CELEBRATION A SUCCESS

Events Winners

Spearman Jaycees played host last weekend to the annual Hansford County Celebration and handled each scheduled event with unusual competence this year.

Saturday's activities got off to a good start when 62 senior citizens registered at the Old Timer's reunion. Four of these were presented with free barbecue tickets for having lived in the county since 1900. Tickets went to Gwen-Lackey, Spearman; Tom Jones, Gruver; Vina Hawpe, Sunray and Olie Tyler of Guymon.

Mr. Tyler was the oldest man born in Hansford County to register for the reunion. He was born on the old Tyler ranch near Morse in 1890.

The beard contest was won by Bob Keith and Roy Boyd, Spearman; Keith for the fullest beard, Boyd for the neatest trimmed one. Other bearded entries included: Don Allison, John Sutterfield, Don Reed, Vancil Hill, Gary Davis and Tom Reed.

The wave of eaters in the lunch line showed once again the prowess of the barbecue committee headed this year by Dr. H. B. Rinker. Virgil Floyd, chief cook prepared about one-ton of beef for the feed enjoyed this year by over 800 people.

The parade rolled down the street at 10:30 a.m. Using the theme "Americanism 1968", the Gladiola Flower Club float sponsored by Spearman Rexall Drug was the winner of the \$50.00 first place award. The Rio chapter of Beta Sigma Phi was awarded 2nd place \$30.00. This float was sponsored by Gages Mens Wear. A & W Root Beer sponsored the 3rd place winner, Town & Country Home Demonstration Club which received \$20.00.

Ten-year old Kathy Gilley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Gilley, was the winner of the award which went to the best decorated bicycle. Western Auto Store presented her with a bicycle radio complete with holder.

At two p.m. Saturday 92 persons boarded buses provided by Spearman schools, to enjoy the historical tour of Hansford County. Acting as moderator for the guided tour was Charles R. Woodburn, president of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

Refreshments were served to the group at the first stop, the old Hansford Hotel. Still in use, this hotel is now owned by Mrs. Sid Beck, 502 Davis St. Spearman. It was constructed in 1908 at Old Hansford and moved to Spearman in 1920.

Other memorial markers and sites visited included: Robert E. (Bob) Martin, 1869-1911 First Sheriff of Hansford to be killed in the line of duty.

Two minor fire calls were answered by the volunteer firemen in May. One was an

Old Hansford Courthouse site; Farwell, first town in the county; Hansford Cemetery; Zulu Stockade, built in 1875.

The sound truck and speaker for this guided tour was furnished by the Mule Train. Thirteen entries in the Old Fiddler's contest kept the large audience entertained for some time while contestants fiddled away for \$200.00 in prize money. The two-hour concert was presided over by Dale Hendrick who supervised the show. The teenager's dance orchestra The Syxth Percent, played to an over-flow crowd Friday night, as did the Western Dance and Square Dance held Saturday night.

The Junior Chamber of Commerce, each and every committee, is to be commended for an outstanding celebration! The success of this year will be a good example for next year's festival.

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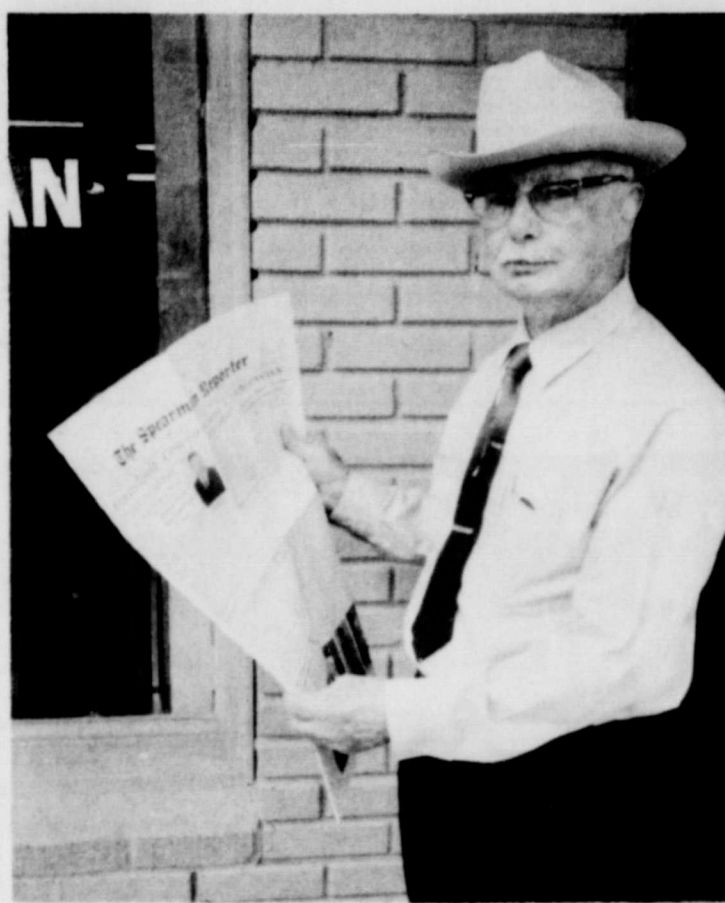

