Charge 'Ridiculous' Says FB President

Texas Farm Bureau President Sidney Dean today said that he has no intention of taking part in a series of proposed public debates with Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman to discuss Farm Bureau policies. Dean's remarks were in answer to a statement issued by Naman this week.

Naman attacked Farm Bureau policy development, charged the organization as bearing the major responsibility for the low wheat and feed grain prices farmers are now receiving and suggested that Dean answer these charges in public debate.

In regard to Farm Bureau policy development, Dean said, "The 105,653 farm and ranch families who make up the membership of the Texas Farm Bureau are well aware of the method by which all policies of this organization are developed. For it is the members who initiate and adopt the policies through member and delegate action at county, state and national conventions."

The president of the state's largest farm organization termed the remarks blaming

Farm Bureau for causing low prices of farm commodities as ridiculous, and said, "The low price of wheat and feed grain, as well as other commodities, is the result of present supply management programs which have been and continue to be opposed by Farm Bureau."

"In 1963, the Secretary of Agriculture and his supporters promised \$2 wheat if given a supply-management program. Having had this program in effect for several years, wheat prices are now at a 26 year low. And after more than thirty years of efforts in supply-management legislation, farm parity income is at its lowest ebb," Dean added.

Enrollment For School Scheduled

Enrollment dates have been set by the Spearman public schools. All classes start Wednesday, August 28, 8:25 a. m.

High school students who did not attend school in Spearman last year, should report to the High School principal's office sometime during the week of August 12-16 between 9 a. m. and 3:30 p. m. in order to enroll and make out schedules. Any students needing schedule changes should come by the Principal's office during this time.

Elementary or junior high students who did not attend Spearman schools last year, will report to their school for enrollment Monday August 26 between the hours of 1:00 to 3:00 p. m.

Registration, election of class officers, locker assignments, issuing of books, etc. will take place on August 26 for all HIGH SCHOOL students according to the following schedule:

9:00 a. m. Seniors report to HS auditorium.

10:30 a. m. Juniors report to HS auditorium.

1:00 p. m. Sophomores, to HS auditorium.

2:30 p. m. Freshmen, HS auditorium.

High school students are classified at the beginning of each school year in this manner: 0-4 credits, Freshman, 5-9 credits, Sophomore, 10-14 credits Junior, 15 credits or above, Senior. Any student who is not certain of his classification should contact the principal's office.

Newspapers to receive the award are nominated by Vocational Ag Teachers in each of the 53 districts in Texas. The Terrace Motor Hotel will be the site of the annual meeting which will kick off Monday August 12 with registration at 3 P. M.

