State Capital News

SENATE AND HOUSE DOINGS

House Members on Excursion.
Austin, Tex.—Most of the house members went on the excursion to the A. and M. College Sunday, but 5 o'clock on a wintry morning was too early for many of the senators to leave their cosy nests.

The result was that while legislative rest prevailed generally over the capitol, some committee work was done in the senate.

The important legislative event of the day was that the senate judiciary committee No. 2 unanimously voted to favorably report the Mayfield-Stevens bill providing that corporations, firms, copartnerships and individuals who have purchased the property of concerns which have been convicted of violating the anti-trust laws of Texas must make sworn reports of present ownership, owners of mortgages, names of shareholders, holders of copartnership certificates, etc. The bill is said to be aimed at the properties formerly owned by the Waters-Pierce Oil Company, Security Oil Company, and Navarro Refining Company.

Senator Mayfield made a full explanation of the bill, in line with the statement which gave to the press at the time of its introduction.

The prohibition senators have organized to prevent any measures save local bills from being considered until the liquor regulation bills and certain other measures which they regard as important have been disposed of.

Senator Hudspeth will introduce a congressional redistricting bill this week. It will merely be a skeleton to be built upon by the committee.

Sign Dry Resolution.

Austin, Tex.—The joint resolution submitting to a vote of the people the proposed constitutional amendment prescribing statewide prohibition was signed by the presiding officers of both branches of the legislature Saturday and was approved by Governor Colquitt.

In the senate the signing of the resolution was attended with little ceremony. When the measure came to him, President Pro Tem Hudspeth, who is an uncompromising anti-prohibitionist, said: "I take pleasure in signing it, and I take pleasure in presenting this pen to the senator from Cooke."

He handed the pen over to Senator Cofer, who, as chairman of the prohibition caucus, led the fight for the measure in the senate.

"I take pleasure in dedicating this pen to the womanhood and childhood of Texas," said Senator Cofer.

The pen was one of the ordinary, everyday sort, used in the senate.

Governor Colquitt promptly approved the resolution when it reached him and sent it on to the secretary of state. There was no other person present when he signed the resolution, and as he afterward remarked he dedicated the pen to hard and continuous work.

The governor also approved the sheep scab bill.

Pass Texarkana Charter Bill.

Austin, Tex.—The Texarkana charter bill was again passed by the senate, and the act will go to the governor once more as soon as it has been enrolled.

It contains the recall provision, notwithstanding Governor Colquitt's objection. He will veto it, and an effort will be made to pass it over his head.

Prepared to sacrifice the commission charter rather than accept it without the recall, and yet desiring legislation for the building of a viaduct, the Texarkana people have removed the viaduct matter from the present bill. They will put that through in another bill, so that Texarkana may have a new viaduct, although it may not get a new charter.

Texas Senate Proceedings.

Austin, Tex.—Among the petitions read in the senate Saturday were a number from citizens of Walker County favoring the consolidation of the Texas Central Railway with the Missouri, Kansas & Texas.

Special order was Weinert's suspended sentence bill, which he called up and explained at the request of Lattimore, saying the prison reform law in a way contemplated the indefinite or indeterminate sentence, a thing that was necessary for true reform, and that his bill was but a step in that direction.

Where sentence is suspended, there is to be no appeal and the suspension lasts during good behavior and after the court has heard evidence of good character of the defendant heretofore.

Governor Approves Bills.

Austin, Tex.—Governor Colquitt on Saturday approved the following bills:

Senate bill No. 96, authorizing certain repairs for the North Texas Insane Asylum.

House bill No. 139, creating the independent school district of Deport in Lamar and Red River counties.

Senate bill No. 88, creating the independent school district of Electra, Wichita County.

House bill No. 89, Jasper County court law.

Texas House Proceedings.

Austin, Tex.—The Porter-Buchanan bill establishing a state sanitarium for tuberculosis patients was taken up on Saturday in the house.

Mr. Nichols of Hunt offered an amendment making residence in Texas for five years requisite for admission into the sanitarium.

The amendment was tabled after Mr. Hamilton of Childress, Messrs. Buchanan and Brown of Tarrant had spoken in opposition to it, both on humane and constitutional grounds. They said it would be inhumane to permit consumptives to die merely because they had not been in Texas five years, and, moreover, that the amendment would probably make the bill unconstitutional.

Mr. Hillyer offered an amendment requiring two years' residence; Mr. Kennedy a substitute making it three years.

Mr. Robertson of Bell spoke for a three-year residence requirement, saying that without it Texas would not be overrun with the afflicted who would flock here from other states. He wanted to take care of Texas consumptives first.