SUPT. B. E. REEVES RESIGNED TUESDAY

Letters of resignation from Supt. Dr. B. E. Reeves and School Counselor L.L. Laws were submitted to school board members at the regular meeting held Tuesday night.

Reeves, who has been head of Spearman Public Schools for 3 years, has asked that his resignation be effective as of June 30 but board members urged him to remain until July 15 to employ as many teachers as possible for the next school term.

Dr. Reeves said he expected about 5 more resignations soon, and these added to the two turned in Tuesday night plus Jerry Hawkins and Principal James Pendergraft who resigned last week will leave some nine vacancies.

At Tuesday's meeting, Mrs. Mike (Georgia) King was employed as a junior high teacher. Mrs. Wesley (Beth) Daniel who has been working as a half-unit teacher for home-bound students, was employed as one-half unit reading instructor in the high school. This will make her a full time teacher next term.

Mrs. Joy Barkowsky was also hired as a full time Home Ec teacher Tuesday night, and along with Mrs. Frances Hudson, this will give two full units of Homemaking being offered beginning next year.

In his letter of resignation, Dr. Reeves said he was accepting a position with Regional 16 Educational Services Center in Amarillo. "I appreciate the fine support that I have received from the staff, the community and the board of education. My three years here have been professionally enriching and rewarding. I feel confident that you will continue to support an educational program designed to meet the needs of all youth, and the community."

Reeves will be working with principals and superintendents in Region 16 and will be responsible for planning and program development for schools. He said he was looking forward to his employment and believed it would pave the way for college work later on.

Mr. L.L. Laws in submitting his letter of resignation as school counselor said, "It is with regret that I tender my resignation effective July 1. I have accepted a position as Admissions Counselor with McMurry College in Abilene. The opportunity to develop new programs under the leadership of Dr. B. E. Reeves has provided invaluable experiences in my professional growth. To further enhance my professional career I deem it necessary to make this decision. The warm relationships I have developed with the fine young people of Spearman have been very rewarding. I hope this community continues to keep the welfare and best interests of its youth uppermost in the plan of implementation of school-related programs."

Tornado Warning

Temporary Injunction Filed in Gas Case

Last Friday the cities of Spearman and Perryton met before District Judge Max Boyer asking for a temporary injunction preventing the High Plains Natural Gas Co. from appealing before the Texas Railroad Commission to apply for higher gas rates in both cities.

The gas is being sold under a contract now at 31 1/2 cents and the gas company has asked for a raise to 35.

The company says it has to have this rate increase in order to make seven per cent return on its investment as allowed by the law.

The company has informed both cities that if it does not get the 35-cent rate it will go before the railroad commission and ask for a 45-cent rate.

Both cities sought the injunction in 84th District Court to keep the company from going to the RR commission.

Testimony presented by the city attorney representing Perryton was to the effect that it has not been proved that a rate increase by the High Plains Natural Gas Co. is in the public interest nor that service to its customers will be impaired if the increase is not granted.

J. W. Elston of the gas company said that the matter of proper rate determination is solely for the railroad commission and not for the court and he asked that this motion be dismissed.

Judge Max Boyer announced that he would have a decision in 10 days after studying the briefs.

So, the matter is literally hanging in the balance. Both cities await Judge Boyer's decision as to whether or not the case can be heard in District Court. If he rules that it can not, as to where the case will go from there, is still a question.

CONCLUDES PASTORATE DUTY SUN.

Rev. George Bollinger, pastor of the Union Church for the past few years, will conclude his pastorate duties this Sunday when he preaches the morning and evening worship sermons.

The church has announced the services of a new pastor for the near future.

Death Takes Richard Nealy

Funeral services for Richard A. Nealy, 48-year old Stinnett restaurant operator, were conducted at 2 p.m. Tuesday in the Assembly of God Church in Stinnett.