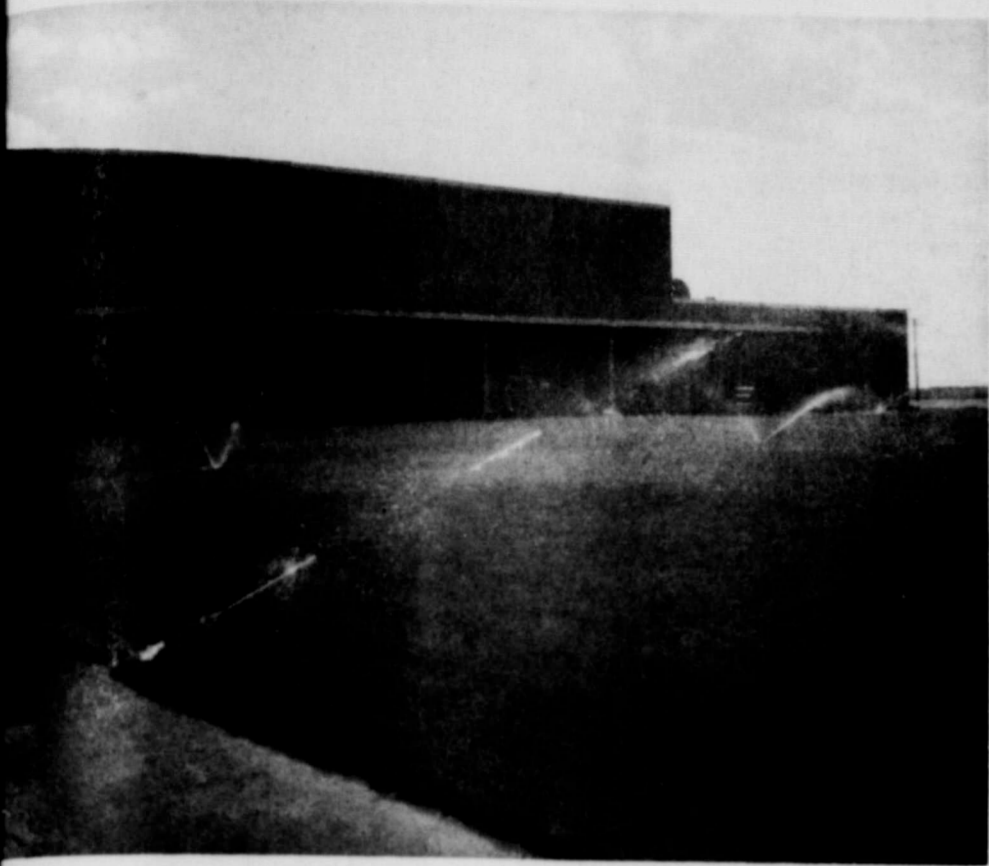
The Awards Breakfast is scheduled for 7 A. M., August 14 in the Ballroom of the Terrace Motor Hotel in Austin.

The constitutional amendments appearing on the ballot in the general election on November 5, 1968, are the 14th, 15th, 16th, 17th, 18th, 19th, 20th, 21st, 22nd, 23rd, 24th, 25th, 26th, 27th, 28th, 29th, 30th, 31st, 32nd, 33rd, 34th, 35th, 36th, 37th, 38th, 39th, 40th, 41st, 42nd, 43rd, 44th, 45th, 46th, 47th, 48th, 49th, 50th, 51st, 52nd, 53rd, 54th, 55th, 56th, 57th, 58th, 59th, 60th, 61st, 62nd, 63rd, 64th, 65th, 66th, 67th, 68th, 69th, 70th, 71st, 72nd, 73rd, 74th, 75th, 76th, 77th, 78th, 79th, 80th, 81st, 82nd, 83rd, 84th, 85th, 86th, 87th, 88th, 89th, 90th, 91st, 92nd, 93rd, 94th, 95th, 96th, 97th, 98th, 99th, 100th.

by this amendment, public employees will have greater assurance that the administering agency will be a permanent one.

Adequate safeguards for funds available for investment are included in the proposed amendment, however, under its terms, it is still possible for the Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System to place funds where greater returns on investment can be realized.

ARGUMENTS AGAINST The Employees Retirement System of Texas is already a statutory agency. As the Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System and the State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund now have constitutional status, it is not necessary that the agency be given this status also. There is no need to lengthen an already bulging Constitution by adding non-essential provisions that can be effectuated by statute.

The broadened investment authority granted the Board of Trustees whereby stocks of companies within the United States may be purchased with money from the Retirement,

Disability and Death Compensation Fund is largely a technical change in that the Board already has comparable authority. It is authorized to purchase the same securities that are now or may hereafter be permitted by law as invest-

ments for the Permanent University Fund or the Permanent School Fund.

About this series:

Publication is being made in The Spearman Reporter of seven of the fourteen proposed amendments to the State Constitution which will be voted on at the November general election. These publications, required by law, were divided between the Gruver Leader and the Reporter. Amendments 2, 3, 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11 are being published in this newspaper, the others are being published in the Gruver Leader.

With this issue, and continuing for the next few weeks, Reporter is beginning a series of articles explaining the background, general provisions and arguments for and against each of the 14 proposed amendments so that interested citizens can check the commentary and be better informed.

