Chamber plans 'Last Frontier Days' celebration

With Rodeo
August 1-3

In keeping with the 50th anniversary of the founding of Cochran county, the rodeo and fair to be staged here this summer will take on much more of a "Texas' Last Frontier" flavor.

The Morton Area Chamber of Commerce has re-named their part of the annual celebration "Last Frontier Days" and will hold it in conjunction with the annual rodeo—with the combined event being dubbed "Last Frontier Days and Rodeo."

The chamber board met in regular session Tuesday night and kicked off the planning for the annual celebration which is expected to be the biggest and best ever staged here. As board president Jerry Schaeffer puts it, "You will have to wait another fifty years to see a bigger and better one than we are planning this year."

Tentative plans call for a week of celebration beginning with a motorcycle rodeo July 30 and 31. The conventional rodeo dates are August 1 through 3.

Some of the events that will be on tap include a street and square dance, a gospel singing and ice cream supper, pet show, grandmother's bicycle race, beard growing contest, parade, bar-be-que supper, and an Ol' fiddlers contest. Other events will be announced at later dates as they are added to the schedule.

In conjunction with the beard growing contest this year there will be something for the ladies. Beginning July 1 all ladies in the downtown area will be required to wear a western hat or a bonnet.

Firing, resignation depletes MPD

The firing of one Morton police patrolman and the resignation of a second has

depleted the department down to bedrock and has all but left Morton "defenseless."

Bobby Turner, newest member of the force and younger brother to the resigned patrolman, Dan Turner, was discharged May 23 by Chief Chester Miller for what he would describe only as "a number of reasons."

In a move that Miller described as coming as a total surprise to him, Dan Turner suddenly quit the force on May 28. "He quit in mid-shift in the middle of the night and has yet to give me a reason for doing so," the chief stated to the Tribune in an interview Wednesday.

The younger Turner stated to the Tribune last week that he considered his dismissal totally unfair and would go to Mayor Marshall Leitzell and

request a hearing on his case. Quiried at noon Wednesday, the Mayor stated that he had not contacted him and as far as he knew at that time, there was no hearing scheduled.

A check with city manager Elra Oden on Tuesday revealed that no hearing request had been made through his office and there was none on the agenda of the next regular meeting of the city council slated for June 10.

Meanwhile, Chief Miller has been on the recruiting trail in search for two experienced

Key wins in close commissioners runoff

By a total of only two votes,

W.R. Key was named Cochran county commissioner for Precinct Four in the second primary runoff election June 1.

Key won his victory over Jimmy Millar by the scant margin of 99 votes to 97. Since victory in the Democratic primary in Cochran county is tantamount to election — there was no Republican primary and very little chance of opposition in the November general election — he can pretty well count on serving as commissioner for the four years beginning January 1, 1975.

Key's vote include: Absentee, 5; Box Four, Star Route, 52 and Box Seven, County Activities Building, 42, for a total vote of 99.

Millar polled 12 Absentee votes; 61 Box Four votes and 24 Box 7 votes for a total of 97.

In the first primary, held May 4, Millar outpolled Key by a total of 90-76 and a margin of 14 votes. However a third candidate, George (Ike) Williams polled 30 votes, thereby preventing either from a clear majority and forced the runoff election.

The vote in both elections total 196, which would indicate that Keys margin of victory came from winning over more of Williams votes that Millar could muster.

persons are away. If your police force does, you will need to tell them what cars are authorized to visit your house.

—Have your telephone put on "vacation." Your callers will be told that the telephone has been temporarily disconnected at your request, and you can have them referred to another number if you wish.

—Avoid mentioning to casual acquaintances or strangers that you will be on vacation. Also, avoid telling your newspaper's society editor of your trip until you have returned.

—Before leaving, engrave all valuables in your home and those you will be taking with you in the car with your driver's license or social security number. Some police forces will loan you an engraver to mark your belongings and will register your number on their master list. This may discourage burglars from taking your goods and can make identification of recovered stolen goods much simpler.

After taking precautions to secure your home from burglars while you are gone, don't let down your guard when you get into the car and drive away. There are a few things to remember during your trip too:

—Make sure you have had your car serviced and thoroughly checked before leaving and always get out of the car to watch when having it serviced on the road. There are a few unscrupulous persons who sometimes take advantage of tourists with out-of-state license plates. If your car was given a clean bill of health before you left, you can better evaluate warnings about faulty fuel pumps, air filters, batteries, etc.

—Take traveler's checks or use credit cards, and keep a list of your credit card numbers in a safe spot.

—Men should avoid keeping billfolds in back pockets, or at least button the pocket if possible. To discourage pickpockets, use the inside coat pocket or a money belt.

—Women should select a purse with a secure clasp or zipper and keep a key over the opening when carrying it.

—Don't wear unusually expensive or flashy jewelry or display large rolls of bills.

—Never boast of wealth or possessions or tell strangers your home town or address.

—Check valuables at your hotel desk for safekeeping.

You could be taken advantage of in more subtle ways, too. Many people spend large amounts of their money on vacation souvenirs without examining them carefully. Many souvenir items are cheaply made, over-priced, and of little or no practical value. Try to spend on the amount of money you set aside on things you're likely to throw away or put in a closet later.

If you have a consumer problem, contact the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division, your county or district attorney, or your local Better Business Bureau.

CORN MEAL YEAST BREAD



1 cup milk
6 tablespoons sugar
2 teaspoons salt
1/4 cup margarine
1/2 cup warm water (105°-115°)
2 packages active dry yeast
2 eggs, beaten
3 3/4 cups unsalted flour
1 3/4 cups yellow corn meal

Scald milk, stir in sugar, salt and margarine. Cool to lukewarm. Measure warm water into large warm bowl. Sprinkle in yeast; stir until dissolved. Stir in lukewarm milk mixture, beaten eggs, flour and corn meal. Beat until well blended, about 2 minutes. Batter will be stiff. Turn into two greased 8-inch round cake layer pans or two greased 9x5x3-inch loaf pans. Cover, let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour. Bake in preheated 375° oven for 30 to 35 minutes. Serve warm or cold. Makes 2 loaves.

