To the Teachers of Houston County.

The Houston County Teachers' Institute will be held at the Public High School Building in Crockett for 5 consecutive days, October 3, 8, 1910.

The teachers of the schools of the county are required by law to attend this Institute. They who attend, as bona fide participants all its sessions and do all the work assigned will receive full salary for the week and due credit towards the extension of certificates.

Every teacher should bring a note book and such text books as may be necessary for successful work during the week. All the different subjects should be studied. A special study will be made of Monroes Brief Course in the History of Education, and an examination will be given at the close of the Institute, covering the work done during the week.

The work on Psychology will be based on James Talks to Teachers and McKeeyer's Psychologic Method of Teaching.

All teachers are on the program whether their names appear or not and will be expected to take part in the discussions.

It is desired that no papers be read in the Institute. Anyone who wishes to prepare a paper should do so but be able to talk its contents from memory.

Each teacher will pay an incidental fee of 25 cents to pay the expense of printing, etc.

There are two books especially that each teacher ought to purchase. They are Monroe's Brief Course in the History of Education which can be gotten by ordering from The MacMillan Company, Dallas and the other is McKeever's Psychologic Method of Teaching, which can be ordered from C. A. Bryant & Company, Dallas by enclosing the price which \$1.25 for the first and \$1.00 for the last named book.

Let the paramount consideration during the week be the betterment of the educational conditions surrounding the children of this county.

Fowler's Platform.

The Messenger is in receipt of a circular from Hon. G. R. Fowler setting out his views on state policies. He makes his announcement squarely on the Galveston platform, declaring himself in favor of the Governor-elect's policy of legislative rest and political peace. He pledges himself to vote and work for submission at as early a date as practicable. He believes in rigid economy in State government, but is in favor of enlarging the asylums sufficiently to accommodate those entitled to admission. He believes in liberal support of the public schools and State educational institutions. He comes out fairly in favor of liberal aid to confederate veterans, and for reform in court procedure. He declares in favor of the re-establishment of the iron industry at the Rusk penitentiary and the restoration of that branch of the penitentiary system to its rightful status. He is opposed to the lease system and will fight any effort to establish a negro asylum at Rusk.

He believes that the Legislature should devote itself to a careful consideration of necessary business and refrain from political agitation or legislation calculated to provoke further turmoil and business unrest.—Adv.

"We favor a law to prohibit public officials from accepting fees or emoluments from the public service corporations while they hold a commission from the people, to the end that they may be free from the suspicion of wrong."

The Farmers' Union at Ft. Worth adopted the above resolution. The same resolution was voted down at the state democratic convention. The former represents the rank and file of the common people; the latter politicians and heirs of the corporations.

The editor acknowledges the receipt of a copy of "Methods for Young Teachers" by A. W. Cain, Principal of the Training Department of the Philippine Normal School, and formerly principal of the Grapeland High School. It is an interesting and instructive book, especially for those teachers just entering upon their career and who have not had normal training. Speaking of the book, the Manila Times says:

"The modesty of the author leads him to profess that he has no new or superior knowledge of the contents of the book, but as no book has been written giving the consideration deserved to this class of teachers in the islands, the book is published with the hope that it may prove useful and instructive to the young teachers who are endeavoring to train the Filipino youth."

The book has its setting in a Philippine atmosphere, but the principles set forth are applicable everywhere.

The Chronicle is of opinion that the friends of Senator Bailey are doing more to prolong the fight on him than are his enemies. The best way to stop the fight on the Senator is for his friends to stop re-opening the old sores. He is the commanding figure in Texas politics, but we cannot keep him as such if we continuously put chips on his shoulder and invite somebody to knock them off.—Teague Chronicle.

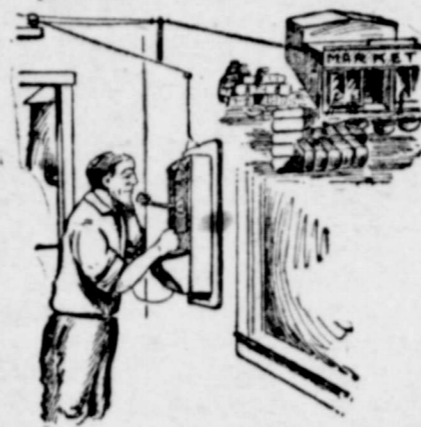

This mileage, single wire, is equal to 450,000 miles, and is sufficient to encircle the globe eighteen times.

The scientist in giving the farmer improved varieties of products, and the inventor in giving us machinery that reduces the cost of production, has performed a great service to the farmer, but the telephone, born from the creative mind of the inventive genius, is destined to companion in utility and convenience all human accomplishments for the intelligent promotion of agriculture. The telephone is the improved public highway of information and is as valuable to the farmer in selling his products as good roads are useful in hauling his products to the market. The telephone eliminates time and space and enables the farmer to personally visit the markets and talk with buyers without the inconvenience of travel or loss of time.

