County Commissioners Advise Voters Against Amendments

A regular session Monday County Commissioners, the took a firm stand on all of the amendments are up for the approval of voters on November 5 election day. Members of the commission's court attended last week a state conference held in Austin where they had the opportunity to hear all 14 amendments discussed, both in respect to the voting process to make their own decisions in each of the proposed amendments, and perhaps the most important, and the court said that they are definitely unconstitutional.

amendments No. 4, No. 7, No. 11 and No. 12. Take special note of No. 7. A spokesman for the court said today that for the good of the taxpayers and the future of our county, voters should vote NO on these amendments.
Amendment No. 4, as worded, would seem to pertain only to Dallas County, but the commissioners court advises that it could effect and would effect us all in the future. Vote AGAINST it.
Amendment No. 7 is the most tricky of all 14 amendments, and perhaps the most important, and the court said in order to vote against this one, VOTERS SHOULD VOTE

FOR IT. This one has to do with abolishing Ad Valorem property taxes which naturally sounds good to taxpayers. However, Judge Johnnie C. Lee said in the long run this could give the state the right to come in and set the tax rate for Hansford County. He advises county taxpayers to vote FOR amendment No. 7 in order to vote against it.
The court strongly recommends the opposition to proposition number 11 also. This amendment has to do with authorizing the Legislature to consolidate governmental offices and functions and allow political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in El Paso & Tarrant counties. The court feels that this is a Metro Government step, and is so worded in the proposition that an enabling act could be passed by the Legislature so as to effect ALL OF US in the future. VOTE AGAINST NO. 11.

The court also went on record as being AGAINST NO. 12 which would grant the legislature power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes.
A general rule-of-thumb in deciding on constitutional amendments for most voters has been "if you don't understand it, vote against it." County Commissioners Court members feel the above information is of grave importance to Hansford voters.

Area farmers moved back into the grain fields this week to harvest a near bumper crop following a delay caused by inclement weather earlier in the month.

Average yields are expected to run under last year's milo crop due to an invasion of greenbugs late in the summer and the battering hail storms earlier in October. The number one cash crop of the region is expected to come up with an average of 800-1500 lbs. per acre less than last year's because of damaging effects caused by bugs & hail.

Some estimate the grain sorghum harvest at 35% complete. While there are some who have finished cutting, still others report fields too green or too wet to enter. No field reports nor acre yields are available.

Hansford County is expected to have the largest voter turnout in history for Tuesday's general election, 2831 residents were issued voter registrations in January of last year.

Voters should take their voter registration certificate with them to present to clerks at the election boxes Tuesday Nov. 5. If you are unable to find the slip, you would be safe in calling the county tax office for a quick check to see whether or not you are eligible to cast a vote in the presidential election.

Absentee voting has been underway for the past several days at the county clerk's office. Hansford county voters wishing to vote absentee in person at this office will have until 5 p.m. Friday November 1 to do so. A check with the clerk's office Monday revealed a count of 92 persons casting absentee ballots.

Copeland judge; Precinct 2-Kimball, Mary Ellen Saltzman judge; Precinct 3-Gruver Elevator, Mrs. Elmo McClellan St. Judge; Precinct 4-Gruver High School, J. S. Gruver judge; Precinct 7-Oslo Church with Gordon Sedje judge; Precinct 9-Morse High School with Willard McCloy judge. Precinct 10-at Spearman Junior high school where R. L. McClellan will be the election judge.

