Houston County's 5 Per Cent Leave For Training Camp

Crockett, Texas, Sept. 4.—Acting on instructions from the Adjutant General to select from Houston County's quota of 190 men, ten men who did not claim exemption from military service, the Local Exemption Board Monday evening named the following, who will leave on the Sunshine Special Thursday evening for the mobilization camp at Fort Travis, San Antonio, as an advance guard: Grady Monk, T. H. Sepmore, C. P. Dorman, and George Lewis Payne, of Crockett; R. Brannen, O. Gipson, L. I. Shaw and E. Drennan, of Ratcliff; B. F. Rikard, of Creek; and Jim Wright, of Kennard. One hundred men in first call did not claim exemption, one hundred and fifty men claimed exemption, mostly on account of dependents; the papers in this last number have been forwarded to the District Exemption Board for the Eastern District of Texas, Tyler Texas. Hon. W. B. Page, Chairman of the Local Exemption Board, stated Tuesday evening, that on account of the large number claiming exemptions, in all probability it would be necessary to make a second call.

Fire Saturday morning destroyed the two story residence of District Clerk John D. Morgan, situated in south-east Crockett. Everything was lost. Loss \$3,000.00 with insurance of \$1,500.00. Both Mr. and Mrs. Morgan were away from home at the time, Mrs. Morgan being at Kennard visiting relatives and Mr. Morgan having left for his farm near town about thirty minutes before the fire was discovered. The fire is said to have originated in the second story, and Mr. Morgan states that no one had been upstairs for three days, nor had a fire been built in the house for the same length of time. Mr. Morgan did not know anything about the fire until his return from the farm and he drove up in front of the place where his home used to be.

Edgar Baker, colored, was shot Saturday evening, dying Sunday morning. He is said to have drawn a pistol on one Jake Lewis, another negro, when Lewis grabbed his hand, throwing it up; the pistol was discharged with results as stated. The negroes had had trouble earlier in the day. Baker is said to have been drinking.

Penick, deceased, whose names are unknown; the heirs of William Murchison, deceased, whose names are unknown and the heirs of Mary Murchison, deceased, whose names are unknown, to appear at the next regular term of the District Court of Houston County, Texas, to be held at the Court House in the City of Crockett, on the 2nd Monday in October, 1917, being the 8th day of October, 1917, then and there to answer the petition filed in said Court on the 31st day of August, 1917, in a cause No. 5704 on the Docket of said Court wherein W. That plaintiffs claim title to said land under the following deeds and title papers: A title from the State of Coahuila & Texas to Marcelino Salas, dated February 5, 1833; a deed from Lucy R. Penick to Wm. Murchison, dated April 5, 1852, recorded in book Y, pp 109-10, Houston County Deed Records; a deed from S. E. Kennedy and L. M. Kennedy to Wm. Murchison, dated October 15, 1859, recorded in book Y, page 108, Houston County Deed Records; a deed from Wm. Lagow and others to W. F. Murchison, dated February 19, 1904, recorded in book 65, pages 540 to 545 of Houston County Deed Records; a deed from W. F. Murchison to Sallie S. Murchison, dated February 16, 1915, recorded in book 75, page 209, of Houston County Deed Records.

Plaintiffs also allege that they have been in the continuous peaceable and adverse possession of said land, cultivating, using and enjoying the same, under deeds duly registered, and paying all taxes due thereon, for more than five years before the commencement of this suit, and for more than ten years before the commencement of this suit, and they claim title to the same under the statute of limitations of five years and ten years respectively.

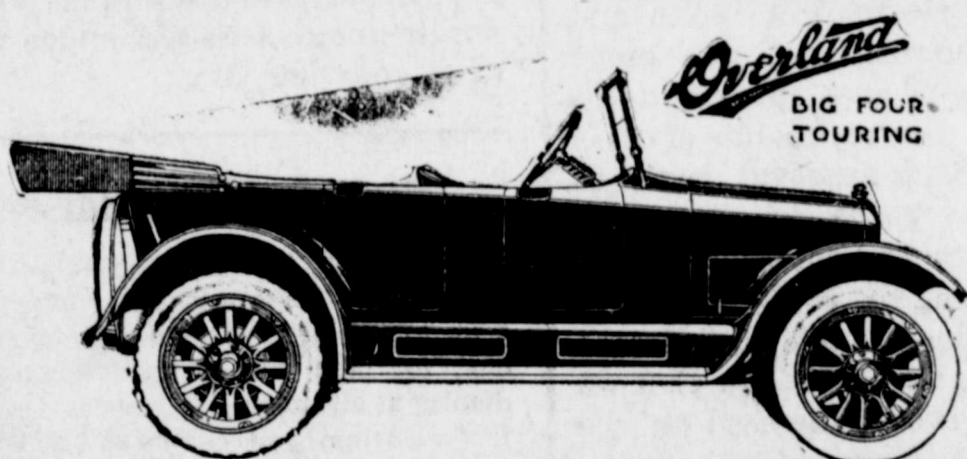

PLAN FOR SEED CORN NOW

The acre yield of corn in the United States could and should be greatly increased, according to the United States Department of Agriculture, which states that the proper selection of seed is of primary importance in improving the yield. The average production for the country is 26 bushels an acre, though yields as high as 200 bushels have been made by contestants in boys' corn clubs.

