REBELS MENACE CHIHUAHUA

OZCO READY TO TAKE CITY IF
PEACE IS DELAYED.

Taft Will Urge Congress to Recognize
Rebels if Diaz Does Not Institute
Reforms.

San Antonio, Texas.—The claim of the rebel junta that General Pascual Orozco is at the head of an army numbering 1200 men at San Andres, thirty-five miles from the city of Chihuahua, waiting to take the city if peace negotiations are not undertaken at once, and the assertion of Juan Sanchez Azcona that President Taft's message to the special session of congress would recognize the rebels as belligerents were the important developments.

Azcona arrived from Washington Saturday. He came as the representative of Dr. Vasquez Gomez, head of the Washington City junta, to confer with the Maderos. The party met as friends, and there is no indication of any friction developing in regard to who is to treat for peace. Azcona said that the true situation in Mexico had been explained to President Taft, and that if the message of President Diaz to the Mexican congress did not meet his approval the recognition of the belligerency of the rebels would be recommended to congress.

The rebels are now reported to be in desperate straits on account of the lack of ammunition. Since the border patrol was strengthened it has been almost impossible to get ammunition across the border. Two or three sharp engagements have taken place since then, and this has greatly depleted the stock of ammunition in the hands of the men. It is stated that there is in the entire camp of Madero not more than enough ammunition to carry the rebels through one hard battle. That is given as the reason for the cessation of hostilities. The present supply of ammunition is being held in reserve for the final attempt to invest Chihuahua in case President Diaz does not make overtures.

If the rebels fail in that, the general belief prevails that the insurrection will end of itself, for the men cannot continue to fight without munitions of war. That such a condition exists is emphatically denied by the insurgent leaders here, who state that the rebels are in a position to hold out indefinitely.

Mr. Azcona, in an interview, said he desired it emphatically understood the rebels were not suing for peace. "Understand," said Mr. Azcona, "the insurgents are not suing for peace. Neither will we accept peace under any cloak of amnesty, for that would imply a pardon for the insurgents. We are not asking any pardon for having taken up arms in behalf of our rights guaranteed under the constitution. Neither do we want any promises without performances. President Diaz has been noted for that ever since he climbed into power by a revolution ostensibly started to secure constitutional rights. We would ask some such guarantee from President Diaz as to put some of our men in the cabinet in event he stays in power, which is not at all likely."

Board of Directors Elected.

Hammond.—At the annual meeting of stockholders of the Hammond State Bank, the following board of directors were elected for the ensuing year: R. Lillie, B. M. Morrison, Jacob Wolf, C. W. Eubanks, T. W. Cate, R. E. June, C. E. Brakenridge, W. E. Libby and O. C. Pantall. R. Lillie, B. M. Morrison and E. Richardson were re-elected president, vice-president and cashier respectively.

Harlingen Cabbage Shipments.

Harlingen, Texas.—Harlingen has broken all records this week in the shipment of vegetables. Over thirty cars of cabbage have gone out, besides several cars of potatoes and onions, and express shipments of smaller truck. The good price of cabbage has brought out everything that was ready. Strawberries are all picked. Cotton is looking fine and a large yield is expected.

Sweet Potatoes by Carloads.

Crowley.—The location in Acadia Parish of a buyer who will handle sweet potatoes in carload lots has given a powerful impetus to the sweet potato industry in this parish, and the acreage, which has been increasing in recent years, will be very large next year. Ernest T. Lovell, manager of the Lovell farm, will plant sixty acres of yams, and a number of large farmers will plant acreages almost as large.

Harlingen's New School.

Harlingen, Texas.—Ground has been cleared for the large new \$40,000 school building to be erected. Bids for the work are being received daily and none will be received after the 15th of April, when the work will be let to the best bidder.