Some of these amendments are "local amendments" which actually pertain primarily to a particular county. Also included are several amendments which have been voted down before, but are back again. These deal with the pension and retirement system for state employees, and one that would raise the state welfare spending limit.

In listing arguments FOR and AGAINST, the Reporter is merely presenting the arguments most commonly offered by proponents and opponents of each proposal.

Reduced Long Distance Rates Are Effective

A reduction of long distance rates went into effect for General Telephone Company of the Southwest customers on August 1 as a result of the recent ruling by the Federal Communications Commission which ordered the American Telephone and Telegraph Company to cut long distance rates by \$20,000,000 annually.

The reductions will be 5 to 10¢ from the charge for the first three minutes on daytime week-day station-to-station calls. These are calls placed between 7 A. M. and 5 P. M. Monday through Friday.

This is the 23rd time interstate rates have been cut since coast to coast service began in 1915. During that time, the cost of transcontinental calls has dropped to as little as 75¢ (station-to-station between midnight and 7 A. M.) from \$20.70 in 1915. Rates have been about halved since 1945 in contrast to 77% consumer price index rise.

Gulf Schedules Hansford Test

Operators of the Texas Pathhandle filed five locations last week with the Pampa office of the Texas Railroad Commission. There were three oilers and one gasser reported completed in the week.

Gulf Oil Corporation scheduled the second confirmation test to its central Hansford County discovery by filing its No. 1 Rhonda Hart which opened the North Gruver (Hepler) Field. The No. 1 Rhonda Hart potential for 72 million cubic feet of gas daily from Hepler perforations between 5,782 to 5,792 feet. It was also completed from Upper Morrow perforations between 6,334-6,364 feet for 10.2 million cubic feet of gas daily.

The first confirmation was scheduled the week before by Gulf at its No. 1 Anna Cooper, one mile south of the opener. Both confirmation tests are proposed to 7,000 feet.

The scheduled Hart well is located 1980 feet from South and 660 feet from West lines, Sec. 44, P. H&GN, 2 miles northeast from Gruver.

Food Swindle

COLLEGE STATION, Aug. 8. Trusting consumers from coast to coast are being trapped by the freezer-meat fraud, according to Wanda Meyer, Extension home management specialist.

The gypsters hawk frozen meat in hundred pound lots at come-on prices of 29¢ to 39¢ a pound. They are known as "beef baiters" for their use of "bait-and-switch" selling.

A set pattern of fraudulent tactics emerges from the record of state and Federal actions--largely ineffective against the beef baiters. Mrs. Meyer, with Texas A&M University, tells how the racket works:

The bait--Newspaper advertising is the bait. A typical ad may show a profile of a black angus steer with copy which proclaims: "Gov't. Inspected-Tender-Delicious BEEF SIDES, No money down 31¢ pound.

Includes: All cuts of beef, steaks, roasts, etc."
.. The first switch--When you answer the ad, the salesman says: "You really would not feed this to your family."

.. The tour switch--He walks you past good-looking beef, ending at a piece of carcass covered with a thick heavy layer of yellow fat, known in the trade as a "gem." Then he shows you good-looking meat at twice the price.

.. The installment sales contract--The "better" meat comes only in larger quantities than you had intended to buy. Therefore, the beef baiter sells it to you on credit. He sells the contract to a finance company, thus escaping any obligation to adjust your complaints; the finance company won't listen either.

.. Hidden extra costs--A legitimate freezer provisioner will trim from a side or quarter of beef about 25 percent. He resells the trimmings to others. Thus, beef priced at 79¢ per pound may cost you \$1.58 trimmed.

.. Substitution--Unless you insist on witnessing the cutting and packaging, your order may be filled with meat from a carcass other than the one you picked out. If you bought a hindquarter you may get some inferior forequarter cuts.

.. Storage losses--The beef baiter imitates his legitimate competitors by providing freezer service. If you take your meat home a few cuts at a time, you will never be able to prove he has cheated you.

