Born July 17, 1904 in Lin-dale, Walker attended high school in Memphis, Texas. Survivors include his wife, Gwen: two daughters, one brother and five sisters, one of which is Mrs. Thelma Vaughn of Spearman.

Board members hired Mr. Cunningham in a meeting held Tuesday night at a salary of \$15,000.00. They also accepted the resignation of Mrs. Jerry Ralls. Mrs. Ralls, who has been grade school music teacher, has resigned to move to Houston where she has accepted another job.

Reared on a farm in Collingsworth County, he graduated from Samnorwood High School and entered Texas Tech in 1944 where he attended one year prior to entry into the army. He served two years as paratrooper in the 82nd Airborne Div., and returned to Tech in 1947. He graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Agriculture with a major in Agricultural Ed. He taught one year in the Collingsworth Veterans school before being employed at Whiteface in the fall of 1951 as a science teacher in junior high and assistant

coach. In 1959 he completed requirements for his Master of Education degree and has completed twelve additional hours of Doctoral program

He was selected to Who's Who in American Education and Who's Who In Texas Today in 1968. He has served as vice president of 4-county Texas Association of School Administrators organization and is a member of Phi Delta

Mr. Cunningham is very active in church and civic work. He is a Key member of Lions International and has served as president of the Whiteface Lions club, Zone Chairman of District 2-T-2; and president of Little League baseball. He is currently serving of Great Plains Municipal Gas Corp.
