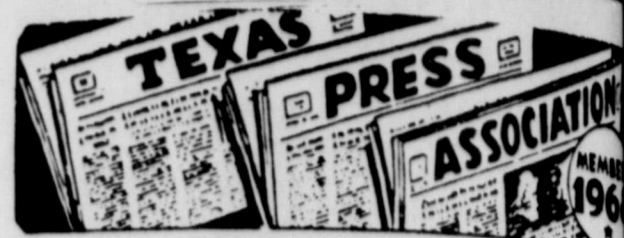
TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

The Commissioner of Internal Revenue gives these statistics on mathematical verification of individual tax returns in his Annual Report Summary for the Fiscal Year 1967:

- 65.4 million returns were mathematically verified;
- 3.9 million returns required correction;
- 2.4 million were taxpayers errors that caused the taxpayer to underpay his tax. IRS collected \$207.5 additional millions from these folks. However,
- 1.5 million made errors in favor of the government, and Internal Revenue refunded \$94.3 million to these taxpayers who had cheated themselves out of almost \$100 million through their own bad arithmetic.

This may not prove that most taxpayers would flunk grammar school arithmetic, but it seems to prove Internal Revenue's repeated warning: "Check it again--carefully--before you mail it." That dollar you save will be your own.

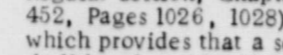

Senior Girls Take Unique Test December 3

Spearman high school senior girls will take a unique test Dec. 3--one on home-making, the only one of its type exclusively designed for girls at that educational level.

This written knowledge and attitude test on all facets of home-making will be given simultaneously that day to more than half a million girls representing some 15,000 high schools in the nation.

Scholarships to colleges of their choice will be awarded to both state and national winners. The highest ranking girl in each state will receive a \$1,500 scholarship and a chance to win one of four national scholarships. These range from \$5,000 for the girl chosen Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow, to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 respectively for second, third and fourth place winners.

Runners-up in each state will receive \$500 grants with the first ranked girl in each school receiving a specially designed silver charm from General Mills, Inc., which inaugurated the Betty Crocker Search in 1954-55 and has sponsored it every year since then.

Climax of this national homemaker test will be an expense paid tour next spring of Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Washington, D.C., for each state winner and her school advisor. Winners of the national scholarships will be selected and announced at a dinner in Williamsburg upon conclusion of the tour.

This scholarship competition is on the approved list of national contests and activities of the National Association of Secondary-School Principals.

Science Research Associates, Chicago, one of the nation's outstanding educational testing organizations, prepares the test and has charge of scoring and judging the contestants. Schools of state winners will be presented sets of Encyclopaedia Britannica by Encyclopaedia Britannica, Inc.

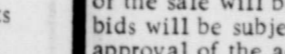

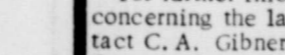

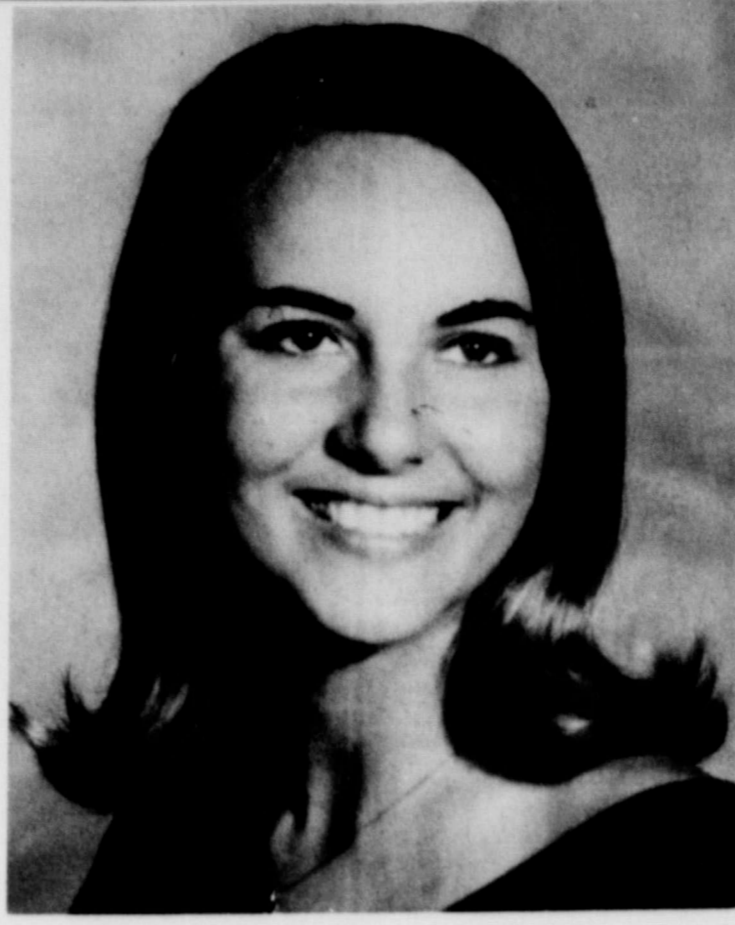

Good Food Buys For Holidays

COLLEGE STATION, Nov. 23.—New crop citrus fruits, many from the Texas valley area, are adding holiday spirit to local markets, reports Gwendolyn Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist.

