**VIATL STATISTICS LAW**

Crockett, Texas, July 14.  
To the People of Houston Co :

Under the Vital Statistics Law passed by the Thirty-fifth Legislature, before any dead body can be buried in any county, a burial permit must be obtained from the County Clerk, or in the case of an incorporated town, from the city Health Officer. In order to obtain the burial permit it is necessary to present to the County Clerk a death certificate properly filled out by the doctor attending the deceased at the time of his death, or by the head of the family if no doctor attended, and the undertaker having charge of the burial. The term "undertaker" is so construed as to mean anyone furnishing a box or coffin in which to bury the dead.

The law also provides for a Sexton at each cemetery who will receive the burial permit, keep a record of all burials in his cemetery showing the lots where each body is interred and make monthly reports to the State Registrar of same. The county will furnish the Sexton's supplies and records.

The law provides penalties for failure or refusal to comply with any of its provisions. I realize the inconvenience it would mean for citizens of this county to

have to come to Crockett, sometimes 20 or 25 miles, to obtain a permit to bury their dead. To prevent that inconvenience and to make compliance with the law a comparatively easy matter I would like to have the people in each community get together and appoint someone near each cemetery in the county to serve as sexton. I will then authorize that person to issue burial permits, so that the people will then be put to no inconvenience in complying with the law.

When a dead body is to be removed from one district to another a removal permit must be secured, or when it is to be transported by a common carrier a transportation permit must be secured. No dead body can be held for more than 72 hours without a permit being secured, either burial, removal or transportation.

The doctors and midwives of all counties are charged with the making and filing with the clerk Birth Certificates within five days after the birth of a child and failure or refusal to do so carries with it a penalty. I have ordered a new supply of blanks from the Registrar of Vital Statistics and will mail a supply to the doctors of the county as soon as they are received. Other persons may

have a supply by calling at the office or by request through the mail. Doctors, midwives and undertakers will please not use the forms recently mailed out to them, as the department has issued an entirely new form and requires the use of it.

I will be glad to explain what I know about the law to every person interested. In regard to the sextons, I will appreciate any assistance the people of the county may see fit to give me, as I want to do my part toward the proper compliance with the law and at the same time make it as convenient for the people as far as possible.

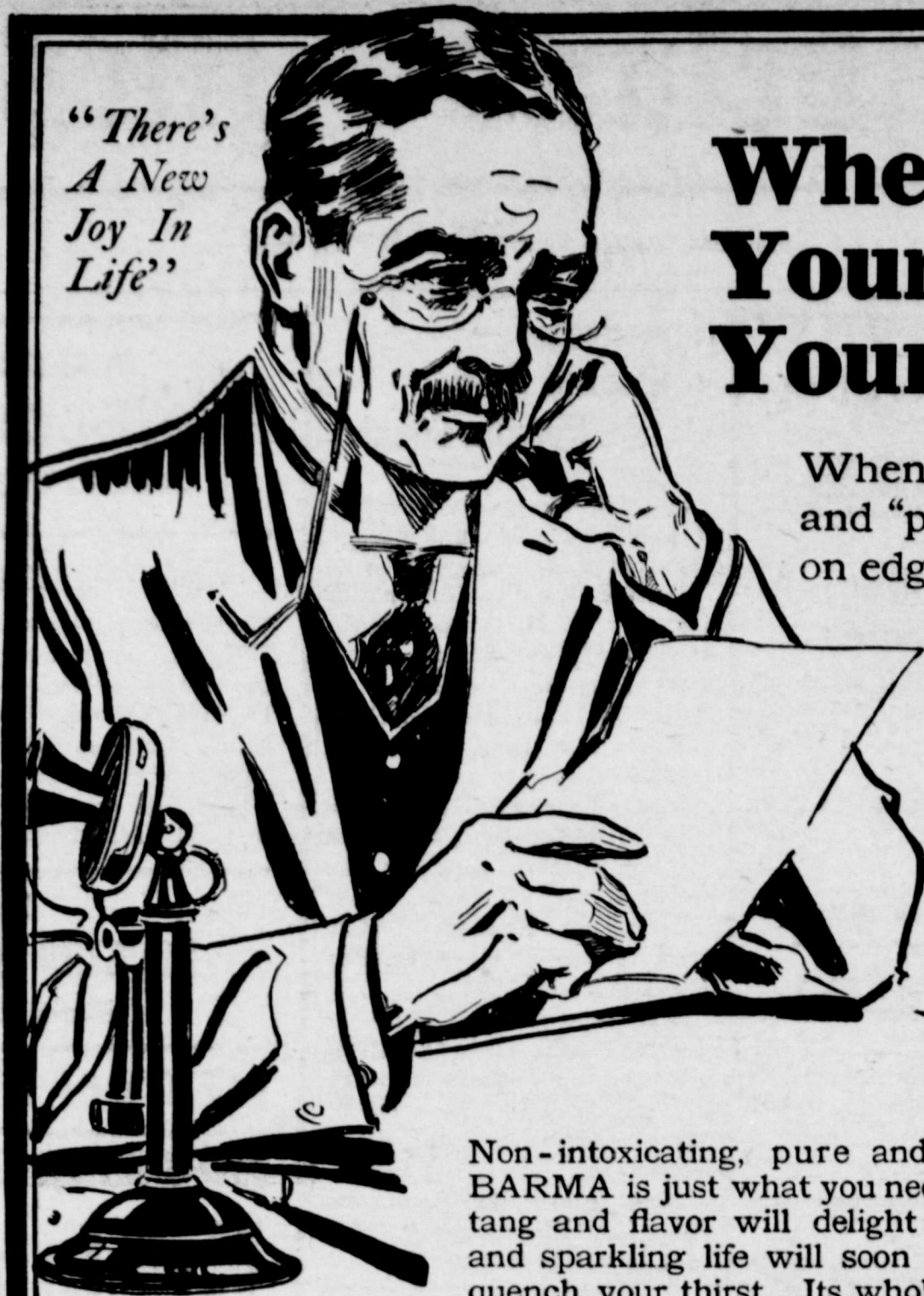
All votes favoring the Proposed Constitutional Amendment shall erase the words "Against the Amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for Conservation Districts, the creation of such Districts and their Government and Regulation", which said erasures shall be made by making a mark with pencil thru said words. The same election managers already appointed by the Commissioners Court to serve for the next two years shall hold said election in each voting precinct in said county and make due returns thereof in conformity with other elections so held. CURBING THE WASTE