.. Phony grades--The ads may misrepresent the USDA grade or use pseudo-grade names, such as Supreme, Select and Choice Select.

.. Money-back guarantee--The beef baiters promise, if kept, means he'll pay back only the price of what was left after he trimmed the meat--perhaps half what you paid him.

Mrs. Meyer says it is hard to identify beef baiters by their trade names because they change names and locations when necessary to thwart consumer protection agencies. Companies doing business as Angus, Black Angus, Steakland, Bonanza, Just Good Meat and Beefland have been named in Government complaints, but

honest butchers may also trade under those names.

What about protection by a government agency? The U. S. Department of Agriculture, in a landmark case, has charged Bruhn's Freezer Meat of Chicago, which operates from at least 25 locations under almost as many names, with using the beef baiters false and deceptive advertising tactics and other violations of the Packers and Stockyards Act.

The case is already two years old. Some time this year, perhaps, the USDA examiner will hand down his decision. If he finds Bruhn and its owners guilty as charged, they will almost certainly take the case into Federal courts. Years will go by before the final decision. In the meantime, aside from a few Federal Trade Commission actions and actions by the California State Attorney General, very little is being done to protect the consumer. The beef baiters ads keep appearing in the papers.

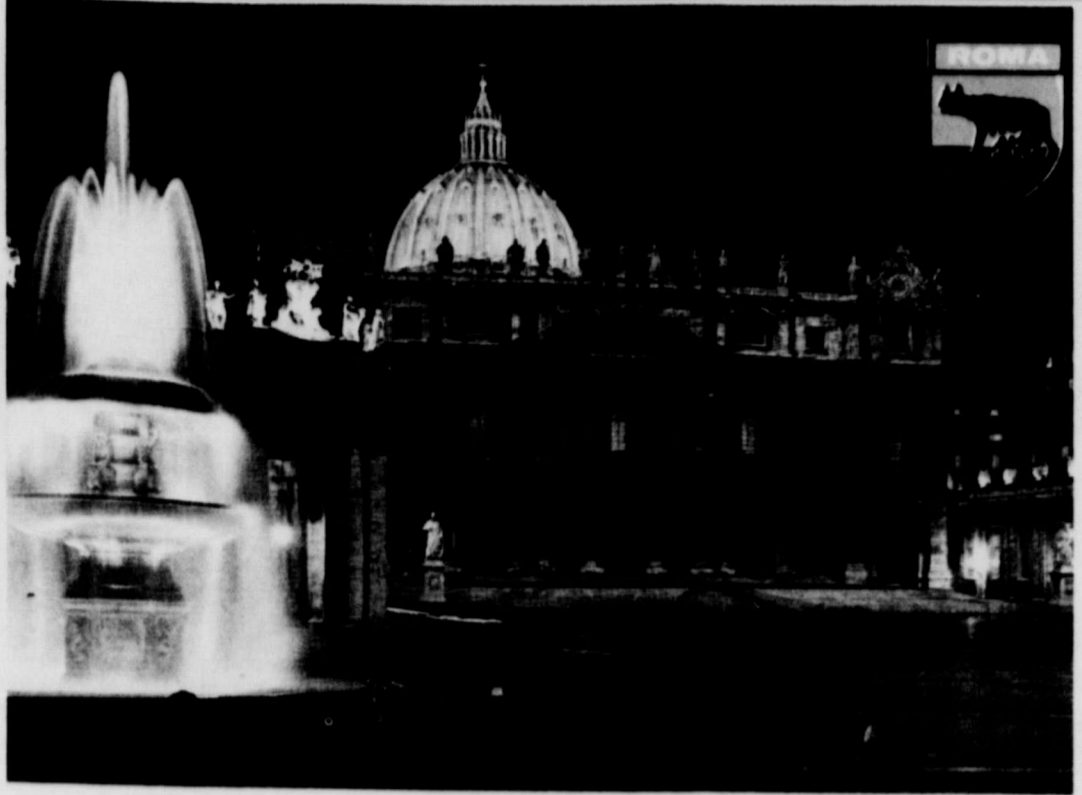
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 1-j to read as follows: "Section 1-j. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 1-i of this article, the Legislature may provide for the refund of the tax paid on the sale of cigars and tobacco products in this state which are subsequently sold at retail within the corporate limits of Texarkana, Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas contiguous to Texarkana."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 11a, Article VII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 11a. Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR41)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended, so as to read as follows: "Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be deemed expedient, for assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services for: (1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years and are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; (2) Needy individuals who are citizens of the United States who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixtieth (60th) birthday and who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps; (3) Needy blind persons who are citizens of the United States and who are over the age of eighteen (18) years; (4) Needy children who are citizens of the United States and who are under the age of twenty-one (21) years, and to the caretakers of such children.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 48a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the state; provided that the amount contributed by the state to such fund each year shall be equal to the aggregate amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such district; and provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered ten (10) years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before either attaining the age fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service, but shall be entitled to refund of moneys paid into the fund.