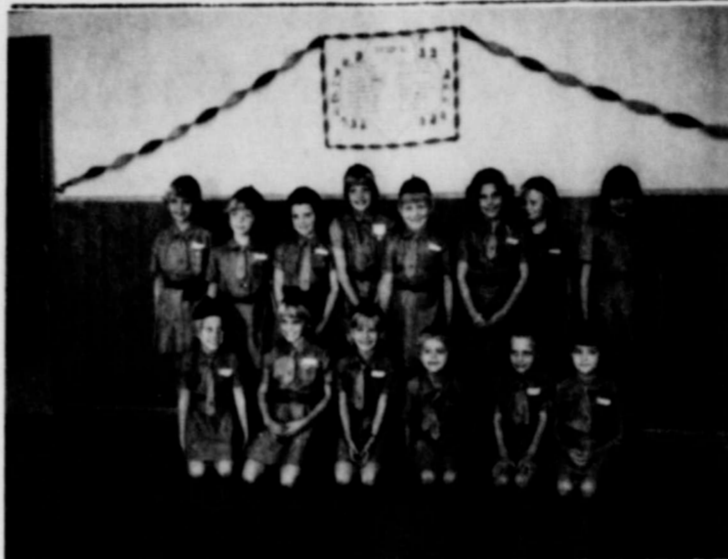

Urges Passage Amendment #9

AUSTIN--Passage of Amendment #9 in the November general election was today urged by Charles H. Tennyson, Executive Secretary for the 123,000 member Texas State Teachers Association.

Tennyson described Amendment #9 as "vital both for attracting new and promising individuals into the profession and for holding those experienced Texas teachers who find themselves discouraged by a retirement program which needs updating."

If passed, Amendment #9 would make it possible for each teacher in the state to contribute to the Teacher Retirement System on the basis of his full salary.

At present, and for the 31 years the system has been in existence, there have been constitutional limits on the salary which could be used

as the basis for a teacher contributing toward retirement. The retirement system for other State of Texas employees does not have any such limitation. A constitutional amendment removed limitations for them several years ago.

"It's now been 12 years since a constitutional amendment raised the ceiling in the Teacher Retirement System. We can't keep upgrading Texas education if we have to wait half a generation between adjusting our teacher retirement system to economic changes. Eliminating the ceiling concept entirely will put Texas back in the race for getting and keeping the kind of teachers we want for our children", concluded Tennyson.

A Vote for Wallace Is An HHH Vote

1968, The Republican Year. A ticket to unite the Party. Spirit of Miami. Disunity among the Democrats. Viet Nam and Inflation, crime and the strength of the dollar: all Republican issues and an electorate genuinely concerned about the course the opposition party has charted for the Nation.

Liberal Democrats beginning to question their own dogmas. The New Politics breaks away from the Liberal Establishment. Credentials fights in Chicago, accompanied by even worse platform battles. Scarcity of funds for the Democrats. Louisiana Gov. McKeithen announces he cannot "in good conscience" support the Democrat ticket. Democrats in Texas avoiding the ticket for their political lives.

Could anything keep Republicans from winning victories so dramatic and telling in November that 1968 might be forever referred to as the Year of the Republican Renaissance?

Yes, George Wallace.

Wouldn't it just break your heart to be so near victory and then have it snatched from Republican grasp in an end run by a member of the opposition party?

It seems to me that one fact—

that George Wallace is a Democrat—and as such is his party's very valuable tool and weapon—is the most overlooked fact of his campaign.

George Wallace does express a certain political viewpoint that has gained him significant support throughout the country and not just in the South. He has obtained this support through use of issues both legitimate and demeaning. It is the demeaning issue of racial collectivism which most often attaches to his name.

Yet it's the legitimate issues he is using—state's rights, crime and lawlessness, a regard for our country and its best tradition—that will take some votes that would otherwise be Republican.

But it is those who are genuinely concerned about the major issues of the day and see in Wallace a chance to protest the very dangerous drift of the country who may lead us into four to eight more years of the same or worse. If the human body were so constructed, I imagine Wallace voters could develop quite a taste for kicking themselves November 6th and into the 1970's if a President Humphrey came to occupy the White House because they

threw away their votes. If no one gets a majority in the electoral college, the election will be thrown into the House. If 26 states elect Democrat-dominated congressional delegations, the outcome of a House-decided presidential election is inevitable.

Southern Democrats may be nice enough on occasion to vote with Republicans on certain legislation, but party loyalty can be pretty thick especially when the heat is on. Don't count on many defections to a Republican President.

