



FFA Take Honors At Ft Worth Stock Show

At this time of year Future Farmers of America are involved in the most rewarding part of their training. It's the stock show season and they are exhibiting projects which have been underway for months. Through their projects they learn patience, discipline, and sportsmanship--including how to win modestly and lose graciously. They learn to work, play and cooperate with others and how to present demonstrations with poise and confidence.

Such was the case this past week at the Fort Worth Stock Show when FFA members exhibited swine and cattle. The Spearman chapter showed 21 head of swine and 16 of these won ribbons.

Jim Kunselman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Don Kunselman brought home six honors, one of them a light weight Hamp won Reserve Champion breed honors. Kunselman's heavy weight Poland also won Reserve Champion breed. Jim won 12th place 1w Hamp, 9th

place 1w Duroc, 6th place 1w Duroc and 4th place 1w Cross.

Jerry Hawkins won three ribbons: 15th place 1w Hamp, 2nd place 1w Spot and 11th place 1w Poland.

Pat Sloan exhibited a Reserve Champion in the light weight Chester Breed and Gary Evans won Reserve Champion honors with his heavy weight Spot. These reserve champions were out of Breed entries with over 200 in each entry.

The Fort Worth show had an overall entry of some 1365 head of swine.

Other swine honors went to Richard Sasser, 9th place 1w Duroc; Joe Bob Grayson, 1st place 1w York; Steve Hicks, 11th place 1w Hamp; Ronald Howarter, 1w Duroc, 2nd place. Ronald's pig was runner-up to the reserve breed champion of the show. Kenneth Donahue took 14th place with his light weight Spot. Phil Sanders took third place honors in the "carcass" class with his Hereford steer. This

was an outstanding honor for Phil since a place in the carcass class is much more difficult to win than an "on the hoof" showing according to Ag instructor Herman Boone.

Joe Vanderburg took 3rd place honors with his Short-horn Steer and Pat Sloan's Short-horn heifer won 2nd place.

THREE NEW YELLOW CORN HYBRIDS FOR TEXAS--The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has developed three new yellow corn hybrids--Texas 425N, Texas 30A and TAM Dwarf 1. 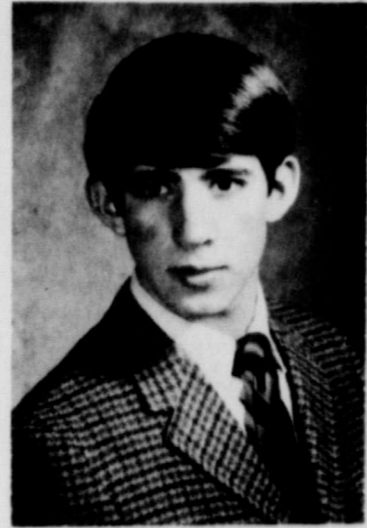

Texas Politics by Rep. Malouf Abraham

This has been the big week so far - when we got our Committee assignments. There are 45 committees with something close to 730 places to fill. Rumors floated around for several days about who would get what and why. After we got the assignments, everyone was comparing notes sorta like kids and their report cards. I came out just fine and wound up with 5 committees instead of the 4 I had last session. Here's the lineup:

ENROLLED AND ENGROSS-ED BILLS: This is more of a check and double check to make sure that all bills passed are properly processed and all up to snuff.

LIVESTOCK: This is a committee I served on last session and am sure you understand what this is about.

PARKS AND WILDLIFE: I was a little surprised in getting on the committee but am pleased. With the Gene Howe Wildlife Management area in my district and Palo Duro park nearby and the emphasis being placed on expansion of recreation, this could be a very interesting committee.

REVENUE AND TAXATION: This is one of the top committees and one that's got our work cut out. Someway we've got to find a bunch of dough and I'm afraid this is the place. This will be lots of midnight oil and certainly most educational although

probably not a Dale Carnegie type. **SCHOOL DISTRICTS:** This could be a real sleeper. Next week we will get our Committees all lined out and start hearings on the bills. We already have over 100 bills introduced although it's sorta jumping the gun. Ate breakfast down town at a table with the Governor, some other members and some lobbyists.

Barnes Says School Bill Won't Pass

AUSTIN--Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes predicted defeat of the proposed compulsory consolidation of school districts in Texas.

