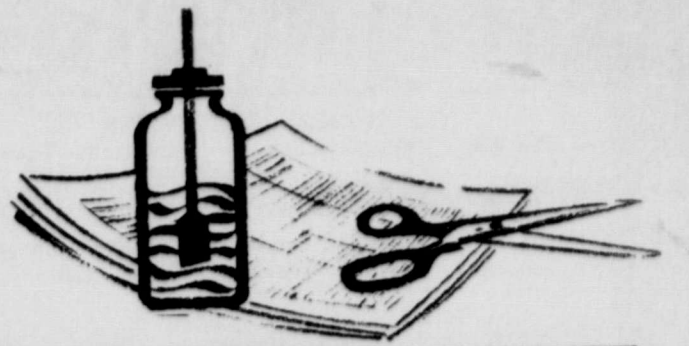

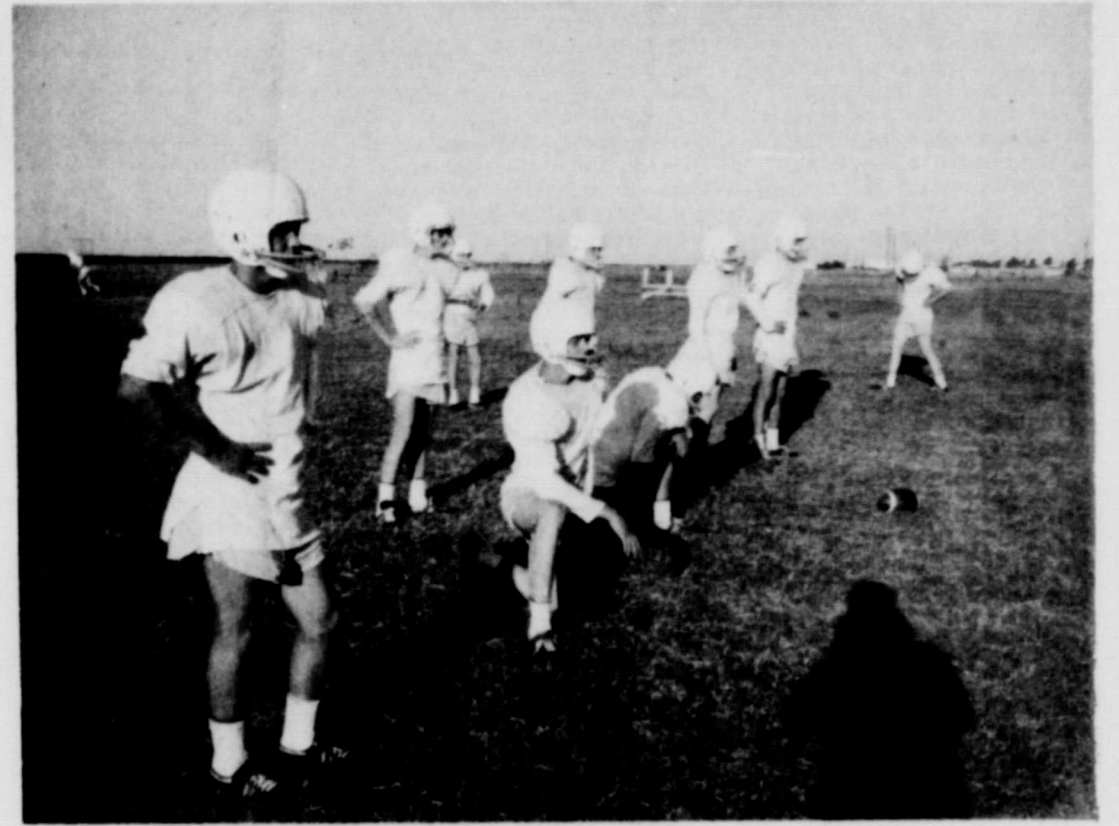

OPENING OF SCHOOL IS SCHEDULED FOR AUGUST 28

With all but two vacancies in Spearman Public School System filled, the first day of instruction for the 1968-69 school year will be Wednesday, August 28.

The exact times for registration is printed in the schedule below. Buses will run on registration days.

Students will attend regular classes Wednesday through Friday, will be dismissed for Labor Day Holiday, Monday, Sept. 2, and return on schedule, September 3, Tuesday.

Cafeterias will serve meals the first day of school.

Superintendent James Cunningham said this week he still lacks two teachers: a Junior High Social Studies instructor and a Music Teacher for Junior High.

Enrollment

Enrollment dates have been set by the Spearman public schools. All classes start Wednesday, August 28, 8:25 a.m.

