MEMBERS GIVE NOD TO COUNTRY CLUB PROJECT

A meeting held Tuesday in the court house, members of the Hansford County Club voted 52 to 25 to enter into a working agreement with a group who desire to build a Country Club. The meeting had been prepared for by members of the Country Club issue who were present.

D. E. Hackley, president of the Golf Club, presided at the meeting attended by approximately 76 of the 117 members of the present Golf Club.

James P. Linn acted as spokesman for the Country Club issue and explained, in detail, the plans which have been developed so far. A group of county business men have obtained an option on 65 acres of land adjoining the present 9 hole course.

Country Club facilities include a club house, dining room, restaurant, meeting rooms, social room, lounge floor, and a pro shop, and shower facilities adjoining the club house. Also to be constructed are a swimming pool, tennis courts, and additional 9 hole golf course.

The proposed Country Club is expected to cost between \$1,000,000 to \$1,750,000. The money is available either from Farmers Home Administration or Perryton Savings & Loan Company. These loan agencies offer 100% financing on a 40-year basis at 5 1/2% interest, with no personal liability on the part of any member.

At the Tuesday night meeting, Country Club spokesmen mentioned as to what kind of figures they were able to present pertaining to monthly operational expenses, etc.

It was explained that members of the present golf club do not wish to join the country club but will be able to continue to play the present 9 hole course without any additional expense because of the proposed project. The Country Club and the Golf Club will be maintained as two separate corporations and the financing of the additional facilities will be handled through the Country Club Corp.

If present golf club members do wish to join the country club, they may do so by paying a \$100. membership fee (new Country Club members will be assessed a joining fee of approximately \$250.00). Monthly dues for Country Club members would amount to approximately \$20.00. Golf Club members who wish to use only the present 9 hole course can do so for the current \$7.00 monthly dues charge, and would be able to use the pro shop, showers and locker rooms.

The group Tuesday night was assured that no indebtedness will be incurred by the Golf Club, nor will any of the members of the two clubs be personally responsible for any of the indebtedness.

Linn, in speaking for the Country Club, said "membership will be open to everybody who wants to join because this project isn't being built for a small clique of people, neither do we want to exclude or cut out any golfer

making it impossible for him to continue to enjoy the game because of too-high dues." He went ahead to state that the project will be used as a well balanced 18-hole course.

After much discussion, the membership was polled for voice votes whether or not to enter into a working agreement with the Country Club. The decision carried 52 "yes" and 25 "no".

The next procedure will be to organize a Country Club Corporation, appoint its board members, and actually "draw up" a working agreement which will be submitted to the board of directors of the present Golf Club.

The work can then go forward and it is hoped that by next Spring construction on the Country Club facility will be underway.

No Increase In County Tax Rate

Hansford County Commissioners Court met in regular session Monday in the Judge's office at the courthouse.

The court accepted a bid for the purchase of a new pickup for commissioner Renner's precinct 3. The 1969 model, 3/4 ton truck will be purchased from Excel Chevrolet Company for \$1,945.00.

The problem of the meter station located just inside the Gruver city limits was cleared Monday when commissioners agreed with the Panhandle Eastern Pipe Line company to move the station one-half mile further east. The station, because of a new road just completed, is proving to be a highway hazard and is actually located on highway right-of-way. The company will move the station in the near future.

In final business before the court, commissioners set the tax rate which will be the same as last year.

\$1 Million Budget Approved By Board

An operating budget of \$1,002,025.00 has been approved for Spearman Public School system for the fiscal year of 1968-69.

The new budget was approved this week at a special meeting of the school's board of directors held Monday night when R. L. McClellan, Joel Lackey, Marvin Jones, Ira Harbour and Chalmers Porter were present.

The total budget for last year was \$998,876.00. However, it was revealed at the Monday meeting that the total expenditures equaled only \$985,655.00.

