service for Texas, is instructing Texas Draft Boards to issue Induction Orders to all 1972 First Priority Selection Group men with lottery numbers of 35 or below.

Under the Uniform National Call procedure, the "Induction Cut-Off Number" was announced by Acting Director of Selective Service Byron V. Pepitone. Induction orders will be issued to all fully acceptable registrants in the United States with lottery numbers of 35 or below who are members of the 1972 First Priority Group. This Priority Group is made up basically of men born in calendar year 1952.

The Defense Department asked Selective Service to induct 15,000 men in April, May and June. The National Director previously established a lottery cut-off number of 15 for April and May, and has raised the lottery number to 35 for the June induction call.

Each registrant to be inducted is given at least 30 days notice before his induction reporting date. All induction orders for June will be issued by May 31, 1972.

Glantz said there is no quota of men for Texas, but he expects the June call to result in approximately 650 inductions in Texas.

Glantz also said men in the 1972 First Priority Selection Group with lottery numbers of 75 and below could expect orders for a pre-induction physical examination in June or July.

## Oh! if spring be here, can tornadoes be far behind?

Spring in Texas brings warm breezes, greening fields and trees and — too often — tornadoes.

In an average year 96 tornadoes hit Texas. They occur most often in the northeastern portion of the Low Rolling Plains and in the northern half of North Central Texas.

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration in Austin reported that tornadoes occur at any month and during all hours of the day. However, they occur most often during late spring and early summer.

In a 20-year period, 1950-70, three-fifths of all Texas tornadoes occurred in May. More tornadoes hit in Texas than any other state, partly because of its size. However, Texas ranks ninth in the number of tornadoes per square mile, with Oklahoma and Kansas topping the list.

The Environmental Data Service reports that 1,907 tornadoes struck Texas from 1950-70.

The greatest tornado outbreak came in September, 1967, when Hurricane Beulah spawned 115. The worst outbreak of spring tornadoes was in 1957 when 69 were reported. The costliest tornado in Texas occurred May 11, 1970 when Lubbock suffered 26 deaths, 500 injuries and \$135 million in damage.

What can you do when a tornado approaches? Immediate action can save lives, says Wayne Keese, agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

A tornado watch is given when the storms are likely to develop in a given area. Stay tuned to newscasts and advisories even if the sky is clear.

A tornado warning means tornadoes have been sighted. Seek shelter in a storm cellar or reinforced building. Stay away from windows. Curl up so that your head and eyes are protected.

When tornadoes are likely, leave mobile homes. They are particularly vulnerable.

"If you're in a car, get out and lie in a depression," says the Texas A&M University engineer. "If there are no low spots or depressions, turn the car at a right angle and proceed away from the tornado as quickly as possible."

Farm animals are vulnerable to tornadoes whether in a barn or on open range. However, if they are scattered, the chances are much greater that only a few animals will be lost.
