Newsy Letter

Milwaukee, Wis., The Mes. senger comes to our home every week and it is read first and then the other papers but first the Messenger.

I noticed someone answered "Big Foot's" question about buying 100 head of stock with \$100. Next time I will ask him to give us an easy one. We got started to work on that at our home one morning before breakfast and we had a late breakfast, our boy was tardy at school and I missed the 9:35 train but we got it worked out and proven and we were happy, to think we could not be stalled on an example and was going to send the answer but here was someone ahead of us.

I have often wondered what became of the railroad rails that are replaced by new rails and a few days ago I learned where quite a few car loads go each day. I was at Kenosha, Wis., and saw them unloading railroad rails at a factory of some kind, so I investigated and this is what I saw. The flat cars loaded with old rails were switched in under an electric crane. A man sat up in a little house or cab that was attached to this traveling crane. He would run up just over the car of rails and let the double magnet down about the middle of the car and these railroad rails would stick to that magnet just like tacks will stick to a toy magnet. He would pick up four or five rails at a time, carry them over here to a saw and they were sawed up into lengths about 12 feet long. Now, these pieces 12 feet long were put into a furnace, heated with gas and made nearly white hot. They were brought out end ways at a little door at one side of this furnace. These pieces were then run between big steel rollers that split them from end to end into three pieces; the top of the rail, then the thin middle of the rail, then the bottom. You can not sell your land Now, there were three pieces after the rail came from these rollers and this operation of ripping or cutting this 12 foot exceed 1.4 minute. Now these three strips were fed through other rollers that squeezed them down into longer and thinner shapes. These rollers that rolled these strips of iron were running horizontal and as these strips of red hot iron came thru Crockett, : : : Texas a man would grab the end with around and start it through an-

other until it was finally rolled down to the desired size and From Albert Tyer shape. They were making some strips of the middle part of the rail. These strips were about 1-8 inch thick and 1 1-2 in. wide and would be 100 or 125 feet long. The upper and lower part of the rail they were making other shaped pieces. It was a sight well worth seeing as well as to see this magnet pick up four or five rails at one time. When he would get to where he wanted to put them he would turn on a current of electricity and they would drop.

The farmers here have not finished planting corn. Some will not finish for a week or more. I saw them flat breaking corn land yesterday-they never bed their corn land hereit is always "flat broke" and planted and cultivated flat throughout the year.

A TRAGIC DEATH

John Cunningham, a young man living in the San Pedro community, met a tragical and accidental death Monday morning about 11 o'clock, caused by the discharge of a shot gun. His wife had come to Grapeland to shop and only his mother was at home.

His failure to return at the noon hour did not excite their curosity, because very often he would go hunting and stay until late in the evening, but as night approached, his wife and mother became alarmed and called on their neighbors to search for him. Searching parties were organized and his body was found near the house about 11 o'clock Monday night. The supposition is that when he attempted to climb a fence the gun was accidentally discharged. The load struck him in the mouth and from indications death was in stantaneous.

Since the death of his father about a year ago, John has been living on the old home place with his mother and wife. He was about thirty years old, a good citizen and industrious farmer. He is survived by his wife and two children, mother, brother and two sisters. The Messenger joins their host of friends in sympathy in this sad hour of their affliction.

"Only one is master of the Empire, and I am that one. I will tolerate no other.

"You must all have one will and that is my will; there is only one law, and that is my law.

"If I order you to shoot down your relatives, brothers-yes, even your parents-you must obey me without murmering.

"I represent Monarchy by the grace of God."

Yet this speech was actually made by the Kaiser and it was respectfully listened to and believed by those who heard it! Word for word it is what the Kaiser actually said!

What would happen to a President of the United States who would give utterance to such ideas? He would either be arrested for using incendiary language or sent to an insane asylum, probably the latter!

In his "proclamation" of January 18th, 1914, the Kaiser said:
