Ferguson Impeached by Senate and Barr- ed from Holding Office

Austin, Texas, Sept. 25.—The Senate late Tuesday afternoon imposed the extreme penalty of removal from office and disqualification from again holding office of honor, trust or profit under Texas, against Jas. E. Ferguson, twice elected governor and found guilty by the senate on ten counts of twenty-one articles of impeachment presented from the house of representatives.

The judgement of removal from office was not contested after the verdict of guilty had been returned by the vote in the senate last Saturday afternoon, but the judgement of disqualification was opposed by some of the ablest lawyers and advocates in the senate. Nevertheless, by a vote of 17 to 9, the senate Tuesday struck down a minority report that recommended the judgement be merely removal from office and by a vote of 25 to 3, one pair and one absent, adopted the extreme penalty of ouster and disqualification.

Monday, Gov. Ferguson, anticipating the judgement of the senate, tendered his resignation to the Secretary of State, with the following statement:

"I take this action only because I have been reliably informed that the senate is attempting to pass some pretended and illegal order or judgment for the purpose of preventing the people of Texas from electing me governor for a third term and to prevent my holding said office by virtue of their election."

Interesting Letter From the Boys At Camp Bowie

Camp Bowie, Sept. 21.—We will try to write you and give the people of Grapeland some of the news of Camp Bowie.

Everybody is very busy getting ready to get the Kaiser and the way things are progressing we will have him in a few more months.

Company L is doing fine and is among the leading companies. Everybody is doing his best.

Camp Bowie is a very beautiful place about three miles from Fort Worth, on high hills where a breeze is blowing almost all the time. It blows a little too hard at night as the boys have to cover up in all of their quilts.

The officers of the 5th Texas are all good men and seem to know how to make friends with everybody.

We have visitors every day and are permitted to go to town about two times a week.

We are drilling eight hours a day every day except Saturdays and Sundays. We have inspection on Saturdays, and every man has to look his best and have everything the government issues to him.

On Sundays we have forty-five minutes drill and then we are off until 10 o'clock Sunday night.

We have bought a fine Victrola

and a lot of good records. We keep it in the mess hall and at night we use the mess hall for a Y. M. C. A.

Everybody enjoys reading the Messenger and is waiting for it when the mail comes in. When one sees it he gives the alarm and all of the boys leap out of their tents and run to the office to get their papers.

We have large bath houses and everything is kept as clean as it can be.

We have to get up at 5 o'clock every morning and have roll call, then clean up the company streets and then our tents. If a tent is not neat and clean and every cot on a line, every blanket folded just right, that squad goes on the blacklist for a week, is not permitted to go to town or leave the camp; so everybody keeps their tent clean. No one in Company L has had to go on the blacklist yet and we hope no one does.

Well, it is about time for taps, so we had better go to bed.