Grapefruit supplies are increasing and price is decreasing. Oranges, tangerines and tangelos are on the market.

Green-skinned Fuerte avocados are begging to come in with more reasonable prices, according to Mrs. Clyatt, a specialist with Texas A&M University. Since the new crop is large, avocados should be plentiful this season.

Due to limited supplies, apples are not inexpensive but occasional bargains are

in sacks of smaller apples. Most of these are the right size for eating out of hand and are as flavorful as the large fruit.

Mrs. Clyatt reports best vegetable buys in carrots, celery, cabbage, cauliflower, turnips, rutabagas, broccoli, sweet potatoes and dry onions.

Beef supplies are ample, but she expects no price changes in the near future. Chuck and rib roasts are currently featured. Figured on a cost per serving basis, boneless roasts often cost no more than the bone-in roasts and are easier to serve.

Turkey prices are up a bit as demand increases. Fryers are featured in many markets as good protein choice.

Egg prices are on the upward trend again as holiday baking and extra cooking gets underway, however, good values in large size grade A eggs are available, Mrs. Clyatt says.

Keep Records Of Medical Costs

COLLEGE STATION—Premiums paid on health insurance policies usually can be deducted --up to a point.

According to Doris Myers, Extension home management specialist, deductions of insurance premiums as a medical expense are limited to payments which cover medical care. This means any money paid for the diagnosis, cure, treatment, or prevention of disease, for malfunctions of the body or for transportation primarily for and essential to medical care, she explains.

Premiums paid for insurance covering reimbursement for of limb or loss of time resulting from sickness or accident are not deductible, Mrs. Myers says. Premiums on insurance that provides only for reimbursement of prescription drug costs are deductible.

The Extension Service specialist at Texas A&M University advises keeping records of all medical costs. One never knows at the beginning of the year if such cost will be large enough to justify itemizing at income tax time.

