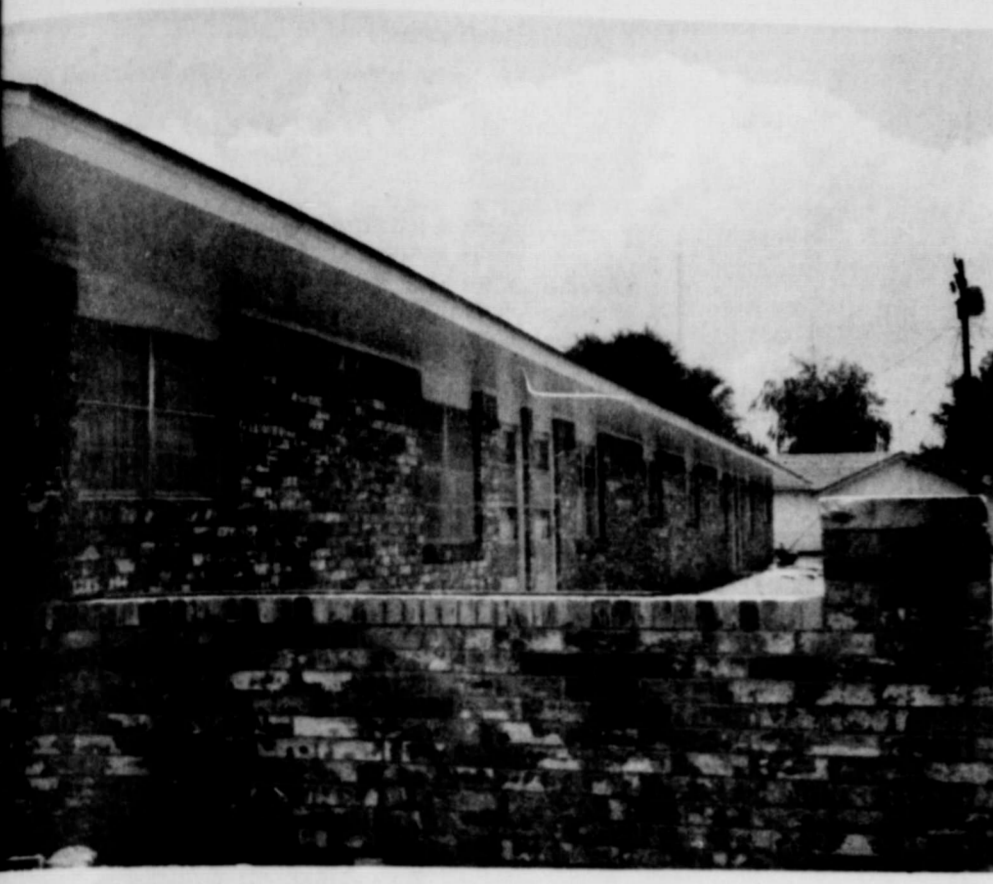

\$75,000. APARTMENT BLDG. SOON READY FOR OCCUPANCY

Roscoe Nelson, local builder and contractor, announced last week that finishing touches within the next few days will see construction completed on his brick apartment building.

Nelson began work in February on the apartments. The apartment, brick, each housing two apartments, will be finished and ready for occupancy by June 8. Four have been finished since early April. The rest of the apartments have been rented for some time.

The cost of the entire project is expected to run in the neighborhood of \$75,000.00. Located at 501 Cooke street, each 2-bedroom apartment features 925 square feet of living space, carpets, drapes, central air conditioning and heating.

The apartments will rent on a six-month contract for \$125.00 per month, or on a year lease for \$120.00.

Nelson, who has a long career of residential construction in this city, saw a growth

in Spearman badly in need of an apartment building of this type some time ago. He applied for a building permit for one unit early in January. When applications from renters began to reach him, he quickly applied for another permit for the second apartment building. This is the first major development of this type for the veteran builder, and is a great asset to the city which has long been in need of such a facility.

The trend throughout the country now days is toward one and two-member families taking up permanent residence in apartment houses, thus ridding themselves of insurance, taxes and up-keep. Advantages such as these are in fact being considered by several individuals in Spearman who find the luxurious 2 bedroom apartments very enticing.

Nelson said he has plans for a grand-opening later, when the public will have an opportunity to tour the Jo-V-Ron apartments.