High school students who did not attend school in Spearman last year, should report to the High School principal's office sometime during the week of August 12-16 between 9 a. m. and 3:30

p. m. in order to enroll and make out schedules. Any students needing schedule changes should come by the Principal's office during this time.

Elementary or junior high students who did not attend Spearman schools last year, will report to their school for enrollment Monday August 26 between the hours of 1:00 to 3:00 p. m.

Registration, election of class officers, locker assignments, issuing of books, etc. will take place on August 26 for all HIGH SCHOOL students according to the following schedule:

9:00 a. m. Seniors report to HS auditorium.
10:30 a. m. Juniors report to HS auditorium.
1:00 p. m. Sophomores, to HS auditorium.
2:30 p. m. Freshmen, HS auditorium.

High school students are classified at the beginning of each school year in this manner: 0-4 credits, Freshman, 5-9 credits, Sophomore, 10-14 credits Junior, 15 credits or above, Senior. Any student who is not certain of his classification should contact the principal's office.

Elementary enrollment for grades one through four follows:

First grade, 9-12 a. m. August 26 at school building. (NEW students, 1-3 p. m. Aug. 26.)

Second through fourth grades, 9-12 a. m. August 27.

Junior high enrollment schedule:

7th & 8th grades Aug. 26 9-10:30 a. m. (NEW students 1-3 p. m. Aug. 26)

5th & 6th grades Aug. 27, 9-10:30 a. m.

The Amendments

Amendment No. 3--Providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund by the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System in certain types of securities within the "prudent man rule." This proposed amendment broadens the base of the authority of the Board of Regents of the Texas University investing the Permanent University Fund.

ARGUMENTS FOR
The erosion in the value of the dollar, which has been under way for many years, and which seems to be accelerating, requires that changes be made in the basic format of the Permanent University Fund. Only by investing a greater portion of the fund in corporate stocks can the value of the fund and the income produced thereby be maintained, or increased. On August 31, 1967, the value of the U. S. Government bonds owned by the fund had declined 18.7 percent from their cost. The corporate stocks owned had increased 32.9 percent and were producing income at a rate of 28% in excess of the rate produced by the U. S. bonds. The elimination of the 50% restriction on the ownership of corporate securities is neces-

sary to safeguard the Permanent University Fund and its income in terms of the continually diminishing purchasing power of the dollar. Clearly, the current restrictions on the operation of the Permanent University Fund are not in keeping with investment policies widely accepted and practiced by the more successful college and university endowment funds. The elimination of the 50% restriction on the ownership of corporate securities is a necessary step to the modernization of the operation of the Permanent University Fund.

ARGUMENTS AGAINST
Fluctuations in the stock market affect the day-to-day value of the Permanent University Fund. The maintenance of present investment policies can reduce the impact of these fluctuations on the fund. For that reason, the 50% restriction on the amount of the fund allotted for investment in common stocks should be retained. The present restriction guarantees that at least half the endowment for The University of Texas System and Texas A & M University System is not subject to the possibility of capital loss, if such se-

curities are held to maturity. During the last few years, the stocks of many rapid-growth corporations have fluctuated because of unsettled conditions. This situation gives added support to maintaining present investment of a major portion of this fund could result in insufficient funds to meet bonded indebtedness for the extensive building programs undertaken by institutions participating in the fund.

1st Lt. Bob Whitson Cited For War Effort

1st Lieutenant Bob Whitson was promoted last week from Vietnam where he has served for 12 months. Whitson received the Commendation Medal for his meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against a hostile force during the Spring Offensive. The citation read: "Lieutenant Whitson distinguished himself by exceptionally meritorious achievement during the period January 30 to February 29, 1968

while serving as Detachment Commander, Advisory Team 37, Binh Thuan Province, Republic of Vietnam. On January 30, realizing the probability of a large scale Viet Cong attack, Lt. Whitson immediately took action to establish and improve the advisor team compound defenses. Due to advisor casualties, it became essential that he assume an additional duty as Assistant Operations officer in the Provincial Tactical Operations Center. He performed this duty in an exceptionally outstanding manner, coordinating the employment of United States Army of the Republic of Vietnam forces and air and naval gunfire support in counterattacks against the enemy forces. During the attacks, which continued in varying degrees of intensity until 25 February, Lieutenant Whitson displayed an operational ability far and above that expected of an officer of his grade and experience. Second Lieutenant Whitson's outstanding achievements were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon him-

self and the military service." Soon after this offensive, the Spearman soldier was promoted to First Lieutenant and is soon to come up for Captain's rating. Whitson, 26, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Whitson of Spearman. He has served two years with the US Army, one year of this in Vietnam. Following his 30-day furlough, he will be stationed at Ft. Bliss and will be eligible for discharge in eight months. His wife, Linda Jo, and 13-month old daughter, Christi have been residing in Farwell, Texas where she is a teacher in the Farwell Public Schools.

