

SENTENCED NEGRO TO HANG.

EXECUTION OF LEE RUSSELL, WHO KILLED GIRL, SET FOR OCTOBER.

Crockett, Texas, August, 8—Judge B. H. Gardner today overruled the motion filed by the attorney for Lee Russell, the negro who received the death penalty for the murder of Mollie Harrison, a negro girl, in Crockett last April, and set the day for the execution as Friday, October 1 next.

In view of the fact that Bayne and Jackson, partners of the condemned negro, received only a life sentence, an effort probably will be made to have the governor commute the sentence of Russell to life imprisonment.

TOM MILLER DEAD.

ONE OF THE OLDEST ENGINEERS ON THE INTERNATIONAL & GREAT NORTHERN.

Palestine, Tex., Aug. 8.—Engineer Tom Miller was killed at Taylor today, being caught between cars. News of his death reached here early this morning. Mr. Miller was one of the oldest of the International & Great Northern Railroad engineers and resided here. He was a popular railroad man and the news was a great shock to his many friends at headquarters.

SIGNIFICANT.

The other day a merchant in a nearby town saw a farmer receiving goods at the station from a Chicago mail order house, says the Muscotah (Kan.) Record. The goods were in his line and the same had been carried in his store for years. He approached the farmer and said: "I could have sold you every article you have there for less money than you paid the Chicago house, and saved you the freight besides."

"Then why on earth didn't you say so?" answered the farmer. "I have taken the Muscotah Record for years, and have never seen a line about your selling these goods. The Chicago house sent advertising matter to me, asking for my trade, and they got it."

The Messenger use to preach to its readers to patronize the home people, but we have reached the conclusion that a man has a right to trade where he pleases and the merchant who goes after business deserves all he gets. If home merchants cannot realize and see the benefits of advertising then they will have to suffer the consequences.

Ex-State Senator W. S. Hawkins of Midland has announced as a candidate for Lieutenant Governor.

Bryan says it is all a mistake about him becoming a permanent citizen of Texas. However, he will spend some of the winter months at his home in southwest Texas.

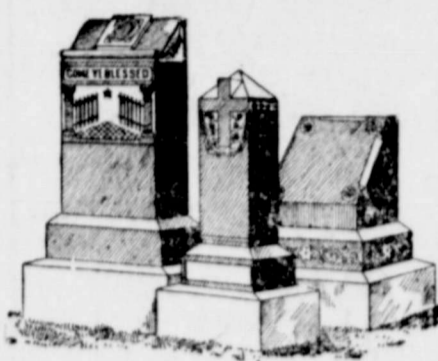

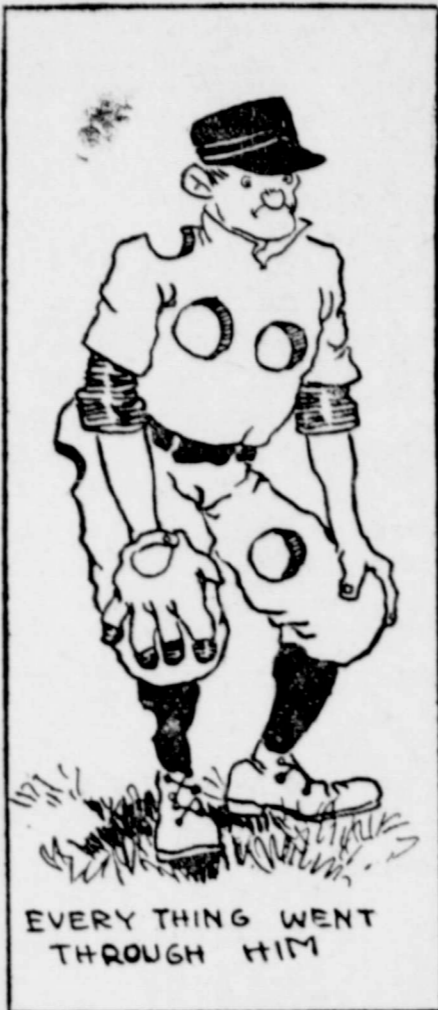
