Show sale sets record



**Exceeds '73
by \$8,000**

The Cochran County Junior Livestock Show has taken on "Topsy" characteristics over the past several years, but this year it outdid its normal growth. It just "grewed and grewed"--almost \$8,000 in sales over last year.

The sale, which would up the highly successful show Tuesday night, netted an unofficial total of \$27,693.00--up \$7,980.20 over the 1973 total, which in turn was up \$6,000 over the highest previous total recorded in 1971.

The show set records in just about all categories and set an all-time high in the quantity and quality of all animals entered.

Leading off the honors list was Steve Polvado who showed his 1,192 lb. Angus heavyweight steer to the Grand Championship of the show. His calf was purchased in the sale for \$1.40 per pound by Sanders Fertilizer and Chemical of Morton for a total of \$1,668.80. Steve is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Polvado of Morton.

Fort Worth hosts TSTA convention

The 95th annual convention of the Texas State Teachers Association will be held in Fort Worth March 14, 15, and 16 with some 11,000 members and guests expected to attend. The theme of the convention, which will be held in Tarrant County Convention Center, will be "A

Unified Commitment to Youth."

Johnny Clark, Superintendent of Schools at Baytown and TSTA state president, will preside over the convention, an executive Committee meeting on Thursday, March 14, and three sessions of the 1,400-member House of Delegates, which is the official governing body.

Registration will begin at 1:30 Thursday, March 14. Dr. Joyce Brothers, psychologist and author, will address the conferees at the opening general session Thursday evening, March 14.

Jesse Owens, former U.S. track star who won four gold medals in the 1936 Olympics in Berlin, will speak at the second general session on Friday morning, March 15. Owens is presently engaged in helping young people, through athletics.

The 1,400-member House of Delegates will hold three sessions in connection with the convention.

Turkey hunt application deadline near

March 25, 1974, is the last day the Parks and Wildlife Department will accept applications to hunt turkey this spring on the Kerr Wildlife Management Area.

Hunters for the April 27-May 5 season will be selected in a public drawing to be held at 10 a.m. March 28 in the Austin offices of the Parks and Wildlife Department.

Permits will be issued for a two-day hunt with a one-gobbler limit.

A total of 100 permits will be issued from the drawing.

This is the fourth year of the spring gobbler hunt on the 6,493-acre Kerr Area which is located on the north fork of the Guadalupe River in Kerr County.

This is the first year, however, that a \$5 fee will be charged of each hunter selected to hunt on the area.

Required by the legislature, fees will help defray the cost of conducting such a public hunt.

Alternatives to nursing home care given by SDPW

Alternatives to nursing home or institutional care are being offered by the State Department of Public Welfare to Texas' newly aged, blind and disabled.

The new "adult social services" are designed to help those who don't require full-time nursing care to continue living at home, State Welfare Commissioner Raymond W. Vowell said.

The new programs are intended for elderly people, and the blind and disabled, who receive a monthly assistance check from the federal government's Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program.

"With little help, many elderly people who otherwise would have to enter nursing homes can live at home or in their own communities," Vowell said. "All they need is someone to help them do things they can no longer do for themselves, like cooking meals and taking care of the house."

To be offered on a statewide basis as community resources become available, the new programs include Homemaker, Chore, Foster Care, Day Care and other services to adults.

The Department of Public Welfare pays for these services and is interested in locating people who are willing to offer their homes for day care or foster care, as well as those who wish to contract with the department to provide Chore and Homemaker Services to adults. Persons in need of such services or who wish to offer their services should contact Mr. James Allison at the Welfare Department at 101 South D., Brownfield or by calling 637-7511 in Brownfield.

When aged, blind or disabled SSI recipients are found to be living in hazardous conditions or in situations in which they cannot protect themselves, a

DPW social services worker will act to correct those situations through the Protective Services program.

In addition, the Welfare Department will assist SSI applicants and recipients in finding and using community resources related to education, employment, health, housing, transportation and other needs.

"Our primary goal in offering hulternate care is to help as many people as possible delay going into nursing homes until they really need to," Vowell said. "Nursing home or other institutional care continues to have the support of the Welfare Department when there are no other alternatives."





The Next Presidential Election Campaign: Big Gifts or Small?

