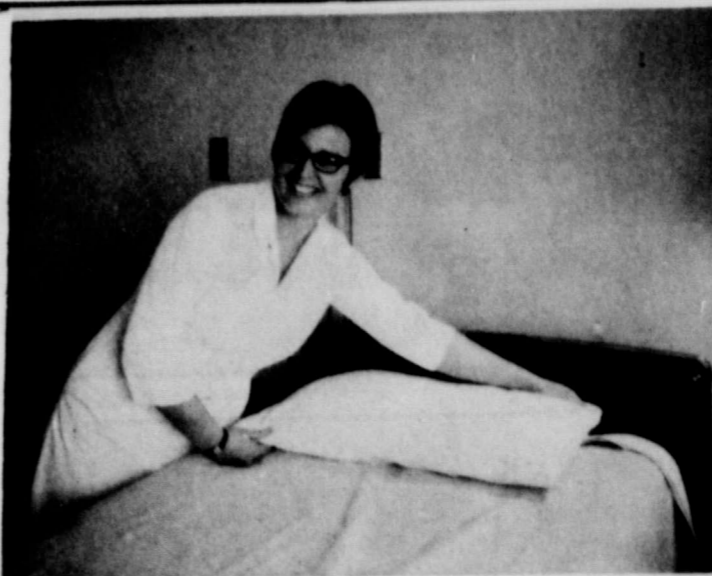
Joe Bob Grayson was the high scorer with 18 points and Marvin Wilkerson had 10 points for the second highest total.

Help us find her . . .

Will you, please, help us find our daughter? My wife, Ruth, and I are directing this plea to you and to the ten thousand other newspapers in the cities, towns, and hamlets of this country.

Our daughter, Elizabeth Larene (Liz) Erstein, was just two months short of her fifteenth birthday when she vanished without a trace last March 18.

She was last seen walking home from school along a lonely tree-lined street amid the orange groves of suburban Redlands. In her arms, she carried a blue notebook and a red algebra textbook.

Since then, law enforcement agencies, family members, and friends have spent countless hours tracking down hundreds of tentative leads. But to no avail. Not one single, slender clue has brightened all our efforts. Seemingly, Liz has disappeared like a breath of air on a winter's day.

"But, surely there is a simple explanation. Was she abducted? Did she run away from home? Is she dead? Or is she alive, and, perhaps, in your town?"

You can help us. Ruth and I are begging you to help us find an answer to our torment-to help us end the long nightmare of these past eight months-by releasing our story and Liz's picture in your paper.

The Lord willing, someone in your area may have seen her.

REDLANDS, CALIF. --Monday March 18, 1968, began as an ordinary day for Elizabeth Larene Erstein when she left home for classes at Moore Junior High School in Redlands, Calif. But this Monday on the 18th of March was not to be an ordinary day.

Elizabeth's school day passed without incident. She attended her last class, then left school at 3:40 p.m. to walk home, a two-mile route through blossoming orange groves. She never arrived home. Somewhere along the lonely street, Elizabeth Erstein vanished.

There are no clues to her whereabouts, or even to what happened to the 14-year old girl, other than a report from a Redlands businessman who was driving through the area. He thought he saw a girl resembling Elizabeth walking toward the corner of the street on which she lived.

To her parents, Norman and Ruth Erstein, the months of uncertainty and anxiety a person can go through. It is a shock so deep you become wooden," the mother explained.

The Ersteins are appealing nationwide for help in locating their daughter. Er-



stein, a chemical engineer at Lockheed in Redlands, and his wife, a psychiatric social worker, have posted a \$5,000 reward for information that will solve the mystery of their daughter's disappearance. They have vowed: "We will not rest until we know."

Neither parent has rested since that first long night when their young daughter failed to come home. They have tracked miles through orange groves, fields, foothills, and canyons in and around the Redlands area. They have followed every lead, no matter how slight, in the search for Elizabeth.

"I can face the daytime better than the night," the distraught mother said. "At night I find myself saying: 'Is she safe? Is she warm? Is she fed? . . . and finally. . . is she alive?'"

When Elizabeth, nicknamed "Liz" by her friends, left for school that March morning, she had only 25¢ with her. She was dressed in a blue dress with white flowers, tennis shoes and a dark-olive corduroy coat. Around her neck she wore a small gold chain with a pendant gold and blue star. Enroute home, she carried a red algebra book and a blue looseleaf notebook. Neither has been found.

Elizabeth is five feet, five inches tall, weighs 105 pounds and had brown hair and brown eyes. She is one of five Erstein children. The family lost one of these, a son, to polio in 1952.

"This, the second tragedy in our lives, is even greater because of the uncertainty," the desperate father said in his appeal to end the nightmare. "I can accept anything, even the worst, which I'm resigned to, but I must know."

