## Thompson named 'top citizen'

## Chris Bell, Lamb family draw honors

Cochran County Judge Glenn W. Thompson was presented the "Outstanding Citizen of the Year" award for 1973 by the Morton Area Chamber of Commerce at its annual banquet Saturday night.

Thompson was presented the award by last year's recipient, Hi Duncan, who praised him highly for his talent for "getting things done" in a short presentation speech.

"No job is too great or too small for Judge Thompson's full concentration and when he concentrates, things begin to happen. He takes all tasks as a personal challenge and is unafraid to tackle even the largest of problems," Duncan said.

## Chief deputy fired

In a brief but highly dramatic confrontation in Room 121 of Cochran Memorial

Hospital at approximately 10 a.m. Tuesday, Cochran county lost its chief deputy sheriff.

How was he lost? By the firing method, that's how.

Chief deputy Darrell Denny appeared at the door to the hospital room where Sheriff C.G. Richards is being treated for an unknown illness at approximately 9:55 and by 10 a.m. he was without badge or authority, and with a scant 30 minutes to remove his personal affects from the sheriff's office.

Denny's wife, who has been employed as a dispatcher in the sheriff's office, was also dismissed.

Pressed for a specific reason for the firing, Sheriff Richards would not go into specifics, but stated that it was an accumulation of many actions and incidents that effected their working relationship.

Rose has had previous municipal government experience, having served on the Morton City Council in the past.

Rose is the only candidate for the office at the present time, with incumbent Mayor Marshall Leitzell maintaining silence on his intentions in the matter. The city election will be held on the first Saturday in April.

## Cotton harvest nearly complete

The South Plains cotton harvest reached the scrapping stage in most counties this week, according to Paul R. Dickson, in charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office of the U.S.D.A. However, ginning, sampling and classing continue because of the volume of cotton remaining in trailers and in ricks.

Samples from 2,297,000 bales had been classed at the Lubbock, Brownfield, Lamesa

Win put Friona in the district driver's seat and almost certainly won them the first half district laurels. By the same token, it puts Morton way deep in the hole—where they will probably have to win all their remaining games, including the second one

She won the right to try-out on the area level after being judged first in Region try-outs on January 5. At that time five students from Region XVI were chosen to compete with the five best from Region II (Amarillo) Region V (Midland-Odessa) and Region VIII (El Paso).

Of these twenty, the five best were chosen, and Gail was picked in the first round of competition.

Each student played three difficult exercises and was graded by five judges. Unlike athletic All-State contests, students must compete in an open-class, regardless of school size. The other four

## City employees pay hiked

A large majority of the Morton city employees were the recipients of a small bonanza this week as the city council voted an almost

blanket increase in salaries.

Raises ranged from a high of \$50 per month for two employees in the utilities department to a minimum of

\$12.80 for secretarial personnel. In some categories of employment there was no provision for salary increases—these will be considered for increases at a later date when their employment position and circumstance becomes eligible for consideration.

Old and new salary schedules are as follows:

Utilities serviceman—Everett Billbrey, old \$450, new \$500. Benny Aragon, old \$450, new \$500.

Office secretaries—Alice Tarlton, old \$447.20, new \$460. Mary Lee Carter, old \$447.20, new \$460.

Street, cemetery, parks and sanitation department—Superintendent A.M. Mapes, old \$600, new \$625.

Street—R.E. Gardner, old \$460, new \$475.

Buildings and Parks—custodian J.T. Atkins, old \$445, new \$475.

Sanitation collection—Leo Johnston, old \$425, new \$450.

Police Department—Chief Chester Miller, old \$610, new \$650. Patrolman Bobby Ray Turner, old \$475, new \$500.

City manager Elra Oden emphasized in an interview with the Tribune that these raises are merit raises and are not due to cost of living increases. "In other words, they are raises these people have earned through their own efforts," Oden concluded.

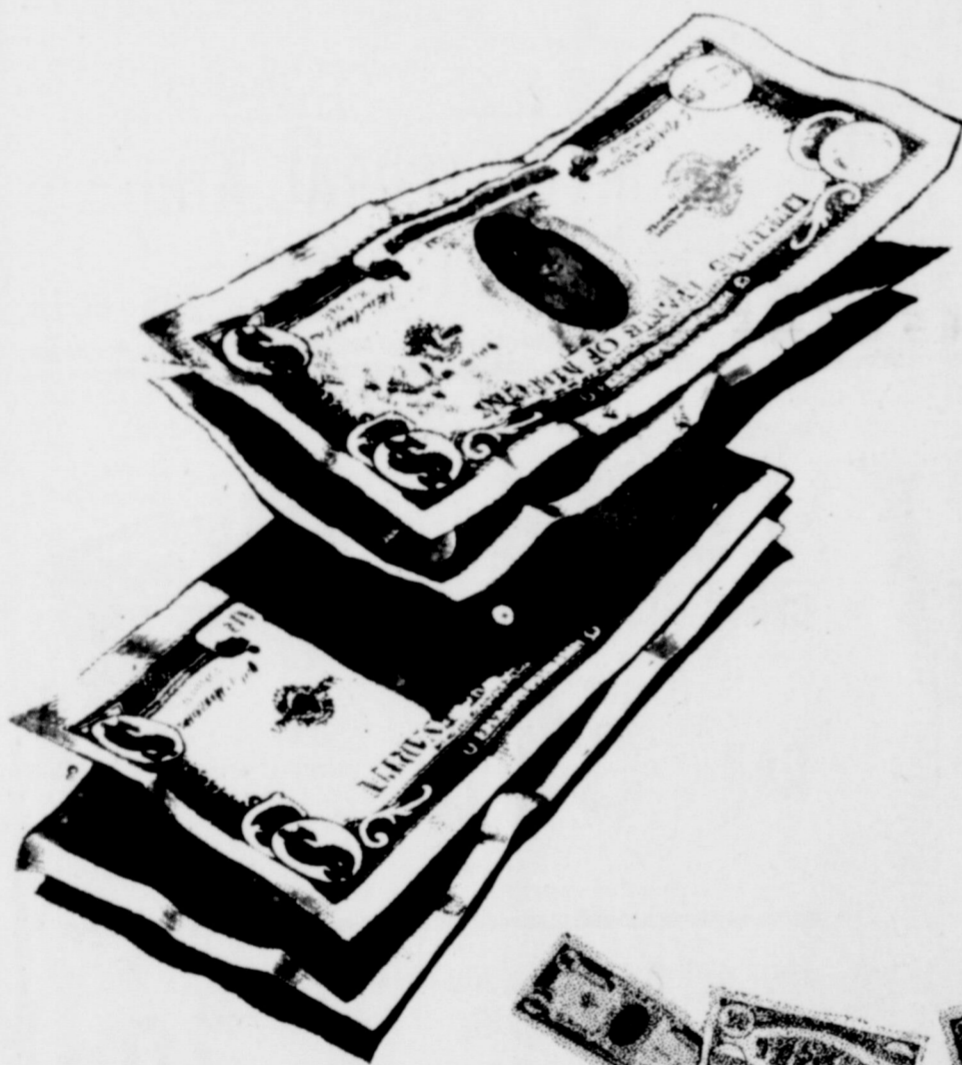
