#### LAW CENTER OF TEXAS FOUND

Commercial Secretaries Prepare Map and Present Statistics on Legislation.

Ft. Worth. Texas, Dec. 1.-The approach of the Thirty-Second legislature and the possibility of another deluge of laws, has prompted the Texas Commercial Secretaries Association to locate, as far as mathematical analysis will permit, the storm center of legislative disturbance. The association has prepared a map showing the "Law Center" of Texas and finds it to be about 15 miles west of Palestine. During the 30th legislature, the law canter rested near Rusk, but it traveled on its westward journey along the right of way of the go Texas State Railroad and the 31st legislature leaves the center near the county line of Anderson and Freestone counties, as shown by the star in the map below.



The method employed in developing the Law Center is similar to the method used by the United States Census Bureau in locating the center of the popuber of bills introduced by each