New Pastor

Reverend Jacob C. Regier took over his duties as new pastor for the Apostolic Faith Church last Sunday, August 18. He replaces former pastor Robert Gerouard who resigned earlier this summer. Rev. Regier is well known in this area, having been evangelist and pastor for many years in the Apostolic Faith movement. 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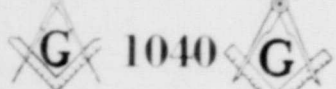
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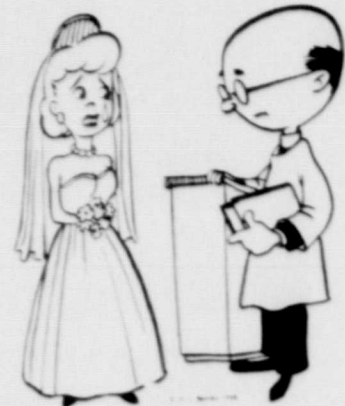

Revised Rules For School Lunch Room

As the schools open their doors for the 68-69 school year, the National School Lunch Program, America's largest, single food service operation, will begin serving nutritionally adequate meals across the nation. The meal pattern for the Type A lunch supplies one third to one half of the child's daily food needs. To meet these requirements each Type A lunch must contain as a minimum one-half pint whole milk, two ounces protein rich foods, three-fourths cup fruit or vegetable, one slice enriched bread, two teaspoons butter and other foods needed for energy and to satisfy the appetite.

Since studies show that Vitamin A and vitamin C are frequently short in the children's diet, special attention will be given to include a Vitamin C food in each lunch and Vitamin A food in lunches twice each week.

For better service for the students and faculty, Spearman Schools have two lunchrooms serving the same Type A menu each day, with a choice of meat items served at the High School Lunchroom. Chocolate or Plain

milk is available at either lunchroom and extra half-pints, other than the one served with the lunch may be purchased by students for 3¢ through the Special Milk Program. Iced tea and Ice Cream Novelties, 3¢ variety, are available for students and faculty at the High School Lunchroom.

Prices for school lunches will be:
 Grades 1 thru 8-----35¢
 Grades 9 thru 12-----45¢
 Faculty and visiting adults-----50¢

(No government subsidies for adult lunches)

For convenience, lunchroom tickets are available in 5, 10, 20 lunches. No price reduction is made when tickets are purchased. Tickets are available at either lunchroom. A refund for the amount of unused lunches on a ticket will be refunded only at the end of the school year or when a student is withdrawn from school. There will be no refunds on lost tickets. Present ticket to manager for refund when necessary.

High School students may not "Charge" for their lunches--one (1) charge will be permitted in grades

one through eight because of age of student. Tickets for school lunches will be available at the School Lunchrooms and Elementary School Building during registration, Aug. 26 and 27. Parents are encouraged to purchase tickets during registration to avoid waiting in line on opening day.

Parents are welcome to eat lunch with their children, however with the large number of students served at the Elementary and Junior High lunch room it would be appreciated if you would not make arrangements to eat lunch with your child.