Mr. Williams of Dallas argued along the same line, saying it would take every cent the state could raise for this purpose to take care of Texas consumptives. Consumptives from other states could pay if they wished to come to this institution. He thought the state might as well "open a soup-house and invite the vagabonds from all the other states to come down and eat soup with us."

The Cotton Belt and Santa Fe consolidation bills were reported favorably by the house committee on common carriers, with minority unfavorable reports by Messrs. Crisp and Byrne, after a hearing which lasted all the afternoon.

The railroad commission appeared before the committee in opposition to the bills, Messrs. Mayfield and Williams speaking briefly. Mr. Wortham did not address the committee, but the views of his colleagues were stated to be the unanimous opinion of the commission.

The first bill permits the Cotton Belt to purchase the Stephenville, North & South Texas Railway, running forty-two miles from Hamilton to Stephenville, and the East Texas Railroad, running thirty miles from Kennard to Lufkin. The Santa Fe bill permits that road to acquire the eighteen-mile line from Miles to Paint Rock and the forty-two-mile line from San Angelo to Sterling City.

On the last bill Messrs. Crisp and Byrne offered an amendment providing that the consolidation could not be made until the Santa Fe had built an extension from Somerville to Aransas Pass, by way of Smithville and Cuero, which amendment was lost.

The Humphrey Bill.

The Humphrey bill preventing reversals upon immaterial errors was reported unfavorably by house committee on reforms in civil and criminal procedure, Mr. Humphrey giving notice of a favorable minority report.

Mr. Humphrey expects to make an earnest fight upon the floor for the passage of this bill and believes a proper understanding of its merits will give it a sufficient number of votes.

Pure Food Legislation.

House committee on public health reported favorably the White-Hubbard bill placing foods or drinks containing drugs not specifically mentioned in the pure food law under the operation of that law, and requiring the display of placards announcing the drugs contained in such food or drinks in three-inch letters upon placards not less than twenty by thirty inches in size.

The house committee on common carriers, Standifer chairman, by a unanimous unfavorable vote killed the Baker of Hood bill prohibiting railway companies from making exclusive contracts with any one person or firm for the soliciting of transfers upon their trains and depot property.

U. S. TROOPS HAVE CASILLAS

THE REBEL LEADER TRIED TO CROSS RIO GRANDE.

General Navarro Proceeds Slowly, Fearing Mines Under Tracks and Bridges—Repairing Roads.

El Paso, Tex.—Jefe Politico, Martinez's public reception to General Navarro, set for Sunday, was indefinitely postponed, as General Navarro did not arrive. An insurrecto courier definitely located the federal leader at a lake a few miles southwest of Ahumada, a station on the Mexican Central about eighty miles south.

The insurrecto forces are scattered between Ahumada and Juarez, wherever they can find pasture and water. The country for a hundred miles south is practically a desert.

Manuel Casillas, probably the best educated of the rebel leaders, and who has been in El Paso at a council of war, for three days, was captured by American soldiers at Ysleta, Sunday. Casillas was trying to get across the river to join his command. He carried a rifle in violation of the neutrality laws and was taken into custody.

Navarro fearing mines under the tracks or bridges, is said to be proceeding at a snail's pace. The track is inspected ahead of the train, which, together with the repairs he is compelled to make, renders his advance a tedious one.

A letter received by the local junta from a sympathizer at Shafter, Tex., purported to show that the federals had not forsaken the practice of executing the defenseless.

The letter says that one Tom Perrien, a river guard, saw the recent fight at Mulata, and that four very old men were taken out and shot although unarmed and almost helpless.

"One of them," says the letter, "was partly blind and paralyzed and was 75 years old; another was 80 years old."

The insurrecto board of strategy held a meeting at Saragosa, on the Mexican side, twelve miles east of El Paso, Sunday. Their plans were not divulged. Newspaper men penetrated the desert thirty miles south of Juarez without catching sight of troops on either side.

Capture of Casillas.

El Paso, Tex.—Sunday has been full of rumors of fights between the insurrecto bands under Orozco and Blanco and the command of General Navarro, which is making its way northward repairing the Mexican Central railroad as it comes. But they are mere rumors and probably have no foundations in fact. The most important happening and probably the only one worth mentioning was the capture near Ysleta about noon Sunday of the insurrecto General Martin Casillas by Lieutenant W. B. Riezenhausen and Sergeant Hart of Troop M, Fourth United States Cavalry. General Casillas was on the American side of the river and was armed with a new Winchester rifle and 150 rounds of ammunition and carried dispatches from Abram Gonzales, the insurrecto governor of Chihuahua, whose headquarters are in El Paso, to Orozco, Blanco, Soto and Juan Garcia. He was brought to El Paso and lodged in the county jail. Nobody knows just where Navarro is. Juarez officials arranged for his reception, but he failed to arrive. It is believed that he is preparing a surprise for the insurrectos.