Then how does the Wallaceite justify his vote? One notices the often repeated charge in Letters to the Editor columns that both major parties are identical and that Wallace offers the so-called choice the country wants. If the record is analyzed carefully, a better case can be made that Wallace's record in Alabama more closely resembles the national record of the liberal Democrats as far as spending and a "populist" approach to domestic affairs goes.

Those who believe the major parties are identical have short memories, apparently. Have they already forgotten the 1966 and 1967 fights for the option of states to pass right-to-work laws, one of the finest hours of the Republican Party in

the Senate? Do you really think a Nixon would appoint a Fortas as Chief Justice of the Supreme Court? Any chance of continuing under Nixon with an Attorney General who excuses the looting and burning of our cities?

If there ever was a time when the lines of the two parties were converging, that day is long gone. The tickets chosen in Miami and Chicago makes that clear. Contrast the careers of the men at the top of the two tickets. I doubt if the Wallaceite has a real appreciation of exactly how dangerous a man Hubert Humphrey really is or how liberal also has been the record of Senator Muskie. There will be attempts to sell them as moderates, but in all Humphrey has done, the Wallaceite should be reminded, Humphrey's cry has been "All the way with ADA."

Potential Wallace voters then must thoughtfully ask themselves: "Will my protest vote fall into Humphrey's ultraliberal hands?"

The gamble isn't worth it, especially if one considers Dick Nixon's well articulated stands on the issues. The little mountain of Wallace votes simply becomes an emotional Kama-kazi lunge in which conservative-moderate principles are the victims.

As for me, I prefer to have my vote count.

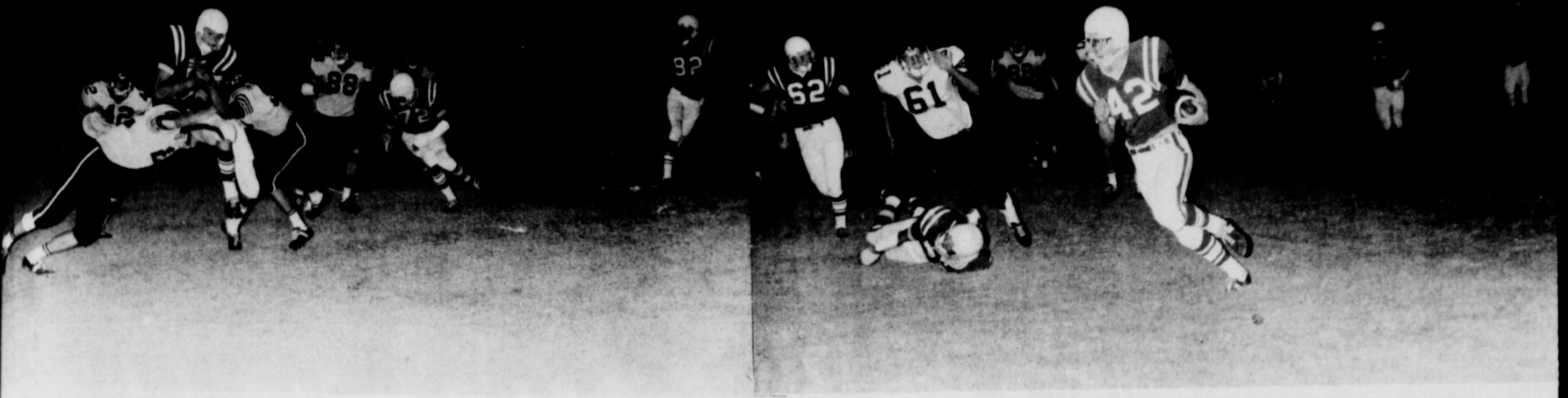

Breathalyzers In Operation

AUSTIN--Colonel Wilson E. (Pat) Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today that 62 breath analysis instruments will be placed in operation over the state on Friday, October 25.

The "Breathalyzers" will be utilized in the highway patrol's driving while intoxicated enforcement program. The 62 instruments going into the field Friday are the first of 90 purchased by the DPS for use in 80 of the state's most populous counties where the DWI problem is greatest. The remainder will be placed in service when delivered by the manufacturer.