"Moneys coming into such fund shall be managed and invested as provided in Section 48b of Section III of the Constitution of Texas; provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as

may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other state pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such other state pension or retirement fund, contributed by the state, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid; provided, however, that this Section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words: "FOR the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

Research

The Renner Foundation, located in the Blackland of North Central Texas, has done considerable research on residues. Their report states "burning certainly is the shortest route to bankruptcy, both on the farm, and at the bank." They employ a system of shredding residues, and then incorporating them into the top two to four inches of the soil by two tandem discings. It is reported that 7,751 pounds of residue treated this way left only 2,565 pounds of residue on the surface after the treatment.

The Renner Foundation in conclusions on the application of residues to the soil surface found: (1) An increase in available soil moisture in the 0 to 10 inches depth; (2) An increase in soil aggregate stability; (3) Increase in water percolation; (4) Increase in total nitrogen; and (5) decreased bulk density.

A. W. Goettel, Canadian soil test scientist states that burning stubble from a 40 bushel per acre wheat crop wastes about \$3.00 worth of nitrogen and phosphorous per acre.

Some farmers who burn stubble claim that it increases yields, but Goettel says that although there may be an increase of 1 or 2 bushels per acre, this increase is neither certain nor constant. Even if it were, the value of straw for soil protection outweighs the value of the increased yield. Goettel says it is not true that stubble burning kills weed seeds. Tests have shown that the heat generated by burning the stubble has little effect on weeds or weed seeds. The organic matter from the straw contains plant nutrients, it also improves the soils ability to absorb and hold water. It increases the soils' capacity for aeration. Soils benefit from a good straw cover since it helps to protect against water and wind erosion. Heavy clay soils, where internal drainage is a problem, also, benefits from organic matter. Fertilization of heavy straw residues is important.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 1-e to read as follows: "Section 1-e. '1. From and after December 31, 1978, no State ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon any property within this State for State purposes except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning."

"2. The State ad valorem tax authorized by Article VII, Section 3, of this Constitution shall be imposed at the following rates on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the years 1968 through 1974: On January 1, 1968, Thirty-five Cents (35c); on January 1, 1969, Thirty Cents (30c); on January 1, 1970, Twenty-five Cents (25c); on January 1, 1971, Twenty Cents (20c); on January 1, 1972, Fifteen Cents (15c); on January 1, 1973, Ten Cents (10c); on January 1, 1974, Five Cents (5c); and thereafter no such tax for school purposes shall be levied and collected. An amount sufficient to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State shall be set aside from any revenues deposited in the Available School Fund, provided, however, that should such funds be insufficient, the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State.

"3. The State ad valorem tax of Two Cents (2c) on the One Hundred Dollars valuation levied by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution shall not be levied after December 31, 1976. At any time prior to December 31, 1976, the Legislature may establish a trust fund solely for the benefit of the widows of Confederate veterans and such Texas Rangers and their widows as are eligible for retirement or disability pensions under the provisions of Article XVI, Section 66, of this Constitution, and after such fund is established the ad valorem tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, shall not thereafter be levied.