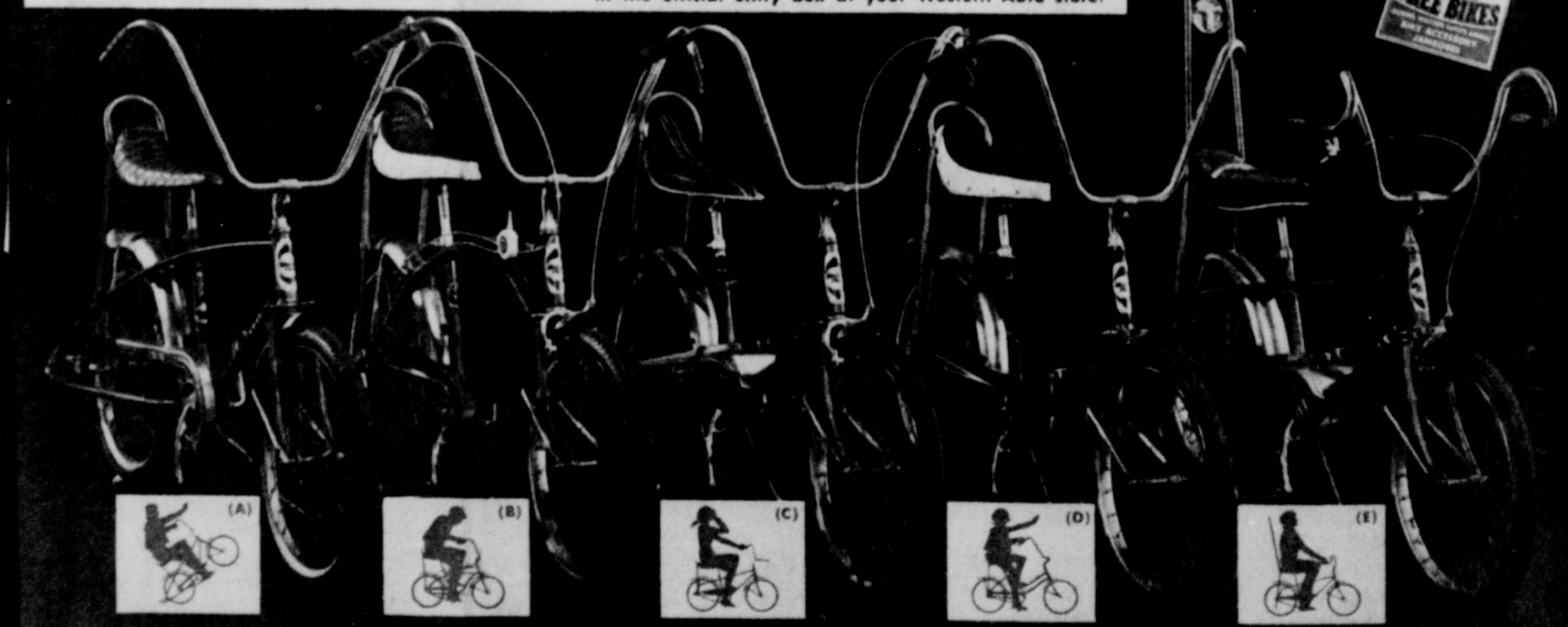

Field Day Sept. 12

In preparation for the Semi-annual meeting of the Board of Trustees and the 12th Annual Field Day of the High Plains Research Foundation on September 12, the Wheat and Small Grains Commodity Committee recently had its initial meeting at Halfway.

The committee will be hosts at an exhibit during the open house and Field Day showing samples of various types of wheat and small grains, along with information about the crops. Also, the products of these grains will be on display.

A discussion of the 1968 research program was held and recommendations were prepared for the 1969 farm program. These included (1) wheat and barley variety performance studies, (2) a combination fertilizer-irrigation test, with the addition of a simulated grazing study which was instigated by the doubtful economics of wheat for grain alone; (3) wheat stubble burning followed by soybeans and grain sorghum, tilling the stubble followed by both crops, and leaving the stubble with no follow crops for comparative effects on soil composition and structure; (4) a study on young cotton using dead wheat stubble as a protective measure, with the wheat stubble and weeds being controlled by herbicides; and (5) fall planting of some new varieties of barley.

Members of the Wheat and Small Grains Committee are Leo Witkowski, Chairman, Hereford; Dick Brown, Hartley; Cone Donelson, Stratford; Drew Ellis, Perryton; Eddie Joe Fortenberry, Lockney; Joe Foster, Lockney; W. E. Miller, Springlake; Bruce Parr, Friona; R. G. Peeler, Hereford; Jim Wedel, Muleshoe; Asa Willis, Texline; and Donald Wooten, Crosbyton.

TOPIC: WILL THEY SEND YOU TO JAIL?

A lot of folks talk about Internal Revenue putting you in jail for cheating on your income tax. However, there's not a large number of people who actually end up behind bars as a result of tax fraud. This doesn't mean that it has become advisable to start cheating on your income tax. Internal Revenue does not undertake the investigation of fraud against a taxpayer lightly. Before they present a tax fraud case to the Justice Department and finally to the Grand Jury, and the Judge and the Jury, they must be able to prove that the taxpayer was guilty of cheating on his taxes, and that there was a deliberate intent or malice aforethought involved. It's not unusual to read that the jury found, after trial of a taxpayer, that he was not guilty of criminal fraud. However this taxpayer still must pay his taxes and civil fraud penalties and interest. Those taxpayers who manage to escape detection even though Internal Revenue has all types of records and sources available to them often wish that they had paid the additional tax so they could stop worrying about the tax man finding them out.

