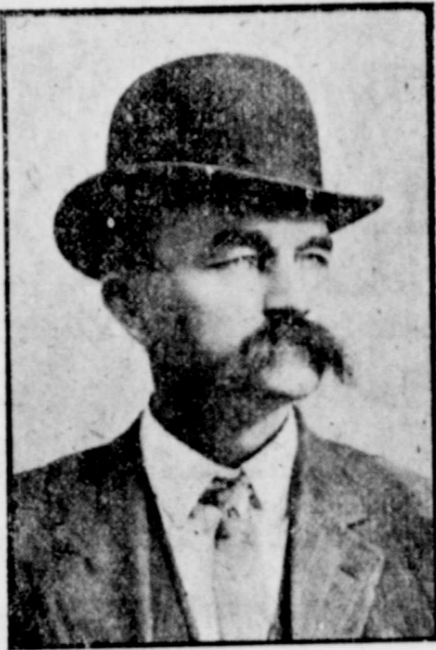

Has your nose been counted yet?

Breeding and rearing animals is a fine art and should appeal to every boy on the farm. It is a fascinating occupation and when intelligently followed is profitable.—Farm & Ranch.

We are pleased to note that our friend Stokes seems to be gaining in favor among the people of the seventh district. He has been campaigning in the lower part of the district the past few weeks.

The little town of Trinity last Saturday voted a bond issue of \$15000 by a vote of 75 to 2 for the erection of a brick school building. Grapeland must be up and doing along this line. Let's vote bonds and build a nice school house.

That's the talk! A few \$10 "bacon sprouts," half a hundred hens, a nice truck patch in addition to the regular crop, and talk hog, hens and turkeys, and the country will be better off.—Corrigan Index.

The value of peanuts as a hay and food crop has never been appreciated. The peanut will grow on the larger portions of the uplands of the South. As a crop for varied uses nothing excels it. It can be made profitable when nuts are grown for market, and it has been found to produce more and cheaper pork than any other crop. When used as hay for horses or cattle the vines and nuts are pulled up and cured together. In this shape they are relished by all kinds of stock, and as they are highly nutritious they can be utilized in place of more expensive grains to a large extent.

Peanuts should not be planted

until warm spring weather. Plant on a well prepared soil, in rows 3 feet apart and 12 inches apart in drill for the Spanish variety and a greater distance for larger varieties. The Spanish is preferred for feeding purposes. The peanut is a soil improver, and every farmer should look with more favor on its place among the farm crops.—Bulletin of the U. S. Agricultural Department.

Colquitt has challenged candidate Davidson to debate the issues of their race for governor, but the latter is too shrewd a politician to take such desperate chances.—Kosse Cyclone.

We suppose Colquitt knew that Davidson would not debate with him before he made a grand stand play and issued the challenge. But say, what is Oscar Budwiser going to do about the challenge laid down at Marlin by one Cone Johnson?—Grapeland Messenger.

Editor Messenger:—The Lord has indeed blest the farmers of our country. Every thing which the farmer has to sell brings a good price, and when he gets a good price for his products the doctors, merchants, preachers, and all professional men are more successful in their business.

But we hear some "sap headed" farmer, who is a consumer more than a farmer, say that flour, bacon and lard are too high. He does not take into consideration that the farmer is the one who produces the article.

If he would make his farm self-sustaining and raise every thing that he could to live on he would not be a howler. The old horny hand farmer has been blest and he is getting something for his products. So you consumer farmers hush your growling and raise the article that gives you so much trouble. Weather Forecasts and Warnings.

Through the cooperation of the Southwestern Telegraph and Telephone Company with the Weather Bureau, U. S. Department of Agriculture, the daily weather forecasts and special warnings will be disseminated over the lines of that company on and after April 18, 1910. The dissemination will be accomplished so that within two hours after issue the weather reports can be had by every patron of the company whether a city or rural subscriber. The forecasts and warnings usually cover the 36-hour period ending at 7 p. m. of the following day.

City subscribers will obtain the forecasts and warnings by calling up about noon each day by a long ring from their operator who will then announce the forecasts to all subscribers simultaneously.

Rural subscribers will be called up about noon each day by a long ring from their operator who will then announce the forecasts to all subscribers simultaneously. The reports will also be displayed at all exchanges, receiving them, in their waiting room or other appropriate place, for the benefit of the general public.

It is difficult to estimate what this means to rural population, whose every day affairs depend so much on the weather. There is no doubt that an intelligent use of these reports will be of inestimable value to the farmer. The territory covered embraces the entire section from the eastern boundary of the State southwestward to Laredo and Uvalde; westward to Big Springs; and northwestward to Quanah. There will be nearly 200 points of distribution, with many times more of rural lines running radially into remote districts. Most of these districts can be reached only by telephone which will thus be made doubly useful to the farmer.

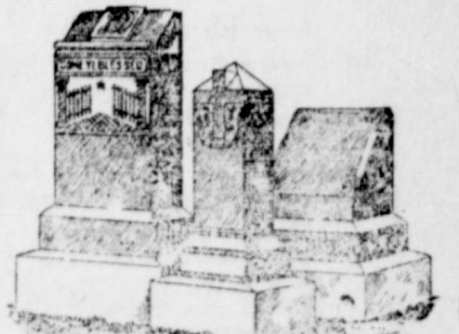



FIND IT HARD TO CLASSIFY

Lovers of the Noble Game of Chess Differ as to Just How It Should Be Ranked.

Chess is a very old game, but it has hardly yet been classed as a mere form or entertainment or as a science. Those who would invest it with the latter dignity have received important support from the Brooklyn Institute of Art and Sciences. The management has made arrangements for a course of lectures on the subject during the coming two months. The managing director says: "With the playing of the game, the institute, as such, is not, of course, concerned, but as an educational or ethnological element, with its history, general theory and esthetic phase, it is quite in our line." The public may not really recognize its ethnological value, but that probably lies in the transference of this ancient game from country to country and its effect upon the mental processes of various peoples. In its essential features it was played in Hindustan almost as far back as history runs. From there it spread to Persia and thence to Arabia. The Arabs introduced it into Spain in the eighth century and it was then gradually adopted in the other countries of Europe. As a player and a writer Benjamin Franklin was the first American to bring it into prominence. It no doubt furnishes mental discipline of value, but the number of noted players who have become insane through devotion to it suggests that its introduction into the sciences be carefully guarded.

EMBROIDERED MAP.

A. Henry Peterson of the Seattle office of the United States shipping commissioner's department has hanging on his office wall a map of Alaska which is something of a curiosity. Like most sailors of the old school, Peterson is a handy man with the needle and in the spare time at his disposal it took him ten months to make the map. It is all of silk embroidery, and nearly 500 skeins of silk thread were used in its manufacture. The different divisions of country are done in different colored silk, and all the names are worked in. The map is complete in detail.

In London a company has been formed to introduce and encourage the use of electricity in the poorer districts of the city. The company agrees to wire and supply any apartment of three rooms and over with tantalum lamps, charging five cents a week for each lamp from April to September and seven cents a week for the rest of the year.