Diving while intoxicated suspects who consent to the test will accompany the highway patrolman to an office where an instrument is located. There, the suspect will blow into a tube attached to the Breathalyzer and the percentage of alcohol in his

blood will register on an indicator.

"Drivers who drink contribute significantly to the traffic death toll in Texas," Speir said. "We believe that use of the Breathalyzer will enable us to more effectively enforce the state's traffic laws," he added.

The first 62 instruments will be located in the following cities:

Dallas District - Sherman, Greenville, Dallas, Denton, and three on the Dallas-Fort Worth Turnpike.

Tyler District - Texarkana, Marshall, Longview, Tyler, Mount Vernon, and Gilmer.

Houston District - Brenham, Wharton, Richmond, Angleton, and two in Houston.

Corpus Christi District - Corpus Christi, Victoria, Alice, Harlingen, McAllen and Sinton.

San Antonio District - San Antonio, Seguin, Floresville, Laredo and Hondo.

Midland District - Midland, Odessa and Pecos.

Abilene District - Eastland, Del Rio, San Angelo, Sweetwater and Abilene.

Lubbock District - Lubbock,

Plainview, Haskell, Wichita Falls, Mineral Wells, Brownfield and Bowie.

Amarillo District - Amarillo, Pampa. Childress, Hereford and Borger.

Waco District - Waco, Hillsboro, Corsicana, Palestine, Centerville, Belton, and Stephenville.

Austin District - Austin, Bryan, Georgetown, Kerrville and Lampasas.

Loans To Farmers Totaled \$396,920

During fiscal 1968, thirty-five Ochiltree, Hansford, Hutchinson and Lipscomb County farm families availed themselves of Farmers Home Administration operating type loan credit, Bob Holloway, County Supervisor said today.

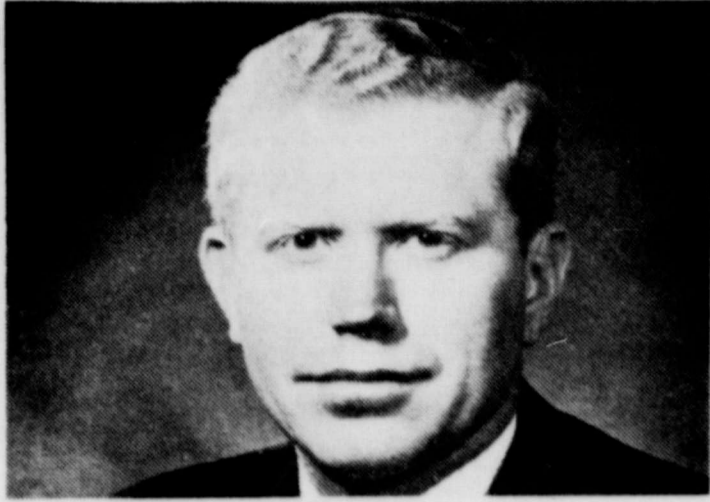
He said that \$396,920 was advanced during the 12 months ending June 30 for such expenses as new machinery and equipment, livestock, fertilizer, feed, seed, pasture improvement, and fencing. Operating loan funds also were used to refinance debts and pay family living expenses.

"This type of credit," Holloway said, "has enabled many small farm operators to stay on the land."

As the fiscal year ended nearly 440,000 people nationwide were benefiting from the program which serves family farmers who can find no other source of necessary operating loan credit.

Loans are made through county offices of the Farmers Home Administration serving all rural areas of the United States. All loans are accompanied by technical assistance in farm and financial management. The local FHA office is located at 418 So. Amherst, Perryton, Texas.

In addition to operating loans, Farmers Home Administration makes loans to purchase and develop farms, to develop community water supply systems, to obtain housing in rural areas, including housing for farm laborers and senior citizens, and to meet the emergency credit needs of farmers suffering from a natural disaster such as hail, flood or drought.