Just now the housewives of the United States are being deluged with advice and warnings as to waste in the kitchens. In nine families out of every ten the advice is entirely superfluous, from the fact that prices and pocketbooks fail to harmonize. Economy was the first lesson learned by the women when the present era of high prices opened. There is practically no waste in the average American home. The waste and extravagance in this country is in the hotels, restaurants and cafes and in the mansions of the idle rich. Just the other day the hotel owners in Chicago issued a statement saying they would disregard the plea of Food Commissioner Hoover to conserve the food supply and would continue to serve their customers with suckling pigs, milk-fed chickens, baby beef, etc., giving as their reasons that the consumption in the homes of the country should be cut down. They are ignorant of the facts, of course, for as stated above, the waste in the average American home has been cut to the limit.

Intelligent economy will never be practiced in these places so long as people persist in being served with six to ten course meals of which but a small fraction is consumed, the residue going to the swill barrel. No system of food economy can be successful that permits waste of products for no other reason than that the waster has the price.

We are perfectly willing to go to war, provided all of our delinquent subscribers have to go, too.

The government is about ready for the draft of all eligibles between the ages of 21 and 31 and the drawing will probably take place the latter part of this week.

The prohibition forces of the state are getting ready to make a big drive in all the wet counties of the state, in the hope of making them dry. Elections have been called in nearly every wet county.

Emma Goldman, anarchist agitator and menace, has been "drafted" by the government for two years and will make overalls in the federal penitentiary. Sister Emma "bit the hand that fed her" by trying to obstruct the operation of the selective draft law. She will from now on be engaged in productive labor instead of raising hell.

Has the great wizard, Edison, at last found something that will put the submarine on the blink? In a press dispatch printed Monday Mr. Edison stated that "we now have all rebellious elements under control." He told some of his friends that the date would be remembered as "contemporaneous with the time when he removed the last jinx from the record." A few days ago a high government official said that Mr. Edison had just completed a task that would make him the greatest man in the world. We hope Mr. Edison has something up his sleeve, because the German submarine must be conquered to insure allied victory.