"The Governor's Committee on Public School Education has made many constructive recommendations. I feel that the Texas Senate will pass many of them," Barnes said in a statement released this week. "However, I feel that the Texas Senate will not pass compulsory consolidation," the new lieutenant governor said.

Barnes added that the recommendation to consolidate school districts with less than 2,600 students will probably fall on deaf ears.

"The Texas Senate and this Legislature will probably write an attractive financial incentive program to encourage voluntary consolidation but will not adopt laws making consolidation compulsory

in Texas this year," Barnes said. Compulsory consolidation and other recommendations of the Governor's Committee on Public School Education are included in Senate Bill No. 2 which was introduced last week by Senator A. R. Schwartz of Galveston and Senator Oscar Mauzy of Dallas. The bill has been referred to the Senate Education Committee.

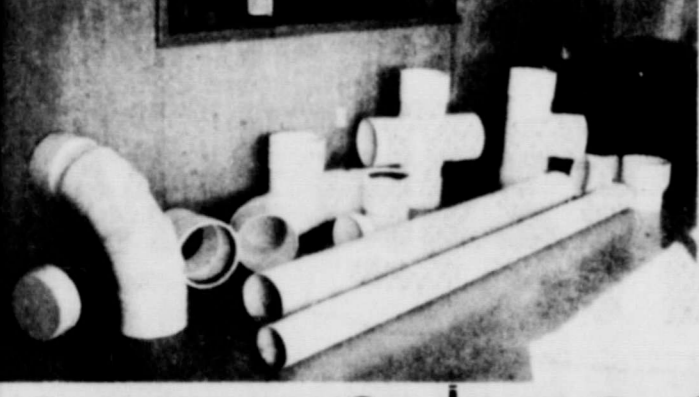

Sign-up For Commodity Program Now Underway

Sign-up dates for farmers who wish to take part in the 1968 Feed Grain, Wheat and Cotton programs began Monday Feb. 5 and will continue through Friday, March 21, according to Ellzey Vandenberg, Hansford County ASCS Mgr.

It is extremely important that your certification on wheat, cotton and feed grain be accurate," Vandenberg said. He also stated that when making this certification, farmers will be expected to accurately report acreage devoted to each program crop, as well as diverted acreage and to be ready to identify the respective fields upon request. "An error in this reporting may result in the loss of all or a substantial part of any payments otherwise earned," he said.

To help farmers meet program provisions fully, the ASCS office is offering measurement service at a nominal cost upon request. If farmers ARE NOT SURE of their certified acreage, Vandenberg suggests that they come by the office and request this measurement service.

In the past the county committee has been able to approve the burning of irrigated small grain stubble in some cases so that it would not effect that years ACP cost-sharing. DUE TO A CHANGE at the state level, the committee will no longer be able to approve any stubble burning. Therefore, farmers are reminded that deliberate burning of crop residue will result in loss of ACP cost-share payments.

Under the feed grain program for 1968, farmers may earn diversion and price support payments as well as qualify for price-support loans on their corn, barley and grain sorghum crops; feed grain diversion payments will be available to all producers participating in 1968.

The wheat program provides diversion payments for reducing acreage below the farm allotment and price sup-

port loans on all the wheat produced on the farm. It also provides marketing certificates to being returns up to full parity on the part of the wheat crop allocated for domestic use.

Vandenberg said his office has no information as of the date on advance payments on any commodity program. This determination has not been announced from Washington as yet.

R-R Pays \$20,084

Current annual taxes paid to the various government agencies by Texas railroads in Hansford County totaled \$20,084, it is announced by the Texas Railroad Association.

That amount was the county's share of the more than \$30,000,000 the rail-

roads paid in Texas on their own right of way and other property.

The biggest railroad contribution was to the school systems throughout the state. Large sums were also distributed to city, village and county governments and for road and bridge funds.

In addition, of course, was the large total in taxes the railroads' 30,848 Texas employees contributed on their own property. The vast majority of rail workers, many of whom live in Hansford County, own their own homes.

"I am delighted that nearly half of the taxes paid by the railroads in Texas go to support the schools," said Walter Caven, general counsel of the Texas Railroad Association. "The future of our country depends to a great extent upon the education of our youth" he said.

Recognizing this need for education, many of the railroads operating in Texas also make scholarships available to a large number of students every year."