Santa Fe Brings in Well.

Snyder, Tex.—The Santa Fe Railroad people have within the last few days brought in and tested a well eighty feet deep on the right of way at the depot site in the north part of Snyder, and find that it produces 156 gallons of pure water a minute. The Santa Fe now has a track completed through Snyder, and switches are now being built.

New Gin at Poth.

Floresville, Tex.—Work on the new gin at Poth, a prosperous little German town about seven miles from Floresville, has begun. The gin will be equipped with all the latest machinery and conveniences. This makes two gins at Poth, but owing to the fact that several hundred acres of new land will be put in cultivation this year a busy ginning season is looked for.

Now Flows 8,000 Barrels.

Markham, Tex.—The Hardy Oil Company well reported Saturday as doing 4,500 barrels has steadily increased in flow and is now estimated to be flowing 8,000 barrels and is a topnotcher in the field. Several other wells are expected to come in within a few days.

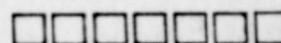

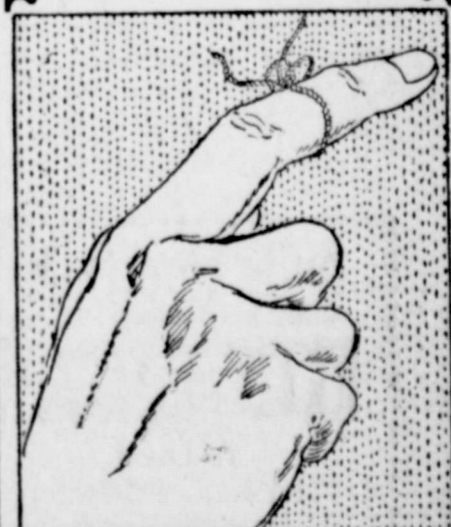

Legislative Letter

Austin, Texas, Feb. 13.—The political thermometer has been at boiling heat during the past week. Both Pros and Antis tried to drive a tandem with the Bailey issue and that of their own and they got the Senate in a tangle and there was some linen not intended for the laundry washed out on the floor of the Senate and as a result some of the Senators quit the caucuses and are now plowing with their own heifers. The upshot of the whole affair was that the Senators very generously returned to Lieutenant Gov. Davidson the power to appoint committees which was wrested from him a few days ago. There is nothing permanent around the capital except changes and they come with unerring frequency. The trouble all came up over the appointment of the members of Redistricting Committee which has in charge the carving out of congressional districts for the next decade. This committee holds in the hollow of its hand the political destinies of many congressional aspirants.

The prohibition amendment to the Constitution has passed both Houses with practically no opposition and the Governor is committed to submission and on July 22nd, every voter in Texas will have the privilege of expressing himself on the question.

The new Governor is busy untying the hard knots bequeathed to him by the old administration. The policies of the old and the new administrations were brought together with a clash that was heard around the world last week when Governor Colquitt requested the Attorney General to cancel the instructions issued by Ex-Governor Campbell just before retiring from office to place all railroads in the hands of Receivers. We need more railroads and fewer railroad Receivers in Texas. Then there is the tax system that has degenerated to the point where inequalities can no longer be endured and revision is always a disagreeable task. Construction of independent railroads lines is at a standstill since the passage of the I. & G. N. Bill and the construction gangs are tied up awaiting the signal from the legislature; capital has felt the cold touch of fear and is looking out from its hiding place awaiting the fair unfolding of springtime. The new administration is carrying out the demands of the Democratic Platform by throwing out the life lines to prosperity and the people are with the Governor in his efforts to upbuild the material interests of their state. The 32nd Legislature is trying to put brick and mortar together and if some of the measures now before the body are enacted into law, Texas will be turned into a construction camp.

a bill in the Upper House to establish a Public Highway Department and it is understood that the Governor is in favor of state encouragement of road building. Representative Terrell of Bexar has a measure amending the I. & G. N. Bill so that railroad construction can continue and there are numerous railroad consolidation bills which means better railroads for the people. There has been a strong delegation of Westerners from along the line of the Texas Central pleading for the lease of that line to the Katy; the people affected by the lease are anxious for it; there are no constitutional inhibitions against it and no sound reasons have been advanced against the consolidation. Transportation is our most important problem in Texas.

The signs now in the political skies indicate that there will be a prolonged session. Some of the representatives have labored with the Governor to call a special session but it is understood that he has so far refused to do so; the prospects of working for \$2.00 per day don't appeal to the lawmakers and some of them are beginning to wish they had made hay while the sun was shining. There is considerable work to do on the Appropriation Bill and the redistricting of the state into new Congressional, State Senatorial and Representative Districts will require considerable time and some log rolling as well. Then there are some who feel that they must rock the cradle of liberty by passing more laws; custom, you know, meets some people at the cradle and leaves them at the grave, but placing laws on the statute book of Texas is not an easy task at the present time.