It's a rare taxpayer who ever gets a chance to tell the government how to spend his taxes.

This year, however, the federal income tax return gives Mr. and Mrs. Taxpayer one opportunity to order Washington around.

Not far, maybe, but for a unique purpose. American taxpayers now have the means to put an end to big political giving—all through their orders to the tax collector.

The Congress of the United States has passed the Presidential Election Campaign Fund Act, which gives to each taxpayer a special checkoff privilege when he files his federal income tax return.

The law gives every taxpayer the option of "telling" the Collector of Internal Revenue to place one dollar of the taxes he has already paid into a special fund to be used in the 1976 Presidential campaign.

It costs the taxpayer nothing. On the regular federal tax return, he checks a box

on line 8. This puts \$1 (\$2 in joint returns) into a 1976 campaign fund. This neither increases the individual tax or reduces the refund. Those who did not utilize the option last year can do so this year by checking another box on the bottom of the tax form, immediately above the signature line.

Democratic and Republican presidential candidates will receive equal amounts from the fund. Minor parties that get over 5 percent of the vote will receive pro rata shares.

How many taxpayers will use the checkoff privilege this year? If enough do, it can eliminate the influence of big gifts in future presidential elections.

Time is running short. April 15 is the deadline for filing federal income tax returns. Taxpayers who use the box on line 8 will be telling the government something they never had a chance to say before. Something that sounds like, "Spend it this way."

Pork Referendum and Producer Board Election

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Pork Producers Association, 2422 Taho, Sherman, Texas 75090, proposes a referendum election on May 14, 1974 under provision of Article 53c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on the proposition of whether or not the pork producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of 10 cents per head on all slaughter animals to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members of a 15 member commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, predator control, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of pork.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots

must be mailed to the polling place at Sherman, Texas before midnight on the date of the election.

Any person within this state engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced slaughter hogs for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to April 30, 1974 may obtain one at his local County Agent's Office.





reported that the delegates took action in two major areas of concern to the people of the state; one with which he agreed and one which he opposed.

The convention included in the article a section which will require the eligibility for voting in bond elections be limited to property owners. Delegate Clayton stated that he strongly favored this section, pointing out that this will allow those who have to pay taxes which fund bond issues to be the voters who decide if the debt should be incurred in the first place.

The second issue of concern with which the convention dealt was action which gave the right to vote to felons. Clayton, who strongly opposed the change from the present constitutional ban which prohibits anyone convicted of a felony from voting, stated that he felt that the present system, which makes provisions for the granting of pardons on an individual basis, provides sufficient latitude for exceptions. Clayton noted that he felt a person who had committed a serious crime against society should have to take individual action to prove his rehabilitation and desire to become a voting citizen after serving his sentence.

The convention, which has used almost two-thirds of its allotted ninety-day session, began consideration of the Executive article on Friday.

The largest group served include those with major deformities of bones and joints, severe speech defects, cerebral palsy, arthritis, muscular dystrophy and multiple sclerosis and stroke. The Easter Seal Campaign, which provides funds for continuation of these services through April 1, and continues through April 14, Easter Sunday.

SPC announces financial aid program deadline


Current and prospective students of South Plains College who are planning to attend SPC next fall under some form of financial aid program are reminded that May 1 is the deadline for applying for Work Study, loans and grants.

Glenn Pounds, director of financial

aid, also has announced that applications for the new Basic Education Opportunity Grants (BEOG) will be available at his office during the first week in April. The BEOG program is separate from Work Study, loan and all other grant programs currently being used at SPC. Under the BEOG, students can receive from \$50 to \$800 a year depending on financial need. And because it is a grant, it does not have to be repaid.

Students who qualify for BEOG must never have been to a post-secondary high school prior to April 1, 1973, must be a full time student and must be a U.S. citizen. This means that the grants are available to students who will be freshmen and sophomores during the academic year 1974-75.

For the other financial aid programs — such as Work Study, National Direct Student Loans, Hinson-Hazlewood Loans, Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants, and Texas State Scholarships — students must fill out an SPC application form and an ACT Financial Statement. Three to six weeks after the ACT statement is turned in, Pounds and his staff will be able to tell the student how much financial aid he or she qualifies for.