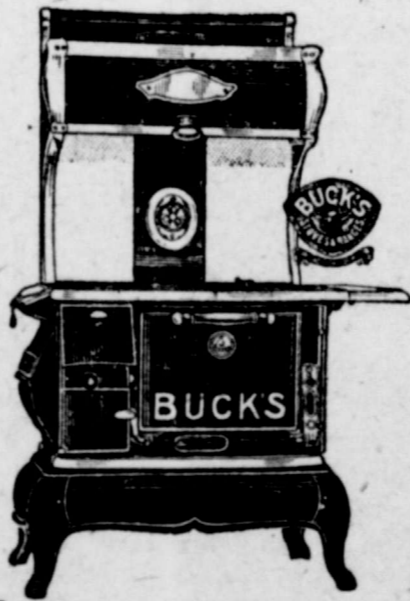

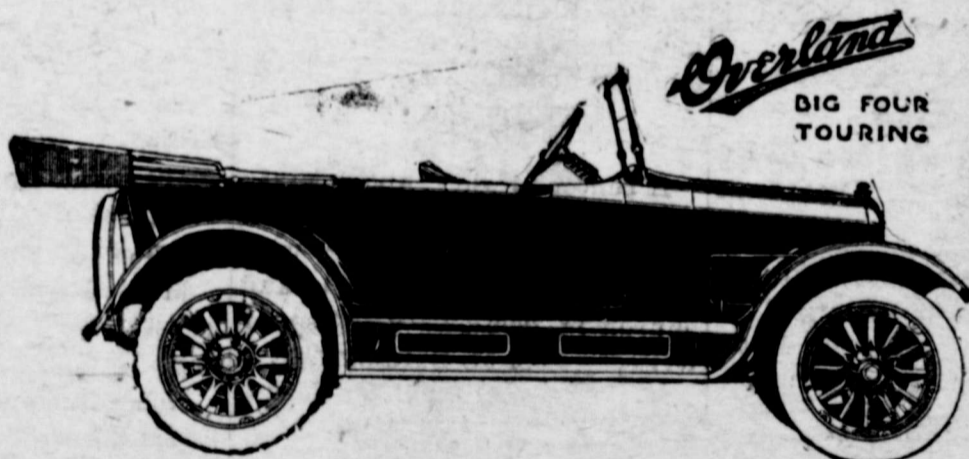

POULTRY

WINTER TONIC FOR POULTRY

Beets, Silage and Alfalfa Produce Satisfactory Results—Cabbage Also Is Excellent.

Succulent feed should be given to chickens in winter, because of its value as a tonic, asserts R. M. Sherwood, acting head of the department of poultry husbandry in the Kansas state agricultural college.

"Beets, silage, and alfalfa may be obtained on most farms," said Mr. Sherwood. "Alfalfa leaves soaked in sour milk are of great value. The milk softens the leaves, and also furnishes valuable food nutrients. It is well for the farmer to plant winter wheat or rye near his chicken house."

Cabbage is excellent as a green feed, in the opinion of Mr. Sherwood. Some persons feed turnips, potatoes, and even apples. Sprouted oats are often used for succulence, but it is not desirable that the sprouting be done in the house because of the offensive odor given off. This necessitates the use of a special sprouter with heater, and adds materially to the cost of the feed.

REPAIRS FOR THE INCUBATOR

Time to Get Machine Into Working Order—Removable Parts Should Be Thoroughly Cleaned.

(By C. E. BROWN, Poultryman, Northwest Experiment Station)

In a few days many incubators will be in operation. Whether the chicks are to be hatched early in March or not until the middle of April, it is time to look after repairs and to get the machine—in shape. Repairs for the incubator may not be readily found.

If the incubator was neglected at the close of last season, it should be thoroughly cleaned. Removable parts should be taken out and washed and the entire machine should be aired and sunned. A 10 per cent solution of zenoleum should be used as a disinfectant in washing the interior of the machine.

HATCHING IS "GREAT STRAIN"

Lice Working Unmolested While Hen Is Sitting Is Most Responsible for Poor Condition.

The average poultry man will say that hatching is a "great strain" on a hen, and the condition of some of the birds on finishing their hatches seems to bear out this statement. But the harm done by the lice working unmolested while her motherly instinct keeps the hen busy is more responsible for her run-down condition than the energy required in the actual work of incubating the eggs.

The dusting with lice powder should be done not only at the beginning of the hatch, but about once a week throughout the sitting period.

Noted Welshmen.

It may be remarked that the small piece of British territory known as Wales has been the motherland of other great men than the Lloyd George of today. The Welsh have long been noted for their obstinacy and steadfastness of purpose, and at the head of these for resoluteness of purpose and indomitable will may be mentioned no less a person than Oliver Cromwell, lord protector of England. The race was originally Welsh, and bore the name of Williams, but the great-grandfather of the protector changed it to Cromwell in compliance with a wish of Henry VIII, taking that name in honor of a relation, Thomas Cromwell, earl of Essex. Henry Ward Beecher, the great preacher, at one time pastor of the Second Presbyterian church of New York city, was of Welsh extraction. The father and mother of the late John L. Griffiths were both born in Wales, and perhaps it was in his Cymric blood that Mr. Griffiths was so gifted in oratory.

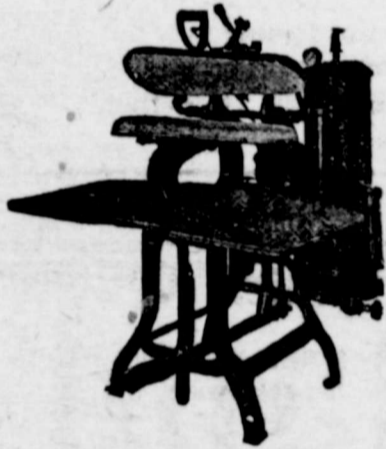