For former Spearman resident, was pronounced dead on arrival at 1:15 a.m. Saturday at Borger's North Plains Hospital.

Nealy was the operator of the Hillcrest and Falcon Restaurants in Stinnett. He had lived there about 8 months having moved there from Canadian where he had operated a restaurant for several years.

According to reports in the Borger newspaper, Nealy collapsed in the Hillcrest Restaurant about 25 minutes after having been in a scuffle with a patron whom he reportedly had admonished for using loud language.

Justice of the Peace J. E. Early ordered an autopsy in the death. It was conducted Saturday.

Nealy is survived by his wife, Sara; three sons: Richard Wayne, Travis and Gordon and four daughters,

Nina Lou, Joella, Becky and Jane, all of the home; his mother Mrs. H. L. Nealy of Webb City, Mo.; three brothers, Horace, San Francisco, Calif.; Gordon, Webb City; and Charles, with the U. S. Air Force, and three sisters: Mrs. Nellie Stevens, San Francisco; Mrs. Shirley Chambers, Kansas City, Mo.; and Mrs. Ruby Rees, Webb City, Mo.

Rev. George Bollinger, pastor of Spearman's Union Church, conducted funeral services in Stinnett. Burial was in Hansford County Cemetery.

Public Meet July 1 With Telephone Co. Officials

Spearman's City Council Monday night awarded \$70,522.00 in water improvement bids. At a bid of \$43,747.00, Wes-Tex Construction Company of Borger was awarded the bid for the Bogster station and equipment needed at the new city water well. The bid for a 500,000 gallon storage tank went to Corbett Brothers of Fort Worth at a cost of \$26,775.00.

Councilmen had a surprise visit from telephone company officials who reviewed their recent plea for a general rate increase and announced that they will be in Spearman for a public meeting at 8 p.m. July 1. Everyone is welcome to attend this hearing concerning the telephone rate increase for the City of Spearman.

The board voted to pay an additional \$6,000.00 on the building note and to hire a contractor to begin the essential remodeling necessary before the library can be moved from the courthouse into the new building on main street.

The building, formerly housing the Excel Chevrolet Company, was purchased in November 1967 from Mr. Erlis Pittman. At this time the board paid \$6,000.00 and gave Pittman a note for \$25,000. With Monday's payment of an additional six thousand, this leaves a balance of \$19,000.00 indebtedness.

The library will be moved as soon as the remodeling is completed.

Washington Report

From Congressman

Congress reacted quickly to the tragedy in Los Angeles. The Crime bill passed by the House last year and amended by the Senate was already scheduled for approval by the House when Senator Robert F. Kennedy was gunned down. Efforts by the chairman of the House Judiciary Committee to send the bill to a House-Senate conference where it could be emasculated of the Senate amendments were decisively defeated. The next day, the House passed the bill by an overwhelming vote. While there is a firearms section in the bill which I consider too stringent--shot-guns and rifles are not included--the choice after the effort to send it to conference was a straight "yes" or "no" vote for the whole bill.

The National Rifle Association, although recognizing the objectionable features in the firearms legislation, also recognized the need for a strong bill to help curb crime. NRA, under the circumstances, did not object to adoption of the bill. Had the bill gone to conference, the chairman of the House Judiciary Committee would undoubtedly have attempted to substitute much more restrictive gun controls than those actually in the Act. And there undoubtedly will be a renewed effort now for stricter firearms laws. But in spite of the emotional outcries against firearms, those who demand more laws overlook the most important factor in the whole crime problem--the laws we now have are not enforced.

ed. Congressman Tom Curtis of Missouri, a Republican who is running for the Senate, made a point of this on the floor the day the crime bill was considered. "We do not need more laws," Curtis told House members. "We need enforcement of laws that are on the books. Our Committee on Ways and Means held hearings on this matter two years ago. We had the Attorney General of the United States come before us with examples of guns being sold across our borders to criminals, this is against these laws. I think 40 were sold by one operator in Maryland which were shipped to criminals in the District of Columbia. I asked the Attorney General then whether they had revoked the Federal license that this gun dealer in Maryland had. They had not done that. Had they carried out the law requiring this gun dealer to keep a list by name and address of those to whom he sold the guns? They did not check on that. Did they