The new spending bill calls for \$56,358.00, Administration; \$586,524.00, Instruction; \$7,930.00 Health Service; \$38,060.00 for Pupil Transportation; \$84,400.00 for plant operation; \$24,298.00 for plant maintenance; \$3,650.00 fixed charges; \$2,500.00 for food service; \$23,938.00 is listed for student activities; \$23,525.00 for capital outlay and debt service, \$149,502.00

The hiring of these two teachers completes the faculty. Estimated 46 People To Die This Weekend

AUSTIN, Col. Wilson E. (Pat) Speir, acting director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today the DPS estimates 46 persons may die in traffic accidents in Texas during the Labor Day weekend.

"This is the last holiday weekend of the summer, and thousands of motorists traditionally take to the highways for an outing," Speir said. "It is indeed tragic that so many men, women and children will become victims of motor vehicle accidents during an otherwise happy period," he added.

Speir said the Department of Public Safety will use all facilities and personnel at its disposal in an effort to reduce the predicted death toll. A special "Operation Motorcade" will be activated at 9 P. M. Friday, August 30, and continue through midnight Monday, September 2. During this period, all unformed DPS

officers and equipment will be used on the highways to enforce traffic laws.

"Many other groups such as local police and sheriff's department, the trucking industry, and the Jaycees will be cooperating in this effort to promote safe driving during the holiday," Speir noted.

For example, the Texas Motor Transportation Association and its Texas Council of Safety Supervisors will sponsor a holiday road patrol during the holiday," Speir noted.

Jack Bryan, TMTA safety director, said some 40 cars marked "Holiday Road Patrol" will be used in the program. These will be manned by the safety directors, safety supervisors and safety engineers of the trucking industry who comprise the membership of the Council. Personnel participating in the road patrol will work as volunteers.

The Jaycees will provide rest stops for motorists in many areas of the state. Texas Safety Association said W. F. (Bill) Leonard will coordinate efforts of over 12,000 Junior Chamber of Commerce members in operating some

200 "rest stops" for serving free coffee to fatigued drivers. The Texas Highway Department has provided the news media with a bulletin listing all road construction areas in the state.

The Amendments

Following a discussion of proposed amendments voted on November 5, this week number 4 is presented.

Amendment No. 4-Authority of qualified property electors voting, to certain road bonds without necessity for further legislation providing that bonds or to be issued under sections (a) and (b) of Section III, not be in determining the debt.

Section 52 of Article III, Amendment in 1904, might be the cornerstone of constitutional provisions relating authority of counties, towns, or other political corporations or subdivisions credit. It provides that legislative authority and two thirds majority vote of qualified property tax electors voting, any (or etc.) may in addition to all other debts, issue or otherwise lend its credit any amount not to exceed the assessed valuation of real property of the district

or territory. Total bonded indebtedness of any city or town, however, could never exceed the limits imposed by other provisions of the Constitution. Further, the bonding district is authorized to levy and collect taxes to pay the interest on bonds issued under Section 52 and provide a sinking fund for redemption of the bonds.

ARGUMENTS FOR

Construction and maintenance of sufficient roads and turnpikes to meet traffic needs of the rapidly growing Dallas region have been hampered by the constitutional debt limit which prevents the county from acquiring the necessary funds to carry on the construction and maintenance. Amendment No. 4 would liberalize the debt limitation in Dallas County and enable the county to meet its expanding needs. This amendment is limited to Dallas County, so that adoption of it will ease Dallas' critical problem without giving other counties in the state a free hand to extend their indebtedness.

ARGUMENTS AGAINST

The Change in the proposed

amendment which makes a majority rather than a 2/3 majority the requisite vote for approval of a bond election to provide funds for the construction of roads and turnpikes makes it too easy for a bond election to pass. When elections are called with the timing selected to assure turnout of only those in favor of an issue, a majority of the voters can be, in fact, disenfranchised. Further clutter to an already overburdened constitution would result if the proposed amendment should be adopted. Within the limits of constitutional safeguards requiring a 2/3 majority vote in a bond election and authority granted individually on each election by the Texas Legislature, it is already possible to achieve the ends which this amendment purports to accomplish. The delay resulting from the present requirement of legislative authority on each issue serves the people in good stead by preventing impulsive action without adequate study. The liberalized debt limit in the proposed amendment is much broader than it appears and the reduction of the number of voters that must approve the extended indebtedness will open to Dallas County the means for squandering more of the taxpayers' money with little effort.
