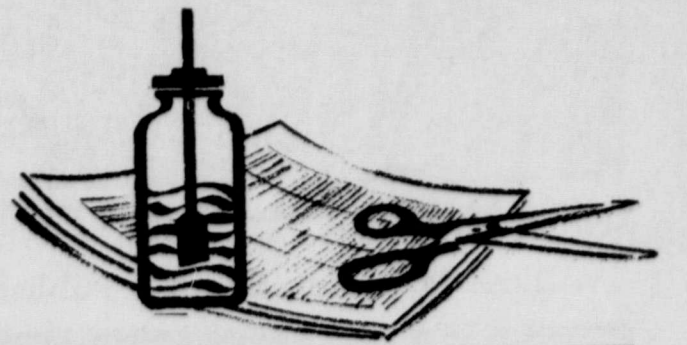

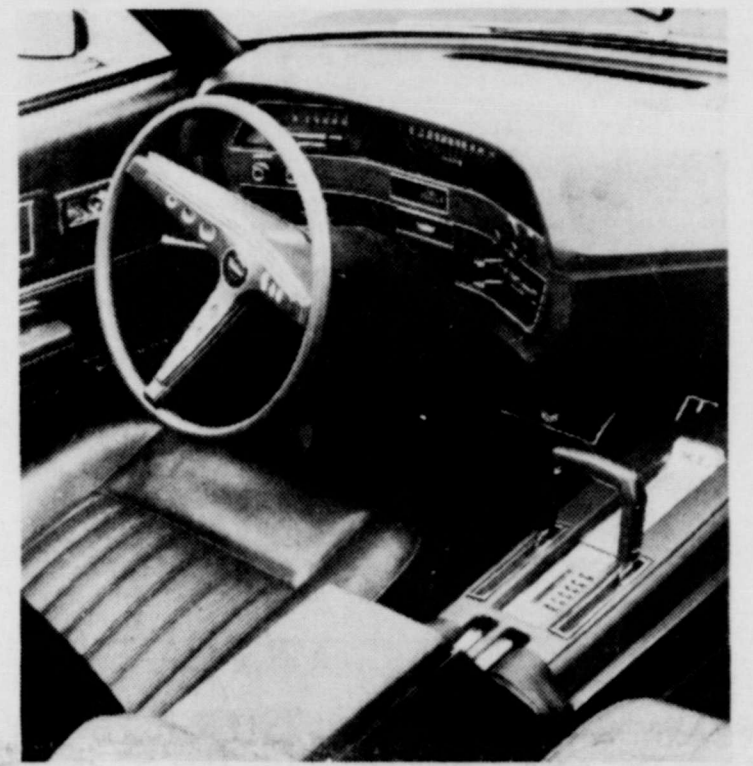
## Pontiac Reveals 1969 Firebird, LeMans

# THE CIRCUS IS COMING SEPT. 29

Sunday, September 29 is circus day. The arrival of a real 4 ring European-style circus takes place in Spearman as the big Carson & Barnes circus arrives at daybreak for one performance at 2:30 P. M. on the grounds just East of Spearman High School.

Sponsored by the Spearman Junior Chamber of Commerce, the show will arrive on three colorful convoys at daybreak and the always interesting and traditional spectacle of watching a tented city suddenly arise on circus morning is expected to start approximately at 8 A. M. at the showgrounds.

The circus officials commented that in nearly every city where they have visited this year, they have been greeted by hundreds of local citizenry on hand for the arrival event, which seems rarer today in view of the fact that several of the other larger circuses exhibit only in arenas and auditoriums and that the tented circus seems to be more popular than ever before. They also stated, too, that most of the youngsters on hand for the arrivals and at the performances are probably seeing their first traditional circus under the "BIG TOP" with all of its nostalgic excitement of the first time.

Many of the oldesters on hand are re-living some golden memories and Mom and Pop are very anxious that their offspring do not miss out on the thrills of "Circus Days" as they themselves remember them. The usual swift unloading of animals and equipment will take place by the circus workmen aided by the circus performing elephants, and out of apparent chaos will come orderly precision as the tented city is erected, the spokesman promised.

The Carson & Barnes circus, currently on its annual tour of the U. S. and Canada is considered in circudom to be one of the two major tent circuses in America today. In addition to the featured star, CBS TV Star "SKY KING" who will appear in person at each performance. There are more than 100 circus stars and performers in the 1968 addition of the big show, with several making their first appearances in America this year having been brought from European and Asian countries by Carson & Barnes for this year's program. Included will be high aerial thrillers, acrobatic and tumbling champions, tightwire wizards, risley and contortion exponents, spectacular near the dome of the big top trapeze dare-devils, juggling artists, a real

wild west exhibition of trick shooting, roping and hazardous riding which is part of the main performance. Other features include trained animal acts including an African Lion Act in the big steel arena, comedy canines and hilarious chimpanzees, troupes of trained ponies and liberty horses and, of course, the ever popular peers of all circus performers, the "Ponderous Performing Pachyderms" as the circus refers to the elephants. The doors to the circus are scheduled to open one hour before each performance. Miss Evon, noted aerialist, will perform a Free High Act above the main show entrance before each performance.