NATIONAL, STATE, FOREIGN, OF INTEREST TO READERS.

THE WHOLE WEEK'S DOINGS

Short Mention of Interesting Happenings From Day to Day Throughout the World.

WASHINGTON.

In the senate Saturday the Dallas postoffice site bill was called up by Senator Culberson and passed without opposition. The bill appropriates \$100,000 for the purchase of a new site or the enlargement of the present one.

The house committee on fisheries reported favorably Mr. McGuire's bill appropriating \$25,000 for a fish hatchery for Oklahoma — preferably in Payne County.

The house committee on merchant marine and fisheries reported favorably Representative Sheppard's bill for a fish hatchery at Paris, to cost not exceeding \$25,000.

Without debate or amendment the joint resolution locating the 1915 Panama Canal exposition at San Francisco passed the senate Saturday.

The house bill providing \$500,000 a year for the erection of buildings for American embassies and consulates in foreign countries was passed over a protest Saturday. The bill was passed over a protest by Senator Clapp.

Without a word of protest from New Mexico, the house of representatives Saturday adopted unanimously the joint resolution offered in the senate by Senator Culberson and in the house by Representative Stevens, recognizing and accepting on the part of the United States the existing boundary line between the state of Texas and the territory of New Mexico. This will bar New Mexico, when it comes a state, from attempting to declare the true 103 meridian boundary between itself and Texas.

Personal recollections of Abraham Lincoln were related by Speaker Cannon Saturday at a gathering in memory of the martyred president. He refuted the charge that Lincoln was not a Christian or a God-fearing man. "The religion of Lincoln," said Mr. Cannon, "was not affiliated with any church, but nevertheless he was a religious man, doing all that he did for his country in preserving the union in the trust and fear of God. I know of no love for humanity that equaled that of Lincoln save that of the master. Had God failed to make such a man as Lincoln, the union would have perished and the country died of dry rot."

Magazine publishers will have to pay a rate of 4c a pound on the advertising sections of periodicals carried as second-class mail if an amendment to the postoffice appropriation bill adopted by the senate committee on postoffices and post roads Friday is accepted by congress. Senator Penrose late in the day reported the bill to the senate.

DOMESTIC.

George S. Griscom Jr., who has achieved much notoriety in connection with the disappearance of Miss Dorothy Arnold of New York, and who came to Atlantic City, declared Sunday that he hopes to be able to marry Miss Arnold. He added that he believes the young lady is alive, but says he absolutely does not know her whereabouts.

Mr. Herman T. Keller Sr., for thirty years a prominent business man of Houston and one of the best known citizens, died on Sunday.

For the purpose of facilitating the movement of interurban cars over a maze of railroad tracks and across a busy public road construction was commenced on Saturday by the Stone-Webster Engineering Corporation on a re-inforced concrete viaduct just outside the eastern limits of the city of Houston. This viaduct will be 1,900 feet in length, it will support a single line of track for the use of the Alveston-Houston interurban cars and will do much to shorten the running time of the interurban cars between the two cities.

Mrs. Zeñalda Samuels, mother of Jesse and Frank James, the ex-bandits of Missouri, died in the Pullman car of a Frisco passenger train twenty miles from Oklahoma City Friday. Mrs. Samuels had spent the past two months visiting her son, Frank James, who resides on a farm near Fletcher, Ok. She and her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Frank James, were en route to Kansas City to visit Mrs. Samuels' grandson, Jesse James, Jr.

North, south, east and west, the state of Texas has been seemingly drenched by one of the most generous rainfalls that has visited the Southwest in many months. The rain is so widespread as to fall very little short of statewide in its reach. Added to the precipitation that came Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, the fall of Friday and Friday night will undoubtedly give not only a splendid season in the ground for all kinds of farming operations, replenish thousands of stock water tanks and pools, but will certainly start many streams running that have not run in months.

Notice of receipt of a warrant for \$10,000 for a site for a new postoffice for Marshall, Texas, was received on Saturday. The site will cost \$14,000, citizens paying \$4,000.

Texas sheep men, favoring the Texas bounty bill, have prepared statistics showing that if the wolves were destroyed and the sheep industry encouraged Texas could easily increase its sheep production to 35,000,000 to 45,000,000 and these immense herds would produce annually \$70,000,000 to \$100,000,000 in wool. The state now has 1,400,000 sheep, producing \$3,000,000 worth of wool. It is claimed the sheep could be raised on land which is now too arid for any other use.