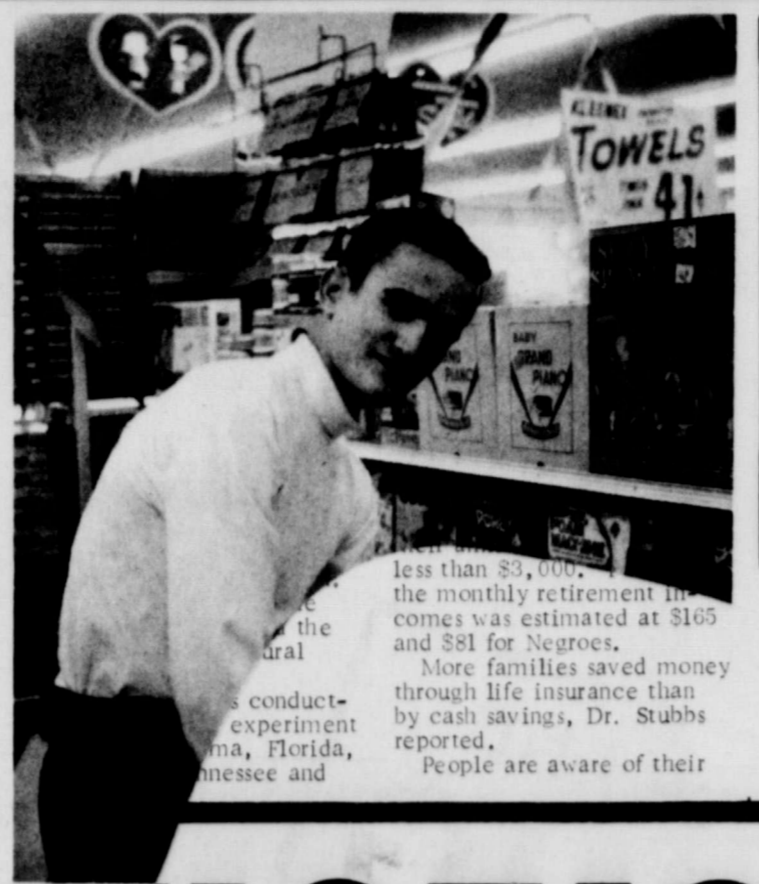

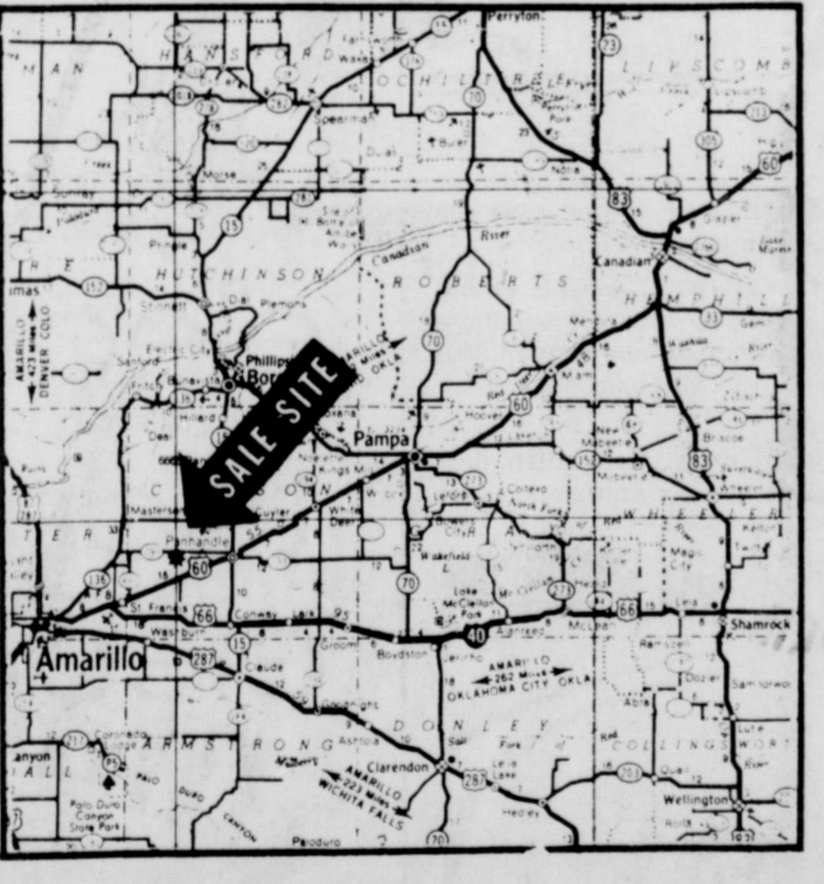

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AUSTIN--Ben Barnes became the 37th Lieutenant Governor of Texas and the youngest ever to hold the office as he was administered the oath of office by Texas Supreme Court Chief Justice Robert W. Calvert. "Let us preserve the old values which are under assault from so many quarters today, but let us welcome without fear the new ideas and innovations which move our government forward,"

Barnes told the thousands gathered to witness the inauguration ceremonies on the Capitol steps.