Early arrivals will be treated to ring side seats at no extra charge. All seats on first come, first served basis.

Immediately after the final performance here, the show is scheduled to make ready for their departure for the next days show stand.

# Vote Forms Included With Tax Statement

Hansford County taxpayers will be receiving their tax statement soon and included in the envelope will be an important form for you to fill out if you want to vote in 1969!

If you were registered in the county as a voter in 1968, you will receive, courtesy of the tax office, an application for a voter registration. This form in NOT a registration, but an APPLICATION for one.

All voters, regardless of age, must have a voter registration receipt with them before they can vote in any 1969 election.

J. B. Cooke, County Tax Assessor-Collector, says if for some reason you do not receive one of these forms, you must stop by the county tax office and register in order to be eligible to vote next year.

The form being mailed with tax statements is to be completed by each voter in the family, and returned to the tax office. A receipt will be mailed in return showing that you are registered and eligible to vote.

Only those who registered in the county last year are on file in the tax office. New-comers and those who failed to register last year will need to make a personal visit to the county courthouse to sign a voter registration form.

# LYNX DOWN WILDCATS

Spearman's jynxing Lynx journeyed to Canadian Friday night, put on their biggest offensive show of the year, as they ran up 27 points the 1st half, and coasted scoreless throughout the last half.

Spearman won the toss, and received, defending the North goal. Bobby Smith downed the ball in the end zone, and it was brought out to the 20. On the first play from scrimmage, Smith went around end for a 9 yard gain. On the second play, Smith up the middle for a 1st down. Smith again carried the ball for another 1st down. Quarterback Davis carried up the middle for 4 yard gain. On third down, Smith picked up 5 yards, but a penalty nullified the gain. On third down, Davis around end for 3 yards. The Wildcats held on this first series of plays and forced the Lynx to punt. Davis kicked, and Canadian returned the ball to their 34 yard line. On the first play from the 26, Smith dashed around end for 4 yards. On the second play, Cochran hit the middle for no gain. On third down, Davis dashed off-tackle for a 1st down. Smith ran the ball to the 8 yard line, and Whitefield dove into the end-zone from the 8 yard line for the first touchdown of the night. The PAT was no good, and the score stood at 6-0 with 6:53 left in the first quarter. The Lynx kicked to Canadian and after three plays, the Wildcats fumbled, and the Lynx recovered the ball near the 20 yard line. The Lynx ran a series of plays up the middle, and once again, Whitefield blasted into the end-zone, from 8 yards out to score the TD. Davis handed off to Smith, and he scored around end for another 2 points, making the score 14-0, with 4:20 left in the 1st quarter. Once again, the Lynx kicked to Canadian, and on third down, they lost the ball to the Lynx on a bad pass from center. Ronnie Lusby recovered this fumble. The other two times that the Cats fumbled, there was such a pile-up, and scramble for the football, we never did get the number of the Lynx player who recovered the fumble.

On another series of ground plays, the Lynx were forced to punt to Canadian. The Wildcats, who seemed to fumble on third down plays, also fumbled on their third down this series, and the Lynx once again had excellent field position, in Canadian's territory.

From about the 20 yard line, (spot of recovery) the Lynx mixed up their ground gain, to again score. All of the Lynx backs, alternated on the ball carrying duties, behind good blocking, to put the ball on the 5 yard line, just as the 1st quarter ended. On the first play of the second quarter, Cochran dashed into the end zone for TD no. 3. Davis kicked the extra point, to make the score 21-0, with 11:55 left in the half.

Spearman kicked to the Wildcats, and after three plays, (as usual) they had to kick. Spearman returned the ball to their 44 yard line. And, once again, the fine ground game of the Lynx was out into play, and with 7:52 left in the half, Smith went over from the 3 yard line to make the score 27-0. Little did the Lynx fans realize that this would be all of the scoring for the Lynx. In just a few minutes the Lynx had ground out 27 points, and it looked like a run-away, but the last half was a different story.

With a 27 point lead, it appeared that the Lynx were going to work on their passing attack the last half; and that is exactly what they did. And even though they didn't score the entire last half, they did get a lot of practice passing, and did complete a few fine passes. Penalties, and mistakes stopped the Lynx passing game however. But, the always deadly defense was ever present to stop Canadian from any serious scoring threat.