The United States circuit court of appeals in a decision handed down Friday uphold the constitutionality of the Jim Crow law of Oklahoma. The opinion was written by Judge Adams and concurred in by Judge Hook. Judge Sanborn, presiding judge of the court, dissented. The law requires railroads to have separate cars for whites and negroes and also attendant accommodations separate, though equal.

A majority opinion of the state supreme court, delivered by Justice Williams, and concurred in by Chief Justice Turner and Justice Hayes regarding the location of the seat of government permanently in Oklahoma City, agreeable to terms of an act passed by the legislature in special session last December, was sustained. Dissenting opinions were delivered by Justice Kane and Justice Dunn, the former holding that the term imposed by the congress and accepted by the constitutional convention, requiring the state capital to be kept in Guthrie until after 1913, was binding, while Justice Dunn, without passing upon the question of whether the people could remove the embargo by a vote, held that the legislature was without power to do so.

Attorney General Lightfoot made it plain Friday that he will do nothing with the Missouri, Kansas & Texas and International & Great Northern forfeiture matters and other lines of investigation until the legislature gives him funds independent of gubernatorial strings. He also says he has been forced to continue all the land suits for the same reason.

The death of Judge Rufus Y. King, president of the Texas Terry Rangers' Association, which occurred in Belton removed an interesting and patriotic figure in the history of Texas. Deceased came to Belton from Lee County in 1877 and had resided there ever since. He was an active preacher of the Gospel thirty years ago at Giddings, abandoning the ministry for the law, having served two terms as county judge of Lee County. In 1890 he was elected to represent Bell County in the legislature. Governor Sayers appointed him superintendent of the Confederate Home at Austin, and his administration was a successful one.

FOREIGN.

In a rescript issued Saturday the emperor of Japan directs attention to the importance of adapting the government's policy to the changed economic conditions of the time, and announces the donation of \$750,000 to the relief of the poor who are unable to otherwise receive adequate medical attention.

An unsuccessful attempt on the life of Alejandro Lerroux, deputy and chief of the republicans in Barcelona, was made Saturday. Five shots were fired at him by a group on the sidewalk, but he was not hit. Three persons were arrested.

The body of T. Bogojavlensky, Russian consul general at Ispahan since 1908, was discovered in a well on the grounds of the consulate at Teheran Saturday. The official had been drowned, and foul play is suggested, though there was no evidence of crime.

In pursuance of Winston Spencer Churchill's aspirations for a reform in the prison system in England, the home office announces the creation of a new body, to be aided by the state, which shall devote itself to the reclamation of discharged prisoners. The central idea of this reform is the suspension of police supervision during the good behavior of ex-convicts.

An attack was made on a Mexican International freight train near Agua Naval, Mexico, Friday by the band which sacked Matamoros. The engineer refused to stop and the train ran the gauntlet of the rebels fire.

HANDY IN PRESERVING TIME

Device That Not Only Protects the Hands, but is of Value in Many Other Respects.

A useful article for housewives who do their own preserving is the jar-holder, designed by an Iowa man. It will not only keep the jars from breaking and allow them to cool quickly, but will save the person who handles them from burning her hands. There is a circular metal frame with holes in it to permit the tops of jars to pass through. Arms with their ends bent down extend out from this frame and fit over the rim of a basin



or other large pan, and one of these arms is adjustable so that it can be screwed tight to hold the whole contrivance firmly in position. The jars can be placed in the basin and the framework drawn over them and screwed fast. This leaves space between each jar so that they may cool quickly, where otherwise they stand close together, and each helps the other retain the heat. Then the jars are filled with the preserving mixture, whatever it may be, the lids screwed on and the basin removed to a convenient place till the preserves cool.

TAKES STAIN FROM MAHOGANY

Disfiguring Spots May Easily Be Removed, Though the Operation Requires Carefulness.

For the thumb mark that so often disfigures mahogany, or that blurred blue haze which clouds its polish there is a simple remedy which requires only a deft hand and a bit of courage. A soft rag or flannel, dampened with alcohol, must be passed quickly and lightly over the part. Water stains and liquor spots will disappear immediately. The amateur refinisher, however, must heed the warning that the work be done with great rapidity and absolute confidence in oneself. To slacken the wipe of the rag on the surface means that the polish will be roughened, and made to look streaked, or as if glue had been spilled, and a furniture expert will have to be called in to lend his skill toward bringing back the smooth mirror-like surface once again. In old time a wax polish was customary, and the servants worked with a will over every piece, so that their tables and chairs would outshine those of the next big house. A dull finish was unheard of, and would have been scorned as showing laziness in the household, besides being a dust revealer, for even a fleck shows on unpolished furniture most plainly.

Cold Meat Relish.