require these people to identify themselves so that they could not use fictitious names? They had not done that. They had done nothing. To this very day the Attorney General of the United States is not enforcing these laws, nor is the Department of the Treasury, which has a part of this jurisdiction for the enforcement of these laws, enforcing them." Preceding Curtis, Rep. Paul C. Jones, also of Missouri and a Democrat was highly critical of the Attorney General and the need for law enforcement. He said "I am referring particularly to the attitude of those in high places--in the executive, in the judicial, and in the legislative branches of our Government--where we apparently have been more interested in protecting and justifying the lawless actions of those who riot, kill, burn, steal, and rape than in protecting the innocent." The wave of fear that grips the nation's capital and other cities will not be

dispelled by more study commissions but only by a return to law enforcement by all departments of the government. And this new direction must come from the White House before the nation degenerates into a complete state of anarchy. Continued tolerance of violence could spell the end of Democracy in America.

Almond Electric Mixer Pastry one 8-inch pie, double crust or cutouts

1 3/4 cups enriched instantized all purpose flour
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup chopped blanched almonds

3/4 cup shortening
1/4 teaspoon almond extract
1/4 cup cold water
desired filling

Stir flour, salt and nuts together in large mixing bowl. Add shortening; mix at low speed about 1 minute, scraping bowl constantly. Combine almond extract and water; add and mix until all flour is moistened and dough begins to gather into beaters, about 1 minute. Scrape bowl constantly. Form dough into ball; divide in half. Roll one portion on lightly floured surface to circle 1/8 inch thick; fit loosely into pan. Fill with desired filling. Trim pastry and flute edge. Bake in preheated 425 degree oven 25 to 30 minutes, or until filling is cooked and crust is lightly browned. To make pastry cutouts: roll out dough to 1/8 inch thickness, cut desired shapes. Brush with milk to aid browning if desired. Place on baking sheet and bake in preheated 425 degree oven 3 to 6 minutes, or until lightly browned. Arrange on baked pie.

STRAWBERRY KOLACHES

This is a variation of an old Bohemian recipe and a delicious one for Sunday breakfast, a morning coffee or just a treat for your family anytime.

1 yeast cake	2 Tbsps. sugar
1/4 warm water	1 cup boiling water
1/4 cup shortening	1 egg
1/4 tsp. salt	3 cups flour (about)

Griffin's Strawberry Preserves

Dissolve yeast in warm water. Put shortening, sugar and salt in large bowl and pour in boiling water. Stir until ingredients are dissolved. When they are lukewarm, add the dissolved yeast, beat in the egg and stir in the flour. Cover with a clean cloth and let rise until doubled in bulk.

Pinch off small pieces of dough with buttered hands and place in greased muffin tins. Cover the tops with melted butter and let rise about 1 hour. Then make holes in the rolls and put in 1 tsp. strawberry preserves. Continue to let rise for another hour. Bake in 425° oven about 20 minutes.

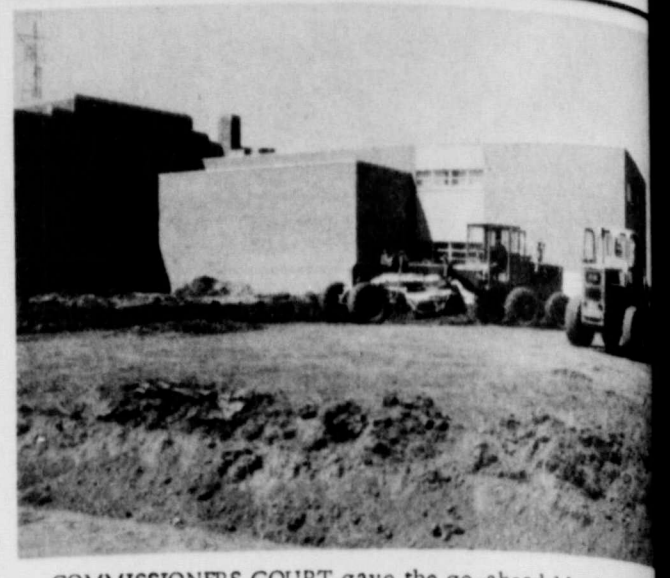

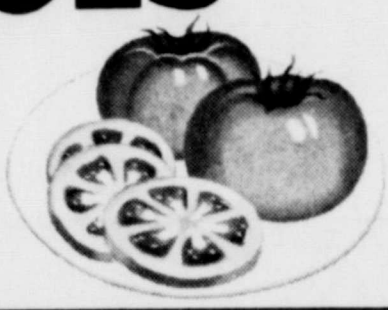