## Suggestions For Safe Hunting

Safety is the most important factor to remember in the upcoming hunting season, says Wallace Klussmann, Extension wildlife conservation specialist at Texas A&M University. Nearly all hunting accidents could be prevented if gun safety rules are followed.

It's the "over-anxious" hunter who endangers the lives of fellow hunters and causes needless damage to wildlife. Approximately two-thirds of all hunting accidents are caused by humans in the line of fire, humans mistaken for animals and hunters not using the safety catch on their guns.

Hunting only in season and respecting the bag limits are rules of good hunting sportsmanship, says the specialist. Also never throw away a lit cigarette or leave a burning campfire, since either can start a destructive grass or forest fire.

Another good rule to remember is to respect the rights of others and to obtain permission before going onto another's property, says Klussmann. Treat all property as if it were your own and don't litter the countryside.

One of the most important rules, but one that is often neglected, is to handle every gun as if it were loaded. Never carry a loaded weapon in an automobile and be sure the action and barrel are clear of any restriction.

In conclusion, always be as sure of your target as you would want your fellow hunter to be, says the specialist.

## Uninsured Drivers To Be Action Of St. Legislature

DALLAS--Financial responsibility in auto accidents and an increase in the weekly compensation for injured workers were given top priority at a recent meeting of the Texas Trial Lawyers Association in Dallas.

The statewide organization of trial lawyers went on record strongly urging the Texas Legislature to act on the two matters in the forthcoming legislative session to begin in January.

William R. Edwards of Corpus Christi, TTLA president, said the association's directors voted unanimous support for both items after receiving a recommendation on the issues from the organization's Legislative Committee, headed by Jack Eisenberg of Austin.

The committee recommended a system of "uniform driver responsibility at the time of purchasing license plates, instead of the present point after an accident already has occurred. The committee report noted that the number of uninsured drivers is increasing in Texas.

In the field of workmen's compensation, the TTLA board voted unanimously to support an increase in the weekly compensation allowed injured workers, which currently is set at \$35 a week.

Edwards said "hundreds of injured Texans endure unbelievable hardships while collecting compensation payments, simply because the weekly rate is so unrealistically low in comparison with today's living costs."

More than 100 trial lawyers from across the state attended the meeting at the Sheraton Dallas.

### Amendment 9 To Benefit Teachers

The proposed Constitutional Amendment under discussion this week is amendment No. 9, a very important one to teachers and members of the Texas State Teachers Association. (Following contributions to be made to the Teacher Retirement System of Texas on the basis of full salary of members.)

The proposed amendment removes the ceiling on contributions which teachers may make to the retirement system for their own retirement benefits. A now provided in Sec. 48a, Article III, a ceiling of 6% on a maximum of \$8,400 in salary, or \$504 in contributions, is set. This amendment No. 9 would permit contributions, and resulting retirement benefits, to be based on a teacher's full salary, rather than the first \$8,400 of that salary.

The original Section 48a, Art. III of the Texas Constitution, was added in 1936 in an effort to provide a form of

security for teachers that would serve as an incentive for qualified persons to become and remain teachers. This first amendment established a ceiling on contributions of \$180 annually, plus interest, to be matched by the state in determining the total amount of the annuity payable to the participant.

In 1956 Sec. 48a Art. III was amended to raise the ceiling on contributions to \$504, as further encouragement to persons to enter and remain in the teaching profession. This higher ceiling, with resulting increase in annuity benefits, also recognized the rising cost of living and the need for greater retirement income for subsistence.

Continuing inflation and salary increases for teachers provided by the legislature during the past several sessions have indicated a need for still larger retirement benefits, which amendment No. 9 proposes to provide.

If Texas is to attract and keep the kind of teaching personnel needed to bring Texas public schools up to first rank among the states, teachers must be given adequate retirement benefits as well as good salaries. The legislature has frequently increased teachers' salaries in recognition of the need for good teachers, and it is imperative that retirement benefits be commensurate with these higher earnings. Adoption of the proposed Amendment No. 9 would make this possible.

Mr. James Cunningham, Supt. of Spearman Public Schools, is vitally interested in efforts to pass Constitutional Amendment No. 9.

"Approval of this amendment on November 5," says Supt. Cunningham, "will strengthen recruitment programs designed to ATTRACT the best qualified college graduates into teaching. It will also guarantee experienced teachers now in service, a sense of future security which will HOLD them in the classroom."

"Approval of this amendment not only raises, it removes the ceiling, giving

teachers the same privilege that state employees now enjoy-- contributing to their retirement system on the basis of full salary earned," Cunningham continued.

Thousands of teachers in Texas now exceed the \$8,400 annual salary that may be used for retirement benefits today. Approval of this amendment will simply permit teachers of Texas to contribute to the Retirement Fund on the basis of their ENTIRE salary rather than be limited, by law, on the maximum that they contribute.
