STC Barrow, Lamb, Steer Exhibitions At The Co-Set In Junior Livestock Show

SHOWMEN WILL BE MEMBERS OF HANSFORD 4-H, FFA CHAPTERS

The critical eye of judge Don Penny, from the animal husbandry department, Oklahoma State University, will be focused on pigs, lambs, steers, gilts and heifers Monday as the annual Hansford County Junior Livestock show is staged in Spearman at the community building.

Gruver and Spearman chapters of Future Farmers of America and Hansford County 4-H boys and girls will be exhibiting some 161 head of livestock. In the Sunday issue of this newspaper was published the list of exhibitors which included only the Spearman FFA group.

Troy Sloan, general superintendent, has announced that swine will be judged first at 10 a. m., beginning with gilts. After the gilt division has been climaxed with selection of champions, barrows, lambs, steers and heifer judging will follow.

Animals will be placed in sale order for the annual sale in the evening at 6:30 p. m. Businessmen and individuals traditionally have given a strong support to the facet of the program.

Earl Henderson has charge of the cattle division, Leslie Barkley is in charge of the sheep division and R. L. McClellan and Mike Garnett will supervise the swine division.

Sale superintendent is Buddy Murrell. Marvin Wilson of Gruver and Frank Richardson of Dumas will be sale auctioneers.

Grand Champion and Reserve Champion trophies will be awarded in the steer, barrow, lamb, gilt and heifer classes. Showmanship trophies will be awarded for steer, swine and lamb. Hansford County business firms will furnish trophies.

Hansford County Farm Bureau will award three animal husbandry project awards.

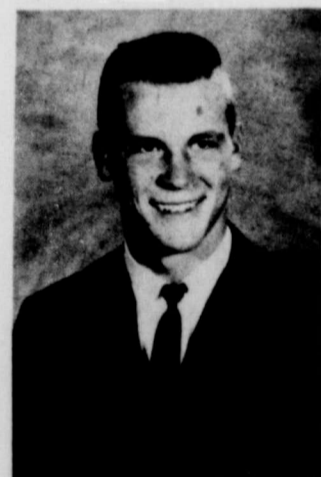
Jim Garrison, head of the petroleum department of Farmland Industries, Kansas City, spoke to farmers Monday night about refined fuels.

Spearman Team Wins Regional Tournament for Third Time! Yes, it was three in a row as they fought their way to their third straight girls' championship, in the regional tournament, on the campus at Texas Tech Saturday.

To make a long story short the favored Spearman team owned Winters 49-40 in their opening game, and finished off Dimmitt 54 to 48 in the finals.

As a result of this fine performance at the regional tourney, Spearman will meet the Rivercrest Rebelettes Friday, in their opening game at Austin, 4:35 p. m., Gregory gym in Austin, Texas.

The Lynettes left Spearman Wednesday morning, following a pep rally, at 7:40 a. m. They will stay in Abilene Wednesday night, and journey to Austin Thursday. The team will enjoy supper, a movie, and plenty of rest on Wednesday. They will arrive in Austin Thursday.

Class AA teams in the state tournament are Gregory-Portland, Hamshire Fannett, Rivercrest and Spearman. Gregory-Portland will meet Hamshire Fannett at 3:10 p. m., Friday, just before the Spearman Rivercrest game at 4:35 Friday.

A complete wrap-up of the regional play is printed below: Spearman clipped Dimmitt, 54-48, in a down-to-the-wire clash for the Class AA regional championship.

Spearman took command in the first period and was never in trouble until the final period.

In an otherwise slow game, the final round was as exciting as a high-wire walker with sore feet.

Dimmitt, down 42-30, following the third quarter, cut the margin to 48-43 on a 15-footer by A'lan Webb.

But the two squads matched points until the final buzzer and Dimmitt will sit home and listen to the state playoffs on the radio.

The Bobbies jumped to a 2-0 lead in the opening seconds, but ferns like Marcia Shieldknight and Sandra Shuffelt pulled Spearman up and past Dimmitt, 10-7, as the period ended.

Dimmitt briefly got the lead back, 17-16, moments later, but four straight points by Shieldknight gave the Lynettes the lead and they trotted to victory.

Shieldknight finished up with 27 points and Shuffelt tipped the cords for 19 for the 31-5 Lynettes.

Debra Summers hit for 25 and Webb poured in 22 to pace the losers.

Those making the Class AA all-tourney squad included Shieldknight and Marilyn Jones, Spearman; Debra Summers, Dimmitt; Babs Tatum, Winters and Judy Drury and Emma Perkins of Granbury.

In Class AA semifinal games, Spearman bumped off Winters, 49-40, and Dimmitt trimmed Granbury, 55-44.

Marcia Shieldknight paced the Lynettes with 30 points-three-quarters of Winters' total, but Winters jumped to a 12-9 lead as the second period began. It didn't last long as Shieldknight went to work.

What chance Winters had was lost in the final quarter. The Blizzettes had a performance colder than their name and only dumped in six points, while Spearman got 11 and the win.

Eileen Fabion collected 20 points and Dora Snell banged in 14 to lead Winters' scorers.