Take any cold meat cut into small bits and put a layer in a baking dish, then add a layer of sliced onions, one of tomatoes, more meat, onions and tomatoes. Fill dish in order given, season with salt and pepper, moisten with gravy or stock. Make a crust for top and bake one hour. First half hour cover with a plate then uncover to make a rich brown.

Irish Hash.

Take cold meat, put through grinder, and one small onion (if liked), mix this with gravy, season with salt and pepper, do not make too soft with gravy. Should be "about the same as mince-meat." Put on platter and mashed potatoes around the sides first, then over top. Garnish with hard boiled eggs and lettuce. This is most delicious, if correctly made. If you don't have any left over gravy put a piece of butter in frying pan and a spoonful of flour, brown, and add water to make thick gravy.

To Whiten Clothes.

When your white waists, children's dresses or other white goods become yellow and soiled, put them in a stone jar and cover with sour buttermilk; let stand a few days, keeping them under the milk, then rinse out milk and wash in the usual way. They will be as white as new.

Use of Lime in Cellar.

A box of lime in an out-of-the-way corner of the cellar helps to keep the atmosphere dry and pure.

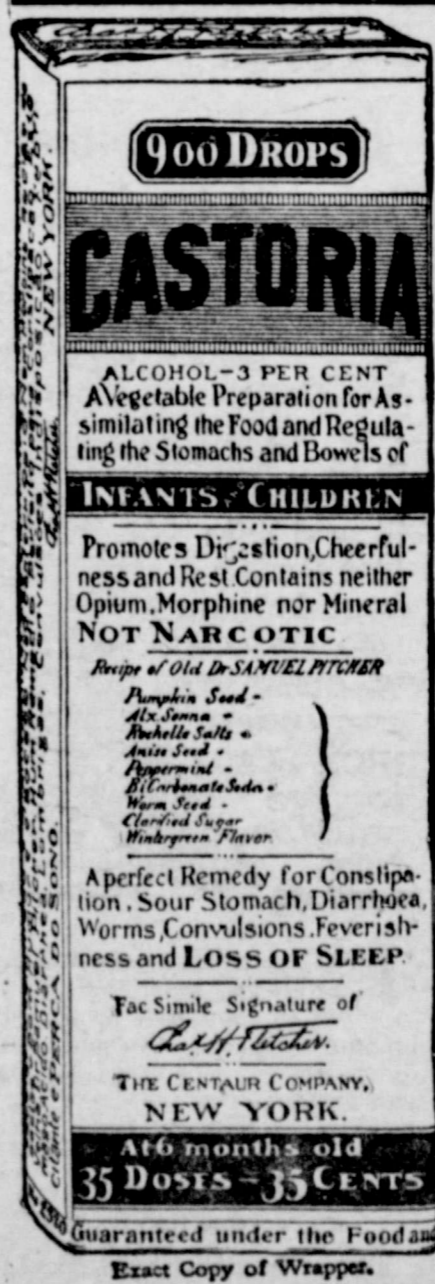

VALUE OF BEET PULP

Compares Favorably With Bran as Food for Cows.

Mixed With Refuse Molasses It Enhances in Worth for Feeding Purposes—Should Be Fed in Large Quantities.

(By C. H. ALVORD, Professor of Agriculture, A. and M. College of Texas.)

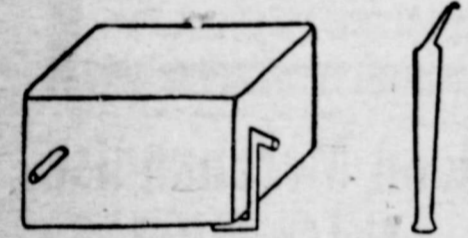
Dried beet pulp compares favorably with wheat bran as a food for dairy cows. Experiments seem to indicate that its feeding value is about two-thirds that of the bran. It should not be considered a grain, as it contains 17 per cent. of crude fiber while wheat bran contains only 9 per cent. of crude fiber and corn chops 1.9 per cent. The New Jersey experiment station fed dried beet pulp nine pounds, mixed hay ten pounds and rich concentrates 10.5 pounds to one lot of cows, and corn silage 45 pounds, mixed hay five pounds and rich concentrates 10.5 pounds to another lot. The daily milk yield was increased 3.4 pounds, or 11 per cent., and the fat in the milk .014, or about nine per cent., in the production of each cow. When the nine pounds of pulp and five pounds of hay replaced 45 pounds of corn silage, figuring the silage at \$3 per ton, the dried beet pulp would have a value of \$15 per ton, or figuring wheat bran at \$24, the beet pulp would have a value of \$16 per ton.