Seed corn should be selected from stalks standing where they grew, according to the corn specialists of the department. This is necessary because it is the means of making sure that the seed will have the power to yield well, as shown by the superiority of the stalks over surrounding ones that grew under the same conditions. This sort of seed inherits high producing power.

It must be understood, says the department, that like produces like, and that an early-maturing corn yielding abundantly on short, thick stalks is likely to repeat these characters in the next generation. For example, seed corn should be taken from stalks without suckers; such seed may produce some stalks with suckers, but it will invariably produce fewer suckers than seed from sucker-bearing stalks.

All seed corn should be selected by hand as a special task, and not incidental to husking. The corn should be gathered as soon as thoroughly mature and before the first hard freeze. Enough should be gathered for two years' planting, to insure a supply of seed, if, for example, the first planting is drowned out, or if the next crop should be hurt by early frost.

DANGEROUS CRIMINALS CAUGHT NEAR GRAPELAND

GrapeLand found its way into the temple of fame, at least temporarily, by the capture near here last week of two very much wanted criminals, for whom rewards aggregating \$2,800.00 had been offered. They are supposed to be the men who so wantonly murdered Tom Sandlin, a well know oil man of Humble, some two weeks ago.

On Wednesday of last week two very suspicious looking individuals were observed near town and the fact was reported to officers who at once organized a posse and started in pursuit of them and before night the first one of them to be taken was captured by Connor Denson, Charles Spruill and J. S. Slaughter. He gave his name as Ernest Kelley and admitted to being an escaped convict, one of the bunch who had escaped from the State Farm at Sugarland several days before, but, of course, strenuously denied any knowledge of the murder near Humble. (The news dispatches state that since his return to the penitentiary he has confessed to participation in that affair and made a clean breast of the whole matter.) He was brought to town by his captors and held here under guard for several hours before being taken to Huntsville and turned over to the penitentiary authorities. While here he was the center of a curious crowd and was not at all averse to talking of himself and his past record.

The companion of Kelley managed to elude the many who were searching for him until Thursday afternoon, when he was captured by two officers from Harris County and City Marshal Dupree, of Crockett. He was also taken to Huntsville and turned over to the penitentiary authorities.

J. B. Connor, of Humble, the driver of the automobile in which Sandlin and the two convicts were riding when the former was shot, saw the prisoner at Huntsville and positively identified him as the man who did the shooting,

and to add to the identification the prisoner was wearing when captured the shoes he had taken from the feet of Sandlin after murdering him. He is known by the name of Gauss and was serving a life sentence when he made his escape. Kelley was also a "lifer."

The murder for which they are wanted in Harris County was one of the most cold-blooded and unprovoked in the annals of Texas crime and great indignation was aroused among the citizens of Humble, who, after the capture of the criminals visited Huntsville in large numbers for a look at the prisoners, but did not attempt mob violence.

It is stated that they will be taken to Harris County for trial as soon as indicted by the grand jury.

Harry Williams, Hilliard Williams, Calhoun Mitchell and Mote Scarborough, all from this section of the county, were given an honorable discharge from Company L, Fifth Texas Infantry, stationed at Crockett, last Wednesday, because they failed to pass the federal physical examination. Seventeen of the boys were discharged on this account.

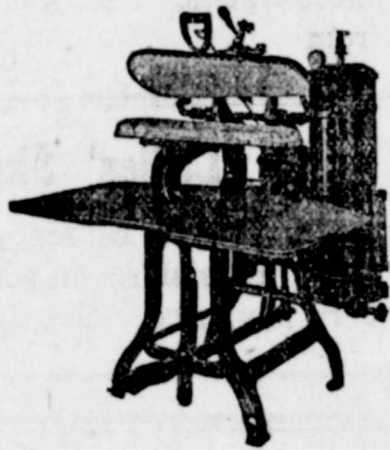

**Destroy all Cotton
Stalks and Check
Ravages of Weevil**

"Push cotton picking to early completion and then destroy the cotton plants before the weevils hibernate."

If every cotton grower whose fields are infested with weevils would carry out that suggestion of an entomologist in the United States Department of Agriculture the 1918 American cotton crop would get a substantial boost this fall. For fall destruction of weevils now is considered the all-important measure in boll-weevil control.