3 Voting Boxes Open Saturday

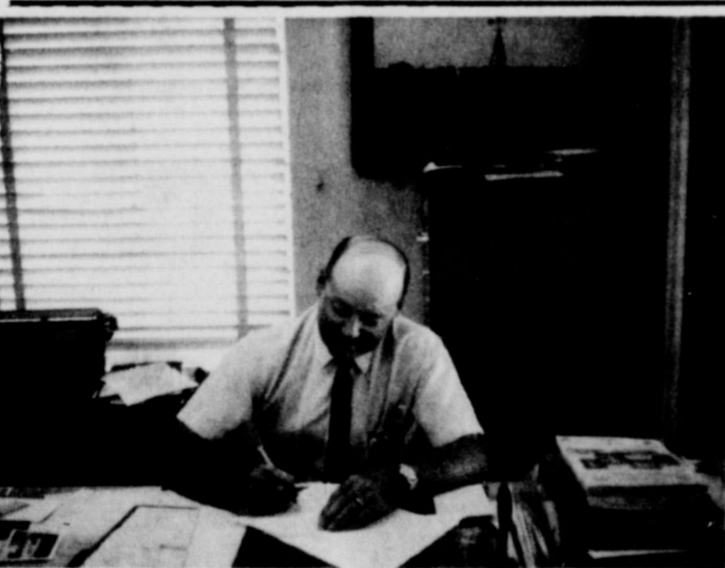

Funeral Rites Friday For Vietnam Casualty

Funeral services honoring the life and memory of Chief Warrant Officer Bobby R. Williams will be conducted Friday May 31 at 3 p.m. from the First Methodist Church, Spearman.

Williams, a pilot serving with the 335th Assault Helicopter Company, was killed in action May 5 in Vietnam. The 24-year old soldier's death marks the first Vietnam casualty for a Hansford County service man. He had been in Vietnam 6 months and was due to begin his R&R leave when he crashed and burned with his plane.

The body was flown to Spearman Wednesday where it laid in state at Boxwell Funeral Chapel until time for services Friday.

A full military funeral will be conducted. The Rev. Wesley Daniel, pastor, will officiate at the church. Military personnel from Ft. Sill will have charge of the graveside rites in Hansford Cemetery.

Williams went through high school at Littlefield, Texas and moved to Gruver in 1963 where he was engaged in farming activities for a while with his father.

Survivors include his wife Monet and 15-month old son Douglas Perry; his parents Mr. and Mrs. Joe A. Reaves and a sister Judy Reaves, all of Morse; one sister Mrs. Vera Morris of Goodwell, Okla.; one brother, Davis Williams with the US Navy stationed at Memphis, Tenn.

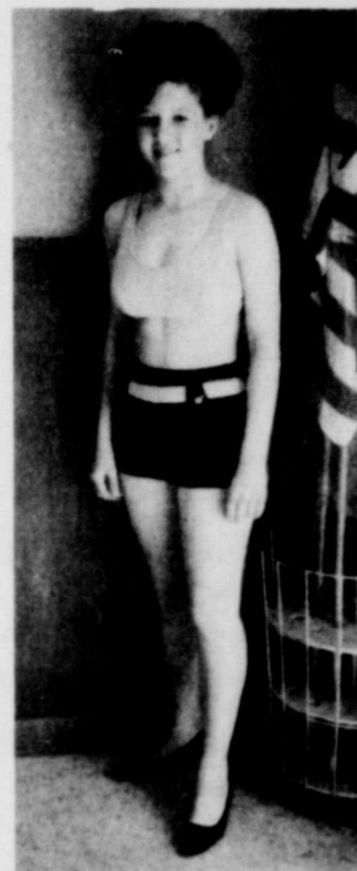
Bobby Campbell Here On Leave

COURT RULES TAIL-WATER PITTS MOVE

Commissioners Court met Monday in regular session and found it necessary to pass an ordinance concerning the building of tail water pits for irrigation purposes.

Some farmers in the county have been damming up bar-ditches to hold tail water and the Court directed that this must stop in order to allow for right-of-way in the event any road along the section line must be either opened or widened.

The passing of this ordinance is in accordance with two similar ones passed in 1965 and 1966 stating that no irrigation well nor pipeline shall be constructed within 60 feet from the center of any county road, highway, or section line.

These ordinances are printed elsewhere in this newspaper and are published for the benefit of all irrigation farmers.