In some instances refuse molasses is mixed with the pulp and dried, which makes it more valuable for feeding purposes. At the Wisconsin station it was found that where three pounds of dried molasses beet pulp was fed against three pounds of wheat bran the milk production was increased 12 per cent. This molasses beet pulp cannot be fed in very large quantities, as it has a tendency to produce a looseness of the bowels. On account of the relatively low amount of protein in this feed it is essential that it be mixed with cotton seed meal, and about three parts by weight of the beet pulp to one of cotton seed meal. I do not know the price of this by-product, but I am inclined to believe that the expense of long shipment by freight would increase its cost beyond the possibility of profitable use in this state.

HIVE TOOL FOR BEEKEEPER

File Flattened at One End and Hook Bent at Other Makes Handy Device for Opening Frames.

The illustration shows a hive tool which, with us, gives excellent satisfaction. It is merely a file with one end flattened and the other end bent at an angle and a hook formed at the

point. The hook is a boon in getting out frames and division boards which are stuck fast with propolis. The flattened end is used for scraping, prying covers, breaking apart hive bodies and supers, etc. The weight of the file makes it a good hammer for driving small nails.

Feeding Apples.

Apples have a special feeding value above that indicated by analysis. While they are largely water, still to give variety and succulence to the ration their worth cannot be estimated, as it depends both upon the individual and the ration being fed. Pumpkins and squashes have much the same value.

Peanut Oil Production.

Investigations and tests of the machinery required in the manufacture of oil from peanuts have been undertaken, and both oil-mill owners and farmers in the boll-weevil districts of Louisiana and Texas, where the soil conditions are favorable to the peanut, have been encouraged to undertake extensive experiments in peanut-oil production.

Loosening a Wagon Nut.

When a wagon wheel nut has become so set that it does not yield readily to the wrench, center a stream of hot water in the nut from the spout of a tea kettle. In a few minutes the nut may be turned off with the fingers.

Cloverseed Scarce.

Cloverseed is extremely scarce this year and prices are steadily advancing. It is believed that the price will be practically prohibitive by seeding time next spring.

FORK AND SHOVEL COMBINED

Scoop Detachably Connected and Has Grooves for Tines—Handy Implement on Any Farm.

A combination implement that is handy for farm and stable use has been designed by a man in the state of Washington. It is a fork and shovel combined, and its advantage is that it takes up no more room than one of these tools and can quickly be turned from one into the other. The basic implement is a fork, and the shovel portion is adjustably connected. In the head of the scoop are holes through which the tines of the fork pass when the scoop is to be attached, and across

the bottom is a metal strip with a series of longitudinal grooves, through which the tines also pass and which serves to hold the shovel in position. The usefulness of such a tool can readily be understood. In a case where a man has both shoveling and forking to do, as around a barnyard, he can accomplish the work by a quick transformation of this device instead of having to go and get a different implement every once in a while.

CHARACTERISTICS OF A MULE

Smartest Animal of Horse Kind on Earth and Much Like Man in That Respect.

A mule is the smartest animal of the horse kind on earth. A mule is very much like a man in that respect, says a writer in the Stockman. He has all kinds of good sense, and if you treat him right he will act right, and if you do not he will be a good deal of a kicker. There is only one difference that I can see in that respect. You take men in our country and they are not, as a general thing, much enamored of their stepmothers, but you can take a mule and get him accustomed to his stepmother and he will go through fire to follow this mare anywhere. They are easily handled in that respect. Put a mule with a gray mare with a bell on her, and you can handle the mule any way you want to. Put him in a pasture with two wires around it and he will stay there, unless he has been spoiled. No, sir; a mule is a very sensitive animal, and an intelligent animal. He is no fool, by any means.

Corn Makes the Best Silage.

Silage has been produced in this country for a comparatively short time, but its place is firmly established as an adjunct to the dairy. It provides a cheap, succulent food of uniform quality and is easily handled and fed. There has been a great deal of experimental work with silage, several crops having been used, such as clover, alfalfa, soy beans, sorghum and corn. Crops that may be easily preserved, such as hay and clover, are better cured, all things considered, than siloed. Corn is easily the first as a plant for the silo. Large quantities may be grown on a small area of land, and it makes a silage possessing a delightful aroma.

Silo Jottings.

Do not have your staves beveled or tongued and grooved. The decay of the stave will be less and hoops may be heightened to meet it. A continuous door of two boardwidths, breaking joints, can be opened at any point.

A silo empty in June can be filled with winter rye and winter wheat to last till corn comes.

The corn should be the entire plant, well advanced in maturity up to its glazing period. It is one of the cheapest ways that you can widen your ration and one of the most economic. Of course some fill the silo with what is left from the corn factory.

Banner Cotton State.