"4. Unless otherwise provided by the Legislature, after December 31, 1976 all delinquent State ad valorem taxes together with penalties and interest thereon, less lawful costs of collection, shall be used to secure bonds issued for permanent improvements at institutions of higher learning, as authorized by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution.

"5. The fees paid by the State for both assessing and collecting State ad valorem taxes shall not exceed two per cent (2%) of the State taxes collected. This subsection shall be self-executing."

Section 2. That Article III, Section 51, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"The term 'governmental functions' as it relates to counties, includes all duties, activities and operations of statewide importance in which the county acts for the State, as well as of local importance, whether required or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State."

Section 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in El Paso and Tarrant counties."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Section 21 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows: "Section 21. All stationary and printing, except proclamations and such printing as may be done at the Texas School for the Deaf, and paper, except that for the Judicial Department, shall be furnished under contract, to be given to the lowest and best bidder under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law. No member or officer of any department of the government shall be in any way interested in such contract."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on

the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the constitutional amendment removing certain provisions relating to purchase of fuel and furnishing the rooms and halls of the Legislature and the requirement that the Governor, the Secretary of State, and the Comptroller must approve certain contracts of purchase."

(a) The Legislature may by statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within El Paso or Tarrant Counties. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require.

Know Your New Knits

COLLEGE STATION, Aug. 8. With the increase of knit fashions, knowing the care they require is important.

Check the fiber content of the knit garment or piece goods you purchase and pass the information along to your dry cleaner, recommends Graham Hard, Extension clothing specialist. Many knit garments are not labeled permanently. Therefore, your drycleaner has no way of knowing the fiber content unless you give it to him.

The Texas A & M University specialist stresses this because acrylic knits must be handled differently from wool knits. Knits of textured acetate require special handling in drycleaning. Knits containing heat-sensitive fibers should usually be air-dried and often cannot withstand the steam of finishing.

A drycleaner who is furnished the care information will be able to give you better service, reminds Dr. Hard.

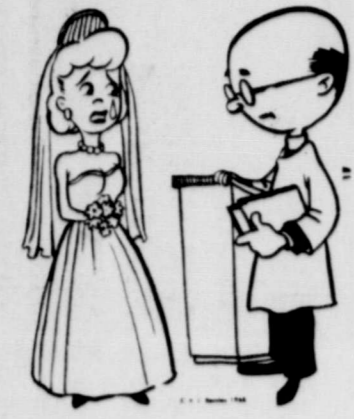

Candy Barr, a former Goree inmate, who is now a night club favorite, will appear each Sunday. The two-hour fast-moving show also features outlaw riders contesting the toughest rodeo stock of the state's penal system.

I don't know what got into Billy. Birthdays & anniversaries alike--they come and go un-noticed at our house except for maybe a reminder--"say you had a birthday last week didn't you?" Or--some-time about March--"we had an anniversary in January didn't we?" August 5 was his birthday and he reminded me of it daily for 2 weeks so I was forced to do something! Monday morn I arose still in doubt as to how to have a birthday party for someone who had long ago stopped having them. Desperate, I called Mrs. Carter Crawford who decorates the most fabulous cakes you ever saw. She consented to do one for me THAT day. It was beautiful. I called in a few kith 'n kin and we had punch & cake Monday night. Some party. He received an assortment of gifts--among which was a quart bottle of Milk of Magnesia, a large can of under-arm spray and a navel brush.

I have had the impression the past year that our stray dog problem in Spearman has all but vanished, at least in our neighborhood it has. However, we received a letter this week from one irate citizen who said: "I never saw so many dogs roaming the streets and in the yards. You can't have flowers or gardens and you can't even let your children out to play. These people have fenced-in yards, why don't they keep dogs where they belong? It is a disgrace to see all these dogs turned loose. Is there a law against shooting them? A few more aggravating days, and I'll be tempted." City ordinance No. 240--Sec. 7 forbids animals to run at large. Those caught doing so will be seized & impounded. Animals must be leashed or confined within a fenced area.

