#### FIRST SMALL FARM TRACTOR IS HERE



The junior-size, speed-lined tractor shown here is said to be the first economically suited to 4,000,000 small farms. It is the lowestpriced farm tractor ever placed on the market, selling for \$495.00 f.o.b. factory with rubber tires as standard equipment.

The new tractor is expected to place economical tractor power within reach of 60 per cent of the nation's farms-diversified farms now using mainly animal power. It plows and cultivates at 4 miles per hour, twice the speed of horses. It will replace four to six horses and will operate at about the cost per hour of a two-horse team.

Implements to work with the new tractor will include a plow, cultivator, disc harrow, planter, spring tooth harrow, mower and harvester. According to its builders, the Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Company, the tractor is also adapted to large farms for replacing horses now kept to supplement a larger tractor.

## **Operation of New FHA** Eplained in Q. and A.

Operation of the Federal Housing Act mortgage system was explained here yesterday in question and answer form by E. T. Stearns, executive assistant state director of the FHA.

Q. Who may borrow under the insured mortgage system?

A. Any person who has a credit standing satisfactory to the administrator, so long as the property securing the loan meets certain neighborhood requirements and construction standards.

Q. What is the source of mortgage

A. Private lending agencies, such as commercial banks, building and loan associations, mortgage companies, life insurance companies, etc., which have been approved by the Federal Housing Administration as lenders.

Q. What is the function of the Federal Housing Administration?

A. The Federal Housing Adminisand enforces certain basic requirethe property and the borrower. Q. What is the maximum loan ob-

Q. What is the interest rate? The mortgage insurance premium?

A. Lending institutions may charge as much as five per cent interest. The mortgage insurance premium amounts to one-half per cent of the decreasing balances of the mortgage, except for mortgages amounting to \$5,400 or less, on which a one-fourth per cent premium on decreasing

balances is charged. Q. What is the approximate amount of monthly payment per \$1,000 exclusive of taxes and hazard insurance

A. Loans made for new construction, at interest of five per cent and mortgage insurance at one-fourth monthly payment of \$5.98 for each \$1,000 of loan, if made for 25 years. If for 20 years, payment would be \$6.72. Thus, the monthly payment on \$3,000 for 20 years would be \$20.16. In every case one-twelfth of annual taxes and one-twelfth of annual hazard insurance premium must be added to complete the total monthly pay-

Q. To whom does the borrower apply to obtain a loan?

A. To any approved lending institution. In some instances, the borrower may wish to make preliminary inquiry at the office of the Federal Housing Administration. The FHA is always willing to give advice and any other assistance within its

Q. How does the prospective home owner benefit from financing his home under the insured mortgage

A. (1) The convenient and all-inclusive monthly payments; (2) the small down payment; (3) the longer term of the mortgage; (4) the careful appraisal, inspection of construction of properties and neighborhood by field insurance office; and (5) the freedom from hidden charges. fore-knowledge of amounts of charges, payment of principal, etc.; the knowledge that the mortgage will be handled by an able and substantial financial institution, etc.

AUSTIN-Serious dispution of the State's highway building program is threatened by the growing "license plate racket" which is being practiced in several small counties, according to Highway Commission Chairman R. L. Bobbitt, and the legislature is expected to be asked to take steps to correct the situation which makes the "racket" possible.

The background for the "racket" is the law which permits counties to keep all of the first \$50,000 of license fees they collect, half of all collected between \$50,000 and \$175,-000, and remit to the State all above 175,000. Some of the smaller counties issue script in payment for various supplies, and this script sells at a discount. Then, when license time approaches, racketeers buy up the script at a discount, and swap it to the small counties issuing it county. for full value in return for license plates, and sell the license plates to