Hand in hand with early fall destruction of weevils goes the practice of planting cover crops after the stalks have been removed. Such crops not only improve the soil but furnish feed of a kind southern farmers need now. Thus the proper step to take in controlling the weevil will increase the production of forage and assist greatly in the production of meat. In a recent publication of the Department of Agriculture, Farmers' Bulletin 848, The Boll Weevil Problem, the department says so emphatically.

"Weevils are at the mercy of the planters in the fall as they are at no other time," declares Dr. W. D. Hunter, the writer of this bulletin. "If the farmer desires to kill these insects, then he can do so. If it is not practicable to burn the stalks, they can still be uprooted, thereby destroying the green-food supply of the weevils and preventing the further increase of the insects. Fall destruction of weevils insures a crop for the following season."

This measure of control, it is pointed out by the entomologist, cannot be applied alike to all infested regions. It is of the greatest importance in localities of the extreme south where the boll weevil problem is the most serious. Farther north the colder winters make this step less important. As the practicability of fall destruction depends upon the supply of labor available and upon the size of the plantings, it is a measure particularly applicable to the southern and southeastern parts of the cotton belt, where the cotton fields are small and labor is sufficiently plentiful to perform the work in ample time.

Extermination of the boll weevils in the fall has not been adopted as widely as it should be, the department entomologist reports, but individual instances everywhere show its value. In one of many experiments performed by the Bureau of Entomology—one in Calhoun county, Texas—the stalks growing on 410 acres of land were destroyed early in October. Careful records kept during the fall each season showed that this work had increased the production more than one-fourth of a bale per acre over the crop on a check area near by where such work was not done. Circumstances surrounding the experiments show that the advantage was probably considerably greater than indicated by the estimated increased yields, which is very conservative.

No definite rule can be laid down as to the proper time for destroying weevils in this way. In general, the proper time is whenever the weevils have reached such numbers as to infest practically all of the squares

that are being set. This may occur much earlier in some seasons than in others. Fall destruction as late as November will accomplish much, but several times the number of weevils can be destroyed if the work is done in October. The rule should be to destroy infested plants at the earliest possible date in the fall. It is much better to sacrifice a small quantity of cotton than to defer the operation. The loss will more than be made good by an increase in the next crop.

In regions where the loss of organic matter from the burning of stalks is important, it is advisable, the specialist says, to cut the stalks by means of the machine usually employed for

that purpose and bury them deeply as soon as possible. This will cause the destruction of many of the immature stages of the weevil in the squares and bolls.

Other fall measures against the weevils include plowing under infested squares, grazing cotton fields with cattle, sheep or goats, and preventing the growth of volunteer cotton or sprouts from the old stumps.—U. S. Weekly News Letter.

Flour Mill Assured Farmers Will Plant Big Acreage to Wheat

As far as heard from, the farmers of Houston county have agreed to sow over 1000 acres of wheat this fall, and from the way the pledges are still coming in, over 2000 acres will be devoted to providing our wheat flour for 1918. They have heard the warning from headquarters to the effect that if wheat flour is desired in the South after this year the farmers in the South must grow the wheat, as all the surplus from the sections of the country that have been furnishing the South these many years will be required to feed our soldiers and those of our allies.

When the announcement was made a few weeks ago that the Commercial Club was going to start a movement in this direction to be known as the "Houston County Wheat Growers' Association," it struck a responsive echo all over the county, and over the border into adjoining counties. The names of those wishing to become members commenced appearing at a rate that clearly indicated that it was to be a success. It was stated that when a thousand acres had been pledged it would secure the location of a mill at Crockett, and that it would be a toll mill. Now that the acreage has been secured the mill is also a certainty.

It was most encouraging to see how the interest in this movement that means so much to this county has increased the past two weeks of the campaign. Individuals had been calling in person and by phone right along and several school house meetings had been held at which many acres were pledged. Mr. Payne, of Augusta, sent in by mail two pages of names and said there were more to follow. Mr. Murchison of Grapeland, called up and asked that a blank subscription list be sent him as many of his neighbors were anxious to join. Mr. Updegraph, of Latexo dropped in and said, "Put me down for sixty acres," and we did. Mr. Brewton, of Lovelady, rang us up and said we could put him down one hundred acres and some of his neighbors also wanted to get in. Mr. Goodwin, of Weldon called up and said we could put his section down for at least two hundred acres, and they are still coming in and the acreage may aggregate more than even two thousand. A Mr. Freeman, representing the milling company that will furnish the milling outfit spent several days in Crockett last week and tried to get us to fully appreciate what a custom and merchant mill would mean to this community, and stated that if the farmers knew how profitable a crop would be here they would double and treble their acreage already pledged.