Oklahoma is the banner cotton state of the year, approximately a million bales being the harvest. This means a valuation of \$75,000,000 from the harvest, and if the value of the seed is included \$86,000,000 is the amount of money this year's cotton crop is worth to the new commonwealth.

Hats for Matrons



IN SPITE of all the jibes flung at womankind for her fickleness as to fashions in headwear, there are some sorts of hats that are always worn and always in style, or able to defy the passing fads of the moment. Among them are the small toques designed for elderly matrons and others who affect inconspicuous and good styles, the walking hat, dear to all women, and the big picture hat, with broad brim of graceful flowing lines which is the rose in the rosebud garden of hats every season. All the styles vary a little from time to time, but hardly enough to identify themselves as belonging to a certain year.

Three pretty and becoming hats for matrons are pictured here suitable to almost any season. The variation of the English walking hat, with brim faced with velvet, and turning up at the left, is finished with a very ample drapery of silk. The arrangement of this drapery gives the impression of a shape turned up at both sides, as in the regulation walking shape. Such a hat needs no additional trimming, but may be adapted to young wearers by the addition of a smart feather, or it may be elaborated for anyone by a tuft of ostrich half plumes. One must look far for a more elegant hat or a model so universally becoming. Hats of this character require the work of an experienced milliner; nothing short of perfection in draping and in finish is permissible in them. Facings must fit; trimmings must be placed by a practiced eye, otherwise the hat is a dismal failure and impossible.

The toque of silk or half braid shown in the second figure is easier to accomplish. It is made on a light wire frame which has an ample head size. The frame is covered with chiffon and faced with maline shirred on



The coronet is covered with ruffles of the braid and the crown is made by puffing a drapery of braid over it.

Black satin ribbon three inches wide is puffed to the toque brim from the back to a point at the middle of the left brim. Here a ribbon plume is set made by sewing short loops to a wire support. Two jet ornaments or pins fasten the plume to the hat, and add a pretty touch of brilliance to the lustrous surface of the ribbon. The hat is good in any dark or rich color, but is at its best in black. The materials of which it is made must be excellent in quality.

A hat with drooping brim and large crown, of black hair braid, is made strictly a mode of the season, but, as it is patterned after the Corday hat, it is not likely to ever be out of style. It is an elegant bit of millinery, trimmed with ropes of Tuscan straw and an applique of leaves made of black satin forming a close set wreath. One or two plumes mounted at the side, complete a hat to be proud of.

GIVE COMFORT IN BOUDOIR

Dainty Bedroom Slippers Should Be a Standard Article for Everyday Use.

A dainty pair of bedroom slippers may be made from two lapped sections of shirred three-inch ribbon (the length, of course, depending on the size of the foot) attached across the front of a lamb's-wool sole. This forms the toe and instep portion.

The sides and back of the slipper are formed of a straight band of ribbon, lined with satin and sewed to the sole. If desired, it can be stiffened with bristol board. Flowered taffeta ribbon is best for this purpose, but it should not be too flimsy.

A drawstring passed through the upper edge of the sides may be tied in a bow in front, or the upper edge may be finished at the sides and back by a two-inch wide portion lined with the satin in a contrasting cover portion, turned down like a collar and caught by a few stitches or a baby ribbon rosette.

Bedroom Wall Papers.

Some of the cut-out borders are charming used with simple, almost plain, side walls, and chintz or cretonne curtains carrying out the design of the border. Then again, if the wall spaces are large, it is sometimes interesting to divide them up into panels, either with simple ribbon or flower borders or with floral crowns and borders similar to the one illustrated. The paneled rooms, however, have the disadvantage of seeming to require a little more elaborate furnishing than those in which the walls are treated simply. They seem to demand Sheraton, Heppelwhite, or Adams furniture.—Harper's Bazar.

Cretonne Shades.

Putting Too Much Responsibility on the Older Ones is Not Entirely Fair.

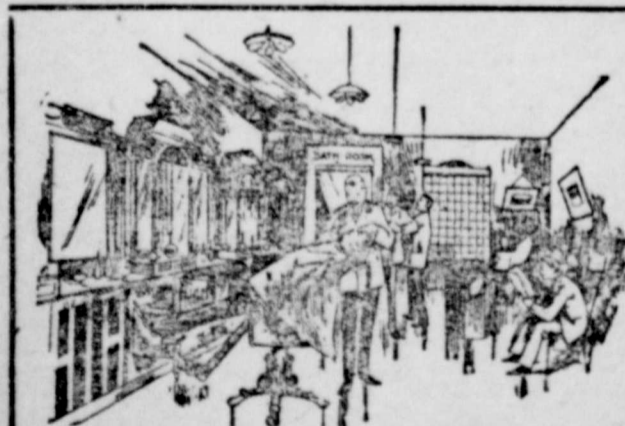