Advance intelligence enables the farmer to successfully combat the Frost King and to shelter his products from the storm and rain, and the telephone is a powerful ally of the farmer in dealing with the elements of Nature. 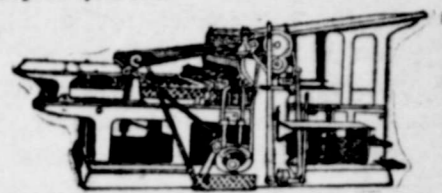

The Texas Newspapers

The dissemination of information has largely to do with the prosperity and development of a country. In no country on the globe does Nature possess such astounding possibilities and reveal them in such rapid and cumulative order as in Texas, making an imperative necessity for newspapers in the home of every farmer who desires to profit by the gifts of Nature and the experience of his neighbors.

There are 950 publications in Texas, of which 89 are dailies, 768 weeklies, and the remainder are issued at regular intervals. The total listed circulation of all papers in Texas is 3,170,515 copies, an average of four papers for each family in the State. In the number of papers published within the State we rank sixth in the Union; Illinois, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Iowa and Missouri leading in the order named. The Federal Government census for 1905 reports capital invested in printing and publishing in Texas of \$6,074,319, a pay roll of \$2,063,935 per annum, and the annual output is valued at \$7,782,247. Among the industries of the State it ranks sixth in capital invested, fifth in pay rolls and sixth in the value of products. One issue of all the papers in Texas approximates one copy per capita, and making the comparison from a population basis we lead all States in the Union in the number of periodicals issued and the number of copies printed.



Circulation 3,170,515.

Texas stands first in intelligence, first in progress and first in industrial opportunities of all the States in the Union, says the Texas Commercial Secretaries' Association.

The newspaper is the channel of communication between the producer and consumer; brings the city to the farm and the farm to the city; gives information of the markets and of the development of the country; carries warnings of impending danger and gives the farmer the advantage of the experience of all his neighbors and informs him of the general condition of affairs so essential to his success. The improvement of our public highways and the establishment of rural free delivery routes have extended the zone of circulation of the press to the remotest sections of the State, and reading the papers is as much a part of the work of the Texas farmer as feeding his stock.



Four Papers Per Family.

The ability of a farmer can be as easily judged by the literature he reads as by the crops he harvests. The printing press is the industrial educator of the age.

KNOWN AS TRAVELER'S PSALM

Number 121 Has Been the Favorite of Many Men of Worldwide Prominence.

Psalm 121 has been appropriately called the traveler's psalm. It begins with the words "I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills." So appropriate indeed is this psalm for the use of pilgrims or travelers that many good men have habitually used it before setting out for a journey. It was the custom of Bishop Hooper of Gloucester, who was afterward burnt at the stake within sight of his cathedral, to recite this psalm before leaving home on his diocesan duties. David Livingstone read this psalm with his father and mother before he left home for Africa. "On the morning of the eleventh November, 1840," writes his sister, "we got up at five o'clock. My mother made coffee. David read Psalm 121 and prayed. Then my father and he walked to Glasgow to catch the Liverpool steamer." In like manner we are told of Bishop Hannington, who followed in the train of Livingstone, that every morning during his long and dangerous journey from Frere Town to Lake Victoria Nyanza, he was accustomed to greet the sunrise by repeating his "traveling psalm," "I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills."

Producers

To promote the prosperity of a community we must increase our wealth. To increase wealth, we must create property, increase the value of property, and move property into the community. The farm, the mine and the fisheries are the natural wealth creating lines of industry. They create property. The building of factories, railroads, opening mines and farms add wealth to adjoining property. They increase the value of property. The immigrant and the capitalist in moving to Texas and buying farms and building railroads and factories bring property with them. They move property into the State. So view it as you will, to be prosperous we must create property, increase the value of property and move property into the community. The man who increases our wealth through either of these channels is a producer and is a public benefactor. There are other important factors in the development of a community, but production is the basis of all prosperity.

In discussing economic subjects it is customary to divide the people into two classes—the producer and the consumer. The farmer is the most prominent type of the Texas producer.



A Producer.

The producer is interested in producing all he can and getting as high prices for his products as he can. The consumer is interested in consuming as little as he can and buying it as cheaply as he can. The tramp is the highest type of an exclusive consumer.



An Exclusive Consumer.

The tramp consumes as little as he can and gets it as cheaply as he can. Low price products make tramp life easy and farm life difficult, and vice versa. All the people are consumers, and most all people consume more or less the products of another. Most all the people are producers directly or indirectly, and net profits accrue only by production exceeding consumption. High prices for products of the farm, mine, factory, etc., and all lines of productive and industrial endeavor encourage development and promote prosperity. Low prices cheapen labor, stagnate development, discourage production and destroy prosperity.

