Lamb is third with 30,626 bales; Hockley a near fifth with 28 .-280 bales; Terry sixth with 26,296 bales; Scurry seventh with 24.307 bales; Crosby eighth with 20,185 bales. Six other counties produced more than 10,000 bales each.

1934 Crop Short

During 1934 crop season only two counties ginned over 10,000 bales each, due to the drouth. They were: Lamb, 12,180 and Terry, 11,552. Seven other counties produced between 5,000 and 10,000 bales; Scurry, 9,-171; Lynn, 8,473; Hale, 7,346; Dawson, 5,793; Hockley, 5,766; Lubbock, 5,594; Bailey, 5,198.

State production for 1935 was 2,-849,242 bales, an increase of 534,548 bales or 23.1 per cent, over the 2,-314,894 bales in 1934.