**Says Wheat Can Be Grown in Houston County**

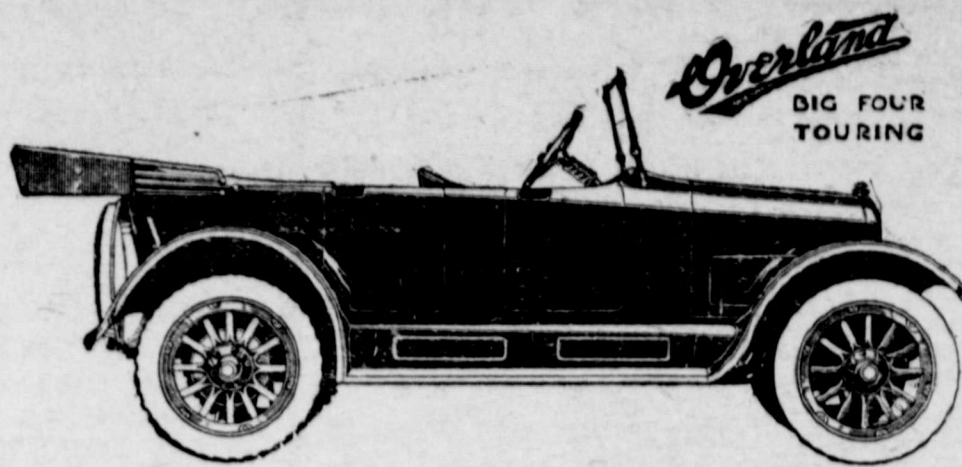
Mineral Wells, Texas, July 14. Editor Messenger:

I was in Dallas a few days ago and saw a copy of the Houston County Times and noticed the article advising farmers of Houston county to raise wheat.

It reminded me of my boyhood days in the early settling of Texas when we couldn't buy flour and had to raise wheat so we could have something to wallop in our molasses besides corn bread. It was molasses in those old days and not syrup. We raised sorghum cane and ground it on home made wood mills and boiled the juice in common wash pots. Then we made our living at home, but what I am getting at is to tell the farmers of Houston county my experience in growing wheat in East Texas.

No doubt a great many people in East Texas think that wheat can't be raised there successfully, but they are badly mistaken. My father came to Texas in the year 1853 and settled in Henderson county, two miles east of Athens, and I think it was about the third year after settling there that we planted wheat on third year's land. Our land was good, some gray sandy land and some red gravelly land, and we planted some on both kinds, and we made fine wheat, I think about twenty bushels per acre. The problem then was a mill to grind it on, and as there were no flouring mills, we carried it to an old fashion water mill and had it ground like corn and sifted it like corn meal. It made dark bread but I want to tell you right here those were the best biscuits I ever ate in my life. You must remember I was just a boy then and had had nothing to wallop in my molasses since I left old Georgia, so you can imagine about how I felt.

Now I notice that somebody offers to put in a flour mill at Crockett if farmers will plant 1000 acres in wheat. I want to say that they can very easily do that. Let every farmer that possibly can plant a few acres of wheat. You will never regret it; if you once get started to raising wheat you never will quit it; my father raised it until after the civil war, but we finally got a flour mill in 25 miles of us and

we went there with our wheat. We never failed to make a good crop; some years we made as much as 30 or 35 bushels per acre, but I will say right here that you can't raise wheat on thin land and you can't raise it in East Texas planted in the Spring. You want to plant regular winter wheat and plant it in the fall--say September or October--plant after fall rains set in and plant on good strong land and you will always make good enough crop to pay you. This has been my experience in raising wheat in East Texas from the time I was a small boy until I was about grown. And in conclusion I want to beg the farmers of Houston county to try it. It will beat buying high priced flour.

Farmers that raise ribbon cane and make their own sugar and farmers that have low land that can be irrigated can raise their rice so the farmers of East Texas can raise everything they eat except coffee.

**Decomposed Bodies of Two Negroes Found Close to Weldon**

Weldon, Texas, July 15.—The partly decomposed bodies of Monroe Collins and Major Collins, negroes, were discovered about 11-2 miles west of Weldon Friday by Hal Chance, who was out hunting, the negroes having been dead about 48 hours. The body of Monroe Collins was hanging and the

body of Major Collins was lying on the ground with a gaping wound in the throat, indicating that he too had been hung.

Mr. Chance was attracted to the scene where the two bodies were found by a stench. He suspected that a cow or horse was dead and went to investigate. There is no clew as to who perpetrated the crime nor is there any well authenticated theory as to why it was committed. Robbery is said to be the most plausible. Major Collins

is said to have had \$25 in his possession when last seen alive. No money was found on his person. There were several knife wounds on the neck of Monroe Collins, whose body was still hanging when the two were found.

Both of the negroes were raised near Weldon. Major Collins was about 21 or 22 years old, and Monroe was probably 35. They were cousins.

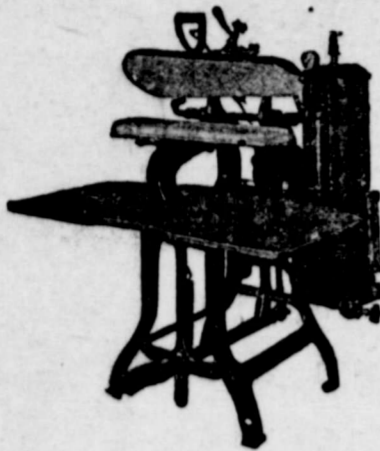