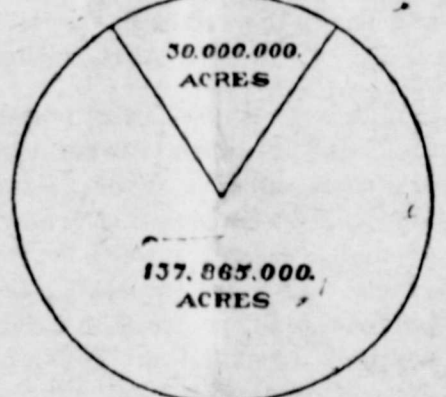
Details That Appear Small But Mean Much to the Care-Burdened Mother.

Bodily comfort has much to do with the mental state and, consequently, with the accomplishment of work, and considering, too, the reaction of the spirits of one member of the household upon the other members, it becomes a positive sin for a mother, especially, not to do everything in her power to keep herself in good physical condition. The first requirement of comfort is bodily cleanliness; the second is comfortable clothing. Women are too prone to economize on footwear, especially for house wear. Often when mother's feet ache because of patched stockings or runover shoes, her temper is stretched to the snapping point and husband and children long for peace. A cold foot bath and a clean, soft pair of stockings each morning, two pairs of really comfortable shoes, changing the shoes early in the afternoon, will make a brand-new woman of her. The busiest woman, because she needs it most, should add to this time and temper saving process a short nap and clean clothing for the evening meal.

Idle Lands.

The prosperity of a community depends upon the activity of its property and the people. Improved public highways afford facilities for marketing production, stimulate commercial activity and otherwise encourages agricultural development. To increase agricultural production we must bring under cultivation idle land and increase the yield per acre.

We have in Texas 167,865,000 acres of land. Of this area there are 2,118,000 acres of water surface. All our land is susceptible to a high degree of cultivation except the city area and a small portion of our land which is mountainous. We now have less than 30,000,000 acres of land under cultivation, leaving 137,000,000 acres of land that has never been plowed. Idle land is of course no value to a community, and to increase our prosperity we must put activity into our vacant lands. The following cut illustrates the relative proportions of our cultivated and uncultivated areas:



Texas Land Comparison.

There are 109 counties that have less than 10 per cent of their land under cultivation. There are 43 counties that have a larger uncultivated area than the total area of the State of Rhode Island. The uncultivated area of Texas, says the Commercial Secretaries' Association, exceeds the total area of the thirteen original colonies, excepting Georgia and North Carolina. We need 3,000,000 farmers to develop our agricultural resources, and no country on the globe affords the opportunities to the homeseeker that Texas now offers. The land agent is an important factor in the development of agriculture. There are 100 people moving to Texas daily, and remain here permanently and of this number probably half of them go on the farm.

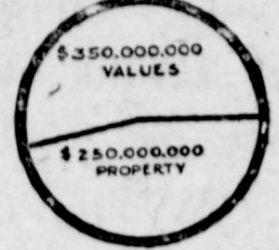


People Coming to Texas.

A present rate of agricultural immigration it will take 400 years to secure a sufficient number of farmers to bring under cultivation our idle lands. We must get farmers from other States and countries more rapidly, and the improvement of our public highways will influence the homeseeker by making farm life attractive

Property Values

Some people are born wealthy, others acquire it, and still others have it thrust upon them. The Texas property owners are now having wealth thrust upon them. The real estate values in Texas are increasing at the rate of \$1,000,000 per day. The total increase in wealth from property and property values approximate \$20,000,000 per annum. A careful study of the tax rolls indicate that \$350,000,000 of this amount is increase in property values and \$250,000,000 in property moving into the State, as shown in cut below:



Increase in Property Values \$600,000,000 Per Annum.

Every dollar of new money coming into the State gives added value to investments already made. The money which is flowing into our State will treble and quadruple the price of land and the investor is sure of a comfortable fortune through the natural increase of land and without effort on his part. There are 70,000 per day coming into Texas and making investment in farms, factories, railroads.

There are two classes of property—natural and artificial.

Natural property, such as land, cannot, of course, be created by man; we can only increase its value. Artificial property, such as buildings, machinery, etc., can be created by man, and its value can be enhanced. With natural property we are limited in our methods of increasing values, while there are no restrictions to development through artificial property. We may gridiron the State with railroads, dot it with factories, build cities and fill the valleys with happy homes, but we cannot create another acre of land. The investor may come to Texas and buy land, and if he cared to do so, can sell it later and leave the State, with all the property he brought into the State, but the investor who builds railroads, factories, irrigating canals, etc., cannot take that back with him, and he has established permanent values.



Permanent Property.

Ownership may change hands, but the property remains as a permanent addition to the wealth of the State. He has added to the property values of Texas, just as much so as if he had gone down to the Gulf of Mexico and lifted so much land out of the sea and added it to the State's domain. Texas needs builders.