But the court may have a hard time deciding, in a particular situation, what matter is foreign and what is "natural." Take three actual cases:

A man bit on a turkey bone in a dish of roast turkey that he had ordered in a restaurant.

Another man encountered a hard grain of corn in a bowl of corn flakes.

A woman was injured by a chicken bone in chicken fricassee.

In each case a damage claim was filed by the victim. But each time, the claim was turned down because the item in question was not considered foreign. As the court in the turkey case put it:

"Bones which are natural to the type of meat served cannot legitimately be called a foreign substance, and a customer who eats meat dishes ought to be on his guard against the presence of such bones."

In recent years, however, courts have been putting less emphasis on what is natural and more emphasis on what a consumer might logically expect to find in his food.

Not long ago a man damaged a tooth by biting on the olive in his martini. The olive had not been pitted, although the usual hole in the end led him to think it had.

Of course, the pit was "natural" to the olive. Nevertheless a court ruled that the jury could reasonably reach a verdict in the man's favor.

"Because a substance is natural to a product in one stage of preparation," said the court, "does not mean necessarily that it will be reasonably anticipated by the consumer in the final product."

COTTON, STILL the Number 1 crop in Texas, brought in a total of

\$1,056,000,000 from 4,246,000 bales in 1972. The figures are from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service which said that total United States pro-

duction in 1973 was 12,958,000 bales, compared to 13,704,100 bales in 1972. Lint cotton averaged 47.10 cents a pound in 1973, compared to 23 cents in 1972, and cottonseed brought an average of \$94 a ton, compared to \$48.60 in 1972.

TEXAS' 1973 cotton production was from 5,200,000 acres, which gives Texas a record of 431 pounds of lint per acre, but below the 519 pounds national average. Arizona had the highest yield per acre with 891 pounds of lint, followed by California with 891 pounds, Mississippi with 645 pounds per acre. Mississippi was second to Texas in total production with 1,800,000 bales, followed by California with 1,749,000 and Arkansas with 1,041,000 bales. Texas produced about 40 per cent of the nation's total cotton.

LIVESTOCK OWNERS are reminded to watch out for screwworms, because they are making an appearance over Texas. Samples of suspected screwworms should be mailed to the laboratory at Mission. Kits in which they may be mailed can be obtained from county agents. There were 176 identified cases of screwworms found in Texas during April 1973. Cases were found in the following counties: Webb, Duval, Zapata, Starr, LaSalle, Dimmitt, Hidalgo, Live Oak, Kenedy, Jim Wells, Jim Hogg, Zavala, Dewitt, Kinney, San Patricio, Cameron, Goliad, Atascosa, Medina, Bee, Karnes, Victoria, Brooks, Willacy, Guadalupe, Wilson, Frio, Presidio, Real, Gillespie, Pecos, Terrell, Val Verde, Llano, Concho, Coleman, Bastrop, Fayette, Gonzales, Jackson, McMullen, Kleberg, Crockett, Kimble, Kerr, Kendall and Comal.

PARITY RATIO is reported to have dropped seven per cent during the month ending April 15, hitting 83 per cent. Prices paid farmers went down on many commodities, including cattle, eggs, corn, wheat, hogs, soybeans, rice, rye, and prices on cotton went up three cents a pound and on potatoes 73 cents a hundred. Wheat prices dropped almost a dollar, to \$3.98 a bushel, which was 103 per cent of parity, but the price was still declining at last report. Texas' wheat crop, plagued by drought, was estimated to be 69,300,000 bushels, compared to 98,600,000 bushels from the previous crop. Recent rains came late to save the wheat in orth and West Texas.

"Tennis, Son?"

Turning your boy into a tennis player is an admirable goal. The game is a skill he'll enjoy using for the rest of his life. Not only is it a healthy activity, but it's a social asset that can be of real value later, in business and professional relationships.

When should tennis lessons start? That depends on the individual child. The correct time to start is when he shows an interest in the game, and when he starts to coordinate. Some children will have enough coordination by age eight or ten. Others don't get themselves "pulled together" until their early teens. Don't push too soon, or the child will rebel and walk off the tennis court for good.

Tennis lessons are expensive, but they don't go on forever. Unless a child is going to be playing at tournament level, he will need anywhere from six to twenty lessons and no more. The average tennis player should not stay with the same teacher until it's a habit. A year is probably too much.

Equipment is another expense. Spend wisely in the beginning, and you'll save money in the end. It is not necessary to outfit a child from head to toe in the latest tennis clothes. Spend your money on a good racket and good shoes, and send him out on the court in jeans.

A good wooden racket for beginners will cost about \$25, strung. Get it at a tennis pro shop where the child can be fitted for the right racket in terms of size and flexibility. These factors determine how much control he'll have over the ball from the beginning. This certainly will influence his interest

in the game.

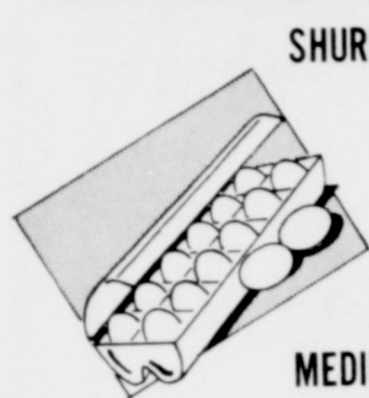