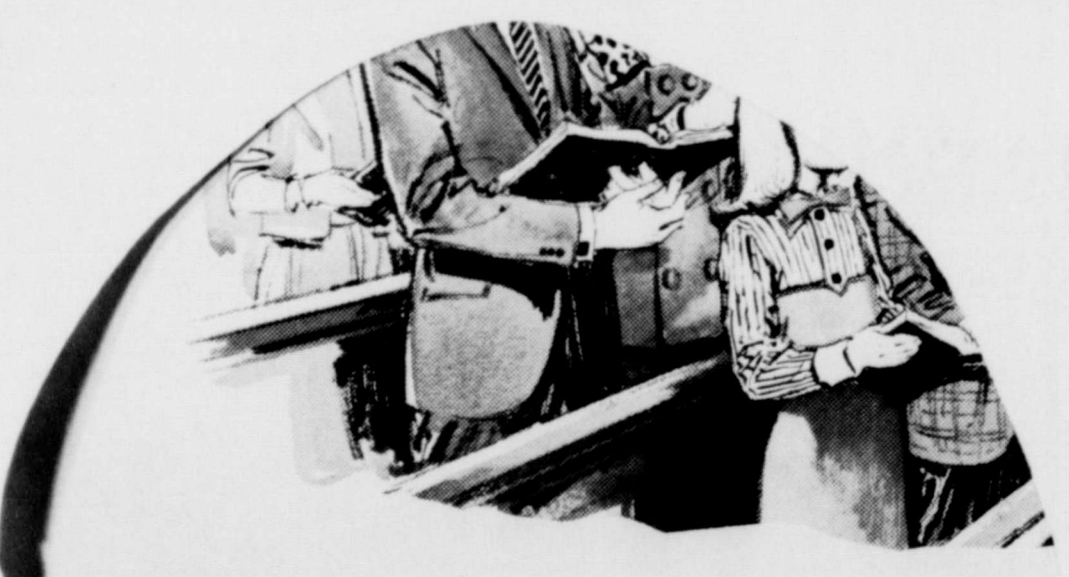

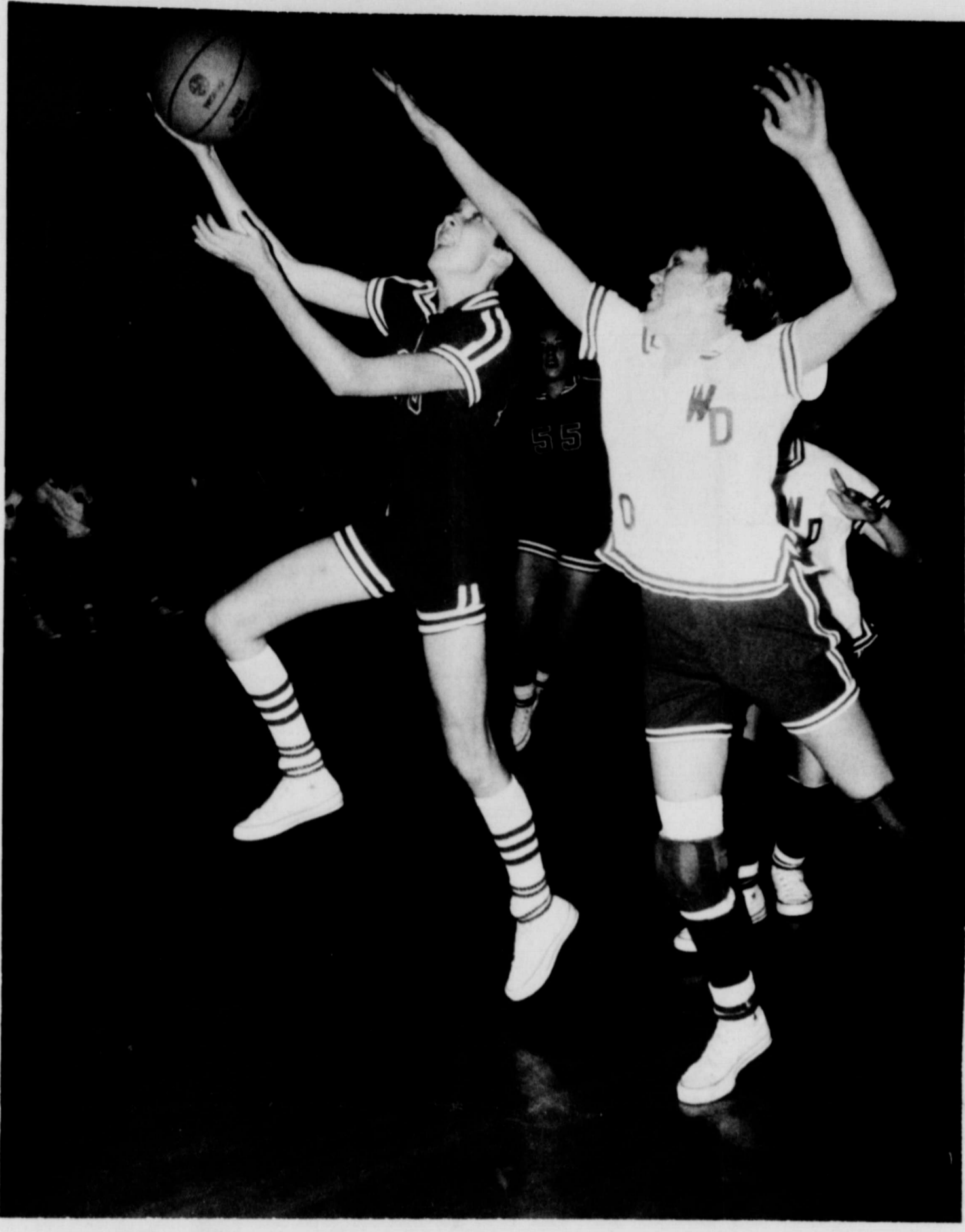

IT WAS a heart full of gratitude that inspired Governor William Bradford of the Plymouth Colony to dispatch men to shoot wild turkeys and other fowl one day in December, 1621. The Gov. with his band of Pilgrims, had arrived from England the preceding December. And their first winter in the New World had been a heartbreaking one. Half of the entire band had perished of disease, hunger and exposure.

The following March, two Algonquin-speaking Indians befriended the remaining group, gave them Indian corn--telling them to plant it "when oak leaves are as big as mouse ears," and to catch fish to fertilize the soil. It was thus that the seeds were sown for the first harvest. The summer that followed was warm and bright. When autumn arrived, the three log warehouses were filled with provisions.

00the harvest of 20 acres of corn and 6 acres of wheat, rye, barley and peas.

Governor Bradford thought it fitting to celebrate and give thanks for this good fortune. A formal invitation was issued to Massasoit, grand sachem of the Pokanoket Indians, to join in a feast of Thanksgiving. Massasoit accepted, arrived with 90 of his followers, and stayed for 3 days of feasting.

Thanksgiving days following harvests later came to be celebrated throughout the New England colonies, but on different and varying days. George Washington proclaimed Nov. 26, 1789 as the first national Thanksgiving day in honor of the new Constitution. But the custom continued to vary widely among the states--kept alive only by the proclamations of local governments.

