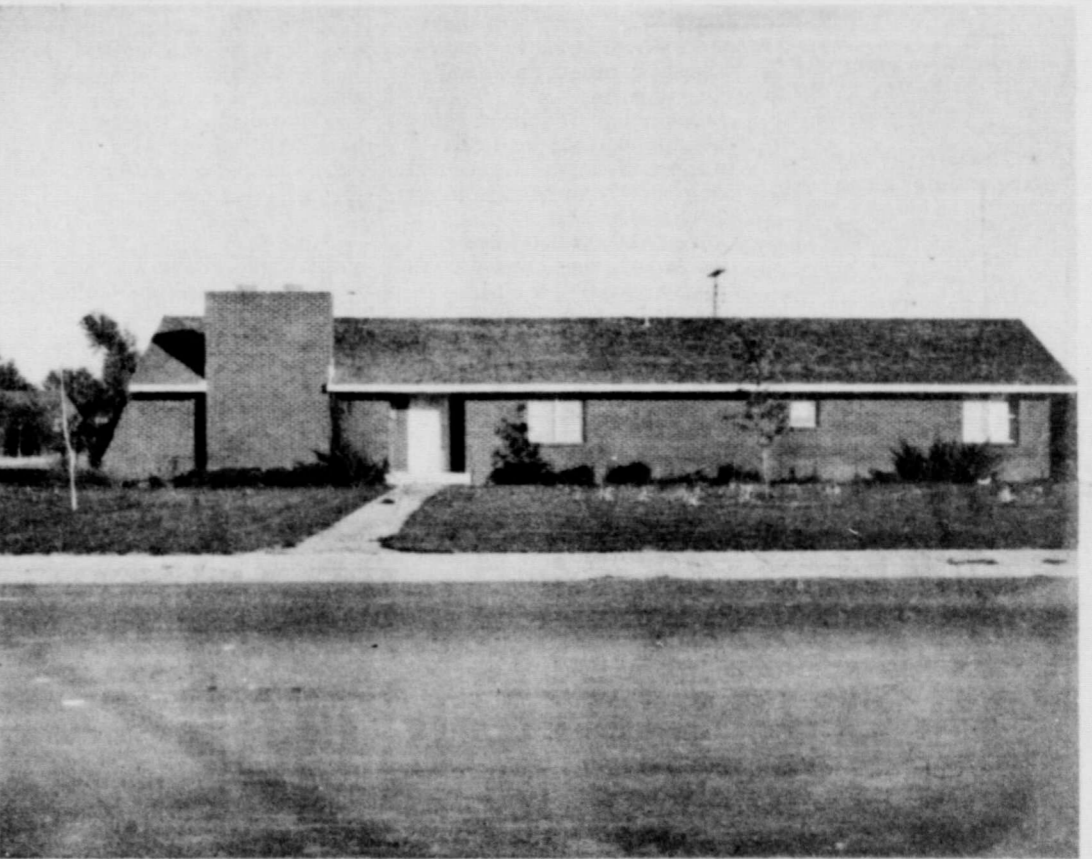
Postoffice Urges Early Mailing

Postmaster Elmon Jacobs urged all mailers to start to plan for their holiday mailings now and to be "Early Bird" mailers as more mail than ever before will be delivered between now and the holidays.

The postal service can handle the unusually heavy load of mail expected this year, if the mailing public will give us a hand by depositing their cards and packages into the mail a bit earlier than usual and by using ZIP codes, the local postmaster said. Also, it is a big help for mailers to bundle their letters and cards and label the bundles "out of town" or "local". Labels for this purpose are available at the post office.

Packages should be wrapped well in a strong box or container, without rattles and addresses should be legible. It is imperative that a list of the contents as well as the name and address of the addressee and addressor be included with the contents.

New postal law have eliminated the lower rate for greeting cards. Therefore, all "regular" Christmas cards will be mailed at the six cent rate. It is suggested that all greeting cards be sealed and with a return address to insure better treatment.

Weather Delays Harvest

The area maize harvest plagued by wet, cold weather, is still in the process of being cut. Grain dealers said Monday a few more loads trickled in but that farmers estimate 40 percent of the 115,000 acres of milo in the county is still in the fields.

County Agent Robert Adamson said Tuesday that some of the maize has begun to fall, but that most of the grain could be picked up by attachments and harvested, when and as weather permits.

The first good freeze which occurred on Nov. 11 matured the grain for cutting, but rains and damp, cloudy weather conditions have kept combs out of the fields.

SOMETHING SPECIAL FOR THANKSGIVING

Pumpkin Pie With Praline Topping. Pumpkin pie is an easy dessert to make for your family. The filling for this pumpkin pie is very rich and smooth. To make Pumpkin Pie a very special treat for Thanksgiving. . . add a crunch "Praline Topping". Pumpkin Pie with Praline Topping.
9-inch unbaked pie shell
2 eggs
1 can (1 lb.) pumpkin
3/4 cup firmly packed light brown sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1-1/2 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice

1 tall can evaporated milk (1-2/3 cups)
Praline Topping (recipe below)
In a medium size mixing bowl beat eggs slightly. Stir in pumpkin, brown sugar, salt, spice and evaporated milk, mixing well. Pour most of filling into pastry shell, then place pie on oven rack. Pour in rest of filling; this helps to prevent spilling. Bake in preheated hot oven (425 degrees) 15 minutes; turn oven temperature down to moderate (350 degrees) and continue baking 45 minutes longer, or until filling is done when tested. Cook pie slightly, then re-ferigerate until serving time. When ready to serve, make Praline topping and sprinkle evenly over pie. Place pie under broiler heat until topping is bubbly, about 1 minute, watching carefully so mixture does not burn. Serve at once. Makes 9-inch pie (6 to 8 servings.)

Praline Topping
2 tablespoons margarine
1/2 cup firmly packed light brown sugar
1/3 cup chopped pecans (peanuts or walnuts may be used in place of pecans)

In a small saucepan, melt margarine. Remove from heat; stir in brown sugar and pecans.

Tips on Pie Making:

Pastry Shell: When you roll out the pastry for the pie shell, leave it big enough so that you can make an edge that stands about 1/2-inch above the rim of the pie pan. This keeps the filling from bubbling over in the baking.

Filling the Pie Shell: For liquid mixtures such as this pumpkin pie filling, it is usually easier to pour only part of the filling in the pie shell before placing in the oven. After placing the pie in the oven, pull the oven rack out a little way, then pour in the remainder of the filling. This helps to prevent spilling in carrying the pie to the oven.

Testing the filling to see if it is done: For custard mixtures, it is usual to insert a silver knife (table knife) in the filling about halfway between the edge and the center. If the knife comes out clean, the filling is done. Another simple test is to shake the pie gently. If the

filling is not quite firm in the center, it is okay to take it out of the oven, for the heat in the pie will continue to cook the filling done.

There are many versions of pumpkin pie, but whatever your favorite, here are some ideas to brighten the coming holidays.

Dairy sour cream makes pumpkin pie. For variety, add 2 teaspoons grated orange rind, 4 teaspoons orange juice and 3 teaspoons sugar to a cup of sour cream.

Another choice may be whipped cream topping. Add creativity with combination of spices, fruits, nuts and flavorings.

The dairy sour cream and whipped cream offers an added nutritional bonus.

Top mincemeat pie with a spicy sauce made from one can dairy sour cream, three tablespoons firmly packed brown sugar and one teaspoon nutmeg.

Prepared mincemeat and vanilla ice cream make delicious and quick holiday desserts. Alternate layers of ice cream and mincemeat in parfait glasses.