Although I do not know of a LAW against shooting a dog, I do know the City has one against discharging fire-

arms within the city limits--so shooting is OUT. Because of this, most animal haters then resort to poison which will get them in much trouble. There is a State law against this, for if any child were to accidentally consume it, the person who dispensed the poison would likely be charged with murder without malice.

Complaint or NOT, the city animal control picks up animals ALL THE TIME. In fact they gather on an average of 30 stray pets per month if they are found running at large. The sad thing is, about 20 of these are never claimed and have to be destroyed. So it makes you wonder if people REALLY love & care for their pets. If you are bothered with stray animals, I would strongly advise against taking the law into your own hands. This could create even more problems than a nasty front yard, uprooted flowers, etc. All you have to do is pick up the phone and call the City Hall.

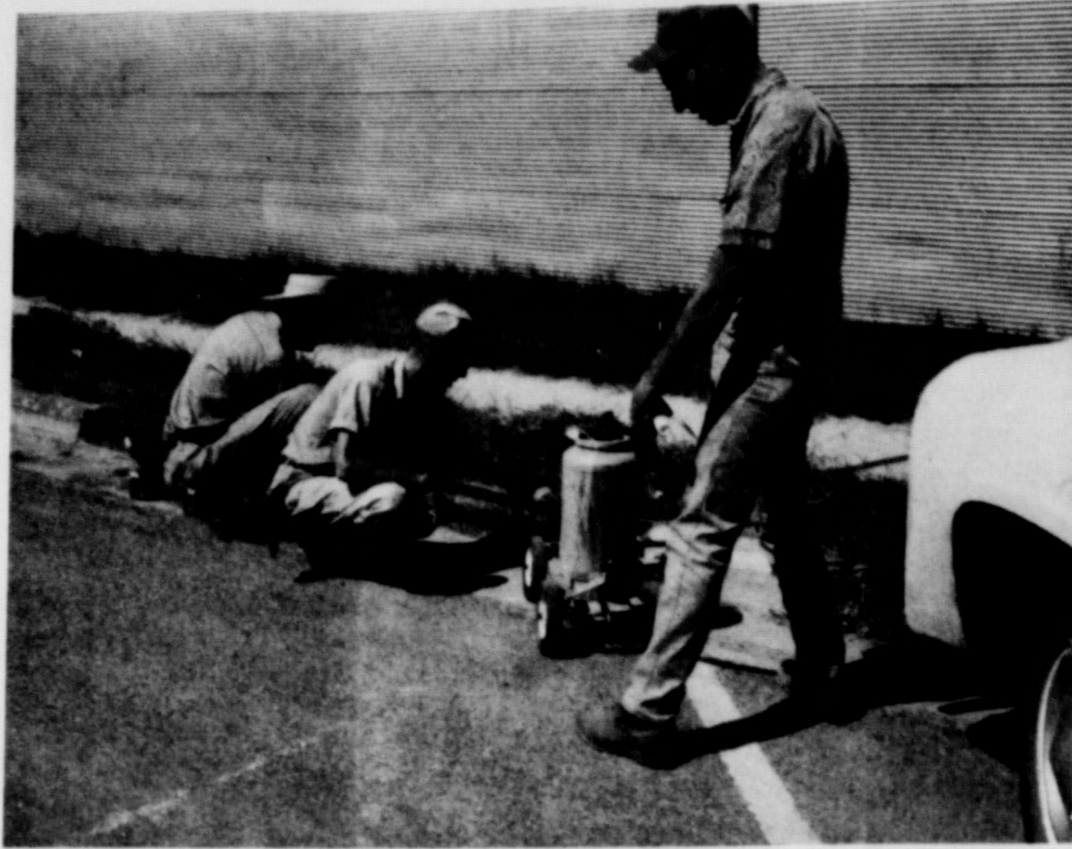

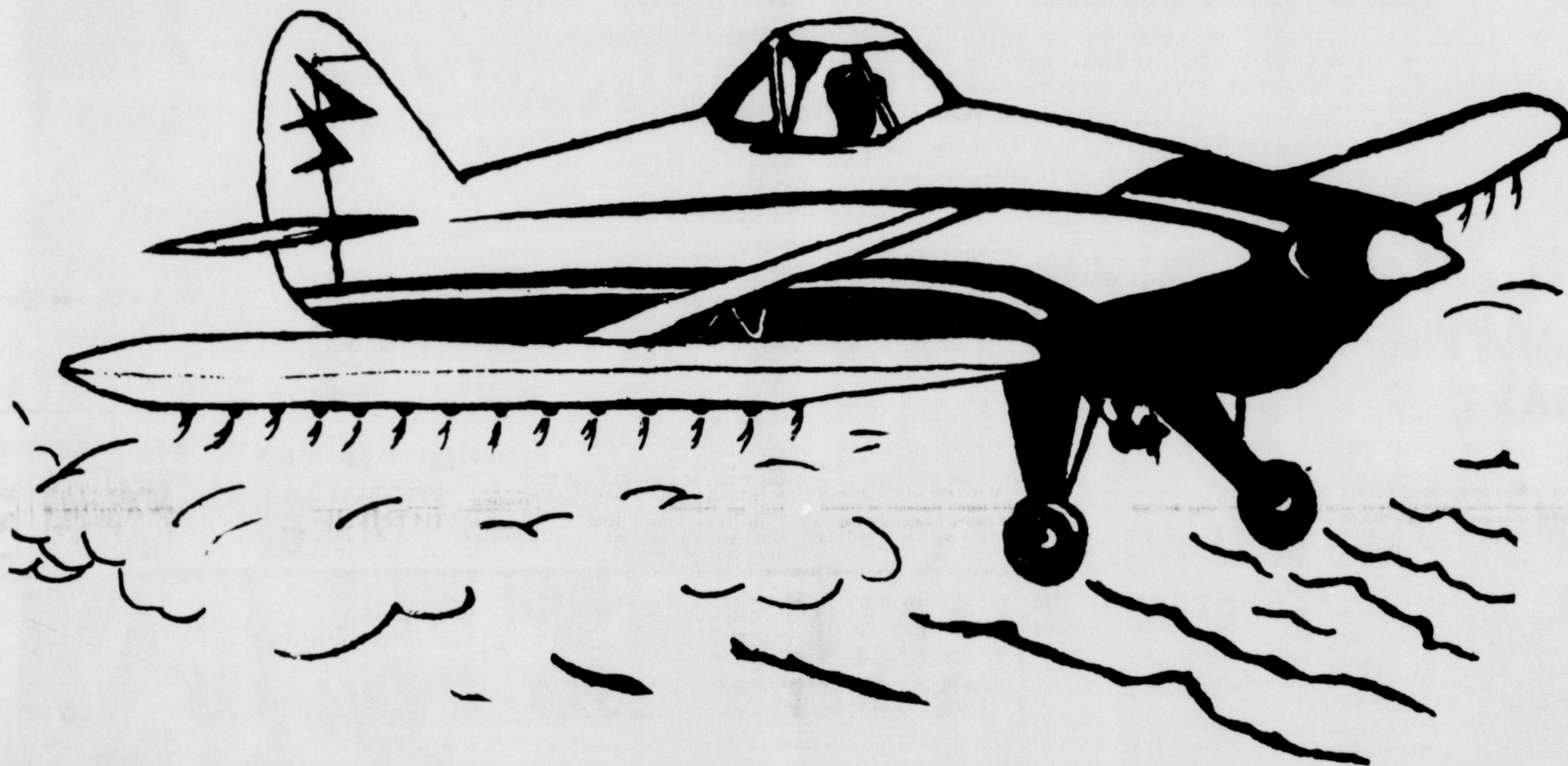
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