As Lieutenant Governor, Barnes serves as presiding officer of the Senate and acts as Governor during the Governor's absence from the state.

Barnes, who will be 31 in April, has already established himself as both a state and national political leader. As the leader of the ticket

in the 1968 General Election, he became the only candidate ever to receive two million votes in Texas. He has eight years of legislative experience and before his election as Lieutenant Governor he was the fourth man in history to serve two terms as Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives.

Barnes is President of the National Legislative Conference, made up of state legislative leaders of the 50 states and holds governing positions in several other intergovernmental organizations of national scope. He has served on advisory groups at the national level and as a representative of the U. S. State Department to committee-level conference in Europe of both the United Nations and the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

A native of Comanche County, Barnes has received numerous honors, including honorary degrees of Doctor of Laws from both McMurry College and Texas Technological

College. He was named one of Five Outstanding Young Texans by the Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce in 1965.

Rural Families To Face Poverty

COLLEGE STATION, Jan.--More than a third of all rural southerners will face poverty in some degree during retirement, predicts a recent five-state research report.

"The survey indicates that the public should act to solve some of the human issues involved in rural retirement," says Dr. Alice Stubbs, head of the home economics department of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Some of these issues are substandard housing and the social adversities of rural isolation, she said.

The research was conducted by cooperative experiment stations in Alabama, Florida, Georgia and Tennessee and

Texas. Dr. H. O. Kunkel, dean of Texas A&M's College of Agriculture, served the project as administrative advisor.

The research was to find how rural families were preparing economically for old age. Results showed that at least 1.5 million rural families in the five states will eventually receive annual retirement incomes of less than \$75 a month for a family of two persons. This will come from Social Security and Welfare.

The study also showed that pre-retirement family income relate directly to economic expectations for retirement. In general, most Negroes and many whites reported their annual incomes were less than \$3,000. For white the monthly retirement incomes was estimated at \$165 and \$81 for Negroes.

need for money income and medical care in older age, she said, but they are not aware of the need to prepare for using their increased leisure time.

Research

COLLEGE STATION, Jan.--Severe malnourishment in the first months of life stunts a child's brain growth, new research directly has pointed out.

The brain damage cannot be repaired by proper feeding later in the child's life. Frances Reasonover, Extension foods and nutrition specialist reports the brain's working cells reach their full number just before and after birth.

The research said the critical growth period is completed by six months of age. Miss Reasonover reports that improper feeding before this time could have 60 percent below the normal brain cell content.

1969 Census Will Require Good Records

COLLEGE STATION, Jan. 30--Farm and ranch operators will need good records for the 1969 census of agriculture, according to James Mallett, Extension farm management specialist at Texas A&M University.

The farm census will be taken by questionnaires mailed out in January of 1970 to be completed and returned by mail. Response is required by law and information for each farm will be entirely confidential.

The census will ask for amounts spent for feed, fertilizer, pesticides, lime, gasoline, livestock, and poultry. Other information will include size of the farm, age of the operator, value of farm products sold, off farm employment, income from recreational use of the farm and numerous other items.

Mallett emphasized that

good records are also essential to today's commercial farmer. Top management required for success with narrow profit margins in agriculture must rely on complete and accurate information about the farm or ranch business.

There are two kinds of farm and ranch records, according to Mallett--financial records and production records. Financial records are used to make tax reports, analyze the performance of the farm, and establish a basis for credit and other services.

Production records combined with financial records can be used to determine the profitability of each practice or enterprise. Production records include yields per acre, weaning weights of calves or pigs, milk production per cow, percent calf crop, the cost of producing a unit of output and other measures of production efficiency.

Good farm records alone will not insure success. Even the best farm records are of little value if they are not used, said Mallett.