Trap Door Yields Giant Enemy Cache

DAU TIENG, VIETNAM (25th Inf. Div., 10)--"Almost like magic, a trap door opened at my feet."

As in an episode from the 1,001 Arabian nights, the opening of the entrance to a "cave" yielded the glimmer of treasure for "Bobcats" of the 1st Battalion (Mech), 5th Infantry.

The trap door opened in front of FIRST LIEUTENANT RONALD J. CLARY OF GRUVER, TEXAS, just after one of his infantrymen had tossed a grenade down an air vent to an enemy bunker, 45 miles northwest of Saigon.

The platoon leader for Bravo Company of the 3d Brigade, 25th Infantry Division battalion was sweeping an area as part of a security operation for the 168th Land Clearing Company (Prov), which is knocking down scrub forest long notorious as an enemy stronghold.

"When the trap door opened, we followed a short tun-

nel into a room 10 feet long, 15 feet wide and six feet high," said Clary.

The underground vault yielded more than 50,000 rounds of enemy AK-47 assault rifle ammunition, 3,500 rounds of 12.7mm caliber machinegun ammunition and three large pressure-anti-tank mines. There were also 98 rounds of 57mm recoilless rifle ammunition.

Commenting on the amazing find, Captain Gregory Hayward said, "Maybe the magic words have changed, but the results haven't."

"All Baba said 'Open Sesame!' But all we had to say was 'fire in the hole' and we got Charlie's treasure."

Meanwhile, not to be done, Charlie Company of the battalion which was sweeping nearby, discovered a second cache, which included 800 lbs of rice and more than 500 lbs of salt.

How much money will a one cent sales tax raise:
Based on last year's record, it is estimated that the city can expect a net annual tax income of at least \$25,000.00.

WHO WILL COLLECT THE TAX?

The tax will be collected by the state, on a contract basis with the city. The state can collect the tax much more cheaply than the city could. Allowing the state to collect the tax will make it simpler and more convenient for business firms, who can file their report in one place, rather than two. The actual cost of collection of the estimated \$25,000.00 tax income will be \$500.00 per year.

WHAT ITEMS WILL BE TAXED?

Items taxed will be exactly the same as items taxed by the state sales tax, and exemptions will be the same as under the state sales tax. The following items are exempt from the one cent sales tax: Cigarettes, Cigars, Automobiles, Water, Telephone & Telegraph, Meals served by hospitals to patients, Meals sold by a church, food products which are not prepared for eating, prescription medicines and prescription eyeglasses, cement, alcohol beverages (unless included on meals), gasoline, farm machinery and products which will be used in the manufacture of another product which is not subject to this tax.

When would sales tax go into effect? The sales tax would go into effect on April 1, 1969.

Property owners should not expect a reduction of their taxes, but the sales tax would at least spare them from bearing the entire amount of future increases. With the sales levy, everyone will help pay for the services that all enjoy and make use of. If the sales tax does not pass the need for additional revenue will still exist; this issue can no longer be ignored; the City Administration will have to consider other ways of raising funds.

AS A BUSINESSMAN, WHY FAVOR A SALES TAX?
A run-down city runs down business. Experience in other cities has proved that a sales tax does not hurt retail business. A better, safer, more progressive city will attract industry and people. That means more business, not less. If Spearman has adequate finances, it will continue to grow.

How has the sales tax affected other Cities? Other cities have found from experience that the tax does not drive people and business out of the city, but on the contrary, promotes city growth. As of September 1968, 301 cities in Texas have adopted this tax.

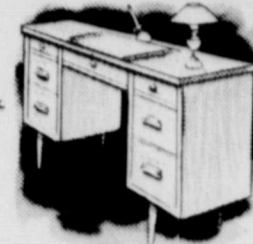

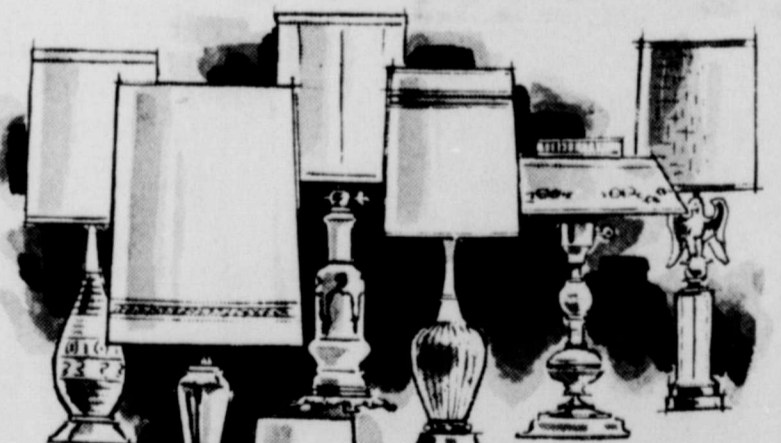
