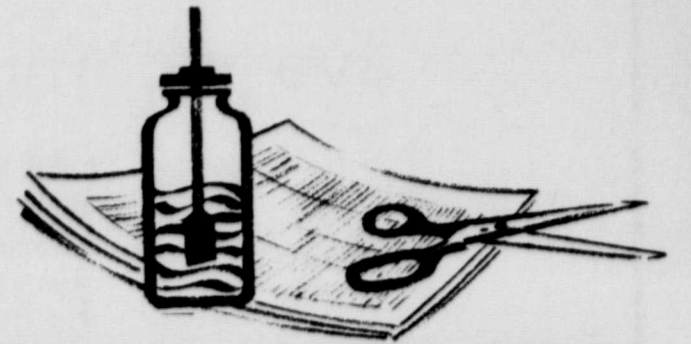

Students To Attend Citizenship Seminar

Two high school students from this county will attend the sixth annual Texas Farm Bureau Citizenship Seminar on August 3 on the campus of Baylor University in Waco, according to Joe Dan Spearman, president of the Hansford County Farm Bureau.

The students are Lynna Mackie, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Glen Mackie, Wade W. Morse of Morse High School, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. B. Morse.

The annual training school for high school juniors and seniors is an intensive course in citizenship, our American heritage and the proper role of government, according to Bryan.

It is designed to complement the formal education of these young folks and make them citizens more responsible, the local farm leader said.

The county Farm Bureau sponsors the local students by paying their tuition, room and board and transportation to and from Waco. Travel is by chartered bus. A total of 425 students from 156 counties are enrolled for this year's seminar.

Survivors include her husband Silva; daughters, Mrs. Viola Wallin of Dallas and Mrs. Paul Hazelwood of Spearman; sons, Billy of Garland and Bobby of Lefors; 14 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Public Invited To View Textbook List

It is hereby announced by the Spearman Independent School District by orders of Dr. J. W. Edgar, Commissioner of Education of the Texas Education Agency, that the list of books which publishers intend to submit to the State Board of Education for adoption in November, 1968, is now on file in the School Superintendent's office at 403 East 11th Avenue, Spearman, Texas. This list is also on file in the office of the Spearman Reporter and may be viewed by any patron of the public schools of Texas.

Anyone desiring to protest the adoption of any of the books submitted can also gain directions on procedure and deadline dates for so doing from either of the two places mentioned above.

The textbooks will be used beginning September 1, 1969, if no protests are entered and if the State Board of Education adopts the list during their next meeting October 8, 1968, 9 a. m. in the Board Room of the Texas Education Agency.