It was a woman--Sarah Josepha Hale, however, who first suggested that Thanksgiving should be a national patriotic holiday. She was the editor of the popular woman's magazine called "Godey's Lady's Book," and for almost 20 years she campaigned through editorials and letters to the President, governors and other influential persons. Finally, Sarah Hale was able to win support of President Abraham Lincoln. In the third year of the Civil War, he believed that the Union had been saved. He, therefore, proclaimed a national day of Thanksgiving to be celebrated Thursday, November 26, 1864. So Thanksgiving Day became an annual observance.

Today, as in 1864 and 1621, it remains a holiday that Americans await with hearts of gratitude for bounty, family, and many, many other blessings.

Blessings which cannot be numbered... not even remembered. My Thanksgiving prayer to God is best said by this, my favorite scripture found in Psalms 40:5

"Many, O Lord my God, are thy wonderful works which thou hast done, and thy thoughts which are to us--ward: they cannot be reckoned up in order unto thee: if I would declare and speak of them, they are more than can be numbered."

Jones cinched another two points by passing to end Jerry Bayless for the conversion.

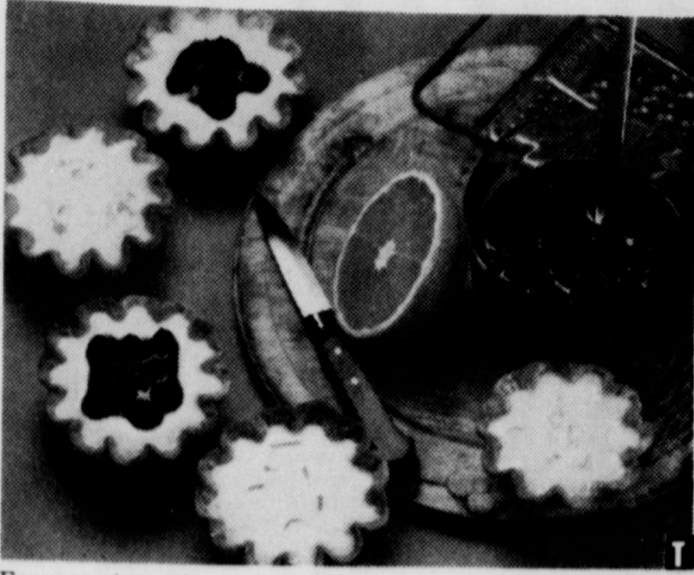

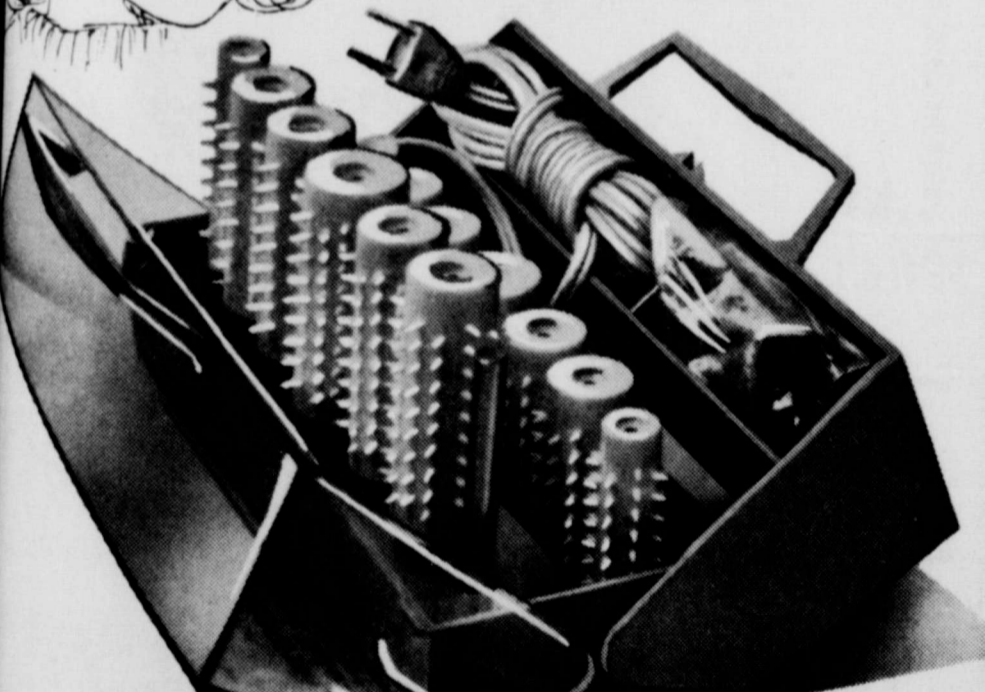
