A Letter From Albert Tyer.

Joliet, Ill., Aug. 13.—Have your teeth examined if they are unsound have them treated or quit work. so reads the signs posted upon the Illinois Match Co's mill at Joliet. I asked the guide why that sign, he said if an employe had a decayed place in a tooth and it was not treated the whole jaw bone became affected and would very likely have to be taken out, he said one of their girls had to have a jaw bone removed a few days ago on account of not heeding the warning. It is the chemicals of which the matches are made that have action on the teeth and if there is the least decayed place in a tooth and it is not treated the result is often as above stated. I will not attempt to describe the machinery with which matches are made, however I will try to tell something of it. The wood is brought to the mill in logs, just as if to a saw mill. These logs are cut in pieces 43" long, they are then put in a lathe and a knife is set that shaves them off as the blocks turn, now we have a thin piece of wood the thickness of a match, 43" wide and perhaps 12-15, or 20 ft. long, the length depends upon the size of the block. These pieces are now fed through a machine that cuts them the length of a match, at the same time cuts the match out; the sticks, as they are called before the chemical is applied, falls pell mell into boxes or bins that have steel cross bars that cross each other and make little boxes about 1 1/2" deep, 2" wide and the length of a match plus 1/2".

Now they are placed in a steel box that rests against a steel belt with small holes in it and by means of a neat contrivance one stroke will drive perhaps a thousand of these sticks, for they are not matches yet, into these holes in this steel belt. Look at a match, you will find one end shows to have been clamped.

Once these sticks are fastened in these holes in this steel belt, they are then passed over a vat of the chemical that puts the head on the match, of course this vat is kept just so full that the match sticks will go just the right depth from this place they are passed under fans that dry them, from there to the packing room.

The guide showed me some of the chemicals of which matches are made, this particular chemical looked like lemon stick candy and about three fourth inches in diameter and 6 or 8" long and it must be kept under water all the time, he took out a stick to show me and it begun to smoke at once and he put it back very carefully. He said if he should drop a stick of it on the cement floor on which we were standing the chances were we would be killed immediately as it was a very great explosive, and I did not wish him to try it, so we left that part of the factory at once.

A word or two about the weather here. The thermometer has been registering 94 degrees in the shade for several days, and it does seem to me that the heat here is

much more severe than in Texas. Wishing you, Mr. Editor, and your many readers peace, happiness and prosperity I beg to remain, Yours truly,

Immigration Mass Meeting.

Pursuant to call a large representation of the citizens of Houston Co. met in mass meeting at the Court house, in Crockett, on last Friday, the 13th. Inst. for the purpose of adopting a plan by which the advantages of the County might be advertised and a better interest aroused as to the value and desirability of Houston County land for the investor and home-seeker.

On motion Frank Shupak was elected temporary chairman and C. M. Ellis temporary secretary.

The meeting then went into permanent organization, and J. W. Madden was elected permanent Chairman, and Geo. W. Crook permanent secretary. Mr. Crook being absent, C. M. Ellis agreed to act as Secretary at this meeting.

The chairman explained the object of the meeting and addresses were made by various gentlemen, approving of the purpose of the meeting and discussing plans whereby the object of the meeting could be best accomplished.

Whereupon a motion was made by C. E. Hayes, and adopted by the meeting to the effect that the chairman appoint a committee from each community in the county whose duty it should be to seek to work up an interest in their community in behalf of the object of the meeting, and if possible to organize local clubs for that purpose. The motion also authorized these various committees to collect funds from all public spirited citizens who feel an interest in the movement, the same to be used in such plans of advertising the advantages of the County as may be hereafter adopted so as to bring to the notice of the outside world the advantages and inducements that are offered by the county, either for the purpose of investment or for the home-seeker who may want to come among us.