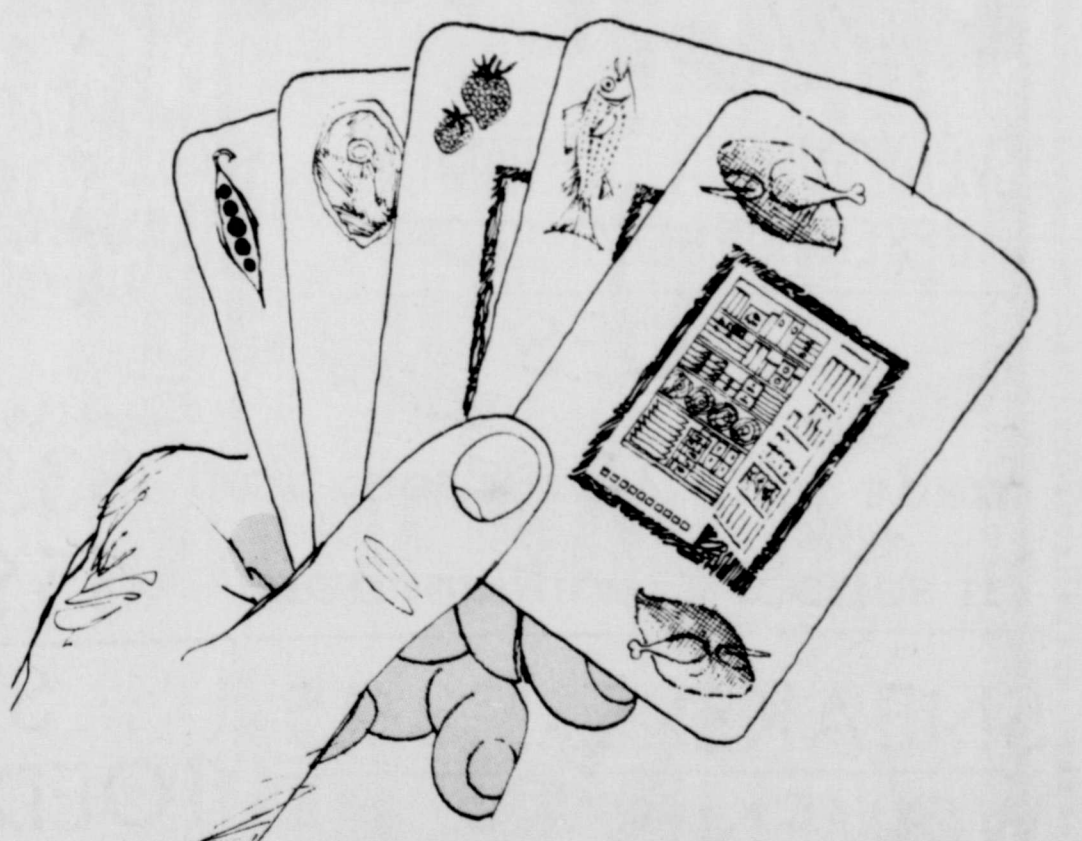

The member losing the most weight for the month of July, totaled a loss of 8 3/4 pounds. One member, who joined the club the first of June, has lost a total of 29 pounds.

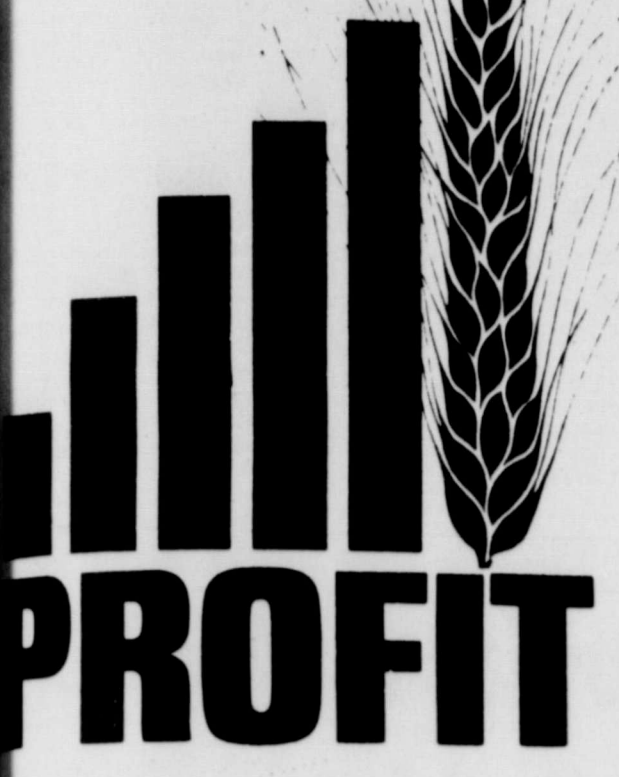
The next four weeks the contest will be between the 12 top losers of the club against the other 12 members. This contest will begin this Friday evening.

Man Charged With Car Burglaries
